Location: SMA Prep campus. The chairman called the meeting to order at 4:34 pm.

# Motion to Approve the Minutes from the 6 December, 2017 meeting:

Chairman Jones motioned for approval of the 6 December, 2017 minutes; Dr. Malone seconded the motion and the board unanimously approved with the correction noted.

**Executive Director of School's Report:** A read-ahead report was provided by SMA-COL Bowman and enrollment was reviewed. Enrollment acceptance will be sent via email and will be the first year for on-line submissions as well as a welcome video from cadet ambassadors.

The technology pilot will begin in approximately one month with iPads provided to three high school and three Prep classes. Ms. Donovan asked the cost analysis to purchase iPads over leasing. SMA-COL Bowman asked if Ms. Linda Long would be willing to participate in gathering information from the pilot program. The program would begin in the 2018-2019 school year and Ms. Long agreed to assist.

**Human Resources Manager Report:** SMA-MAJ Denise Harper provided a readahead report on the hiring process and her progress to date.

**SMA Prep Head of School Report:** SMA-LTC Tom Vara provided a read-ahead report and progress to date. SMA-LTC Vara reported the results from the second diagnostic testing cycle. Ms. Donovan asked if he was able to analyze test results to see where issues were. SMA-LTC Vara responded that the test does show where shortfalls are specifically and early intervention is helping. He also stated that the iReady program has been helpful.

**SMA High Head of School Report:** SMA-COL Bowman provided a read-ahead report. COL Ben Knisely expressed concerns about the number of computers for testing. SMA-COL Bowman and SMA-LTC Vara both agreed computers were needed at both schools. SMA-COL Bowman stated that the computers used for the pilot program can assist with testing and that the Florida Department of Education plans to gradually phase in paper-based testing. SMA-COL Bowman also stated that the schedule will stay as a 4x4 hybrid schedule.

Vice-Chairman Herb asked about the graduation ceremony in which SMA-COL Bowman replied that graduation will be at Bayside on SR64 with our guest speaker as alumni, Kaisen Mitchell.

**SMA Prep Athletics**: SMA-COL Vara provided a read-ahead report from SMA-MAJ AJ Brown. SMA-LTC Vara mentioned a successful first semester sports ceremony. This was the first time honoring students in sports in this fashion.

**SMA HS Athletics**: A read-ahead report was provided by Athletic Director Amy Mazner. Coach Mazner stated that every event gets better with the soccer girls going to regionals and four runners in states with two looking very promising. She mentioned how she acquired very good coaches and foresees sports doing very well in the future.

<u>Staff Representatives:</u> SMA-CPT Michael Friday provided and presented a readahead report for the high school. SMA-CPT Terri Davis provided a read-ahead report for Prep.

<u>SAI/Commandant's Report</u>: A read-ahead report was provided by COL Ryan. Chairman Jones asked where the final fact sheet of how JROTC stands with SMA. SMA-COL Bowman responded that revisions are being made with COL Ryan and will be prepared for the next board meeting.

**IB Report**: SMA-LTC Pamela Donehew provided a read-ahead IB report. She included a spreadsheet of colleges and scholarships of our graduates.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> CAPT Frederick Derr provided a read-ahead report. He mentioned the new school bus has arrived and will be placed in service the following week. SMA will now own six busses for five routes which will leave the oldest bus as a spare.

CAPT Derr announced receiving the 1.5 Millage funds and expressed the need to prioritize how it will be spent. SMA-MAJ Kok stated the district's news release on 5 February of a two year district wide pay raise that will be retroactive to this school year. SMA-MAJ Kok reviewed the salary increases and recommended parallel increases for the Academy employees.

Vice-Chairman Herb motioned to authorize the salary increase retroactively to August 2017 to match the district salary revisions; COL Knisely seconded the motion and the board unanimously approved.

**PTCC Report**: SMA-CPT Weaver provided a read-ahead report for the High School and a report for the Prep was provided.

**New Business:** SMA-COL Bowman announced that Dr. Robin Livingston has resigned and moving forward with the transition plan with Dr. Wendy Katz. READ AHEAD SMA PREP For BOD Meeting March 7, 2018

LTC Vara and I met and discussed the following concerns of SMA Prep Teachers and they are being brought forward.

- During 4th quarter a significant amount of time is spent on mandated FSA testing. Our 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade design classes have laptops which are used for their lessons on a daily bases. However, during 4<sup>th</sup> quarter the laptops from design rooms 518 and 520 are in use for FSA testing for a majority of the quarter. The lack of laptops/computers makes it almost impossible to teach a design technology course. While it is being considered to provide one to one computers for all of the students in the future, this is not a solution for the upcoming 4<sup>th</sup> quarter. The design teachers are concerned about their curriculum and what should be taught for 4<sup>th</sup> quarter, due to their computers being unavailable for their classroom use. The lack of computers makes them unable to provide this semester's group of students with the same curriculum they taught the first semester students.
- Concern: There are teachers whose additional duties do not allow them to have an adequate break to eat lunch and attend to personal needs. The teachers are assigned these duties for the school year.
   Over time this creates a negative impact on these teachers as they do not receive an adequate break for the entire school year.

