Why Work Experience?

Work experience has been consistently identified as the most important predictor of postschool employment success for students with disabilities, regardless of disability or intensity of special education services

Transition in FUHSD

Transition Planning

- Begins in preschool
- FUHSD begins the formal process in 8th grade
 - Parent Education Nights
 - Specialized Academic Instruction (November)
 - Academic Community Transition (December or January)
 - SAI transitions with Lead Resource Specialist
 - ACT transitions with SELPA Program Specialist
 - Diploma and Certificate of Completion Pathways
 - Diploma--meets course of study requirements
 - FAPE ends
 - Certificate of Completion--Academics, Community, Independence, Employment skills
 - FAPE continues until age 22

Individual Transition Plan (ITP)

- ITPs are <u>required</u> for students with IEPs by age 16
 - FUHSD begins in 9th grade

- ITPs help student set goals to prepare for post-high school life
 - What are the goals?
 - Education/Training
 - Employment
 - Independent Living
 - What activities support working towards the goals?

Activities related to grants are available but not required


- Grant activities are NOT IEP services or part of FAPE
- WorkAbility--all students with IEPs have access and participate in activities
 - Some students can participate in paid work experience
- Transition Partnership Program--some students participate and all who participate can access a paid work experience
- Paid Internship Program--students who are SARC clients and 18+ can participate in paid work experience

What is WAI?

The WAI grant programs provide comprehensive training in work, employment placement and follow-up for middle and high school students in special education who are making the transition from school to work, independent living and post-secondary education or training. The WAI program is funded and administered by the CDE and offers special education students the opportunity to complete their secondary education while also obtaining marketable job skills for success in the modern labor market.

WAI Activities include:

- Learning style assessments
- Interest inventories
- Career exploration
- Self-advocacy skills
- College visits
- Portfolio development
- Interview techniques/ workshops

- College planning
- Career exploration--UNPAID
- Job shadows--UNPAID
- Volunteer work
- Resume and job application support
- Soft skills
- Up to 50 hours limited work experience training--PAID
 - 50 students throughout district

WAI Paid Work Experience (general)

- Program Involves:
 - Employment skills training
 - Soft skills-proper attitude and work ethic
 - Hard skills-specific skills needed on the job
- Requirements:
 - 16 years old (minimum age)
 - 2.0 GPA
 - Good attendance
 - Complete 50 hours of work (two 3hr shifts/week)
- Job coaching-to start
- Continued communication with job developer
- Match students with suitable employment opportunities

WAI Paid Work Experience ACT and Post Secondary

- Different criteria and individualized
 - Good attendance
 - Prior successful volunteer experience
 - Can demonstrate necessary skills prior to paid work experience
 - Can participate similarly to other employees at site
 - Cannot be at volunteering at the same site or alongside other students who are volunteering
 - Will have job coaching from paraeducator from ACT class
 - During school day
 - Appropriate workplace behavior

Transition Partnership Program (TPP)

Some students with disabilities can participate

What is TPP?

TPP is an employment readiness program that works with high school students who have a disability prepare for life after high school by exploring careers and post secondary opportunities and getting ready to work.

Contract between FUHSD and Department of Rehabilitation

What is TPP?

- Student Services--16+
 - 5 Student services--support in exploring and preparing for the world of work
 - Job exploration counseling
 - Work-based learning experiences
 - Post secondary education counseling
 - Workplace readiness training
 - Instruction in self-advocacy
- Employment Services--seniors
 - Vocational Rehabilitation--students want help getting a job or working toward their career

How do students receive services?

- Classroom Model at each high school
 - Training for Transition
 - Academic Communications
 - Learning Skills
- Individual Service
 - Available at each high school
 - Services provided by job developers and transition specialists

TPP funding supports:

- Field trips related to post secondary or career exploration
- Instructional materials
- Transportation to job shadows
- Materials for student-run businesses
- Bus and train tokens/passes
- Interview clothing
- Student wages

TPP clients can participate in paid work experience

- Up to 100 hours
- \$15.65 per hour
- After school on weekdays and sometimes weekends
- Fingerprints, TB test, and sometimes food handlers card required

Summer Program

- Approx. 30 spots available
- 7-8 weeks
- 5 days/week
 - o 1 day classroom instruction including guest speakers
 - 1 day field trip
 - o 3 days work experience, 4 hr shift

+ Job Exploration: Field trips, job shadows and guest

What is CIE?

Competitive Integrated Employment (CIE), real work for real pay is the gold standard of transition outcomes for students with disabilities.

 The work should align with the post-school employment goals of the student and is the desired transition outcome for all students with disabilities who choose to work, regardless of disability or needed accommodations or support.

CIE should be a realistic and desirable expectation for all students.

What is the PIP?

Paid Internship Program (PIP) is a vendor-coordinated job development and placement which helps to build social and vocational skills through job exploration in an integrated and competitive environment the individual may not have previously been able to access, in order to prepare for and lead to permanent competitive employment. The internship uses state funds to defer the employer's expenses of paying the individual while an adult day program or supported employment vendor receives funding through the individual program plan for job coaching.

New to FUHSD

- FUHSD is now a vendor for this opportunity
- Students can be paid up to \$10,400 per year
- Jobs are developed to be geared toward student interest
- The scope of work and pay must be similar to others in the same role
- End goal is direct hire
