

Stormwater Program

The city of Oakwood manages stormwater run-off in accordance with rules and regulations established by the EPA. The Oakwood stormwater permit requires: 1) dry weather screening of sewer outfalls to verify absence of illicit sewer connections; 2) educating residents on stormwater matters; 3) sediment and erosion controls on construction sites larger than 1 acre; 4) regular street sweeping; and 5) staff education on stormwater impacts. The overall goal of the stormwater program is to improve the quality of the water in our rivers, lakes and streams by limiting pollutant release into receiving waters. There are several ways that citizens can aid this effort: 1) do not place any material in the street except leaves during the 10 week collection period in the fall; 2) do not dump oil, lawn debris, or other materials into the storm sewer – this is a direct path to streams and rivers and there is no treatment of this water; 3) limit as much as possible the use of fertilizers, pesticides, and herbicides; and 4) clean up after your pets as the bacteria in animal waste is very harmful to the streams. Yard Debris Disposal

As you work on your yard, please remember that there are two options for disposing of yard waste:

Do It Yourself:

• DIY disposal may be done in three different ways:

1) Drop it off at the Foell Public Works Center, 210 Shafor Blvd, on the first Saturday of the month between 8 a.m. and 12 noon; or

2) Drop it in the yard debris dumpster at the Creager Field parking lot (corner of Shafor and Irving). The dumpsters are available 24-7; or

3) Call 298-0777 to schedule a dumpster delivery to your property, and load it up. This is free of charge if the dumpster is used exclusively for yard debris (green waste).

Monthly Collection by the City:

 Place piles of yard debris (brush and branches) into the tree lawn area just behind the curb, ideally just a day or two before your scheduled pickup (see map herein). Branches should be no longer than 6 feet and all material should be placed in manageable piles for easy pick up. Do not place piles around trees, fire hydrants, cable TV boxes or posts/ poles, or in the street or gutter.

Additional Refuse Program Reminders:

- Under no circumstance should you place anything in the street gutter (except leaves in the fall) or anything except yard debris in the tree lawn area.
- Small amounts of leaves, small twigs, dead flowers and other such incidental green waste items may be placed in with your regular trash.
- Do not stack loose yard debris around or on top of trash cans. All debris must be placed in cans with lids.
- Please recycle as much as you can... it saves us money.
- Please learn what is recyclable and what is not. See: www.oakwoodohio.gov
- Remember the 35 gallon size limit and 60-pound weight limit on cans, and that cans must have handles and removable lids.
- Remember the three (3) can limit for regular trash (or one roll waste container for alley properties). There is no limit on the number of recycling cans.
- Grass clippings are not accepted, either with regular trash, with curbside collected yard debris, or in dumpsters.
- Contractor generated material is not accepted.

Drinking Water Consumer Confidence Report

The city of Oakwood has prepared the 2018 Drinking Water Consumer Confidence Report for the City's public water system. This was done in accordance with federal regulations under the Safe Drinking Water Act. The report can be viewed on the City website at **www.oakwoodohio.gov/ccr.pdf**. The report includes detailed information about the operation of our City water system during the 2018 calendar year. The report shows that the City operates the public water system in compliance with all state and federal rules. A paper copy of the Consumer Confidence Report is available on request by calling the Public Works Center at 298-0777.

City Construction Projects

- Sidewalk, Curb and Driveway Apron Project: The 2019 Sidewalk, Curb and Driveway Apron Repair Project will soon begin in the area bounded by Far Hills, Forrer, Shroyer, Acorn and Patterson. The purpose of the project is to maintain the concrete structures located within the city rights-of-way in good, safe condition. Please contact Streets Foreman David Shuey at 298-0777 if you have any questions about the project.
- Asphalt Roadway Repaving: A city contractor will repave the asphalt streets below this summer. Call Foreman/Engineering Technician Tom Long at 298-0777 if you have any questions. Property owners on these streets will receive individual notification of the construction schedule.

 - Fairmont Avenue
 - Hillview Avenue (Alpine Lane to South Corporation Line)
- Concrete Roadway Repairs: Work is underway to repair concrete pavement on Ridgeway Road, between Park Road and the Kettering bridge over Dorothy Lane; on Fairforest Circle, and on Park Avenue between Harman Avenue and Oakwood Avenue. Call David Shuey with questions.

