Student Rep Reports:

8. Tracy High FFA: Madison Kelley and Anthony Santiago reported that they have 429 members which is an increase of 50 from last year. This summer 39 students attended ag fest showing sheep, goats, dairy, pigs and small animals. The officer team met for dinner to plan the year. They had a candle fundraiser and their first meeting with 160 members attending. They hosted the freshman BBQ to welcome them to the ag department. The chapter officer leadership training is this weekend in Modesto. They have 5 teams training for the speech contest opening and closing ceremonies and are excited to have so many students attending. One of

the students has a garden project and the produce will be harvested and sold.

West High FFA: Renae Leighton, Jocelyn Estrada, Veronica Martinez-Mota, and Tatiana Maya each introduced themselves and their position. They are doing various things such as raising chickens to sell and show at the fair, impromptu and ag sales, and job interview team. They will have a tri tip dinner sale for \$35.00 that includes salad, 4 cookies and 4 rolls. The sales close Thursday and pickup is between 3:00 and 6:00. The Fall Festival caters towards younger kids in our community and will be held on October 20th from 12-4:00 pm in the school garden.

Recognition & Presentations:

9.1 Villalovoz Elementary School Presentation

Principal, Erin Quintana, and Assistant Principal, Derek Sprecksel presented a power point on their team and showed a video where teachers and students spoke about their school. Teachers are working with common goals through PLCs. PLCs is a process where teachers are given a time for grade level teams to come together and analyze how to get students moving forward. Through staff efforts, each student will have a positive, productive and challenging experience at Villa.

Tracy High child care class is partnering with Villalovoz. Tracy High Students shadow the Villa teachers and help support the Villa students. Students active in Panda Paws are student leaders who help the community. Math Olympiad promotes problem solving skills, builds self-esteem and increases test scores. The Parent Faculty Club has parents working together as a team with teachers. They fundraise and make sure everyone works together to fill the needs of students. They have craft night, a talent show, and Parent Café where they help support kids academically and practice English.

10.2.1 Receive Report on the 2018 Summer Bridge Program

Director of Continuous Improvement, State and Federal Programs, Julianna Stocking, presented a power point on the Summer Bridge Program. This is the 2nd year at each of the high schools. It is for incoming 9th graders and helps them adapt to the high school culture, study skills and fun engaging projects which creates student success. She reviewed the administrators and teaching staff at each high school and the daily schedule, which included breakfast. Their day includes high school cultures, study skills, fun projects, team building/goal They showed pictures of students setting lunch and reflection. participating in team building activities. Jeff Baker and Tony Irizarry spoke about the program. They offer after schoolwork on Tuesdays and Thursdays with great follow through. Students are getting extra study skills and learning how to cope better. There is an average of 50 students on a regular basis. They are putting resources together and seeing regular response from students and they are taking advantage of supports. There is a quarterly check-in and having end of quarter checkin to keep parents engage as well.

The program offers academic support and tutorial service. They are

leveraging the AVID, AP and IB students to assist in tutoring. It also builds relationships student to student. Bridge teachers have leveraged their colleagues and other teachers are now helping with tutorials. They are starting parent workshops and working with parent liaisons. Students will continue with monthly counselor check-in. They just held their first all counselor meeting where all in the district attended and worked together. Some students are participating in a pilot freshman seminar at West High who need intensive support throughout the day. They were spotlighted in Outlook, a San Joaquin County Office of Education publication. They had an exit survey that will be emailed in the Friday Memo. Students said the program helped them make friends and not feel nervous. They wanted more time to visit the campus and specific classrooms. They are always looking to better our program for next year. Students described teachers as cool, lit, etc. and were very positive about the college tour. The report shows the number of students and where they attended 8th grade. 155 students responded to the survey.

