**BACKGROUND:** AVID, (Advancement Via Individual Determination) is a program that was created in 1980 designed to help average students perform at above-average achievement. AVID objectives are: to provide academic instruction and other support to students that prepare them for eligibility to four-year colleges and universities, to provide students with college level entry skills, to motivate students to seek a college education and to increase student's awareness of careers. In Tracy, AVID started in 2003 with the first graduating class of 47 students in 2006. TUSD has expanded the AVID program to serving eight schools: West High School, Tracy High School, Kimball High School, Monte Vista Middle School, Williams Middle School, North School, Poet-Christian School, and George Kelly School.

**RATIONALE:** AVID is designed for students who have appropriate behavior, a grade point average between 2.0 and 3.0, good attendance, good work habits and a willingness to commit to a rigorous academic schedule as identified by test scores and teacher input. Potential AVID students are interviewed. Selected candidates and their parents are asked to sign a contract committing to the program. AVID is a voluntary elective class in which skills such as Focused Note Taking and Socratic Seminar are taught. This agenda meets District Strategic Goal #1: Prepare all students to be well-rounded individuals with the knowledge and skills to pursue their college and/or career goals and District Strategic Goal #3: Apply fiscal, operational and community resources to ensure a safe learning environment that supports staff and student goals.

County Behavioral Health Center Services to Provide Parenting
Classes to families in all TUSD Schools. These include Nurturing
Parenting Program: "Alcohol and Kids don't Mix," and
Strengthening Parenting Program: "Strengthening Multi-ethnic
Families and Communities."

The Tracy Unified School District (TUSD) has offered parenting BACKGROUND: classes to parents as a supportive service in year's past. Through the Children Youth Services Program, San Joaquin County Behavioral Health Center Services is an organization that provides classes for parents on the following topics: 1) Nurturing Parenting Program: Alcohol and Kids Don't Mix - This is a 5 session, 1.5 to 2 hours each, program that provides education about drugs and alcohol. This curriculum stresses the importance of not drinking during pregnancy and while raising children. Parents learn the dangers of alcohol addiction, fetal alcohol syndrome, teens and alcohol, and prescriptive drug abuse as well as modeling appropriate adult consumption of alcohol; 2) Strengthening Parenting Program: Strengthening Multi-Ethnic Families & Communities -This is a unique integration of various prevention/intervention strategies geared toward reducing violence against self, the family and the community. The program targets ethnic and culturally diverse parents of children ages 3-18 years who are interested in raising children with a commitment to leading a violence-free, healthy lifestyle. This curriculum is a 13-18 week, once a week for 1.5 to 2 hours, program.

**RATIONALE:** There are many potential benefits to offering parenting classes at TUSD school sites. Examples of parenting classes include: helping parents to set and hold boundaries with their student during homework time; teaching parents about normal behavior for specific developmental ages and stages, and how to cope and respond; introducing them to other parents at the school, so that a network of support is established and can enhance the school community. Additionally, this service aligns with TUSD's LCAP Goal 2) Provide a safe and equitable learning environment for all students and staff, Priority 3) Parent Engagement. In addition, this agenda item supports District Strategic Goal #3: Apply fiscal, operational and community resources to ensure a safe learning environment that supports staff and student goals.

### PRE-UNIFICATION AGREEMENT

### By and Between

### TRACY JOINT UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

and

### BANTA ELEMENTARY SCHOOL DISTRICT

This Pre-Unification Agreement (hereafter, the "Agreement"), dated September 24, 2019, is made and entered into by and between the Tracy Joint Unified School District (hereafter "Tracy") and the Banta Elementary School District (hereafter "Banta"), collectively the "Districts," both school districts organized and existing under the laws of the State of California, and is predicated upon the following:

### **Recitals**

WHEREAS, Banta is a non-unified school district serving grades transitional kindergarten through 8<sup>th</sup>;

WHEREAS, Tracy is a unified school district serving grades kindergarten through 12<sup>th</sup> within the boundaries of the former Tracy Elementary School District and serving grades 9<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> within that territory that it shares in common with: (1) Banta; (2) New Jerusalem Elementary School District; and (3) Jefferson Elementary School District within San Joaquin County; and (4) Mountain House Elementary School District within Alameda County (a map of the boundaries of Tracy is attached hereto as Exhibit A);

