n the eve of our 27TH year, Fuqua School is positioned well for the future. During the 2018-2019 school year, the Board of Trustees and school leadership carefully planned for the future and made strategic decisions to ensure the long-term sustainability of Fuqua School. Over the last 4 years, we have grown the Board from 7 to 14 members, and these new trustees have brought valuable perspective and energy to our governing body. With the completion of the \$1.9 million facilities improvement project that began in August of 2017, the most immediate needs of our campus facility have been addressed. Our Upper School students even added a personal touch by landscaping the area in front of A-Building, painting multiple Fuqua Falcon logos on sidewalks and drives, and painting all of the trim on the US Buildings black and red—Go Falcons!

Building on collaborative relationships with the Town of Farmville, Longwood University, Hampden-Sydney College, The Moton Museum and Prince Edward County Public Schools, Fuqua School has emerged as a private school with the public purpose of engaging the greater community to offer the best possible independent school education in Southside Virginia. By locking arms with these key partners, we are contributing to and benefiting from the inclusive and positive trajectory of Farmville, and continuing to honor the vision of JB Fuqua by serving as a model for rural education in America.

Fuqua Spirit was present during our October Homecoming with a record number of alumni returning to the area to re-connect with each other and the School. The same Fuqua Spirit emerged to provide comfort and support when we lost a legendary member of our school community—Coach Beth Fore. She was inducted into the PEA/Fuqua School Athletic Hall of Fame in September—an organization that she championed for many years after her retirement from Fuqua. Fuqua School places emphasis on active, hands-on learning, real life experiences and character development. Students frequently participate in field experiences from day trips to week-long excursions. One great example is

Science Fair/STEAM Fair and Family STEAM Night

O ur middle school students enjoyed a private screening of *Science Fair*, a National Geographic movie. The movie follows nine high-school students from around the globe who compete at the International Science and Engineering Fair. The movie showed their journey through planning, teamwork, setbacks, victories and defeats along the way. The movie inspired our students as they began the planning phases of their own science fair projects.

In April, students in 8[™] grade participated in the Science Fair, while students in grades 2–5 participated in the STEAM Fair. The STEAM Fair allowed students the choice of using the scientific inquiry process or the engineering design process. All projects remained on display in the Commons throughout the evening for our first annual Family STEAM Night.

Family STEAM Night was open for all students and families with activities geared toward students in PK-8. There were a variety of STEAM stations and activities, community demonstrations, Wooded's Food Truck, and a raffle for one of our favorite robots, Sphero! Additionally, our new STEAM lab was dedicated and a plaque unveiled that recognized the generosity of those who donated to make the lab possible.

Virtual Reality

Students in the middle and upper school toured the Egyptian Pyramids, explored the human body to see the impact that various health issues



can cause, and rode roller coasters, all using virtual reality. Using Oculus Rift technology, students were immersed in a virtual world that gave them a real and impactful sense of scope and realism. Using this technology, students also performed chemistry and other science experiments, built a car engine by hand, learned music, visited places all over the world, and much more!

The Moton Story

Cainan Townsend, Director of Education and Public Programs at Robert Russa Moton Museum, visited Fuqua School's $4^{TH}-8^{TH}$ graders. His presentation, The Moton Story, shared the history of the Civil Rights Movement and how this impacted our country and Prince Edward County. He also gave a pictorial history of Prince Edward County and showed pictures of the different schools in our area at the time, and had students make comparisons.

Townsend also had the students participate in several interactive activities including a simulation to demonstrate the difference between equality and equity. Learning at All Levels

Model General Assembly

In March, twenty-seven Fuqua students traveled to Richmond, Virginia to participate in The Virginia YMCA's 72nd Model General Assembly Program (MGA). The Model General Assembly Program is designed to introduce high school students to the legislative process of the Commonwealth of Virginia and is widely considered the finest citizenship-training program in Virginia. Students took on the roles of Senators, Delegates, and elected officers while some freshmen and sophomores participated in the underclassmen's legislature program. General Assembly members, state agency personnel, and lobbyists assisted them as they learned about Virginia's legislative process. Two of our students



were elected to serve in leadership roles. Isaac Drummond was chosen as the House Speaker Pro Tempore and Irene Thornton served as the Senate President Pro Tempore. Both presided over their respective chambers, and were given high accolades for their leadership in monitoring debate.