Hazardous Waste Disposal

It is very important that no hazardous materials are co-mingled with the regular weekly refuse. This includes paints, herbicides, pesticides, oils, antifreeze, and other such materials. Residents may take these items to the Montgomery County Moraine Transfer Facility, 1001 Encrete Lane, Moraine and drop them off free of charge. The drop off center is open from 8:00 am - 2:00 pm on Tuesdays and Saturdays. See **www.mcswd.org** for additional information.

Alternatively, residents can request a free pick up through the Oakwood Rotary Club. The Rotary Club offers a program every three months where volunteer Rotarians travel the community to collect and dispose of hazardous waste. The schedule is routinely advertised in the Oakwood Register newspaper and is posted on the city website. Remaining 2019 collection dates are Saturday, July 27 and Saturday, October 26. Call 296-5155 to register for a pick up. While the service is free, the Oakwood Rotary Club accepts donations to be used for club service projects and grants.

Trimming Along Sidewalks

Oakwood property owners must keep all trees, bushes and other vegetation trimmed away from public sidewalks. City regulations require that no branches, bushes or other vegetation encroach across any sidewalk, and that a clear path is maintained up to eight feet above the sidewalk. Independence Day Refuse Collection





2019 Vectren Gas Line Improvements

Vectren is currently replacing underground gas distribution pipes and home service lines in the Oakwood neighborhoods identified in blue on the maps below. In both work areas, Vectren is installing new polyethylene pipes in place of old steel and cast iron pipes and is moving indoor gas meters to outside wall locations. This is the continuation of a multi-year Vectren infrastructure replacement project in Oakwood. Oakwood residents personally affected by the work will receive detailed information from Vectren. Fireworks and Fourth of July Safety Tips



The Fourth of July is a great time to celebrate and spend the day with your family and friends. Fireworks are synonymous with our celebration of Independence Day. Unfortunately, many people ignore the inherent dangers associated with fireworks and expose themselves to the risk of burns and other bodily injury. It is estimated that around 9,000 people each year receive emergency medical treatment due to fireworks related injuries with 40% of the injured being less than 15 years of age. Here are a few reminders and safety tips concerning fireworks.

First and most important is for everyone to be aware that most fireworks are illegal in the State of Ohio. The only types of fireworks that can be legally purchased and discharged in Ohio are trick and novelty devices. These include items that smoke, sparkle, snap, and snake. Other fireworks such as bottle rockets, firecrackers, and roman candles are legally sold at fireworks stores around Ohio, but the purchaser must sign an affidavit indicating that they will transport the fireworks out of Ohio within 48 hours. Furthermore, Oakwood Codified Ordinance 549.08 prohibits anyone from discharging, igniting, or exploding any fireworks within the City. Anyone found in violation of this section is guilty of a Misdemeanor of the third degree.

Fireworks Safety

- Children should never be left alone when discharging fireworks. Handle and discharge trick and novelty devices only under adult supervision.
- Appoint one adult to be in charge. This person should know the hazards of each type of firework being used.
- Carefully read and follow the instructions and warning labels on the package.
- Light only one sparkler at a time. Many dismiss the fact that sparklers can be dangerous and should be handled only by children over the age of twelve.
 Sparklers can burn up to 1,800 degrees Fahrenheit and can easily ignite clothing and hair. Sparklers are the most common cause of fireworks-related injuries in children under five.
- Never use malfunctioning fireworks. Do not attempt to re-light, alter or fix a "dud" firework.
- Always keep a bucket of water and garden hose nearby in case of fire.
- · Have a cell phone handy in case you need to make an emergency call for assistance.
- Lastly, please do not consume alcohol while lighting any fireworks. Fireworks must only be used by individuals who are not under the influence.

If you are planning a fireworks celebration, leave it to the professionals. Attend one of the professionally licensed fireworks exhibitions. The Oakwood Public Safety Department wishes everyone a safe Fourth of July celebration.

Pedestrian Safety



Now that warmer weather has arrived, we are seeing an increase in the number of walkers, joggers and runners on city streets. Subsequently, the Oakwood Public Safety Department receives complaints from motorists about pedestrians failing to yield to vehicular traffic while using the streets.

