Location: SMA Middle School campus. The chairman called the meeting to order at 4:32 pm.

SMA-LTC Tom Vara introduced Dr. Todd Brown as the IGNITE Awards Winner in the first year for charter schools to participate. He is also the only one chosen in Florida to contribute to the UN. Dr. Brown explained the INSPIRE Project he created and the various speakers he worked with. He also mentioned the different appearances and interviews he's had with numerous television and newspaper reporters. Dr. Brown thanked the board for their support and exited the room.

Motion to Approve the Minutes from the 13 December, 2018 meeting:

Mr. F. Steven Herb motioned for approval of the 13 December, 2018 minutes; COL Ben Knisely seconded the motion and the board unanimously approved.

Executive Director of School Report: SMA-COL Christina Bowman discussed the AdvancEd meeting on 26 February at 9:00am and asked for three board members to attend. Mr. Herb, COL Knisely and Dr. Tom McElheny volunteered to participate in the AdvancEd meeting. SMA-COL Bowman stated a survey was distributed to the faculty and staff regarding the revised vision and mission statements and will be distributed soon to the families for input. She also mentioned collaborating with MAJ Becky Morris on presenting a school grade projected plan to the District on 22nd February.

SMA-COL Bowman mentioned two dates for board members to bring potential donors for a tour of our school discussed in the SMA Foundation meeting. She stated the dates as 12th February and 12th March starting at the Middle School and ending at the High School with a special formation, "work call", held after lunch. SMA-COL Bowman commended both schools on the success of the Toys for Tots this holiday season.

He stated that SMA-LTC Abby Williams and a few cadets presented SMA to SSAS and both schools will be showcased at STC in Sarasota and North Port

where families will be able to visit the SMA tables. Chairman Jones inquired if the efforts are effective in reaching out to families in which SMA-LTC Fout responded that it definitely is with SMA-COL Bowman successfully building a great relationship with the District.

SMA HS Athletics Report: Athletic Director Coach Amy Mazner provided a readahead report. She discussed how every sport is performing at a higher level and better results than the previous year. Coach Mazner stated that our first lacrosse coaches with SMA are back to coach lacrosse and looking forward to a great season. She stated girls' soccer are going to Districts and hopefully then to Regionals.

Coach Mazner inquired to the Board to attend a game when possible and SMA-COL Bowman commended Coach Mazner for bringing the program to a higher level. Security

-The security team met on Friday, January 18th to discuss the upcoming drills and how we can conduct drills at times of concern. The times identified were formation, lunch time, and passing time. The decision was to conduct a soft lockdown on Friday, January 25th during formation. We gave our cadets specific instructions on moving to their period one class quickly and safely without talking or retrieving their back packs. The purpose was to move cadets to a safe spot in an orderly fashion due to a possible threat nearby campus. The drill ran smoothly, however, a few cadets grabbed their bags as well as too much talking during the drill. At the conclusion of the drill, we called all cadets back to formation to give them immediate feedback on the drill and how we can improve during the next drill. We then conducted morning formation.

Campus Concerns

Prep conducted a school wide writing simulation in preparation for the FSA testing in April. The simulation as far as computer infrastructure and testing procedures ran smoothly. Our Language and Literature teachers reviewed the writing results a few days after the practice test and the sixth grade results were not up to standard. The seventh and eight grade results were stronger, writing instructions were followed more closely, and the cadets were consistently more on grade level. Quite often cadets do not take practice tests as seriously as they should and this may alter the results. The concern right now is the sixth grade writing skills and possible low results on the FSA. The language and Literature teachers have worked hard to identify some of the weaknesses and will continue to work with these cadets to correct the issues noticed in the practice test.

Wrestling:

Jr Raiders:

The Jr Raiders hosted their first home meet of the year last Saturday. Coach Jackie Trecartin said that all the cadets performed extremely well. The girl's team was just barely edged out for second. The all boys team actually tied and the tie breaker used was the mile run in which they came up just a little short. The mixed team was awarded the Team trophy and is on display in the front office area.

