

CLASS OF 2020

Seniors – You should now be familiar with the College and Career Planning program **Naviance**. A major function of this system includes the processing of your transcripts and recommendations for college applications. Counselors will be meeting with seniors in August to provide details on how to request your transcript, letters of recommendation and counselor reports for your college applications. However, you do not have to wait for these meetings to begin the work on your college applications. You can start applying to most colleges in mid-August.

2019-2020 LILLY ENDOWMENT COMMUNITY SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION

The Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship is a fullride scholarship to an INDIANA college or university for students who demonstrate financial need, a commitment to community volunteerism, and leadership in their extracurricular activities. Carmel High School can nominate TWO students for consideration to the Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship committee.

Students selected from CHS must meet the following criteria:

- Be a Hamilton County resident (four students from Hamilton County will be selected as scholarship recipients.)
- Have a minimum 3.0 g.p.a.
- Demonstrate financial need
- Plan to pursue a full-time baccalaureate course of study beginning in the fall of 2020 at a public or private college or university in Indiana
- Demonstrate a commitment to community volunteerism
- Demonstrate leadership and/or initiative in their school, community, and/or extracurricular activities

Please note that if chosen as one of the two nominees, students will be expected to submit an additional online application, including essays identical to those asked in the CHS nomination application, as well as family financial information.

Students must apply online at https://forms.gle/ fSmVGNt4vR5oS2Vx5 by 3:30 p.m. on Friday, August 9, 2019. Questions should be directed to Melinda Stephan in the Counseling Office (mstephan@ccs.k12.in.us) **Please Note:** in the past, Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship applications were not due until late October/early November, however beginning with the 2016-17 academic year, the deadline was moved up significantly by the Central Indiana Community Foundation. CHS must submit their nominations no later than August 16, 2019. In order to provide sufficient time for the nominating committee to review applications, the due date has been set as late as possible but unfortunately still falls before the 2019-20 academic year begins.

ACT & SAT

The first SAT and Subject tests will be August 24. The registration deadline is July 26 and the cost is \$49.50 without writing and \$64.50 with writing. You can register at the SAT website at www.collegeboard.org.

The first ACT test will be held on September 14. The registration deadline is August 16 and the cost is \$50.50 without writing and \$67 with writing. You can register at the ACT website at www.actstudent.org.

When registering, you will need to use our High School Code Number - 150445.

As a reminder, both the SAT and ACT registration process requires students to upload a current photo of themselves to assist with verifying identification on test day. Please make sure that the uploaded photo is an individual headshot of the student ONLY. Students who upload group photos will be denied access on the day of the test. The admission ticket is REQUIRED on test day in addition to a current government or school issued ID.

PSAT TESTING INFORMATION FOR INCOMING FRESHMEN, SOPHOMORES AND JUNIORS

The 2019 PSAT will be given on Wednesday, October 16 during the morning school hours. All freshmen, sophomores and juniors will take the PSAT. This test will be preparing students for the SAT exam. The cost of the test for sophomores and juniors is covered by the Indiana Department of Education. The test fee for freshmen will be included in the book fees and other charges billed to parents at the start of the school year.

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Traffic

Dear Greyhound Parents,

Our traffic team is constantly looking at ways to improve traffic and pedestrian flow; increasing the safety of our students and saving you precious time. Here are a couple of items we need your assistance with:

MAXIMIZING FRESHMAN CENTER DROP-OFF LINE CAPACITY

As you pull up to Door 13 pull forward as far as possible before letting your children exit the vehicle. Many vehicles are stopping directly in front of Door 13 to let their children out. As a result, there is a considerable amount of space left open between that point and the stop sign. This is leading to a traffic back up on 2nd Street NE in the mornings.

DROPPING OFF STUDENTS ON MAIN STREET

Please, DO NOT let anyone exit your vehicle while on Main Street. We have seen an increase in drivers letting students exit vehicles on Main Street. This is a MAJOR safety hazard. We have had accidents and near misses caused by this over the last few weeks. We want to keep your children as safe as possible, and this must take priority over running a few minutes late.


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Parking Permits Required for ALL Student Drivers

To enhance safety of our campus, all students who wish to drive to school must hang a valid Carmel High School parking permit from their rearview mirror. For your convenience, students can immediately register for a parking permit online which will be available for pick up at Back to School Days/Registration. Students are highly encouraged to apply BEFORE Back to Schools Days/Registration, as there will be limited laptops available. Student drivers must have their permit properly displayed by September 3, 2019. Please note, this permit does not allow students to park on campus property adjacent to the school buildings. Applications are available on the CHS website (Student Services>Student Parking).

PARKING PERMIT FAQ

Why do I need a parking permit?

Parking permits allow administration and school resource officers to easily identify vehicles of students and those that do not belong on school property.

What if I do not have a parking permit?

If you do not register and properly display the permit by September 3, 2019, you may not park on campus. Students who park without a permit will be required to register for a permit and receive a parking violation per handbook rules.

