The Science Fair

On March 26th, St. Joseph School held the annual science fair. From guinea pig mazes to Rube Goldbergs, the SJS science fair has had so many great projects that filled up hallways and the entire gym. Every grade participated with either a group project or an individual project. Each year the 7th and 8th grades are put into teams and asked to complete a goal.

For the past couple years, the 7th grade was to create a hydraulic arm that could lift a soda can over a wall. In order to move the hydraulic arm, the 7th grade used syringes to move the arm. The syringes are attached to different parts of the arm such as: the base to move the entire arm from left to right, or one to move the arm up and down. A syringe also moved the part that grabbed the soda can. Each hydraulic arm was different and had a different way of completing the goal. One team blew up a balloon in order to grip the can and some of the others used a claw to lift it. All four groups worked very hard and even added a theme to the project this year!

The Rube Goldberg has been the 8th graders' project for many years where they are asked to complete a certain task. This year the objective is to dispense a ¼ cup of kibble into a dog bowl. You must use at least 5 out of the 6 simple machines: screw, lever, pulley, wheel & axle, inclined plane, and wedge. Some projects this year included balloons, dominoes, and magnetic powder. The 8th graders had to present their projects to their fellow classmates, teachers, and parents. We would like to give a special thanks to Mrs. Marricco and Mrs. Sanchez for all their hard work and determination in organizing this amazing event. Why Easter Egg Hunts?

This tradition dates back thousands of years, and there would be no hunt without the Easter Bunny. In Pagan traditions, the bunny was a symbol of fertility. Rabbits were the sacred animals of Eostre, the Saxon goddess of spring and fertility. This is where the word “Easter” is believed to have been originated. Early German cultures believed Eostre to have an egg-laying hare named Osterhase. The hare would lay eggs in the grass, which became symbols of new life and rebirth. This was the connection to Jesus and the Resurrection. German children were encouraged to make nests and to leave them outside for Osterhase to lay eggs in. They soon began to search for the eggs left behind. German immigrants brought this tradition to Pennsylvania in the 1700’s. The nests were later replaced with baskets. Today, this festivity has spread across the nation and has evolved into a treasure hunt of candy and toys. This family tradition will go on for centuries as long as the egg and the Easter Bunny are around!

Easter Recipes

Here are some fun, creative, and tasty treats for the Easter season! They are easy to make and won't take long.

Easter Egg Rice Crispy Treat

Ingredients:

4 tablespoons unsalted butter, plus more for the pan

One 10-ounce bag mini marshmallows

1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

Kosher salt

6 cups crispy rice cereal, such as Rice Krispies

1 cup chopped sugar-coated marshmallow chicks (about 8)

1 cup candy-coated mini chocolate eggs

1/3 cup chopped chocolate bunnies (about one 1.5 ounce hollow bunny)

Line an 8-by-8-inch baking dish with a sheet of foil large enough to leave a 2-inch overhang on all sides. Grease the foil with 1 tablespoon of butter. Melt the remaining 4 tablespoons butter in a large pot over medium heat. Add the marshmallows, stirring occasionally until they melt completely, about 5 minutes. Remove from the heat and stir in the vanilla and a pinch of salt. Add the rice cereal and candy to the pot and stir with a rubber spatula until evenly coated. Transfer to the prepared baking dish and press into an even, compact layer. Let sit at room temperature until firm, about 30 mins. Cut into 16 squares. Enjoy!

Chocolate Bird Nest

Ingredients:

8 oz chopped semisweet chocolate chips

2 cups canned potato sticks

almonds



Melt the chocolate in a heat-proof bowl set over a saucepan of simmering water, stirring. Remove the bowl from the pan and stir in the potato sticks. Coat a 6-cup muffin pan with cooking spray and scoop some of the chocolate mixture into the cups; make an indentation in each to form nests. Chill until set, at least 3 hours. Fill with almonds.

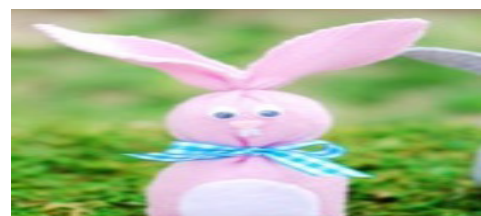

Carrot Cake Muffins with Cream Cheese Glaze

This dessert is great for Easter. It's so delicious, and is light to eat. It's so simple to bake too! I chose this dessert because it is a favorite in my house at Easter, and I think many other people would enjoy it.

Ingredients:

1 1/2 cups whole wheat pastry flour

1 teaspoon baking soda

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

1 cup finely shredded carrots

1/2 cup pure maple syrup

1 tablespoon olive oil

1/3 cup natural unsweetened applesauce

1 egg, slightly beaten

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

1/2 cup unsweetened vanilla almond milk or unsweetened almond milk

1/2 cup unsweetened shredded coconut flake

1/2 cup raisins (optional)

4 oz reduced fat cream cheese, softened

1/4 cup powdered sugar

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

1-2 tablespoons unsweetened vanilla almond milk

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Line 12-cup muffin pan with liners and spray the inside with nonstick cooking spray. Next, add flour, baking soda, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt to a medium bowl; stir to combine and then set aside. In a separate large bowl, add carrots, maple syrup, olive oil, applesauce, egg and vanilla. Whisk to combine wet ingredients then slowly stir in almond milk and flour mixture until just combined. Fold in coconut flakes and raisins. Divide batter evenly between muffins cups. Bake for 18-20 minutes. Allow to cool for 10 minutes, then transfer muffins to a wire rack to finish cooling. Once muffins are completely cool, you can make the cream cheese glaze: Place cream cheese in medium microwave safe bowl and microwave on high for 30-45 seconds. Stir gently adding powdered sugar, vanilla extract and milk; stir again until glaze reaches desired consistency. Dip each muffin top into cream cheese glaze then place back on wire rack. Sprinkle with coconut flakes. Makes 12 muffins. Enjoy!

Easter D.I.Y.'s

Easter Candy Jars-These adorable little candy jars are super easy to make and great for storing your easter candy!

Materials:

Small jars, Decoupage, Paint Brush, Glitter, Construction paper in pink, white and orange, Candy, Pom-Poms, Glue, Googly Eyes

First, paint decoupage onto the jar covering everything except the top and bottom. Next, cover the jar in glitter and shake off any excess glitter. Set aside the jar, so it can dry. To make polka dots on the jar, use a round sponge and dot on the glitter. Then, cut the ears out of the construction paper and glue them to the lid. After, glue a pom-pom for the tail. For the face of the bunny, glue on a pom-pom nose, googly eyes and whiskers cut out from construction paper. Glue ears made of construction paper to the lid. For the face of the chick, cut out little feet and a beak. Glue the feet to the bottom of the jar. Add googly eyes to the jar and glue the beak underneath. Finally, fill the decorated jar with candy and enjoy!

Easter Sock Bunnies-These adorable bunnies are easy to make and are perfect for Easter!

Materials

A sock, Felt, Glue, A large pom pom, Googly eyes, A ribbon, Rice, Clear rubber bands

Fill up your sock with a cup of rice. First, take your rubber bands and tie one around the neck and one around the top of the head. Next, take a piece of felt and cut out the stomach and glue it to the bunny. Glue on the googly eyes. Cut out teeth from white felt and glue them on, as well as a pom pom for the tail. Cut a small orange triangle out of felt for the nose. Glue it on and tie a bow around the sock bunnies neck using the ribbon. Cut the space you left above the head in half. Snip off the corners to make the ears rounder. Enjoy your adorable sock bunny!