20.2.2 Receive Report on Special Education Programs and Services

Associate Superintendent of Human Resources, Tammy Jalique, and Special Education Program Administrator, Jason Davis and Behavior Specialist, Laura Blanchard gave a presentation on the special ed Mr. Davis presented the power point which reviewed our schools and the various programs and services at each site. TUSD serves over 2000 students with disabilities which is about 11% of our total enrollment. The IEP should be tailored to help children make progress and will determine what services are appropriate. Students should be included in regular education to the maximum extent that is appropriate. When decisions are made to remove students, it is done by a team and the parent. TUSD has 32 resource specialists that includes push in and pull out support, paras and support based on IEP goals. There are currently 45 special day classes offered from Pre-k through young adult. When students are moved from an SDC to a regular class it is based on IEP decisions and the support is based on their needs. He reviewed the county operated SDC classes and the more specialized interventions they can provide. Students can be referred to county programs in areas of specialization including autism, visual impairment and hard of hearing. Non-public schools serve approximately 34 of our students with the goal for students to make progress. These programs cost are much more expensive. The cost associated with these services is about \$1.5 million dollars for these 34 students, which is approximately \$50,000 per student plus transportation costs. The district contributes about \$18 million dollars towards this cost, because funding falls short. We offer a robust preschool program and assess and identify students before age 3 so we can intervene. Compared to other districts in the area, we have a very substantial program and we should be proud of it. TUSD also provides teletherapy as well as on site speech services. The behavior intervention services team focuses on teaching social skills, teacher

consultation, and classroom management support. Students also receive mental health services which includes the Second Step program, counseling by our school psychologists and counseling by Valley Community Counseling. We offer a great young adult program and work with the county workability program where students can get experience, earn money and get job skills. All of our students aged 16 and up have secondary transition goals and services. Targets were reviewed and TUSD is working on student achievement in ELA and math. We involve parents in the development of their child's IEP. The county SELPA has a Community Advisory Committee which is a resource for parents. We have 2 parent representatives and also has fliers if interested in learning more about this committee.

11. Rebecca Ray of Barnes and Noble commented that she enjoyed the West High JROTC and moment of silence. They did a great job. She is here tonight to partner with our schools. They have raised thousands of dollars for books. She wants to help and will be reaching out to parents, teachers and students. They offer all TUSD educators to sign up for a free educator card for extra discounts. They support early literacy and have a "My favorite teacher contest". Submissions are judged in March. She also wanted to let us know of a family resource and referral program. You call 211 and are connected to a live person if in need.

Board Reports:

Trustee Costa thanked Julie for putting together the Bridge Program report. It's in its 2nd year and it is amazing the things that the kids are able to accomplish once

given the opportunity and direction. She thanked the administrators, teachers and district office that put it together. It's a great program. Trustee Vaughn wanted to piggy back on what Trustee Costa said. He thanked Ms. Stocking for her hard work and dedication in getting our kids connected. It makes a big difference. He also thought Mr. Davis did an excellent job and it was a thorough report, one of the best he has seen. He congratulated all of our teachers on reaching the Tentative Agreements. It's a great step in the right direction and is glad to see that happen at the beginning of the year. He wants all of our teachers to be happy throughout the school year. He attended the Kimball High powder puff game last night. It was held at the West High field and the junior girls pulled it off at the end. It was fun to watch and to see his son as one of the cheerleaders. He went to the College Bound meeting last Saturday and that was well attended. Ms. Stocking was there to support as well. He thanked a few of the parents that are in the audience tonight for taking time to come out. He appreciates all that parents do to support our students. He also apologized for his tardiness as he had a class tonight and a webinar. Trustee Gouveia commended the special education program, the Bridge Program and TEA. It's nice to see mutual respect on this board. We hear you and like to see the best for all. At the parks meeting they reviewed the new proposed and revised program for facility use and the restrooms at Legacy Fields are being worked on. Trustee Guzman also thought all of the reports were very good. He congratulated TEA and the district for working together. He also commended the FFA programs for Tracy and West. These programs continue to grow and are very successful. He attended the facilities committee meeting. There are several projects. Clover School buildings are coming up and their high school may be moving in during winter break. Central is coming along and may be completed in the spring of 2019. North School is another project coming up. He attended the TLC meeting and they are very excited about moving in and they have their homecoming on October 3rd. Trustee Arriola congratulated the teachers for this accomplishment. He believes that collective bargaining has done a lot for this country. He thanked Julie for the Bridge Report and Mr. Davis for the special ed presentation. Both were excellent. He had the opportunity to attend a 911 dinner raising money for local non-profits. It was a great event. During 911 he was a 6th grader and remembers seeing it on the news. Trustee Gilbert appreciated the opportunity for silence for 911. She was working as a nurse in Wyoming in the operating room. It was devastating to watch and affected so many people. Our democracy is better off because we are more aware of what's going on. she thanked the teachers for the tentative agreements. The Bridge Program is fantastic and getting better. She appreciated the special ed presentation. Her family came to Tracy in 1985 and had 5 children. One of the reasons she ran for the board was because she was concerned about special ed. Her son had graduated in Samoa and since past away but her other son is doing very well. After tonight, this will be her last night as a school board member. Her family is moving out of state. She would like to thank the members of the board who she has served with for their insight, services and skills. She also thanked cabinet. They truly have the best interest of the students at heart. She thanked Dr. Stephens. She has learned how to be a team member and how to collaborate. They don't always agree and sometimes we need to be seen and not heard. She appreciates each member of the board and appreciates the district for allowing her to serve the public. She will miss it. Trustee Silva commented that getting to know Trustee Gilbert and watching her grow as board member has been a great experience. She brought an important and

