**MR C C MULLER—HEAD** As the summer term comes to its final stages, the Lower Sixth are busily engaged in deciding what they might like to do after SWPS. For many, the decision in principle is easy – to continue their education at an institution of higher learning. For others a gap year might be the right answer. For yet others a degree apprenticeship looks attractive. So what guidance is out there? What consideration should any young person consider in their choice of university?

descriptions that any individual looking at university might ask. They are not the usual questions of location, length of degree etc. but rather questions that students have often wished they had asked instead once they were at university.

The first is simple but obvious: **how much teaching will I actually receive?** You will be paying a lot of money for your education so the number of scheduled teaching hours is important. Find out what you'll be doing in those hours – are there long periods in the laboratory? Or are you expected to work on your own for a large part of the week? It is certainly worth finding out before you make a decision what the course you are intending to pursue will offer you in terms of contact and teaching time.

The second question to ask is about how you like to learn? Do you perform better in examinations or is coursework the way in which you perform best? Do you like lectures or seminars? Are you happy studying on your own in the library? Be honest with yourself and consider how the course you might like to study is structured? Does it suit you?



The third is **money**: university is not cheap- the living costs in terms of food etc., the rent of the accommodation as well as the education itself all need to be funded and can be expensive. There is, however, extra funding available which range from scholarships to bursaries. Every university will have guidance in this area and it is certainly worth going onto the university website to find out what is available.

And finally **the degree itself**. Many employers will look at a 2.1 as a minimum requirement for an interview. How well you do will ultimately be reflected in the degree class, which of course depends on the hard work and effort you put in as an individual. But you need to be supported in what you are doing. A way of checking this is to look at the percentage of students who graduate with a 2.1 or better class of degree and compare that with other universities. If there is a big difference, and yet the entry requirements are the same, it is certainly worth asking why this is the case.

So these are my four key, outside the box, questions which I encourage all our potential students to ask. They are not by any means a definitive list, but I think that they are worthwhile. Higher learning can, and should be, a brilliant time in one's life, so it is worth spending a bit of time doing some research and asking questions.





"Celestial Bodies" is set in the village of al-Awafi in Oman, where we encounter three sisters: Mayya, who marries Abdallah after a heartbreak; Asma, who marries from a sense of duty; and Khawla who rejects all offers while waiting for her beloved, who

has emigrated to Canada. These three women and their families witness Oman evolve from a traditional, slave-owning society slowly redefining itself after the colonial era, to the crossroads of its complex present. Elegantly structured and taut, "Celestial Bodies" is a coiled spring of a novel, telling of Oman's coming-of-age through the prism of one family's losses and loves.
