SIR WILLIAM

**Mr C C Muller—Head** Was it the beautiful weather that made me discuss Frisbees in this week's assembly? It was certainly Dexter Dyas' wonderful book The Ten Types of Human which gave me the information and initial incentive. In this compelling read (best book for me in 2018), Dyas gives an account of Kip Williams, a psychology professor. Williams, at the start of his academic career, used to spend a lot of his research with rats – forgivably he eventually had had enough of rats and wanted to work with humans instead.

There was one day, Dyas narrates, that changed Williams' life forever and it began like any other day. He was walking his dog and had taken a rest on the grass by a lake. As he sat on a blanket, minding his own business, a Frisbee rolled up from behind. He picked up the Frisbee and threw it back to the two individuals.

To Williams' surprise the man who caught it threw it back towards him. Without words and signs, all three were now playing Frisbee together. Then, after about two minutes, the men stopped tossing the Frisbee to him, and for no reason the game had ended for him.

Williams was out; he felt foolish. He said that at the time he felt humiliated; he also felt hurt. Unsurprisingly, as a practising psychologist, he began to rationalise his feelings.

What shocked him was that only a few minutes before he did not even know of the existence of these people. And yet...he cared that he was no longer part of this particular group.

So what was going on? Through years of careful and meticulous research Williams and this team realised that all human beings have a fear of being excluded. Social ostracism is something that hurts us all. His research further found that it did not matter who one was nor what personality one possessed, we are all wounded by being left out.

By being excluded, our need to feel we belong is put at risk. Simply put: we no longer have the sense that we are important to someone

From the averted glance to the rejection on social media, no matter which scenario Williams explored, each exclusion caused social pain. In the words of Dyas "there is now a substantial body of

experimental research documenting how the brain registers this social pain. The research shows that we recruit the same or similar neural systems as when we experience trauma that is physical". In other words when we say "she hurt my feelings", or "he broke my heart", social rejection is something that we feel physically as well as mentally.

Of course knowing this does not provide a solution to these painful social interactions. But what it does show is that we all suffer and experience the hurt of exclusion. As such, we should show greater empathy for those who have been excluded as well as search for ways to reduce its likelihood.