heartfelt perspective to the board. We wish her the best in the future. He appreciated all of the presentations tonight. Mr. Davis and Ms. Jalique have come into a program that was experiencing some difficulties and there was a tough road ahead. The presentation was very good and detailed and looks like we are moving in the right direction. He appreciates the efforts they have both put into this. The Bridge Program is a wonderful program and a big win for the district. He is happy and pleased with its progress. He thanked TEA and congratulated them on the contract and for collaborating and making that happen early in the year. He attended the facilities meeting and thanked Bonny, Orlando and Anthony for their work. Compared to 10 years ago, our campuses are looking great. He attended the West and Kimball game and the Ceres game. On 911 he was driving on the Altamont pass listening to the radio. He realized we were under attack and thought about turning around and going home. If he did that he would have let them win and he wasn't going to do that and ended up going to work. It is important that we remember that day and the people who sacrificed so much to allow us to do our jobs.

Superintendent Report:

Dr. Stephens thanked TEA for the agreement. He recognized and thanked Jacqui Nott. They sat down and in a matter of moments were able to work out the deal. It's been a great relationship. He also thanked Trustee Gilbert for being a board member. He has been blessed in getting to know her and the quality person she is. He wished her family good luck. BACKGROUND: California Education Code 60119 (as amended by Statutes of 2012, Chapter 668, Section 3, effective January 1, 2013) requires that the governing board hold an annual public hearing regarding the sufficiency of instructional materials encouraging the input of parents, teachers, members of the community interested in the affairs of the school district, and bargaining unit leaders. The public hearing is held to determine whether "each pupil in each school in the District has sufficient textbooks or instructional materials, or both, that are aligned to the content standards adopted pursuant to Section 60605 in each of the following subjects, as appropriate, that are consistent with the content and cycles of the curriculum framework adopted by the State Board:

- (i.) Mathematics
- (ii.) Science
- (iii.) History-Social Science
- (iv.) English/Language Arts, including the English Language Development component of an adopted program."

RATIONALE: The public hearing requirement is one component of the state audit guide. This item aligns with District Strategic Goal #1: Prepare all students to be well-rounded individuals with the knowledge and skills to pursue their college and/or careers.

This requirement is met in several different ways, depending on the value of the requisition, the types of services or materials being procured, the value of the fee, dedication, services or other requirements being offered to or by the District and the advance notice staff has in procuring the services or materials; or the timing required to negotiate the agreement on behalf of the District. Routine requisitions less than \$5,000 are ratified on the consent calendar when the board approves the warrants list. Except when specific exceptions are detailed in board policies and procedures, requisitions greater than \$15,000 are submitted as action items for board pre-approval. The summary is organized alphabetically so that the project's back-up material is identified with the same letter in the lower left hand corner.

BACKGROUND: The Boys and Girls Clubs of Tracy have been providing after school services in the community at school sites for over 20 years. Monte Vista Middle School is identified as an area of need due to the number of low-income families. The Boys and Girls Club has been operating after school services at Monte Vista for several years. Due to the success of the program, Monte Vista staff would like to continue our association with the Boys and Girls Club at Monte Vista as they provide after school services that the regular school program cannot, specifically academic tutoring and school wide sport participation. This Agenda was electronically submitted for the June 26 Board Meeting; however, it was found the electronic submission was not received. Therefore, this Board Agenda item is seeking ratification.

