- Advise students about course selection
- Write counselor letter of recommendation

 Provide information, support and guidance with the college application process

The College Search Process

- 3 major decisions in the process The good news is you make 2 of them!
- The process is essentially one of research Self-exploration Learning about colleges
- The goal of the research is to find those colleges which "best fit" the needs of the student.

Finding the best "fit" college

Knowledge about yourself Knowledge about colleges

What is "fit"?

- Academic fit
- Social fit
- Financial fit
- Fit happens over time
- Requires effort on the part of the student

- Cost/availability of financial aid

- Three visits to college campuses during a school day permitted junior and senior year




What Colleges Consider When Making Admissions Decisions

- Grades
- Strength of curriculum
- Test scores (SAT and/or ACT)
- Essay
- Letters of recommendation
- Demonstrated interest
- Class rank
- Interview
- Extracurricular activities

TRANSCRIPTS

Official transcripts are sent from CV -official they come from CV electronically -hard copies have a seal and signature -99% of colleges require an official transcript -99% of the transcripts are sent electronically

NEW SAT vs. ACT

All colleges accept either test They are regarded as equally valid

1/3 perform better on SAT, 1/3 perform better on ACT, 1/3 perform the same

• SAT

- 3 Sections
- Critical Reading
- Math, up to Algebra II
- Writing (optional)

No penalty for wrong answers

• ACT

- 5 Sections
- Reading
- English
- Writing (optional)
- Math, up to trigonometry
- Science...(Interpretation)
- No penalty for wrong answers

How Scores are Used

<u>Superscore</u> – Colleges will mix/match your test scores to make the highest score possible. Not all colleges superscore, but use the highest score from a "sitting."

Score Choice – Option to choose which test scores to send to colleges

Students can choose scores from a <u>test date</u>, not individual subscores. For the SAT subject tests, students can choose individual subject scores.

Colleges can choose, however, to require <u>all scores</u> from an applicant. Students are required to comply with each college's policy.

Some colleges are TEST OPTIONAL

- Colleges not requiring the SAT or ACT test scores
- Other requirements may exist (example, must have a 3.5 GPA, graded writing sample required, interview required)

What Works

- Recreational reading
- Being engaged in the Test Prep classes
- Familiarizing yourself with the test format
- Test prep should not come at the expense of school work

The Essay

 Only time YOU have control Only time YOU can share with the colleges something that is not already in the application Shows how well YOU can write Typically between 250-650 words Typically prompted with a question Don't summarize your life Keep the topic specific Proofread and accept criticism



Recommendation Letters

Teacher Recommendation Letters

- Ask early. Teacher should have 3 weeks to write letter.
- Log into Naviance and....

- Go to "colleges" tab and click "Colleges I'm applying to" and request the teachers that are writing your letters.
- Write a thank-you note to your teachers

NO MORE THAN TWO TEACHER LETTERS

Counselor Recommendation Letters

• Same as above, but complete the "counselor letter of recommendation"



SPRING SEMESTER

- Take the other standardized test in March, April, May, or June.
- Schedule meeting with your school counselor
- Attend the Pittsburgh National College Fair.
- Register for senior year carefully, reviewing post-secondary admissions requirements.
- Visit college campuses
- Participate in summer programs in your area of interest
- Take SAT subject tests in June if required
- Before summer break, request (2) teacher letters of recommendations and if needed (1) counselor letter

SENIOR YEAR

FALL SEMESTER

- Visit college campuses
- Finalize list of 4-8 colleges to apply
- Retake the SAT or ACT
- Sign-up to meet with post-secondary representatives as they visit Chartiers Valley
- Research and apply to scholarships
- Submit applications according to deadlines
- Attend Financial Aid Night
- Complete the FAFSA after October 1st

SPRING SEMESTER

- Respond to post-secondary offers of admission and financial aid
- Submit required deposit, due by May 1st (do not double deposit)
- Request your final transcript

How many schools should you apply to:

Generally you should apply to 4-8 colleges

- **Reach:** Selective schools that typically admit students with higher grades and scores than you have. Decision is unknown.
- **Target/In range**: Schools that admit students with grades and scores that are about the same as yours. No guarantee.
- Likely/Safety: Schools that typically admit students with grades and scores that may be lower than yours and price is not a factor. Reasonably certain admissions and financial affordability.

APPLY ONLY TO COLLEGES THAT YOU ACTUALLY WANT TO ATTEND!