Outlined below are a few reminders about Oakwood's Codified Ordinances governing pedestrians utilizing city streets. The Safety Department requests that everyone follow these ordinances so both motorists and pedestrians can safely use city streets for vehicle travel and recreational activities. Section 371.05 of the Oakwood Traffic Code addresses all of the specific requirements. This ordinance and all other Oakwood Codified Ordinances can be found online at the city of Oakwood's website, **www.oakwoodohio.gov**.


- Pedestrians are required to proceed as close as practicable to the curb on his or her left and must face vehicular traffic.
- Pedestrians must proceed in a single file when traffic is approaching from the front or rear.
- Except as otherwise provided in Section 313.03 (relating to rights-of-way at intersections controlled by traffic lights) and in Section 371.01 (pedestrian in a crosswalk has the right-of-way), every pedestrian upon a roadway shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles.
- During the time from one-half hour before sunset to one-half hour after sunrise, and at other times when there are unfavorable atmospheric conditions (including insufficient natural light) which prevents persons from being clearly discernible at a distance of 300 feet, every pedestrian shall:
 - Wear between the neck and waist material such as a vest, sash band or tape which is reflectorized as to be discernible clearly at night from a distance
 of 300 feet; or
 - Vacate the non-crosswalk roadway immediately upon the approach of a vehicle from the front of the pedestrian, and also vacate the roadway at any intersection or driveway where a vehicle is approaching the roadway, and remain off the roadway until the vehicle has passed the pedestrian.
- Walking, jogging or running in the street is prohibited at all times on Far Hills Avenue, Schantz Avenue from Oakwood Avenue to the west corporation limits, Patterson Road between Far Hills Avenue and the east corporation limit, Shroyer Road between the north and south city corporation limits and on Oakwood Avenue from Far Hills Avenue to the north corporation limits.

There are very real, sometimes unavoidable, dangers when running on city streets. Below are a few safety tips every walker, jogger, or runner should follow:

- Be aware.
- Avoid running with headphones.
- See and be seen. Carry some form of identification.

Classics on the Lawn Returns for its 9th Year

Plans are underway for the Oakwood Historical Society's 9th annual Classics on the Lawn car show. It will take place on August 18 from 12:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Committee Chairman Brian Mettling reports that in addition to a unique collection of cars, families can enjoy live music and tour the Long-Romspert House Museum. The cars exhibited are specially selected from local museums, car clubs, and private owners. It is exclusively a car-by-invitation show. "Quality over quantity" is how Mettling describes it.



June/July Council Meetings

City Council will meet in regular sessions at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, June 3 and Monday, July 15. Both meetings will take place at the city building, 30 Park Avenue. The regular sessions are preceded by an open work session beginning at 6:30 p.m. Citizens are invited to attend any of these meetings. The regular sessions are televised live on cable TV (Spectrum Ch. 6, TV Tuner Ch. 5.03 and AT&T U-verse Ch. 99). Meeting videos will be rebroadcast for a week or so afterwards. Property Maintenance and Beautification

The city of Oakwood places significant emphasis on the maintenance and beautification of property. An Oakwood Citizens Housing Committee was originally established 1968. In 1992 the Citizens Housing Committee was renamed as the Property Maintenance Board. The 15-member Oakwood Property Maintenance Board ("PMB") consists of three citizens from each of five property maintenance districts. The citizens serve in a volunteer capacity and are appointed by city council to five year terms. The PMB is involved in enforcing the Property Maintenance Code and in implementing the Beautification Awards Program.

Property Maintenance Program

City staff completes an inspection of the entire city each spring, and compiles a list of properties with property maintenance violations. The City sends a property maintenance violation letter to each property owner where violations are identified and follows an established protocol to ensure that corrective actions are taken. Property maintenance violations on additional properties are identified throughout the year, usually by the City Code Enforcement Officer, but also by PMB members, through citizen complaints, or by Public Safety Officers. These additional violations are handled in the same manner as those identified through the annual inspection.

Beautification Awards Program

The city operates a property beautification awards program. The purpose of the program is 1) to encourage property owners to invest in projects that enhance the physical appearance of their property and neighborhood; and to recognize property owners that have completed significant projects. Ten awards are presented to single family residences each month during May, June, July and August, two in each of the five property maintenance districts. One additional award is presented in each of those four months to a business property or to an apartment/condominium property. Monthly nominations are submitted to the city by members of the PMB and by the general public. Award winners are notified with a letter from the city and a sign is placed in their yard. The sign remains in place for one month, and is then moved to the yard of a following month's winner. A photograph is taken of each property and a video prepared. The video is presented at the public Council meeting in November. Each winner is invited to attend that meeting to receive a recognition certificate, which includes the photograph of their property. Award winners are also recognized in the Oakwood Scene newsletter, on the city website, and in the Oakwood Register.

