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
Message from the Director

We elcome to the fourth edition 'Year at Nanjing International School' which is another at a glance summary of life at school over the year 2013. The information spans the second semester of 2012-13 and the first semester of 2013-14. The main goal of the publication is to share information about school with our community. Every school wants to live their mission and my hope is that the NIS community will be able to draw some conclusions about whether we are achieving what we have set out for ourselves in our mission.

2013 was a year punctuated by double-digit student enrolment growth, stable staffing with few teachers leaving and campus improvement with the replacement of the artificial turf on our football pitch. Waiting lists at a number of grade levels is now part of our reality as we simply cannot fit in all the students that want to come to NIS. With the Board giving approval to Phase 4 of the campus development master plan we have started to build a second sports hall and a state-of-the-art Design Centre, both demonstrating that NIS is certainly not a school that rests on its laurels.

Feedback for Effective Thinking Conference

After the extremely successful regional ACAMIS (Association of Chinese and Mongolian International Schools) Conference NIS hosted in 2012. NIS hosted our first NIS initiated Professional Development Conference. The conference title 'Feedback for Effective Thinking' relates to a staff development goal to highlight and improve feedback in helping students learn from formative assessment. The brainchild of Head of Primary, Derek Pinchbeck the conference attracted 220 delegates including the whole NIS faculty. The two main conference presenters were Dylan Wiliam following on from his successful BBC documentary and Ron Ritchart researcher with the Harvard Visible Learning Project. These world class presenters attracted educators from Bangladesh to the west, Singapore to the south, Japan to the east and Beijing to the north.



At this year's Board Retreat in September we engaged in strategic goal setting. With this in mind my goals were designed to match with our strategic policies.

The Board is a 9-member group of volunteers. Two of the Board members are non-voting – Staff member and Director. There are two Board sub-committees: Finance and Governance. These working committees make recommendations for Board approval.

In 2013 the Board retreat was dominated by one major discussion point – Board stability for the future. Our facilitator, John Littleford, expressed concern about the present system of Board elections leaving the school vulnerable to significant change every year.

A number of changes to create a more stable Board based on a balance between continuity and phased change were presented to the Annual General Meeting in September. The changes were supported by the AGM giving the school a stronger footing for the future. The Board has the power to co-opt or appoint members when there are resignations during a term in office. Those co-opted then stand for election at the next Annual Election. Appointed members serve a two year term.





Finance NIS is a not-for-profit school that is owned by the parents.

All fee payments are for the entire use of the school to benefit the students and their learning. This makes us unique amongst international schools in Nanjing. Since NIS is self-funding, all building, including debt service for such projects, must be generated from fees.

The two graphs show the expenditure for 2012-13 and the present budget for 2013-14. The largest cost for the school is staffing. The major building projects undertaken on campus are affordable investments for the continued development of a world class campus. We are very proud of the proportion of the budget that is spent on resources for learning, which demonstrates our commitment to student learning.








Students by Region

There are presently over 44 nationalities at NIS, with approximately 43% of students from Asia and 57% from outside Asia.





In the last year the number of students coming to NIS has risen steadily.

The region with the greatest increase of students is North America which now accounts for 19% of students at NIS. In terms of real student number this is an increase of 75% in just two years. Due to the expansion of upper school grades we have increased student choice in modern language, science and the Arts. We have added extra Maths classes which has reduced the class size.

Teaching Faculty Staff Demographics

NIS has a teaching faculty of 98 teachers who come from 17 countries.

The number of teachers leaving NIS has remained around 10-12% for the last four years giving the school a great sense of continuity based around a highly motivated professional teaching faculty working in a supportive and stimulating environment.


However the number of new teachers has grown to match the growth in enrolment. It is rare to find such diversity of age, experience, nationalities and expertise in one faculty.

NIS hires teachers through worldwide searches for the best fit, we have no affinity to any one system. Our affinity is to best practice for the benefit of student learning.

There is no more important aspect of NIS education than the outcomes for students. In particular the data on student achievement which helps the school track the performance of our students and to make some meaningful comparisons with like schools.

As an inclusive school it is important that all our academic results are placed within a context. While we are proud that our students consistently achieve beyond the world average at IB Diploma we are most proud of the fact that we encourage all of our students to follow IB level classes. Many schools only enter their academically most gifted students in order to report better results. We simply want our students to achieve their best, for some that means 24 points and for others 45. It is important to view achievement data with a critical eye. The Class of 2013 achieved the highest average subject score over the last five years.

All our eligible students have their work entered for external moderation. At NIS we like to find out if we are meeting external expectations for our students. The moderated results are not just important for our students, but they are also important for our teachers since they design all the internal formative and summative assessments that are sent to the moderators. As the number of students in high school (Grades 9-12) increases we have a better base to judge academic performance. The average subject score at MYP level has improved by the end of the IB Diploma every year for the last 5 years. Our Grade 10 students scored the highest average subject score since we have been tracking their scores.

We have a relatively small number of students entering for the PSAT and SAT however a growing number of students are interested in studying in the USA. As would be expected, even with this small number of students, NIS students score significantly above the US average for Mathematics, and perhaps more surprising with most of them being second language learners, above the US average for critical reading and writing. In fact the combined US average score is below our lowest score.





Discover China Week

Discover China Week (Grade 5-12) is a programme designed to allow NIS students the opportunity to link classroom learning with real-life situations.

It also aims to broaden their experiences and knowledge of China.

Each trip is framed around an Area of Interaction and aims to allow students the opportunity to achieve a number of learning outcomes. In addition, the trips allow students to develop a greater understanding of their fellow students and teachers, and increase their capacity to work together.

