*Plunging necklines; cleavage showing




*Dresses MORE than 3" above the knee:

What is acceptable to wear: Dress Pants Collared Dress Shirts Ties & Belts must be worn Casual dress shoes (soft-soled; clean; no holes)









What is NOT acceptable to wear:

Jeans, Casual pants or Shorts Polo Shirts or T-shirts Baseball hats or visors Old, worn, dirty tennis shoes



No jeans!

<u>Girls</u>

- Dresses and skirts must be no shorter than 3 inches above the top of the kneecap. (If the dress is shorter, the student may not be allowed to enter the dance.)
- A dress with straps or a strapless dress is appropriate, provided there is a modest neckline, and no cleavage is showing.
- No bandage or tube dresses or skirts, or any skin-tight skirt/dress that rides up may be worn.
- No bare midriffs or low-cut bodices or backs are permitted.
- No two-piece dresses allowed.
- No see-through dresses.
- Comfortable shoes to dance in are recommended. Girls do not need to wear dress shoes into the dance. No flip-flops, please.

<u>Boys</u>

- A dress shirt (short- or long-sleeved) with buttons and a collar must be worn with a tie and full-length dress pants. No polo shirts or t-shirts; no jeans or casual pants.
- Nice casual shoes and socks must be worn. Shoes with a soft sole are recommended for comfort. All shoes must be clean and free from holes.
- No hats may be worn.
- Belts must be worn.

Note for all students and guests in attendance:

- Visible tattoos and body piercings are not permitted at school events.
- Students arriving at the dance who are inappropriately dressed may be asked to change before being admitted to the dance.
- An extreme violation of this policy will result in the student not being permitted to enter the dance.
- The Administration reserves the right to make the final decision regarding the appropriateness of attire.
