





College Admissions Trends

- The vast majority of colleges will continue to have acceptance rates well above 50%.
- Fewer than 175 colleges (out of 4,000) in the country deny more than half of their applicants.
- These same 175 colleges generate over ¼ of all submitted college applications.
- Gap Years (Bridge Years) increasing.
- There are factors beyond a student's control and within a student's control.
- The more selective the school, the greater role "hooks" play.

- Students who "struggle" and can articulate what they have learned as a result.



"It's not Where you go to college, but How you go to college."

- Gallup-Purdue Index
- Quizzed 30 Thousand college graduates on <u>five key dimensions</u> to well-being: <u>purpose</u> (how much respondents liked what they were doing); <u>social</u> (how supportive they found relationships); <u>physical</u> (whether they felt healthy and energetic); <u>financial</u> (whether they felt they were successfully managing their economic lives); and <u>community</u> (whether they felt connected to, and proud of, the places where they lived and spent most of their time).

What Good College Counseling Entails

- Self-awareness: In thinking about what they want in a college, students should be
 encouraged to reflect on themselves. The best college lists emerge from students who
 most closely examine their own interests and look for institutions that will enable these
 characteristics to flourish.
- **Independence**: Students should work to articulate their own hopes and goals apart from what their families and the larger culture may want as they imagine what's next in their education. They should also take responsibility for the labor of searching for colleges, planning college visits, and meeting the requirements to apply.
- **Self-Confidence**: The college admissions industry is flooded with rankings and perceived measures of prestige. Good college counseling, however, should help students learn to measure their self-worth intrinsically.
- Tolerance for uncertainty: Although data can help make predictions about eventual decisions, students should work to grow comfortable with the long wait and the element of uncertainty inherent in the process.
- Navigation of complexity: Applying to college is hard work, and while the sometimes labyrinthine requirements may seem mundane, students should learn the value in avoiding shortcuts, remaining organized, and staying ahead of deadlines.



Helping students reach the next stage of their development - adulthood - is at the core of every interaction in UPrep's College Counseling Office. What many describe as the busiest office on campus is frequented by juniors and seniors seeking individual college counseling, parents looking for resources to assist their students in the college planning process, and young alumni excitedly reconnecting with the college counseling staff.

The bottom line is that the College Counseling Office expertly demystifies the college process for our students and their families while simultaneously ensuring that they fare extremely well in their search and selection process. College information nights for juniors and seniors, more than 200 visits from college admissions officers from arou the country and the world, and expert administration of standardized tests sim to the many services the office provides.

Our Results

The results of our students' college admissions results speak volumes at who we are as a school:

- Over the past 5 years, our students have matriculated at 130 different colleges in 33 states and 5 foreign countries. At the 40 colleges that generated the most applications (6 or more UPrep applicants), our Pumas acceptance rate was 60% whereas the overall national acceptance rate was
- Our diverse student body finds collegiate homes at a robust range of institutions, from Stanford to Syracuse, and from the University of Chicago to the University of Washington.
- Although we celebrate our students' college outcomes, what we rejoice in the most is the lives of distinction our Pumas lead post-college. In employment ranging from medicine to the legal field and from education global affairs, our alumni are forces for good and excellence in t professions.