Soccer:

Due to a last minute coaching change the boy's soccer team got off to a slow start but are back on track now. IB MYP Read Ahead - 2/14/19 SMA-MAJ Lisa Currie

"The world doesn't care what you know. What the world cares about is what you do with what you know." SMA Prep completed their AdvancED School Quality Factors Report last week which provided a focused opportunity to go through a complete audit of all aspects of Prep and the quality of teaching and learning that occur on campus and often beyond the classroom walls. It is because the MYP comes ready-made with a solid framework based in best-practices that much of what the AdvancED team will need to see and hear on campus is already in place at varying levels of proficiency. It was through analysis of the stakeholder surveys where valuable light was shed. The following is a part of the Prep report submitted to AdvancED and I think it is relevant to restate here.

There is a paradigm shift in education and there is no turning back. Societies new demands are speeding forward into uncharted waters. What do our modern learners need to know and be able to do? In order to establish effective continuous improvement, it is imperative to understand the end-user experience of what our organization is tasked to accomplish. Educational organizations fall within a service industry model. Just as hospitals exist to ensure care and wellness for all patients as ultimate goals, schools exist to ensure, in one sense, an "educational wellness" that will allow all learners to experience growth and accomplishment to have a positive impact in the world. The surveys of students, parents, and teachers offer our school valuable insights into the health of our organization from our end-users who interact with what we provide daily both inside and outside of school. The School/System Quality Factor Diagnostic provides a thorough audit of where we've been, where we are now, and where we are heading in our journey as a continuously improving and impactful educational organization.

It is critical to understand, with empathy, how our end-users (current students and families) are interacting with the services we provide. When you really listen to students and families, as was conveyed in the recent surveys and also through in person interactions, there is an underlying desire of students to feel heard, be engaged, and feel challenged and for families to know their children are being understood and educated as unique individuals. The challenge of SMA, or

any educational organization, is to realize and envision an outcome that transcends the status quo and works instead to build a learning community that collectively offers a holistic experience for young people over six years that are a developmentally critical period in a person's life.

As a strategic plan and vision come to fruition, a uniting aspect of both schools is that we are IB World Schools. This transcends that of a label or an accreditation and instead can become an asset that should empower all SMA teachers and students in both schools to take ownership of these best practices and make it their own. To continue to distinguish this as IB and this as not IB in many circumstances can be counterproductive. Good teaching is good teaching. It would be beneficial for Prep teachers to have an introduction to the high school courses and it would also be helpful for high school teachers, especially 9th and 10th, to have a basic understanding of the Prep program to know where our 8th graders are coming from. It is great news that the high school will be including courses that will reflect IB approaches that are available outside of the IB DP. This provides an opportunity and a purpose as we continue collaborating more in the areas of teaching and learning.

Where SMA will set itself apart as a one of a kind 6th-12th educational organization is how well the sum of its unique parts work together into a comprehensive and original approach to fulfilling the fundamental need of educating young people in the modern world. If there was ever a time in education to be visionary, this is it.

Dear Members of the Board of Directors,

The Prep staff and teachers have brought forward concerns to me that they would like the board to be aware of.

First, staff and teachers fully support the board's goal of filling all student seats in the Prep Academy. What the board may not be aware of is that a larger student population also means larger class sizes. Some of the classrooms at the Prep were designed for a maximum of 22 students and are currently overfilled.

The size of classes has become a concern for many teachers. Core subjects in tested areas including Math, English and Science have the largest class sizes. While the number of students allowed is 22 per teacher, some of these classes have more.

FSA Scores and iReady diagnostic scores of our current 6th grade class showed that many students were one or more grades below level in Math, English, and Science at the beginning of the school year. Research shows that there is a direct correlation between smaller class sizes and higher student achievement. Large classes are especially challenging when teachers are posed with the task of not only teaching grade level standards but also backtracking to scaffold student understanding from their current level.