3.	In consideration of the services performed by Contractor, District shall pay Contractor according to the following fee schedule:
	a. District shall pay \$20,000 per [] HOUR [] DAY [X] FLAT RATE, not to exceed a total of \$20,000 Contractor shall only be paid for work completed to the satisfaction of District through the termination date of this agreement.
	b. District [] SHALL [X] SHALL NOT reimburse Contractor for out-of-pocket expenses incurred during Contractor's performance of the services, including: mileage, meals and lodging in the District, with rates not to exceed those currently in effect for employees of the District. Reimbursement of expenses shall not exceed \$0 for the term of this agreement.
	c. District shall make payment on a [] MONTHLY PROGRESS BASIS [X] SINGLE PAYMENT UPON COMPLETION OF THE DUTIES and within thirty (30) working days from Contractor's presentation of a detailed invoice or on a claim form provided by District. Original paid receipts are required for lodging, air fare (passenger coupon or ticket stub), automobile rental, and parking. Claims for unusual expenses, such as teaching materials, photocopying, etc., must be accompanied by original paid invoices.
4.	The terms of the agreement shall commence on August 6, 2018 , and shall terminate on May 24, 2019
5.	This agreement may be terminated at any time during the term by either party upon days' written notice of termination delivered by certified mail, return receipt requested.

- 6. Amendments, changes or modifications in the terms of this Agreement may only be made at any time by mutual written agreement between the parties hereto and shall be signed by the persons authorized to bind the parties hereto.
- 7. Contractor shall contact the District's designee, <u>Dr. Barbara Silver</u>, at (209) 830-3340 with any questions regarding performance of the services outlined above. District's designee shall determine if and when Contractor has completed the services described.
- 8. Contractor enters into this Agreement as an independent contractor and not as an employee of the District. The Contractor shall have no power or authority by this Agreement to bind the District in any respect except as provided herein. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to be inconsistent with this relationship or status. All employees, agents, contractors or subcontractors hired or retained by the Contractor are employees, agents, contractors or subcontractors of the Contractor and not of the District. The District shall not be obligated in any way to pay any wage claims or other claims made against Contractor by any such employees, agents, contractors or subcontractors, or any other person resulting from performance of this Agreement.
 - a. CONTRACTOR shall be required to provide proof (Certificate of Insurance) of comprehensive general liability insurance coverage in the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) combined single limit per occurrence; two million dollars (\$2,000,000.00) general aggregate. A separate additional insured endorsement shall be provided to include the DISTRICT and its officers, officials, employees, agents and volunteers as additional insured in the policy. It is agreed that insurance coverage provided by CONTRACTOR herein is endorsed as primary and noncontributory to any similar insurance or self-insurance carried by DISTRICT. The DISTRICT reserves the right to adjust its insurance requirements as needed.
 - b. Contractor [X] WILL [] WILL NOT have significant contact with students. If applicable, proof of professional liability insurance, to include one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) per occurrence for Sexual Abuse/Molestation is also required. If applicable, CONTRACTOR will comply with the provisions of Education Code 45125 regarding the submission of fingerprints to the California Department of Justice and the completion of criminal background investigations of the CONTRACTOR and/or its employees.

Contractor agrees to hold harmless and to indemnify District for:

Any injury to person or property sustained by Contractor or by any person, firm or corporation employed directly or indirectly by the Contractor or by any of the individuals participating in or associated with him or her, however caused; and any injury to person or property sustained by any person, firm or corporation, caused by act, neglect, default or omission of Contractor, or any person, firm or corporation directly or indirectly employed by Contractor upon or in connection with this Agreement, or any of the participants arising out of or in the course of their term of this Agreement, and Contractor at his or her own cost, expense and risk, shall defend any and all actions, suits or other legal proceedings that may be instituted against District for any such action, suit or legal proceedings or the result thereof. Nothing herein provided shall be construed to require Contractor to hold harmless or indemnify District for liability or damages resulting from the negligence or willful act or omission of District or its officers, agents or employees.

9. This Agreement is for the personal services of the Contractor and Contractor may not assign the performance of the services to any person or persons who are not parties to this Agreement except for employees of Contractor. None of the services covered by this Agreement shall be subcontracted without the prior written consent of the District, which will not be unreasonably withheld. Contractor shall be as fully responsible to the District for the negligent acts and omissions of its contractors and subcontractors, and of persons either directly or indirectly

employed by them, as it is for the negligent acts and omissions of persons directly employed by Contractor.