Example: The student lunch is 33 minutes but the teachers have to stand duty either the first 15 minutes or the last 18 minutes of the lunch duty. This allows them only fifteen minutes (on a perfect day) to eat lunch and tend to their personal needs.

LTC Vara will meet with teachers: SMA-CPT Davis, SMA-CPT Miller and SMA-CPT Fontecha to review all of the duties and work on developing a fair and equitable solution to the assignment of teacher's duties.

SUBJECT: Board Discussion Items for the March 7, 2018 SMA Board Meeting

As far as concerns go, I have not been approached by anyone who has expressed anything noteworthy. I have heard many faculty express their appreciation regarding the impending salary raise that the Board voted for last month.

Furthermore, I am very happy to point out a few very noteworthy accomplishments that the faculty and students have had.

First, Sylvia Gillotte, one of our English teachers, reported that during the week of (2/13-2/19), 21 student members of Junior Statesman of America (JSA) attended Winter Congress in Washington, DC, along with 900 other students from across the nation. In addition to debating legislation as mock congressmen and senators and visiting our National Mall and treasured memorials, SMA students toured the White House, Capitol, National Archives, U.S. Supreme Court and Arlington Cemetery. Sitting in the Senate Gallery one afternoon, they were privileged to be able to watch Senators Nelson and Rubio individually address the full Senate regarding the recent school shooting in Parkland, Florida. While dining in the Dirksen Senate Office Building Cafe, our students had another unique experience. Dressed in their Class A uniforms, they were approached and warmly greeted by 4 Star Air Force General Lori Robinson, who wanted to speak with students about their DC plans. Robinson is the highest ranking female service member in the U.S. Armed Forces. She took over as leader of the US Northern Command or NORTHCOM in May of 2016 and is responsible for defending the U.S. homeland and surrounding region. which includes overseeing NORAD. This was the highlight of the trip for many of our female students, especially Rifle Team member and Regimental XO LTC Ana Osborne, who just recently got notice of her acceptance to West Point (and also the Naval Academy). The trip was a life changing experience for many of these students and Sylvia Gillotte invites all Board members to attend the Talent Show and Silent Auction Fundraiser on the evening of April 5th to support this trip and Spring State in Orlando.

Second, Maria Clapp, our Director of Counselling, reported that the Counseling office launched the creation of the SMA Eagle Ambassadors this year. Their function is to assist new students in the transition to high school from the Prep or to SMA from a different high school. This group is formed by 9th, 10th & 11th graders who have a desire to assist and support other students in being successful in high school by creating a more tolerant and accepting school atmosphere. The group meets

monthly to organize school wide character development projects and have created their own website to inform other students & parents and the community about the projects they have completed so far. The Ambassadors assisted in presenting the programs that the SMA high school offers to 8th grade parents/students at the prep on February 27, in an effort to engage prep students in their transition to the high school.

Finally, Johnny Browning, one of our JROTC instructors and Raider Coaches, reports that the Raider team had two state championships this school year, the Males and Females. It's worth noting that the Female Team has been the Florida state champions the last 10 years in a row, and the National Champions the last 3 years in a row. At the PREP, the Jr. Raider program (the only one of its kind in the nation) is flourishing and competing against similar programs like Sea Cadets and Young Marines from other area middle schools. The Jr. Raider program just hosted a competition at the prep two weekends ago on the 17th of Feb, in which four middle schools participated and the Jr. Black Knights came away with two 2nd's, and a 1st place finish.

As you can see, there are many exciting things occurring on the high school campus.

# Army JROTC and the Differences between Sarasota Military Academy (SMA) and Other Public School JROTC Programs

Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (JROTC) is a cooperative effort between the United States Army and public school districts. Its mission is to motivate young people to be Better Citizens.

It emphasizes teaching high school students four specific concepts: personal responsibility, leadership, community service, and good citizenship. It aims to instill in them self-esteem, teamwork, self-discipline, and a sense of accomplishment.

Army JROTC is not a military organization; it is a citizenship and leadership development course taught in more than 1700 high schools across the US and overseas.

SMA's JROTC program is stronger than most Army Public School programs because of two major differences. First, SMA was founded on the concept of being a Military Academy. That includes wearing and respecting the military uniform and stressing the principles of Education, Leadership, Teamwork, and Discipline.

Second, the size of SMA's JROTC Program. Presently at 859 cadets, SMA's JROTC program is six (6) times that of most JROTC programs around the country.

There is no obligation to join the armed services, and instructors make no effort to recruit students.

The course of study combines classroom instruction with cadet leadership opportunities, social activities, extracurricular programs, as well as school and service projects focused in the school and total community.