WHEREAS, Banta's residents currently receive transitional kindergarten through 8<sup>th</sup> grade educational services from Banta and high school educational services from Tracy;

WHEREAS, the governing board of Banta desires to reorganize Banta into a new unified district serving grades transitional kindergarten through 12<sup>th</sup>, with such unified school district to be referred to as the Banta Unified School District (hereafter "Banta Unified");

WHEREAS, the governing board of Tracy supports the concept of the unification of Banta into Banta Unified, subject to agreement by the Districts to certain unification conditions as set forth herein to eliminate any fiscal impacts of Banta's unification on Tracy;

WHEREAS, unification of Banta will require a variety of administrative arrangements and agreed upon procedures in order to accommodate students and programs. Prior to commencement of the operation of a high school program within Banta Unified, it will be necessary for Banta Unified students of high school age to enroll in Tracy;

WHEREAS, the Districts acknowledge that Education Code section 46600 authorizes two or more school districts to enter into an agreement for the interdistrict attendance of pupils who are residents of the respective districts;

WHEREAS, the Districts further acknowledge that those procedures of the Education Code governing in part the process for unification of school districts, namely Education Code sections 35500 through 35785, provide further guidance and authority for the anticipated unification of Banta, and it is the intent of the parties to this Agreement to delineate certain procedures, and agree upon certain approaches to carry out the process for unification as contemplated by the parties hereto. The procedures set forth in the Education Code

3. <u>Initiation of Unification</u>. The Districts anticipate that their respective governing boards will initiate the process for unification of Banta by way of a reorganization petition ("Petition") signed by the majority of the membership of each District's governing board in accordance with the procedures set forth at Education Code section 35700 (d). Banta has heretofore initiated unification under Education Code section 35700.

A. This Agreement shall not be binding on either District until approved by the governing boards of both Districts, and further, until both governing boards have approved the Petition.

B. Tracy agrees to implement the terms and conditions as set forth herein and Banta agrees to comply with and support the terms and conditions set forth herein until such time as Banta ceases operation following unification for all purposes.

C. The Districts acknowledge that the process of unification shall include the review, preparation, and approval by the San Joaquin County Committee on School District Organization, of a petition, recommendation, report and order as provided for by way of Education Code sections 35707, 35708 and 35710(b) ("Order"). The Districts further acknowledge that the Order shall set forth certain conditions, rights and obligations of the future Banta Unified which are intended as conditions of its unification.

D. Both existing Districts agree to make reasonable efforts to provide information requested by the San Joaquin County Committee on School District Organization.

E. The Districts acknowledge that notwithstanding the provisions of this Agreement and costs voluntarily incurred, Tracy shall not bear any costs related to unification of Banta, including costs associated with submission and review of the petition.

4. <u>Binding On Banta Unified</u>. The parties to this Agreement base their approval hereof upon the understanding that this Agreement will bind Banta's successors, specifically Banta Unified.

5. <u>Term</u>. The term of this Agreement shall commence upon its Effective Date as identified above and shall terminate upon the earlier of: (A) June 30, 2021, if by that date voters have failed to approve unification at an election called pursuant to Education Code section 35710 et seq., unless the State Board of Education has waived the requirement to hold an election pursuant to Education Code section 35710 et seq.; or (B) Banta Unified's operation of a Four Year High School Program.

In the event that the San Joaquin County Committee on School District Organization, or their staff require material changes in the terms of this Agreement, the Districts shall meet and confer regarding the acceptability of the required changes. If, following this meet and confer, either District determines that the changes are not acceptable, that District may terminate this Agreement upon thirty (30) days notice to the other District. Following such termination, either District may pursue such other unification petitions as they deem appropriate.

6. <u>Banta Unified High School Program Following Unification</u>. It is anticipated that in the event of unification, Banta Unified will develop its High School program over several years enrolling students in additional grades each year. The Districts do not anticipate Banta Unified operating a Four Year High School Program until the 2024-2025 school year.

the anticipated costs related to housing Banta Unified students at high schools in Tracy, except as set forth herein.