- 10. Contractor certifies that his or her current employer, if any, is fully cognizant of this Agreement and that payments hereunder are not in conflict with any federal, state, or local statutes, rules or regulations or with any policies of Contractor's current employer. Contractor covenants that neither it, nor any of its employees, agents, contractors or subcontractors has any interest, nor shall they acquire any interest, direct or indirect, in the subject of the Agreement, nor any other interest which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of its services hereunder. Contractor shall make all disclosures required by the District's conflict of interest code in accordance with the category designated by the District, unless the District determines in writing that Contractor's duties are more limited in scope than is warranted by the category designated by the District code and that a narrower disclosure category should apply. Contractor also agrees to make disclosure in compliance with the District conflict of interest code if, at any time after the execution of this Agreement, District determines and notifies Contractor in writing that Contractor's duties under this Agreement warrant greater disclosure by Contractor than was originally contemplated. Contractor shall make disclosures in the time, place and manner set forth in the conflict of interest code and as directed by the District.
- 11. District shall become the owner of, and entitled to, exclusive possession of all records, documents, graphs, photographic or other reproductions of any kind produced in the scope of services performed and no other uses thereof will be permitted except by permission of the District. Proprietary materials will be exempted from this clause.
- 12. Contractor shall keep itself fully informed of, shall observe and comply with, and shall cause any and all persons, firms or corporations employed by it or under its control to observe and comply with, applicable federal, state, county and municipal laws, ordinances, regulations, orders and decrees which in any manner affect those engaged or employed on the work described by this Agreement or the materials used or which in any way affect the conduct of the work.
- 13. Contractor shall not engage in unlawful employment discrimination. Such unlawful employment discrimination includes, but is not limited to, employment discrimination based upon a person's race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical handicap, medical condition, marital status, gender, citizenship, or sexual orientation.
- 14. Contractor shall maintain and make available for inspection by the District and its auditors accurate records of all of its costs, disbursements and receipts with respect to any work under this Contract. Such inspections may be made during regular office hours at any time until six (6) months after the final payments under this Agreement are made to the Contractor.

BACKGROUND: A team of core teachers and administrator(s) will travel to Las Vegas, Nevada, for the PLC at Work Institute being held June 3 – June 5, 2019. Our school goal is to provide a team of core educators the chance to deepen their understanding and practice of the PLC collaborative process as the most powerful strategy for sustained, substantive school improvement. This goal will help our educational practices and processes towards closing the learning gaps with proven techniques and processes that are focused on student achievement and rigorous and relevant instruction.

RATIONALE: Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) are recognized as the most powerful, high-leveraging strategy for sustained, substantive school improvement. By attending this three day institute, teacher leaders will learn the foundation knowledge and tools to implement and improve upon using PLCs as our driving force behind providing fair, equitable, and high-quality education for ALL students. The Bohn School community has a school-wide focus on the three big ideas of the PLCs with a major focus on the four PLC questions to drive decisions using student data to improve student learning. Students will stay at the Quality Inn in Walnut, CA and will be supervised by the coaches and the same District approved parent volunteers. Academic arrangements will be made for these students. The KHS Cross Country team is a growing program that is successful in both the Valley Oak League and the Sac Joaquin Section. In addition to competing at the Mt. SAC Invitational, the team will tour the Mt. SAC campus which will expose them to new opportunities.

RATIONALE: The Mt. SAC invitational involves students competing against athletes from across California and the United States. This request aligns with District Strategic Goal #1: Prepare all students to be well rounded individuals with the knowledge and skills to pursue their college and/or career goals.

FUNDING: Lodging and transportation will be paid through KHS Cross Country team fundraising efforts. The estimated cost for lodging and transportation is \$4,600 (\$3,800/lodging and \$800/transportation). Fundraising will be accomplished though the Jaguar Invitational, an event which raises approximately \$1,500-2,000, and one additional fundraiser. The cost will be paid through a combination of fundraising opportunities and parent contributions.

The Governing Board recognizes that students who reside in one district may choose to attend school in another district and that such choices are made for a variety of reasons. The Board desires to communicate with parents/guardians and students regarding the educational programs and services that are available.