Our delegation was very successful again this year. Over 550 students from 40 high schools across the Commonwealth attended the program this year. Fuqua won one of the six elected offices for the 2020 MGA session. Fuqua ran two students for elected roles. Roman Davis ran for House Speaker and Audra Murphy ran for Lieutenant Governor. Both of these students gave speeches, along with campaigning, to win their respective primary elections followed by the general election. Roman Davis, a junior at Fuqua School, was elected as the 73rd House Speaker pro tempore for the 2020 Virginia YMCA Model General Assembly. The Fuqua delegation sponsored five bills and was successful in seeing two of those bills reach the governor's desk.

#FuquaFamily

Beginning in Pre-K, students learn the Fuqua School core values of perseverance, commitment, and responsibility. These values come to play in all situations we encounter, including adversity. As Falcons, we take pride in our many traditions and the strong bonds that we share as a Fuqua Family.

Farmville Herald Sports writer Titus Mohler captured the essence of the Fuqua family and our core values during basketball season. He shared his thoughts in a commentary that was printed in the *Farmville Herald* in February. Excerpts from this piece are reprinted with permission.

The day was Thursday, Feb. 7, and I saw that Fuqua's varsity boys basketball team had a home game on the schedule. The Falcons were slated to play Temple Christian School.

I went to Gilmer Gymnasium during the game's run, expecting to take in the usual intensity of a live regular season matchup that would count as either a notable win or a notable loss on the Falcons' record in their quest to qualify for the state tournament. But this time, I found something different.

I entered the gym at halftime and the cheerleading squad was doing a show that seemed somewhat out of the ordinary to me, as they were spread out all over the court and seemed slightly less formal, laughing and having a notable amount of fun with it, along with the crowd. Neither the Falcons nor Temple Christian were on the court, and I figured they were in their locker rooms.

Later, I noticed players wearing Fuqua's red road jerseys mingling around near the opposing team's bench. Some of them looked a little young, and I figured they might be Fuqua's junior varsity players from an earlier game.

Then I was informed about what was going on. Temple Christian had let Fuqua know a day or two earlier that it would not be able to make it for the game. But this was set to be Senior Night for the varsity boys basketball team and varsity cheer squad, so rather than let that event be canceled, Fuqua decided to hold a game all by itself so that those soon-to-be-graduates could get recognition.



The game turned into a fun exhibition pitting the varsity boys team against a squad made up of JV boys players, girls, administrators and more, including Varsity Boys Head Coach Mike Edwards, who showed he still has game.

At one point during the exhibition, the student section in the stands and the cheerleaders collectively chanted, "We want Custis," calling for Interim Upper School Head Jennings Custis to leave his duties behind the scorer's table and enter the contest. Their request was granted.

The cheerleaders played a key role in helping give the game the atmosphere of a real regular season contest by lending it some of their patented cheers with full energy. Later, they added further to the fun when they formally acknowledged the cheers emanating from the more sparsely populated stands on the opposite side of the gym. These cheers were being produced by what appeared to be four young alumni cheerleaders near the top of the stands.

Fuqua's current cheerleading squad filed over during the game and entered one of the lower rows facing the four girls, and they proceeded to do a cheer-off of sorts.

Following the conclusion of the exhibition, both teams and the cheerleaders gathered for a big group photo in the middle of the court to commemorate the one-of-a-kind occasion, including the seniors who had been recognized with their families earlier in the night.

The students may be fewer in number this year, but it has only served to heighten the small-town atmosphere of the school, where students wear multiple hats, serving as supporters and players. Soon, much of the cheerleading squad will don different uniforms and become the school's defending state champion softball team again.

As I left that gym, I thought these students have another amazing memory to add to their already rich collection.

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
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
