IMPORTANCE OF THE ESSAY:

HIGH!! Your **essay**, your grades, and your SAT/ACT scores are the three most important parts of your application.

PURPOSE OF THE ESSAY:

- to demonstrate your writing proficiency
- to reveal the thoughtfulness and maturity that will make you a successful applicant and college student

WRITING SUGGESTIONS FOR THE ESSAY:

- Find your voice. Do not try to sound more intelligent than you are. AVOID the thesaurus.
- Be efficient and concise. OMIT the unnecessary. Do not exceed the word limit.
- Be clear and powerful. Use strong and precise words. Avoid the VAGUE and cliched.
- **Be honest and real.** Do **NOT** become sentimental and moralistic. Stay true to yourself and human experience.
- **Ask for others' opinions.** Friends, peers, teachers, guidance counselors, parents. Anyone can be a resource and provide feedback and a fresh perspective.
- **PROOFREAD**!!!! PROOFREAD!!!! Remember that you need the college more than they need you. **MISTAKES WILL COST YOU!**

FINDING YOUR TOPIC:

- **Tell a good story.** Present visually dramatic images to the reader.
- The topic should be narrow and specific. Generalizing and vagueness are boring, not dramatic.
- Be an individual and take a risk. Do not write about what everyone else is writing about.
 STAND OUT FROM THE CROWD.
- The topic should truly interest you. Use your passion.
- Your essay should explore the topic assigned by the school, include some observation about the school to which you are applying if it relates to the topic.
- Use whatever is available to you. Humor, poetry, narrative. Be unique but be careful NOT TO OFFEND. Get feedback from others to determine if you are appropriate.

In conclusion:

- ♣ Write boldly and beautifully!
- ♣ Remember what your English teachers and others have tried to teach you!
- Be brave and make a great impression!
