

There's not one universal definition of gifted!



LWSD Highly Capable Program is Governed by Laws



Definition of Highly Capable Students:

Highly capable students are students who perform or show potential for performing at significantly advanced academic levels when compared with others of their age, experiences, or environments.

Washington State Legislature:

The legislature finds that, for highly capable students, access to accelerated learning and enhanced instruction is access to a basic education.

Bright Child vs. Gifted Child



Bright Child

- Knows the answers
- Has good ideas
- Works hard
- Learns with ease

- Listens with interest

Gifted Child

Asks the questions Has wild, silly ideas Plays around, yet tests well Already knows Constructs abstractions Shows strong feelings and opinions



K-5HC Program



- LWSD's tier of service for K and 1st grade students is K-5HC
- Identified students are provided services at their home school
- Students receive small-group enrichment in identified area with a K-5HC Teacher Facilitator
 - 30 minutes of instruction per identified area
 - Reading and/or math


K-5HC Program



- Enrichment units based on <u>NAGC (National</u> <u>Association of Gifted Children) standards</u>
- Kindergarten services begin in February


 Students remain in K-5HC through 5th grade unless qualifying for another level of service (FTQ, POQ)







Pull-out Quest Program (POQ)



- 2nd-5th grade students who qualify
- Students are provided services at identified elementary schools
 - Current locations: McAuliffe, Thoreau, Wilder
- Students receive services one day a week
- Enrichment units based on <u>NAGC (National Association of</u> <u>Gifted Children) standards</u>
- Students remain in POQ through 5th grade unless qualifying for another level of service (FTQ)

Full-time Quest Program (FTQ)



- 2nd-5th grade students who qualify
- Students are provided services at identified elementary schools
 - Current locations: Alcott, Baker, Barton, Bell, Blackwell, Einstein, McAuliffe, Redmond, Rosa Parks, Smith, Thoreau
- Services are provided in multi-grade, self-contained classrooms
- Students receive acceleration in math and reading, at least one grade level above assigned grade
- Students receive differentiated instruction in grade level standards for social studies, science, and writing

Initiating the Application Process



- Parents complete an online application
 - Please contact our office if a paper application or translated application is needed.

Students must reside in LWSD boundaries to apply for and receive Highly Capable services.

Application Process Dates



- October 1st: Online applications open
- October 25th: Online applications close at 4pm
- November 2nd: CogAT screener
- **December 7th:** IOWA assessment for students who meet screening criteria
- January 2020: Notification of placement
- February 2020: K-5HC services begin for kindergarten students

Multiple Objective Criteria



Multiple Objective Criteria:

- Cognitive Abilities Test (CogAT) Screening Form
- Iowa Assessments
- DIBELS (done in the classroom)
- WaKIDS (Washington Kindergarten Inventory of Developing Skills)



- MSC includes, at a minimum, a psychologist, a department administrator and a teacher
- The MSC determines screening and eligibility decisions based on a body of evidence (or multiple objectives) for each applicant
- Assessment criteria, including typical ranges for eligibility, are published on the Accelerated Programs Website

NOTE: Students may be identified for either K-5HC Reading or K-5HC Math or may be identified for both K-5HC Reading and K-5HC Math.

Placement Process for K-5HC



- Students who meet the acceptance criteria will be offered K-5HC services
- Services are provided in the student's LWSD home school
- The anticipated start date for services is February 2020
- K-5HC services continue through the end of 5th grade unless the student becomes eligible for POQ or FTQ

1st Grade Universal Screening Requirement



- All LWSD 1st grade students will participate in universal screening for highly capable services including students identified as highly capable in kindergarten.
- Services for 1st grade students that qualify will begin in the fall of the following year.
- 2nd 5th grade students may qualify for:
 - K-5HC
 - Pull-out Quest
 - Full-time Quest

Frequently Asked Questions



- How does Accelerated Programs communicate with families?
 - All communication will be <u>emailed</u> to families from the LWSD Accelerated Programs Department.
 - Schedules for assessments
 - Screening results
 - Eligibility results
- What if my child gets sick or we have a family emergency and cannot take the CogAT or IOWA assessment?
 - If your child is ill or your family experienced an emergency on the day of the assessment, please email <u>quest@lwsd.org</u> before the test begins.
 - Students with a documented family emergency or illness are provided one make-up date set by the district.
 - Visit the Accelerated Programs Website for make-up dates



- I had my child privately tested. Can I submit these results with my application?
 - LWSD does not accept private testing results in place of or in addition to district assessment results. Accepting private evaluations creates potential inequity based on the ability of parents to pay for a private evaluation. Instead students participate in the district assessment process at no cost.
- I had previous teachers write letters of recommendation.
 Can I submit these with the application?
 - Letters of recommendation are not a part of the body of evidence reviewed by the Multi-Disciplinary Selection Committee (MSC).
 - Per Washington State Law, letters of recommendation may not be used determine student eligibility.



- Should my child study or "prep" for assessments?
 - We do not recommend or endorse "prepping" students for assessments.
- If I live outside of LWSD, can I still apply?
 - Students must reside within the Lake Washington School District <u>at the time of</u> <u>application</u> to be eligible for highly capable services.
 - Students <u>must remain residents</u> of the district to continue to receive services.



- What if my child has an IEP or 504 plan?
 - If your child has a current Individual Education Plan (IEP) or 504 plan, please make note of that on your application.
 - Accommodations documented on IEP and 504 plans are provided during the assessment process.
- How many times can my child be nominated or apply?
 - Students can be nominated/apply for highly capable services each year.



- If my child applies multiple times, can we use scores from a range of years?
 - To ensure equal access for each applicant, a student's current body-of-evidence is reviewed in consideration of the current eligibility criteria.
 - Data from previous years is not utilized.



- Can I observe a highly capable group or classroom?
 - We are unable to schedule classroom observations as part of the application process. With high interest in programs, this would create a distraction to the learning environment.
- What if my child becomes eligible for service, but we are not sure whether or not we want to participate?
 - We are here to work with families. Our office staff, instructional specialist, and department psychologist frequently talk with families regarding program participation decisions.



- My child is in private school. What should we do?
- Students <u>residing</u> in LWSD and attending private schools may apply for and receive highly capable services.
 - Complete the online application and submit proof of residency and age during the open application period.
 - Qualifying private school students would attend services at their assigned LWSD school.



- If my child becomes eligible for service, how will we know the time/location of services?
 - Students who become eligible for services will receive information directly from the LWSD Accelerated Programs Department.
- If my child is in K-5HC or POQ and we decide to apply for FTQ and he/she does worse on the assessments, will he/she be removed from the current program?
 - No; once a student becomes eligible for and participates in a highly capable program, they remain eligible for that program unless they decline services or become eligible for and participate in a different highly capable program.