Athletics

The Athletics program at NIS continued to thrive and grow through 2013. For those families who were here during 2012, you may recall that we introduced the NUX competitions as well as introducing our first ever Track & Field team and Cross Country team. We also brought Grade 5 into the CISSA Program offering them opportunities in a range of CISSA sports. This year our focus on more growth but tempered with was some consolidation of the above changes. Our growth came in the form of our first ever Table Tennis team, a re-introduction of the Touch Rugby Program into Middle School and the expansion into Junior Varsity Girls Volleyball due to the increasing popularity of this program.

The 2013 year started off as always with the culmination of the ACAMIS Basketball season. The boys had a JV and a Varsity team enter the SISAC tournaments in Shanghai for the first time and both boys teams and the Varsity Girls' team performed very well. Our Badminton season was highly successful with three teams competing in ACAMIS and at SISAC. All three teams were very competitive in their respective competitions culminating in an excellent SISAC Championship win for our A Team to round off the season.

For our younger students, we were very well represented in a busy time of year for sports including CISSA Badminton in February, CISSA Volleyball in March, CISSA Track & Field in April and CISSA Basketball in May. The numbers participating in these sports just keep on rising which is great to see. Our philosophy at this age group is maximum and equal participation which means every student, irrespective of their past experience or their ability in that sport can gain the opportunity to take part in a competitive tournament. Almost without exception this is a positive experience for our students and allows them to broaden their education beyond the classroom. In the new school year of 2013-14 we started the year with our High School Volleyball teams, our Cross Country team and, for the first time in three years, we re-introduced Touch Rugby into the school. These were all a great success with the ACAMIS Boys Volleyball team returning from Shanghai as ACAMIS Champions, the first time we have achieved this at Volleyball in the school's history!!

A great achievement for our school. Meanwhile our Junior Boys Cross Country team also dominated the ACAMIS event, winning the team trophy.

The CISSA Touch Rugby was immediately followed by the CISSA Soccer season where over 60 boys and girls participated in four different events on the same day in November. From the 31 games played, only 6 were losses and 23 were wins, a great step up in performance from previous years. Meanwhile we have also introduced Table Tennis into the Athletics program, entering ACAMIS competition for the first time where our teams did us proud in Qingdao in November, gaining a 3rd place in the boys doubles competition. They are preparing for SISAC at the time of writing.

Our basketball teams finished the school year with a very successful NUX tournament and look forward to participating in SISAC and ACAMIS in the new year - good luck to them!

Swimming



This was the fourth year of operations for the NIS pool. Due to the popularity and demand for swimming at NIS, in August we introduced our biggest change yet to the PYP in-school swimming programme by doubling the amount of swim lessons from one 30 minute lesson per week to 30 minutes twice a week.

With this change we are already seeing a large increase in the level of swimming abilities throughout the PYP grade levels with all students progressing faster within the programme. In addition to this we have restructured our NIS Sea Lions swim team squad training schedule and levels to meet increased student demand. We now offer a Transition squad level held on Saturday mornings where children are introduced to swimming training using the pace clock amongst other skills needed in preparation for advancement to the Bronze squad.

This year with the aid of our electronic timing system, new scoreboard and a great group of parent and student helpers we hosted several swim meets and club time trials. In January the NIS Invitational Meet was attended by ten International Schools from Shanghai who participate in the Shanghai Swim League (a competitive swimming organization for international school children). 350 swimmers and approximately 300 parents attended this meet. Also in March, NIS hosted the two day CISSA/ ACAMIS Swim Meet finishing 1st against eight other schools. This was our first tournament win since our club was formed in 2010 and a great achievement by the entire swim team. Another stand out event and one that was driven by student initiative was the 12 hour swim-a-thon comprising of 6 teams swimming for 12 hours without a break. It was the brainchild of two grade 8 girls who wanted to raise money for children in need.

Also in April the Grade 12 Visual Arts Exhibition demonstrated the diversity of our students' skills and interests expressed eloquently in many forms of visual media.

The Art Auction was another exciting event of 2013 including works donated by students, teachers, parents and community members raising valuable funds for the Pfrang Association.

In November we were challenged as an audience by the powerful and an emotionally charged performance of Back Home; a play devised, written, directed and performed by the Grade 10 Drama class.

Our inexhaustible Arts students have also been very active beyond Nanjing participating in many festivals and cultural conventions, also including Film and Dance workshops and activities. The Visual Arts students were undoubtedly inspired by an Andy Warhol retrospective in Shanghai whilst the Grade 12 students thoroughly enjoyed their visit to the 798 Art District in Beijing.

The Green Team

The Green Team at NIS is a broad group of students, teachers and staff who are involved in initiatives that enhance understanding of, and develop commitment to, environmental issues.

These people are self-motivated activists trying to create a better school environment and develop life lasting behaviours to save our planet.

Sustainability Committee

A community-wide Sustainability Committee has been formed which meets roughly once a month to identify environmental issues and solutions. This is student-led but attended by teachers, parents and administration.



Save Our Species

Save Our Species (SOS) is an environmental group at NIS. They are focused on raising awareness for a range of environmental issues, including animal protection, energy conservation, and deforestation. Currently, SOS is engaged in two main initiatives--the Million Tree Program, which is a project by the Shanghai Roots and Shoots organization to plant trees on degrading land in Inner Mongolia, and the Nanjing Zoo Project, in which we hope to help improve conditions at the Nanjing Zoo. SOS has also helped raise awareness in smaller steps. Every other Friday, during the MYP/DP assembly, the SOS team projects a quick environmental fact onto the screen as everyone enters the theatre. This is to help educate people and encourage them to become more environmentally-conscience.

The 4R Group

The 4R Group focuses on reducing paper waste at NIS. Our first priority is to persuade people to use as little paper as possible. Then, if they must use paper, to reuse it by printing on both sides. Finally we ask people to recycle paper that has been used on both sides.


Environment Police
