

# SWPS NEWS



MR C C MULLER-HEAD My assembly this week had the potential to cause controversy. It also provided easy ammunition for the students to think that I am really "out of touch". On Wednesday morning I talked about Reality TV, with a particular focus on the latest craze: Love Island.

Full disclosure first - I am genuinely baffled by its popularity and wider-spread interest. Perhaps, then, I am not the best person to take a view on this, but here goes: what has struck me recently is the way Reality TV programmes focus almost exclusively on how we look.

People on these shows are nearly always presented in swimsuits, with the clear message being that this is the "perfect" image. How a person looks, how they are valued and what impression they make is based on their body - and what seems to be important is how they appear rather than what they say, think or believe.

It is no surprise that human beings judge on appearances: they always have. Indeed some evolutionary biologists have argued that physical beauty is linked in subtle ways to bodily health: organ function, child bearing, and a host of other factors, all of which help a person better survive and adapt.

However, Reality TV Shows take this a step further, by promoting the objectification of people as entertainment in itself. Openly judging a person according to their body, placing a value on them solely because of their appearance and deciding on this basis if they are worthy of further attention would seem to be a necessary feature of these shows.

Yet, we are more than just our bodies and we are, of course, more than just how we look. Inside bodies are actual people, with feelings, thoughts and values. Kindness and trust, love and judgement, integrity and compassion - all go beyond our body and this is who we are.

In reducing people to how they look and in treating them as an object to be assessed, we commit Kant's grave error: treating people as a means to an end, rather than an end in themselves. In addition we perpetuate a message that how we look is more important than how we feel, who we are, or what we can do for each other.

Such objectification of people changes how we relate to ourselves and each other, and not in a good way. Reality TV turns the objectification of people into entertainment to be enjoyed and in doing so reinforces the concept that how we look is the most important thing above all else.

It is not.

So I have a new idea for the producers of Reality TV shows: "Kindness Island" with the winner being who displays the most kindness to those in the group?

# **'The Creativity Code'** by Marcus Du Sautoy.



Will a computer ever compose a symphony, write a prize-winning novel, or paint a masterpiece? And if so, would we be able to tell the difference?

As humans, we have an extraordinary ability to create works of art that elevate, expand and transform what it means to be alive. Yet in many other areas, new developments in AI are shaking up the status quo, as we find out how many of the tasks humans engage in can be done equally well, if not better, by machines.

But can machines be creative? Will they soon be able to learn from the art that moves us, and understand what distinguishes it from the mundane?



Marcus finds out how long it might be before machines come up with something creative, and whether they might jolt us into being more imaginative in turn. The result is a fascinating and very different exploration into both AI and the essence of what it means to be human.