1) Consistent with Paragraph 6.D above, if during the term of this Agreement Tracy is able to demonstrate based on objective standards that it lacks capacity to accommodate students from Banta Unified in Tracy's then-existing high school facilities, Banta Unified will fund the leasing, acquisition and installation of portable classrooms or provide other interim housing within Tracy ("Interim Housing") in order to accommodate the number of Banta Unified high school students attending Tracy's high schools that is greater than Tracy's then-available student capacity.

2) Banta Unified will continue to fund such Interim Housing until such time as Banta Unified has capacity for all of its high school students in its Four Year High School Program. As Banta Unified students housed in the Interim Housing become housed at Banta Unified, and the portables comprising the Interim Housing are no longer needed for Banta Unified high school students, then the portables shall be returned to Banta Unified, and the cost of returning these portables, including the cost of site repair and restoration shall be borne by Banta Unified, unless otherwise agreed to by the Districts.

3) Nothing herein is intended to limit or restrict any rights that the Districts may have to hold developers responsible for the cost of the Interim Housing.

E. <u>Access To Tracy Programs</u>. Students who reside in Banta Unified will only have access to programs and services of Tracy, including any specialized education program, (e.g., specialized academy/magnet programs), extracurricular and co-curricular activities, and services and summer school while they are enrolled in Tracy pursuant to this Agreement.

Special Education Services. Together with the San Joaquin County F. Office of Education Special Education Local Plan Area (the "County SELPA"), Tracy provides special education services to non-severe and severe special education students. Tracy will offer special education services to non-severe and severe special education students who reside in Banta Unified but are enrolled in Tracy pursuant to this Agreement, subject to the availability of State and/or Federal funding. The Per Student Funding, consistent with Paragraph 5.B. above, for both non-severe and severe special education students attending Tracy schools shall be allocated to Tracy. Further, any additional funding allocated to Banta Unified for provision of special education services to Banta Unified students attending schools in Tracy shall be allocated to Tracy. To the extent that the cost of providing services to Banta Unified's special education students being served by Tracy are not fully funded by this funding, Banta Unified shall be responsible for such reasonable costs. At any time, in the event Tracy is able to demonstrate based on objective standards that it lacks capacity or facilities to accommodate non-severe or severe special education students from Banta Unified, then Banta Unified shall seek to obtain such services from the County SELPA.

7. <u>Property, Funds and Obligations</u>. Property and funds of Tracy shall be allocated as described below. All matters relating to property, funds and obligations not otherwise specified herein shall be apportioned and assumed in accordance with the Unification Laws, including but not limited to Education Code section 35560.

A. <u>Real Property and Facilities</u>. Banta Unified shall not acquire any real property or facilities within Tracy as a result of this Agreement or the unification, nor shall Tracy acquire any real property or facilities within Banta Unified as a result of this Agreement or the unification.

Tracy agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless Banta, and, following Α. the Unification Date, Banta Unified, its governing board, agents, representatives, officers, consultants, and employees ("Banta Indemnified Parties"), from any and all claims, losses, liabilities, damages, demands, or expenses, including attorneys' fees and costs, arising out of or in connection with Tracy's negligent implementation of this Agreement or its negligent failure to comply with any of its obligations under state and local laws with respect to this Agreement, except such loss or damage which is caused by the active negligence, sole negligence, or willful misconduct of the Banta Indemnified Parties.

Banta and Banta Unified, jointly and severally, agree to indemnify, defend, Β. and hold harmless Tracy, its Board of Education, agents, representatives, officers, consultants, and employees ("Tracy Indemnified Parties") from any and all claims, losses, liabilities, damages, demands, or expenses, including attorneys' fees and costs, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement and/or the unification of Banta, except such loss or damage which is caused by the active negligence, sole negligence, or willful misconduct of the Tracy Indemnified Parties.





**BACKGROUND:** Several Local, State and Federal programs allow public and non-profit transportation providers to apply for administration, capital, and operation assistance programs or grants that support the purchase of electric buses. To be eligible for grant funds, the Tracy Unified School District Governing Board must authorize a representative by resolution, as the "Authorized Individual" to make application and administer the Electric School Bus Incentive Program.