What if I lose my parking permit?

Report to the Student Activities Office.

What if I start driving in the middle of the school year?

Once you are ready to start driving to school, please fill out

an application online and then report to the Student Activities Office. You should not start parking on campus until the permit is properly displayed in your vehicle.

What if I drive more than 1 vehicle?

You may register up to three cars with one permit for a single driver. The driver is responsible for moving the tag between the vehicles.

Can I let my sibling borrow my permit?

Each permit is registered to a single driver; however, if a sibling is driving the same car registered to the family nothing needs to be done. Siblings cannot share one permit if both are driving to school in two different vehicles.

What if I have a permit, but fail to put it in my car before parking at school?

You will receive a parking violation as outlined in the student handbook.

I have a parking pass to park adjacent to the school for a specific reason deemed appropriate by student services. (Ex: Senior CLASS award winner, medical purposes) Do I need to register a parking permit?

Yes, all students who drive to school must have a parking permit.

What happens if I park illegally, but I have a valid permit?

Students will receive a parking violation as outlined in the student handbook.



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I only drive on blue days and my friend drives on gold days, can we share one permit?

No. Permits are non-transferable between students or by students.

Can I obtain a parking pass without agreeing to the terms and conditions?

No.

Do the conditions of the parking permit apply to non-school days?

No. Permits are only required during school hours on school days.

What does the handbook specifically say about driving at Carmel High School?

Parking on campus property, adjacent to school buildings, will be limited to staff and by permit parking only. Students may not park in any designated staff areas on campus. Please be respectful to private parking areas off campus and pay close attention to posted signs. Students who wish to drive to school may park their vehicles in the parking lot at the stadium on Smoky Row Road. There is ample parking at this facility to accommodate all students who wish to drive. Please remember that bus transportation is always available. The Transportation Center's telephone number is 317-844-8207.

Student driving regulations:

- 1. Students must hang a Carmel High School parking permit from their rear view mirror to be able to park on property.
- Students must park in the stadium parking lot. Any exceptions must be approved by the Student Services Office.
- 3. Vehicles are to be driven in a courteous and safe manner at all times. A speed limit of fifteen (15) miles per hour applies on school property.
- 4. Vehicles are not to be driven unnecessarily on campus.
- Drivers are to obey all posted signs, follow directions of traffic personnel, park only in designated parking spaces and avoid the designated fire lanes.
- 6. Upon arrival at school, vehicles should be prepared for inclement weather.

- 7. Vehicles should be locked.
- 8. Vehicles are to be unoccupied once they have been parked.
- 9. School buses have the right of way.
- 10. When vehicles are parked on property without a permit, the student driver will be required to register for a CHS permit. Students will also face consequences as determined by rule 10 of the driving regulations.
- 11. Vehicles are to be parked properly in the designated parking spaces. When vehicles are not parked properly in the designated parking spaces or not properly displaying their parking permit, the student driver will face the following consequences:
 - First Offense: Student will conference with an administrator, and contact will be made to a parent. Student is given a choice to serve two Saturday Detentions or pay a \$50 parking fee.
 - Second Offense: Student will conference with an administrator, and contact will be made to a parent. Student is assigned an in-school suspension for failure to comply with an administrative directive. The student is ineligible for Skip-A-Final for the current semester.
 - Third Offense: A conference with the parent and student will occur to discuss the multiple instances of failure to comply. The students will be assigned an out of school suspension. The student's parking permit will be revoked for the remainder of the school year. The student is ineligible for Skip-A- Final for the current semester.
- 12. Cars parked in posted NO PARKING zones, fire lanes or along yellow curbs will be towed at the owner's' expense. The school will reserve the right to tow cars parked illegally if it creates a disturbance to the school environment.

A school administrator may enter and inspect any vehicle, if, in their judgment, there is reasonable evidence that materials forbidden by law, school policy, or school rules are therein.

Carmel High School have security personnel who patrol all campus parking areas. However, Carmel Clay Schools is not responsible for damages/thefts that occur to cars while parked on Carmel Clay Schools' property.







Attendance Procedures And Tips

To report an illness or prearrange an absence, call the 24-hour voicemail.

- Grades 10-12: 317-571-5915


Choose from one of the following options:

- 1. Illness
- 2. All-day absence, not ill (such as college visit, vacation, bereavement, etc.)
- 3. Prearranging student who will be leaving or arriving before 10 a.m.
- 4. Prearranging student who will be leaving or arriving after 10 a.m.
- 5. All other
 - A parent must make a phone call. Written notes will not be accepted.
 - To prearrange for your student to miss school for an appointment, call the attendance office as far in advance at possible. We are able to schedule prearranged absences months in advance.
 - Students are responsible for picking up their passes prior to beginning of the class period they will be leaving.
 - Students may be considered truant if they leave the school building without a pass and a call from parents to prearrange their absence.
 - Students must sign out at the attendance office before leaving and sign in at the attendance office upon returning to school, even if it is during a passing period or lunch.
 - Students who arrive late to school must sign in at the attendance office regardless of arrival time. Failure to do so may result in disciplinary action.
 - Parents/guardians going out of town should leave emergency contact information for themselves and other pertinent information with the attendance office.