2019 Holiday Home Tour Planning Underway



On an almost spring-like day in late March, The Honorable Judge Irvin Harlamert and Oakwood Historical Society President Leigh Turben hosted an afternoon gathering at his home to plan the Society's second Holiday Home Tour to take place next December. Judge Harlamert said he truly enjoyed sharing his Tudor-Style, English Garden Collage home with 500 new friends last year, and thought that more of his neighbors would have liked to have been asked to host. He approached Turben and suggested that more homes in his immediate neighborhood be featured in the tour's second year. Turben readily agreed; while the 2018 tour was an amazing success, some participants expressed that they wished the homes had been in closer proximity.

The gathering at Judge Harlamert's home gave owners of last year's featured homes an opportunity to meet with perspective hosts for this year and share their experiences. "Everyone was so positive," said Turben. Last year's tour was meant to showcase the architectural styles of Oakwood's historical homes and the welcoming, creative ingenuity of its current residents. "It did that and more," said Turben. It gave neighbors a chance to meet more neighbors and it reflected Oakwood's spirit of community. This year the tour will focus on the historical and architectural qualities of homes during the early platting of Oakwood. Turben reports that six homeowners in the "Hatcher Hills" neighborhood have already agreed to host. The tour will take place on December 7th from noon to 7:00 p.m.

Backflow Device Certification

The State of Ohio Plumbing Code and Ohio EPA Regulations require that a backflow prevention device be installed on water piping to any equipment (e.g., irrigation systems, boilers, etc.) that is capable of contaminating or polluting the water distribution system. A backflow prevention device allows water to flow in only one direction, thus eliminating the possibility that contaminants could enter the city's water system under a backflow condition. Under Chapter 919 of the Oakwood Codified Ordinances, backflow prevention devices must be tested upon initial installation, and must be re-certified annually by a State of Ohio Certified Backflow Tester. The re-certification confirms that the device is functioning properly, and is providing the necessary protection to the city's water distribution system. 

Impacting Our Community Elizabeth Uptegrove



After nearly 10 years of educating students at Harman School and developing amazing experiences for them, ranging from spelling bees, to musicals to Destination Imagination, Elizabeth Uptegrove is saying goodbye to Oakwood. The veteran teacher is moving to Charleston, SC to be closer to family.

"While leaving Oakwood is hard to imagine, I am bursting with energy to share some of what I've learned here with other schools, especially schools that might be struggling in ways we don't. I am looking forward to taking a position at the Charleston County School of the Arts. I will continue to be an advocate for enrichment and meeting the needs of all students," Uptegrove said.

Uptegrove has made an impact on hundreds of students since coming to Oakwood. Whether in the classroom or participating in any number of special activities, Uptegrove says it's the relationships with students and families she will cherish most.

"I have traveled to tournaments with students, scaled ropes courses in the mountains with them, given pep talks in nervous huddles before an intense competition, and comforted them in the dark beneath the floorboards of the bounty hunters' house at Camp Joy. Those are the times when you're laying the groundwork for relationships that help students trust you a little more in the classroom. If they trust me, I can help them learn how to trust themselves and convince them they have the tools to get back up after they've been knocked down," Uptegrove said.

While she is looking forward to her new challenges in South Carolina, Uptegrove says it is "the students, the families and the hardest working educators" who have become her family she will miss most. And what are her hopes for her students?

"I have been so blessed to teach some of the most talented students I have ever known. I hope they will always use their powers for good. I hope they will take care of themselves and balance their academic endeavors with a responsible, healthy life and never feel like they are above seeking support," Uptegrove said.

And what are her final words of advice for her Oakwood students and families?

"I want students and parents to know that at the end of the day, getting the magic score on a test or a special letter in the mail about gifted identifications is not the most important thing. ALL students have special gifts and talents. ALL students can succeed at high levels. Everyone can grow, no matter where you start. Having a healthy, well-adjusted, kind, hard-working child is FAR more important than any test score."