RATIONALE: It is important to update Administrative Regulation (AR) 5117 to remain current with changes to Education Code as well as with District practices.

INTERDISTRICT ATTENDANCE AGREEMENT

A. Purpose and Scope

In accordance with an agreement between the Governing Board and the board of another district, a permit authorizing a student's attendance outside his/her district of residence may be issued upon approval of both the district of residence and the district of proposed attendance.

Interdistrict requests fill a variety of needs for students and parents. With space permitting, interdistrict permits may be granted yearly or longer if in accordance with California Education Codes by the Director of Student Services and Curriculum.

B. General

If a student is accepted for transfer, the student may enroll in a school in the TUSD in the following school year. For the 2011-12 school year and thereafter, the student must enroll on or before the first day of instruction.

Transportation shall not be provided for students attending on a General Interdistrict Agreement.

B. Procedure

A TUSD parent/guardian's application to enroll their student in a school in another district must be submitted prior to January 1 of the school year preceeding the school year for which the pupil is requesting to transfer, however, the TUSD may waive that deadline. The application may request enrollment of the pupil in a specific school or program within the school district of enrollment. The application deadline does not apply if the parent requesting a transfer for a student who resides with that parent is enlisted in the military and was relocated by the military within 90 days prior to submitting the application.

TUSD shall decide whether to accept or reject an application and notify both the applicant parent and the school district of residence in writing within 60 days of receiving an application. If the application is rejected, TUSD shall state the reasons for the rejection in the notification. If accepted, the student may enroll in a school in the school district of enrollment in the following school year.

For high school transfers, TUSD shall accept previously awarded credits from another district toward graduation but can ensure the student pupil meets the graduation requirements of TUSD.

B. Reasons for Approval

The Superintendent or designee may approve Interdistrict agreements for the following reasons:

- 1. When the student has been determined by staff of either the district of residence or district of proposed attendance to be a victim of an act of bullying as defined in Education Code 48900(r). Such a student shall be given priority for **interdistrict** interdistrict attendance under any existing **interdistrict** interdistrict attendance agreement or, in the absence of an agreement, shall be given consideration for the creation of a new permit. (Education Code 46600)
- 2. To meet the **child** care needs of the student. Such a student Once a K-8 student has been admitted to a district on the basis of childcare needs, continued attendance may be allowed to continue to attend district schools denied only as long as he/she continues to use a child care provider within district boundaries. when based on restrictions specified in Education Code 48204. (Education Code 46601.5)
- 3. To meet **the student's** a child's special mental or physical health needs as certified by a physician, school psychologist, or other appropriate school personnel.
- 4. When the student has a sibling attending school in the receiving district, to avoid splitting the family's family's attendance. To complete a school year when his/her parents/guardians have moved out of the district during that year.
- 5. To allow **the student** students to remain with a class graduating that year from an elementary, **middle**, junior or senior high school.
- 6. To allow a high school senior to attend the same school he/she attended as a junior, even if his/her family moved out of the district during the junior year.
- 7. When the parent/guardian provides written evidence that the family will be moving **into** the receiving district in the immediate future and would like the student to start the year in **the** that district.
- 8. When the student will be living out of the district for one year or less.
- 7.9. When recommended by the school attendance review board School Attendance

a. Inter district attendance agreements or applications shall not be required for students enrolling in an ROC or ROP program. (Education Code 52317) (Moved to BP)

The Superintendent or designee may deny initial requests for inter-district attendance permits due to limited district resources, overcrowding of school facilities at the relevant grade level, or other considerations that are not arbitrary. However, once a student is admitted, the district may not deny him/her continued attendance because of overcrowded facilities at the relevant grade level.

An approved inter-district agreement shall specify that the agreement may be revoked because of academic failure, excessive truancy or continual disruption of the educational program due to disciplinary matters.

A student's inter district agreement may be revoked because of academic failure, excessive truancy or continual disruption of the educational program due to disciplinary matters.

B. Procedure

A TUSD parent/guardian's application to enroll their student in a school in another district must be submitted prior to January 1 of the school year preceding the school year for which the pupil is requesting to transfer, however, the TUSD may waive that deadline. b.1. Incoming Students

All applications for Interdistrict Attendance Agreements must be submitted to the District Office no later than January 1st of each school year. Decisions regarding the approval/disapproval of the requests will be made by the Director of Student Services within sixty thirty days.