ATTENDANCE OFFICE REQUESTING DOCTOR'S NOTES

The Attendance Office is requesting doctor's notes from students who are absent due to doctor's appointments or illness that requires medical attention. These notes are an important part of determining which absences count against the Project ACES program. Project ACES differentiates between excused absences with a doctor's note provided and those without one. Doctor appointments and illnesses without a doctor's note are still considered excused. However, when a doctor's note is provided, the absence does not count toward the ten absences allowed each school year by Project ACES. Students may turn in doctor's notes when returning to school or notes may be faxed to the attendance office at 571-7924. 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INCLUDE CAMPUS VISITS IN YOUR COLLEGE SEARCH PLANS!

Campus visits are an excellent way for students and families to gather information about colleges and move closer to helping students find a good college fit. Parents are encouraged to help their student(s) plan visits to a variety of colleges and universities with the aim of providing exposure to a variety of campus environments



(large/small, public/private, etc.) It is never too early to visit colleges, and often these visits serve as powerful motivators for students to strive to do their best academically and improve their candidacy for admissions.

Planning a campus visit is easy. Start by visiting the college/university website. Many visits can be arranged online, while others just require a call to the admissions office to set up the official visit. Most official visits include a campus tour as well as individual or group meetings with admissions representatives. Don't hesitate to ask if you can sit in a class, talk to professors/advisors, or talk to current students. The more information students can gather to make an informed decision, the better!

In addition to recognizing the top scholars at the April 15 banquet, the Hall of Fame Committee honored two CHS alumni:





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BOBBY COX, CLASS OF 1975, HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE



Bobby Cox graduated from CHS as a part of the Class of '75, where he participated in Cross Country and Track and Field. After graduating from CHS, Cox attended Butler University, receiving his BA in PE & Health in 1979, his MA in Secondary Education in 1987, and his Administrative License in 1995. While at Butler, Cox was an active member of the Track & Field team, setting the six-mile record for the school in 1978. Bobby went onto

to be an integral part of athletics for Carmel-Clay Schools, serving as a teacher, coach, and athletic administrator for a combined total of 21 years. During these years, he established his presence in the district, overseeing all 54 athletic teams, 97 coaches, and over 1,100 student athletes while serving as Athletic Director of CHS from 1997 to 2000. He also served as an Athletics Director for Clay Middle School, when he was honored as the *District III Athletic Administrator of the Year* for junior highs and middle schools. Then, starting in 2000, Cox began administering football, boys' golf, boys' and girls' track and field, and wrestling as Assistant Commissioner of the IHSAA.

As Commissioner, Bobby introduced a partnership in "servant leadership", and initiated unprecedented ways to give back to schools and communities. Cox was a member of the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) Football Rules Committee, serving as the Chairman of the Research subcommittee. In 2011, Cox began his role of Indiana High School Athletic Association (IHSAA) Commissioner. Regardless of the prestige of his achievements, his initiatives with Special Olympics and similar organizations that help those with disabilities participate in sports has arguably been his most impactful work. Combining both his love for athletics and his desire to give back to his community, Cox spearheaded the movement to create a partnership between the IHSAA and Special Olympics. This partnership, known as "Champions Together," was created on Dec. 17, 2012, and to this day, "Champions Together" continues to be an active organization at this high school and at many others. This partnership has helped the "inclusion revolution" in promoting Special Olympics throughout the state of Indiana.

CHRISTOPHER ZANETIS, CLASS OF 1999, HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE

Christopher "Tripp" Zanetis graduated from Carmel High School in 1999. He participated in diving and show choir while in high school. After graduating, he began attending NYU, from which he earned his BA in politics cum laude in 2003. Having volunteered with the Fire Department of New York for 14 hours on 9/11 as a



sophomore, he joined the FDNY after graduating and was later promoted to Fire Marshal. Tripp fought several catastrophic fires while serving on the FNDY. In 2008, he joined the Air National Guard, and was deployed to both Afghanistan and Iraq with the 106th Rescue Wing. Before his final tour, he had received four Air Medals for combat missions.

In 2014, while on active duty, he joined Stanford Law School. He worked on the Stanford Journal of International Law and the International Refugee Assistance Project. He served as co-President of the Stanford Law Veterans Organization and won the National LGBT Bar Association Student Leadership Award. He spent 6 months in Brussels, Belgium working with the Office of Legal Affairs for NATO. He also facilitated the rededication of the school's World War II memorial plaque and helped open it for public display.

Zanetis became an associate at a New York City law firm. He joined the Bar of New York and the National LGBT Law Association. While serving in the National Guard in March 2018 he was involved in a fatal helicopter accident. Tripp Zanetis lived his life as a servant leader, and he was proud to be a Carmel Greyhound.