**RATIONALE:** AZ Bus Sales has the expertise and the operational capacity to make application for up to eleven electric buses, each with capacity to transport between eight (8) and twenty-four (24) students. Authorizing AZ Bus Sales to serve as the District's representative will increase the likelihood of being funded by these programs.

**BACKGROUND:** Banta Elementary School District is a non-unified elementary school district serving grades transitional kindergarten through 8<sup>th</sup>, and is one of three elementary school districts with territory in common with the high school attendance arcas of the Tracy Unified School District. The Banta District does not presently offer public high school services, and high school age students residing within Banta District boundaries are eligible to receive high school services from high schools operated by the Tracy District as well as other educational service providers.

**RATIONALE:** With recent increases in population, the population center of the Banta Elementary School district has shifted to the River Islands community, which is approximately 11 miles from West High School, the school of attendance for the students of that area. Therefore, representative of the Banta District have determined there is an increased need for high school age students residing within Banta District boundaries to receive high school scrvices locally, and that a local unified school district would provide a more economical, consistent, and effective articulation of programs and resources. Among other benefits, unification will allow all students residing within Banta District be educated within the Banta Unified School District and thereby reduce the travel time for high school students who live within Banta District boundaries.

To that end, on June 19, 2019 the Governing Board of the Banta District adopted Resolution Number 2018/19 - #15, Authorizing Commencement of a Process for Reorganization into a Unified School District.

Adoption of this resolution certifies that: 1) the Governing Board of the Tracy District supports the unification effort and endorses joint initiation of the petition for unification; 2) that the unification will not adversely affect either the Banta District nor the Tracy Unified School Districts, the residents of either school district, the San Joaquin County Office of Education, the State of California, nor any other agency or person; and 3) supports the elements of the attached resolution.

California State University, Chico School of Education Tracy Joint Unified School District Paid Internship Agreement

This agreement is between Tracy Joint Unified School District ("District") and California State University, Chico ("University"), who may be referred to collectively as the parties. The District is authorized under Education Code 44320 et seq., to cooperate with institutions of higher education in providing training and experience to credential candidates who hold an intern credential, or are participating in an alternative paid internship position ("Paid Intern"). This Agreement describes and confirms the expectations and responsibilities of the Parties regarding the Program through which University students who hold an intern credential from the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing, or are participating in an alternate paid internship position ("Paid Interns") will gain experience in the public school setting. University employs one or more experienced credentialed teachers, administrators, or doctoral candidates who have agreed to provide direct classroom supervision and support to Paid Interns and Local Support Teachers. Such individuals may be referred to below as *University Supervisors*.

### I. TERM OF THE AGREEMENT

A. This Agreement shall remain in effect for a term of three (3) years beginning August 15, 2019 and ending August 14, 2022, unless terminated sooner. Either party may terminate this Agreement on 30 days' written notice to the other party.

### II. RECITALS

A. University operates a program for the education and training of candidates pursuing a California Preliminary Education Specialist (Mild/Moderate and Moderate/Severe) Teaching Credential, and Preliminary Multiple Subject Teaching Credential or Preliminary Single Subject Teaching Credential with English Learner Authorization (ELA) and is accredited by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) with approval to offer intern options in these programs.

### III. CTC REQUIREMENTS FOR SUPPORT AND SUPERVISION OF INTERN TEACHERS

- A. In 2013, the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) adopted policies that specify the number of hours of general support and supervision, as well as additional specific English Learner support and supervision, which must be provided to Paid Interns. The regulations (California Education Code §44321; 5 Cal. Code Reg. § 80033) were approved and made part of law effective 2014.
- B. Under the approved regulations, the University and District must:
  - 1. Identify a Local Support Teacher or other designated individual who meet the CTC's specified criteria prior to a Paid Intern's start date.
  - 2. Provide a minimum of 144 hours per year (72 hours per semester) of support/mentoring and supervision must be provided to each Paid Intern including coaching, modeling, and demonstrating within the classroom, assistance with course planning and problem-solving regarding students, curriculum, and development of effective teaching methodologies.