TUSD shall decide whether to accept or reject an application and notify both the applicant parent and the school district of residence in writing within 30 days of receiving an application. If the application is rejected, TUSD shall state the reasons for the rejection in the notification. If accepted, the student may enroll in a school in the school district of enrollment in the following school year.

For high school transfers, TUSD shall accept previously awarded credits from another district toward graduation but can ensure the student pupil meets the graduation requirements of TUSD.

D.2. Outgoing Students

Applications must be submitted by December 1 of the preceding school year, so that Student Services Department can ensure that the enrolling district will receive the transfer application in a timely manner.

A student whose parent/guardian is in active military duty shall not be prohibited from transferring out of the district, provided the school district of proposed enrollment approves the application for transfer. (Education Code 46600, 48307)

The district may limit the number of student transfers out of the district to a school district of choice or based on parent/guardian employment in another district as provided in Board Policy and Education Code 48204 and 48307.

E.D. Notification

The Superintendent or designee may deny initial requests for inter-district attendance permits due to limited district resources, overcrowding of school facilities at the relevant grade level, or other considerations that are not arbitrary. However, once a student is admitted, the district may not deny him/her continued attendance because of overcrowded facilities at the relevant grade level.

Within 30 days of a request for an interdistrict permit, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians of a student who is denied **interdistrict** interdistrict attendance regarding the process for appeal to the County Board of Education as specified in Education Code 46601. (Education Code 46601)

F. Parent Appeals

Pending a decision by the two districts or an appeal by the County Board, the Superintendent or designee may provisionally admit a student who resides in another district for a period not to exceed two school months. (Education Code 46603)

Students who are under consideration for expulsion or who have been expelled may not appeal **interdistrict** inter district attendance denials or decisions while expulsion proceedings are pending or during the term of the expulsion. (Education Code 46601)

Once a student is admitted to a school on the basis of an **interdistrict** interdistrict attendance permit, he/she shall not be required to reapply for an **interdistrict** interdistrict ransfer and shall be allowed to continue to attend the school in which he/she is enrolled, unless reapplication standards are otherwise specified in the **interdistrict** interdistrict attendance agreement. Existing **interdistrict** interdistrict attendance permits shall not be rescinded for students entering grade 11 or 12 in the subsequent school year. (Education Code 46600)

17 Rulings on Denial of Enrollment

No exercise of discretion by a district of enrollment in its administration of this article shall be overturned absent a finding as designated by a court of competent jurisdiction that the district governing board acted in an arbitrary and capricious manner. (Education Code 48361)

Appeal of Denial of Inter-district Transfer Agreement

The parent/guardian of a student who is denied a General Inter district transfer request pursuant to Education Code 46600-46611 shall receive timely notice, in accordance with law, regarding the process for appeal to the County Board of Education. Parents/guardians may submit their appeal within 30 calendar days of district denial of an Interdistrict Transfer Agreement. This notice shall be provided by the district denying the request, or, in the absence of an agreement between the districts, by the district of residence. Students who are under consideration for expulsion or who have been expelled may not appeal Interdistrict attendance denials or decisions while expulsion proceedings are pending, or during the term of the expulsion. (Education Code 46601)

INTERDISTRICT ATTENDANCE

The Governing Board recognizes that students who reside in one district may choose to attend school in another district and that such choices are made for a variety of reasons. The Board desires to communicate with parents/guardians and students regarding the educational programs and services that are available.

The Board recognizes that the district may be capable dependent upon spaces available of serving additional students. Therefore, the Superintendent or designee may approve interdistrict attendance agreements with other districts.

The Board may enter into an agreement with any other school district, for a term not to exceed five school years, for the **interdistrict** interdistrict attendance of students who are residents of the districts. (Education Code 46600)

The agreement shall specify the terms and conditions under which interdistrict attendance shall be permitted or denied. It also may contain standards agreed to by both districts for reapplication and/or revocation of the student's permit. (Education Code 46600)

Upon receiving a permit for transfer into the district that has been approved by the student's district of residence, or upon receiving a written request from the parent/guardian of a district student who wishes to enroll in another district, the Superintendent or designee shall review the request and may approve or deny the permit subject to the terms and conditions of the **interdistrict** inter district attendance agreement.

