









CTP

SSIS initiated the use of CTP for the first time in 2017-2018 for grades 3 - 7. Previously, SSIS utilized Measures of Academic Program (MAP). CTP is a criterion-referenced assessment that measures literacy and numeracy, meaning students are assessed on a set criterion for each grade level and set of skills for the grade level.

Across both subject, areas and all grade levels, SSIS students' median percentile rank is above the United States Norm of 50%ile. Quantitative Reasoning and Mathematics 1 and 2 were consistently the strongest areas for SSIS students.




CTP 2018 Median Percentile Rank Comparison, SSIS Students &




National Percentile Rank Comparison, SSIS Students & United States


National Percentile Rank Comparison, SSIS Students & United States Norm: CLASS OF 2025 (5th GRADE)

CTP 2018 Median Percentile Rank Comparison, SSIS English Proficient Student & United States Norm: 7th GRADE






PSAT


SSIS expanded the use of the PSAT into grades 8 and 9 for the 2017-2018 school year. All of the PSAT tests are scored along the same scale, which is also the same as the SAT. Using the same scale allows for demonstration of growth across years.


SSIS students consistently performed above the world average and consistently increased each year.




SAT

SSIS students tend to take the SAT during their junior and senior years. The number of times the SAT is taken is up to the individual. SSIS reports overall average of best score per student. For the 2018 graduates the average score for Evidence-based Reading and Writing was 640 and for Mathematics was 700. Comparative world averages for 2018 are were 537 for ERW and 531 for Mathematics. SSIS students exceeded both averages by over 100 points each.









AP

The Advanced Placement (AP) program offers standardized courses to high school students, which are generally recognized as being the equivalent to undergraduate courses in college. An exam score of 3 or higher is considered a passing mark. Many competitive universities will grant college credit to students who score a 4 or 5 on their exams.

IB

The IB diploma is seen as a well-rounded, rigorous, and comprehensive course of study for the final two years of high school. Students are required to take a total of 6 subjects, 3 at the Standard Level and 3 at the Higher Level, complete Creativity, Activity and Services (CAS) activities, complete a Theory of Knowledge class and write an original 4000-word Extended Essay. Each subject has an external exam, which is graded on a scale of 1-7. To be awarded the diploma students must earn 24 points on the exams and complete all other requirements.








PARENT TEACHER ASSOCIATION