- C. District will identify a district-employed Local Support Teacher, and will complete the *Local Support Teacher Information Form* (Exhibit B). Form will be submitted to University's School of Education prior to the Paid Intern's start date.
- D. District will provide new teacher orientation, on-going support and other clinical/professional experiences for Paid Interns teaching within the District under the supervision of a district-employed Local Support Teacher.
- E. District will provide release time and compensation for the Paid Intern and Local Support Teacher for participation in District group/regional group meetings and professional development activities including time to observe other exemplar teachers teaching in their classrooms as per section III.B.
- F. District will pay University a sum of \$1,500 per semester per Paid Intern.
- G. District will immediately notify University if the District has knowledge of or suspects any professional or ethical violations by a Paid Intern. University will cooperate with District in any investigation concerning the reported violation.
- H. District will instruct Paid Intern in school policies regarding child abuse reporting, sexual harassment and professional conduct.
- I. District, in conjunction with University's School of Education, and in compliance with CTC requirements, shall develop and implement an appropriate professional development plan for the Paid Intern. District will advise the Paid Intern in developing an individual academic program plan for completion of the credential program within two years, as determined by the issuance date of the Intern Credential and meet the requirements for the preliminary credential being sought.
- J. Support the completion of the Intern Requirement Checklist, and in consultation with the School of Education, develop and implement an appropriate Professional Development Plan for the intern, in compliance with CTC requirements.
- K. District will notify the University of any changes in employment during the internship;
- L. Release the intern from employment if the School of Education determines that the terms of the internship are not being met.
- M. District will review details and pre-requisite requirements for becoming a Paid Intern found at <u>www.csuchico.edu/soe/intern</u>, and verify that the proposed teaching position:
  - i. is in a public school district or public charter school;
  - ii. is a regular teaching position authorized by the standard credential which the credential candidate is pursuing;
  - iii. does not displace any certificated employees in the school district;
  - iv. is at least 50% of a full-time position;
  - v. is appropriate for the subject matter competence of the credential candidate;
  - vi. is supported by the local bargaining unit representing district teachers;
  - vii. is hired through an alternative authorization to teach while the Intern Credential is being processed, if necessary; and
  - viii. is assigned a reasonable teaching load for a teacher- in-training, and protected from extracurricular and case-overload demands.

such insurance policy or policies. Further, University agrees to maintain professional and comprehensive general liability insurance with no exclusion for molestation or abuse at a minimum of Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000) per occurrence and Twenty Million Dollars (\$20,000,000) in aggregate throughout the course of this Agreement.

- B. Further, University shall provide written notice that should any of the above described policies be cancelled before the expiration thereof, notice will be delivered in accordance with the policy provisions. University also agrees to maintain statutory Workers' Compensation coverage on any individuals considered as employees of University working at District pursuant to this Agreement at all times during the course of this Agreement.
- C. University shall provide certificates evidencing all coverage referred to in this Section within thirty (30) days of execution of this Agreement and thereafter, on an annual basis. If the coverage is on a claims-made basis, University hereby agrees that not less than thirty (30) days prior to the effective date of termination of University's current insurance coverage or termination of this Agreement, University shall either purchase three (3) year tail coverage per claim or provide proof of continuous coverage in the above stated amounts for all claims arising out of incidents occurring prior to termination of University's current coverage or prior to termination of this Agreement, as applicable, and provide District a certificate of insurance evidencing such coverage.
- D. The University is permissibly self-insured through the State of California for automobile liability.
- E. The District shall maintain automobile liability, general liability, workers' compensation and errors and omissions liability coverages for themselves and their respective employees. Errors or omissions liability coverage shall include coverage for negligence relating to alleged sexual misconduct and shall be on an occurrence basis. Automobile liability coverage must apply to owned, non-owned and hired automobiles. The required coverage may be provided by way of adequately documented individual or pooled self-insurance.
- F. The District shall be named as an additional insured or covered party on the liability coverages maintained by the University, and such coverages shall be primary to any coverages maintained by the District. Limits of liability for each type of liability coverage shall be at least \$1 million per claim per occurrence/ \$2 million aggregate.
- G. District shall maintain workers' compensation coverage applicable to its employees, including Paid Interns.

### VIII. INDEMNIFICATION

- A. University shall defend, indemnify and hold District and its officials, employees and agents, harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages arising out of the performance of this Agreement, but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of University, its officials, agents, or employees.
- B. District shall defend, indemnify and hold University, its officials, employees and agents, harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damage arising out of the performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such