The Superintendent or designee may deny initial requests for interdistrict attendance permits due to limited district resources, overcrowding of school facilities at the relevant grade level, or other considerations that are not arbitrary. However, once a student is admitted, the district may not deny him/her continued attendance because of overcrowded facilities at the relevant grade level.

<u>Transportation</u> The district shall not provide transportation for any interdistrict transfer student beyond any school attendance area. Upon request of a student's parent/guardian, the Superintendent or designee may authorize transportation for an interdistrict inter district transfer student students to and from designated bus stops within the attendance area of the school that the student attends if space is available.

Limits on Student Transfers Out of the District

The Superintendent or designee may limit the number of student transfers out of the district to a school district of choice or based on parent/guardian employment in another district, based on the percentages of average daily attendance specified in Education Code 48307 or 48204

In addition, transfers out of the district to a district of choice may be limited during a fiscal year when the County Superintendent of Schools has given the district a negative budget certification or when the County Superintendent has determined that the district will not meet the state's standards and criteria for fiscal stability in the subsequent fiscal year exclusively as a result of student transfers from this district to a school district of choice. (Education Code 48307)

The district may deny a transfer of a student out of the district to a school district of choice or based on parent/guardian employment in another district-if the Board determines that the transfer would negatively impact a court-ordered or voluntary desegregation plan of the district. (Education Code 48301; 48204) Interdistrict Agreements Not Required For Enrollment

When approved by the Board and the appropriate agency, the district may enroll students from other countries who are in the United States on an F-1 visa or are participating in an international exchange program under the sponsorship of a government-approved agency.

Interdistrict transfer agreements are not required for enrollment in a regional occupational center or program if there are openings in the program or class. (Education Code 52317)

BACKGROUND: Education Code Section 44263 authorizes teachers to teach outside their credential authorization provided that the teacher has eighteen (18) semester units of coursework, or nine (9) semester units of upper division or graduate coursework in the subject area to be taught. The Tracy Unified School District currently has 3 teachers on this Education Code.

Education Code Section 44256(b) authorizes the holder of a multiple subject teaching credential or a standard elementary credential to teach any subject in departmentalized classes to a given class or group of students below grade 9, provided that the teacher has completed at least (12) semester units, or (6) upper division or graduate units of coursework at an accredited institution in each subject to be taught. The Tracy Unified School District currently has 19 teachers on this Education Code.

Education Code 44258.2 authorizes the holder of a single subject teaching credential or a standard secondary teaching credential, with his or her consent, to be assigned by action of the governing board to teach classes in grades 5 to 8, inclusive, in middle school, if he or she has a minimum of (12) semester units or (6) upper division or graduate units, of coursework at an accredited institution in the subject which he or she is assigned. The Tracy Unified School District currently has 1 teacher on this Education Code.

RATIONALE: In all the above instances the teacher involved must give their consent, and the Board must adopt a resolution (see attached) authorizing these assignments. This agenda item meets District Strategic Goal 2: Hire, support, develop, train, and sustain district employees who create a singleness of purpose focused on maximizing students' academic, social, and emotional potential.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Governing Board pursuant to Education Code Sections 44263 hereby authorizes assignment of a teacher licensed pursuant to the provisions of these sections, with his or her consent, to teach outside their credential authorization provided that the teacher has eighteen (18) semester units of coursework, or nine (9) semester units of upper division or graduate coursework in the subject area to be taught, and teach any subject in departmentalized classes to a given class or group of students in grades k-12. Education Code 44256(b) authorizes the holder of a multiple subject teaching credential or a standard elementary credendtial to teach any subject in a departmentalized setting to students below grade 9, provided that the teacher has completed at least twelve (12) semester units, or (6) upper division or graduate units of coursework. Education Code 44258.2 authorizes the holder of a single subject teaching credential or a standard secondary teaching credential, with his or her consent, be assigned by action of the governing board to teach classes in grades 5 to 8, inclusive, in middle school, if he or she has a minimum of (12) semester units or (6) upper division or graduate units, of coursework at an accredited institution in the subject which he or she is assigned. Authorization shall remain valid for one year.
