Science Speed Lab

At the beginning of September, 8th grade Science students, across EMS, worked outside of the classroom to participate in a lab regarding calculating speed. Before the lab, the students were instructed on how to calculate speed by dividing distance by time. During the lab, the students used this formula, for speed, while timing themselves walking across a 3 meter string.



Students used the data from their distance and the amount of time it took to walk the distance,

so they could calculate their personal walking speed, in meters per second. Afterwards, 8th graders were directed to use their average walking speed from the first part of the lab to time themselves walking an unknown distance.

All in all, the speed lab helped students to get a better understanding of how to calculate speed, in a fun manner while, enjoying the sunshine of the outdoors.




August & September in Review