Due to large class sizes and low student achievement levels, the teachers at the Prep have created opportunities for students outside of provided classroom time. Many of the math teachers open their classrooms for students to come in for help during lunch. They also volunteer their time before and after school for tutoring. While this certainly helps, not all students take advantage of opportunities outside of their scheduled class.

Science teachers are dealing with class sizes that cannot be accommodated by the number of work stations in their classrooms. This makes hands on labs especially challenging. Research shows that hands on activities in science is an effective way to learn, however with overfilled classrooms the labs are ineffective. The turnover rate of teachers in our Science department over the past several years is making it hard to meet the schoolwide achievement goal that the board has set for the Florida Statewide Science Assessment. Student achievement is linked directly to the effectiveness of teachers. Without consistent educators in the classroom, students are left with gaps in standards which leave them unprepared for the Florida Statewide Science Assessment.

English teachers are working with students who are below grade level. Some of which cannot read. With large class sizes of varying student levels it is challenging to provide the best education to students when the amount of differentiation that is required for students to be successful is so high.

Additionally, there has been an increase in students enrolling at the Prep with special needs, i.e. mental and physical impairments, learning disabilities, those who do not speak fluent English and numerous discipline issues from students who are entering throughout the year. When you combine these types of circumstances with overfilled classrooms it is detrimental to the learning environment. Teachers are doing the best they can, however the impact of these conditions comes at a cost, directly impacting student education and achievement. High teacher turnover rates may be attributed to teachers being spread too thin.

The teachers know that at this time there is nothing that can be done to alleviate the number of students in class, however, moving forward some suggestions are:

Class Size

- One additional teacher in each core subject Area: Hiring an additional teacher in Math, English, and Science would allow core classes to be smaller.
- Additional ESE Staff: Staff members that are ESE certified don't always receive
 additional support in their class for ESE students because legally they are certified.
 This doesn't necessarily mean they are capable of teaching in oversized classes
 while providing direct instruction to a large number of ESE students in each class.
- A better way to assign students to classes/more electives: Some classes, Chinese, Military Studies, Design and other subjects have as few as 5 students while other classes during the same period have upwards of 24. If there was a way to have some teachers i.e. perhaps Military Studies and Design teach five classes and one elective, this may help to even out student numbers in core classes. It will also put more students in Military Studies and design classes which can accommodate larger class sizes.

Retaining Teachers

Additional Planning Time: At SMA High teachers have one 90 minute planning period a day with 3 classes to plan for. At the Prep teachers have one 50 minute planning period a day with 6 classes to plan for. Scheduling more planning time for teachers will help increase productivity during class since teachers will have the time to differentiate for the variety of student needs in classes, this is extremely important for Math, Science, English and History/Civics. Additional planning time will also allow teachers to have the opportunity to increase communication with parents, and grade papers so students receive feedback in a timely manner. All these factors have been proven to increase student achievement.

Discipline

Teachers are a spending a good portion of class time addressing student behavior. It only takes one disruptive student whose behavior takes away from the entire class's instructional time. The teacher has to address this behavior, redirect the student and then get the class back on task. In the core classes with up to 24 students this is not only challenging but very disruptive. After corrections in class

the teacher needs to make time to make contact with the parent, write the minor referral and ensure that the student has done an Approaches to learning assessment sheet. It takes three minor referrals before the behavior is addressed by the discipline department as a major.

There are several ideas that might help in the future:

- 1. Having set days every week, twice a week for afterschool detentions and Saturday school once a month. Last resort: Making use of the ten day suspension window allowed during the school year. The reasoning is that if a parent has not been helpful with correcting their child's behavior prior to receiving the detention, then perhaps, one time having to make arrangements for their student for after school or Saturday detention may help in engaging the parent in supporting the school in improving their child's behavior. Utilizing suspension from school, should be utilized when all of the above have failed in correcting the student's behavior.
- 2. Another solution would be to have the Dean of Discipline with a staff of two people. Each would be assigned to a grade level to document and handle discipline for that grade. A person assigned to each grade would help in quickly identifying a student who receives 30 or more referrals, those who have serious behavior problems and those who need to be put on contract to closely monitored and document their behavior. They would also be able to monitor those students entering the Prep throughout the year, who come with previous behavior issues from their other schools and are entering the Prep on a contract.