Classroom instruction follows a 21<sup>st</sup> century learner-centered performance-based model in which students: identify performance objectives up-front, engage as active partners in the progress, document accomplishments, and improve learning plans.

Instruction is enhanced by state-of-the-art educational programs and techniques which leverage interactive multimedia, games, and simulations.

Along the way, students not only learn specific skills, but also how to learn.

The JROTC subject areas are: Leadership, Learning Skills, Wellness, American History, Geography, and Civics.

All JROTC instructors are retired military service members who have completed 20 or more years of honorable service. The two levels of instructors are:

The Senior Army Instructor (SAI) who is a retired commissioned officer (up to Colonel) who has primary responsibility for directing the program.

The Army Instructor (AI) is retired noncommissioned officer (up to Command Sergeant Major) who serves as the SAI's assistant.

All instructors are certified by the Army and hired by the School Districts. SMA hires their own JROTC instructors to teach at SMA. The Army reimburses (Cost-Shared) half the SMA JROTC instructors' salaries back to SMA.

Because of the number of cadets at SMA, the JROTC program is authorized two SAIs and eight AIs for Cost-Share.

There is no cost for students to join the program. The US Army issues the course materials, uniforms, supplies, and equipment to the cadets. Students are required to keep their uniforms cleaned and pressed, and all cadets must meet hair standards. JROTC program will also fund the cost for most community events, competitions, and field trips. Students may be involved in fund raising efforts to help pay for other activities.

Every JROTC student wears the uniform once a week on a day designated by the SAI.

The JROTC program pays for the uniform and all accessories and issues them to cadets. Cadets are responsible for properly cleaning and maintaining the uniform, which includes dry cleaning for some items. Cadets pay for uniform replacement if items are lost or damaged beyond normal wear and tear. Cadets must return their uniforms at the end of the school year.

SMA Cadets wear the uniform every day, and they are issued an extra pair of pants and two extra shirts to maintain a professional appearance at all times. There are standards for personal appearance, wearing of the uniform, and how to address military personnel and other cadets. Other requirements are outlined in detail during class at the start of the year.

Each cadet participates in physical fitness training once a week in class on a day designated by the instructors. Students do not need to be in good physical condition to begin the program, but they are expected to wear the proper uniform and give their best effort in every class.

JROTC students are active in every phase of school from academics to varsity sports to band to clubs and more. All course requirements are completed in class, except for weekly Regimental and Battalion meetings at lunch.

Whenever possible, JROTC extracurricular group activities are scheduled so that they do not conflict with other practices and meetings. However, cadets interested in joining JROTC competitive teams may need to decide between activities once in-season practice schedules begin.

Cadets chosen for senior leadership positions must be able to commit a few hours a week to their duties after school. Standard course requirements will not keep cadets from participating in other activities.

Cadets can earn a large number of awards for their participation and achievement in JROTC and other school activities. Some awards are given by the unit, some by the school, and some by local civic and patriotic groups.

Awards are available to all cadets. The primary criteria for earning awards are: involvement, solid effort, and active Group participation.

JROTC course material is academically sound and enhances the college preparatory curriculum. Students participating in JROTC can therefore add unique leadership experiences and accomplishments to their college applications.

SMA JROTC cadets are always well represented in the ranks of the National Honor Society, National Merit Scholarship, and other scholarship winners.

Because SMA is an Honor Unit with Distinction (HUD) JROTC Program, the SAI can nominate three (3) well-qualified cadets to each of the US Military Service Academies annually, increasing the Cadet's chances of receiving an appointment.

Cadets choose to attend SMA, many knowing that they are expected to wear the uniform and abide by Army JROTC and SMA regulations. All are aware of SMA's reputation for graduating outstanding cadets with most

going on to college or to one of the US Military Services. The rules and regulations found at SMA contribute to an environment conducive to classroom learning and personal understanding and expression.

SMA Cadets are required to enroll in JROTC, allowing JROTC instructors to expect a higher standard of performance from those cadets. SMA Cadets continually surpass expectations expressing the value of good citizenship, leadership, service to the community, and personal responsibility. Our cadets demonstrate the Army Values every day placing emphasis on HONOR and RESPECT.

SMA's JROTC size is advantageous to program management. Program enrollment drives Army funding (Our budget over \$100,000) and staffing (ten Cost-Shared JROTC instructors). With multiple JROTC instructors, we are able to focus JROTC instruction at the appropriate level for freshman through senior cadets. The extra instructors give needed coaching and safety management to our nationally recognized Raider and Air Rifle teams and superior Drill and JLAB teams.

In our most recent Army Accreditation, all our JROTC instructors received 100% on their Instructor Portfolios. It took more than 18 months to select and hire our recent two Army Instructors. Many applied but only the best were chosen.

We are always looking for outstanding Female Army Instructors.