Board Report 2/14/19

- 1. Preparation for the AdvancEd team visit is moving along nicely. Much consideration has been given to the teams comfort and needs during their visit. Additionally, the admin team has worked diligently in preparing well constructed and researched narratives to help inform the team about who SMA is prior to their arrival in Sarasota on Feb. 25, 2019. The team will be housed at the LaQuinta on Cattleman and Fruitville near I75, for ease of access to both schools. Board members will be interviewed at SMA high school on Feb. 26, 2019, in the conference room, at 9:00 am.
- 2. This year (2018-19) will be the third graduating class of IBDP (International Baccaluearete Diploma Program) cadets. This particular class is the class that has been operating within the 4x4 schedule for two years. Through this experience, it has become evident that IB is correct in requiring concurrency of learning over two years, as the 4x4 schedule has presented extreme challenges to both teachers and cadets. Returning to the A/B schedule will help to get IB back on track and move the program at SMA forward in a positive manner. Another result of the previous scheduling issues is a decline in the number of students that enrolled in IB at SMA during for the 2019-20 (current juniors)cohort. The number of cadets registering for the 2020-21 (current sophomores) cohort and the 2021-22 (current freshmen) cohort is significantly larger. Another factor contributing to the increase in IB interest is the success of the MYP (middle years program) at Prep. Although five years is a good time to evaluate the effectiveness of a new program we must consider that the IB program at SMA suffered a considerable two-year set-back with the scheduling changes.
- 3. As we move forward the IBDP would benefit from a conscious inclusion of the program in advertising and promotion of the school. Consideration should be given to including IB at SMA in videos, advertising, brochures, and presentations about SMA. As an IB World School, we may utilize all IB logos as outlined in their copyright.
- 4. Also as the IBDP moves forward at SMA discussion about scheduling options provided to students should include increasing IB course offerings. Cadets may take IB courses in the same manner as they select AP (Advanced Placement) courses, and are not required to be an IBDP candidate. With the changes that the College Board is making to AP there is no financial advantages to offering AP course rather than IB courses, but there are student advantages in taking IB to earn college credit. As other IB high schools in Sarasota move forward with changes in course offerings SMA

should make similar considerations to remain competitive and attractive to incoming cadets.

Good afternoon, here are the comments that were presented to CPT Wyka and myself for the upcoming board meeting. Please let us know what is being/has been addressed at the local admin level, and what needs to be brought up at the board itself.

A concern is the lack of support for ESE students during the entire classroom period. I have so many needy students, and cannot possibly get to all of them to help them. It is impossible for one person to meet all of their needs.

Students deserve to have the support and resources allocated to them so that they can be successful.

Also- there is not equitable access to technology, and students need equal access to computers - especially in English classrooms where they are expected to write and do research. Computer labs are so booked with testing that it is rare to get the time that they need with computers. The laptop cart does not have enough laptops, and often, a good number are not working. Would also suggest that we consider adding a FULL TIME tech to be able to immediately support tech issues that teachers often have during classes and other times of the day when localized support might not be able to assist. This tech would also be able to constantly service/maintain existing tech equipment.

Myself (and other JROTC instructors) feel that the SMA-Ranks of Admin and higher are a little off. Would like to propose to the board that the structure go this way: Asst. Heads of School: SMA-LTC's; Heads of Schools: SMA-COL; Executive Dir. Of Schools: SMA-GEN. Currently the Asst and Heads are all LTC's. There is no separation between offices, as there is in every other capacity. The proposed change would be more in line with the military structure that our academy is based around.
