2. Technology Update

Mr. Dennis Colclough gave an update regarding technology in the district:

- Network - Over the summer a lot of work on intra structure has been done:
 - Installed 25 WAPS at FHS to increase bandwidth capacity
 - Relocated WAPS from FHS to CB, WSM, CB, and CC. All old low density WAPS have been removed allowing us to run the latest software on wireless controllers
 - Upgraded switch in FHS to POE allowing the installation of new WAPS
- Servers
 - Updated and patched all servers
 - Updated PowerSchool, SIF Agents
 - Updated VMware ESXi, vCenter and replication site
 - ADSelfService Plus – New feature rolling out this year

- Moved to new MDM solution for Apple products
 - Better overall functionality and management of devices
 - Slightly lower cost over prior application
- Website
 - Continue to make improvements to District website
 - Most recent change, moving from older style photo slideshow to their “Resources” model
 - Athletic Schedules are now automatically fed into the site
 - Data Privacy section created around student data privacy
- Curriculum Website
 - Updated with curriculum work done over the summer
- Student Accounts
 - Google accounts available to teachers in PowerSchool. We no longer need to create lists of accounts
- Chromebooks

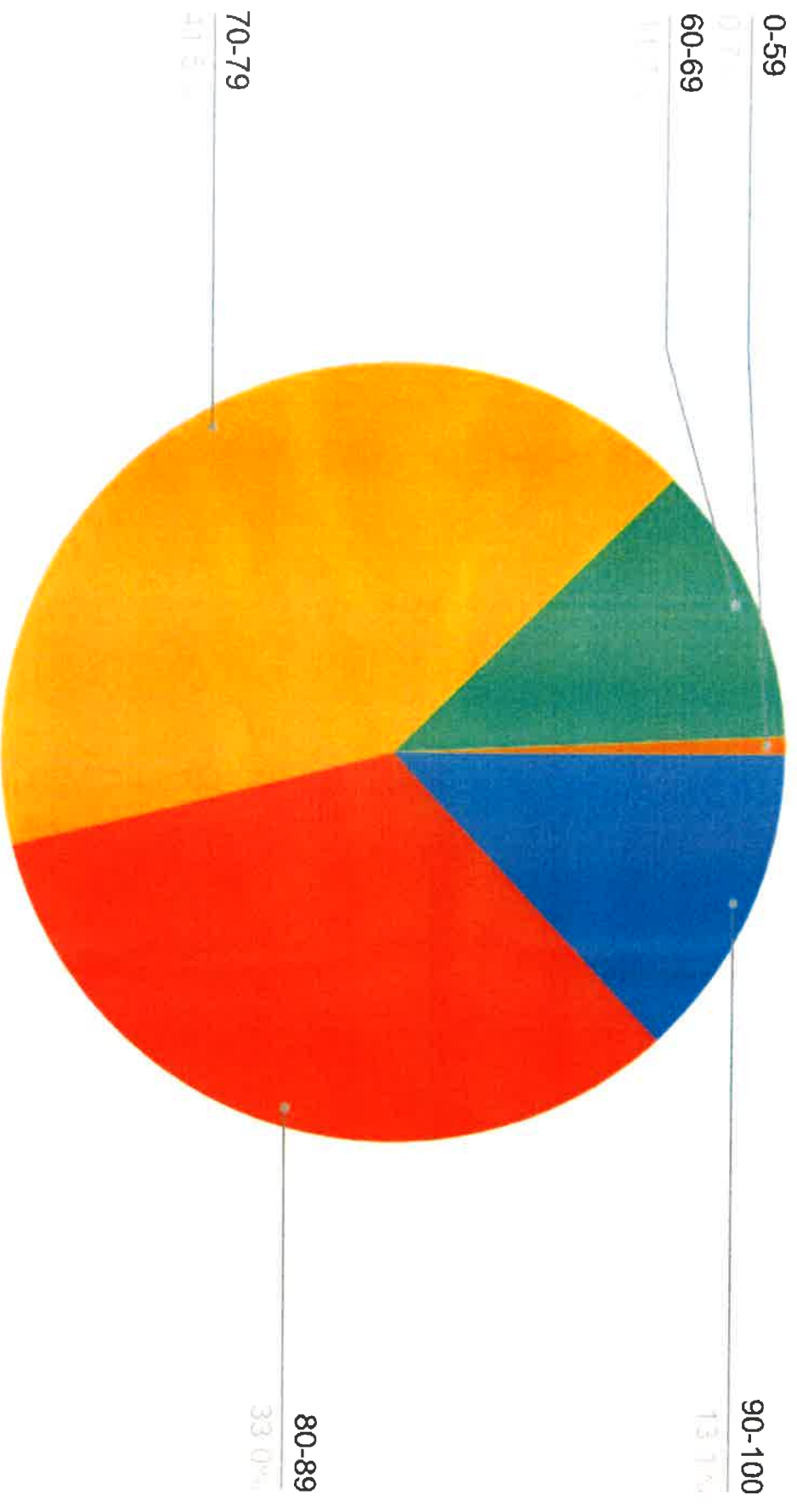

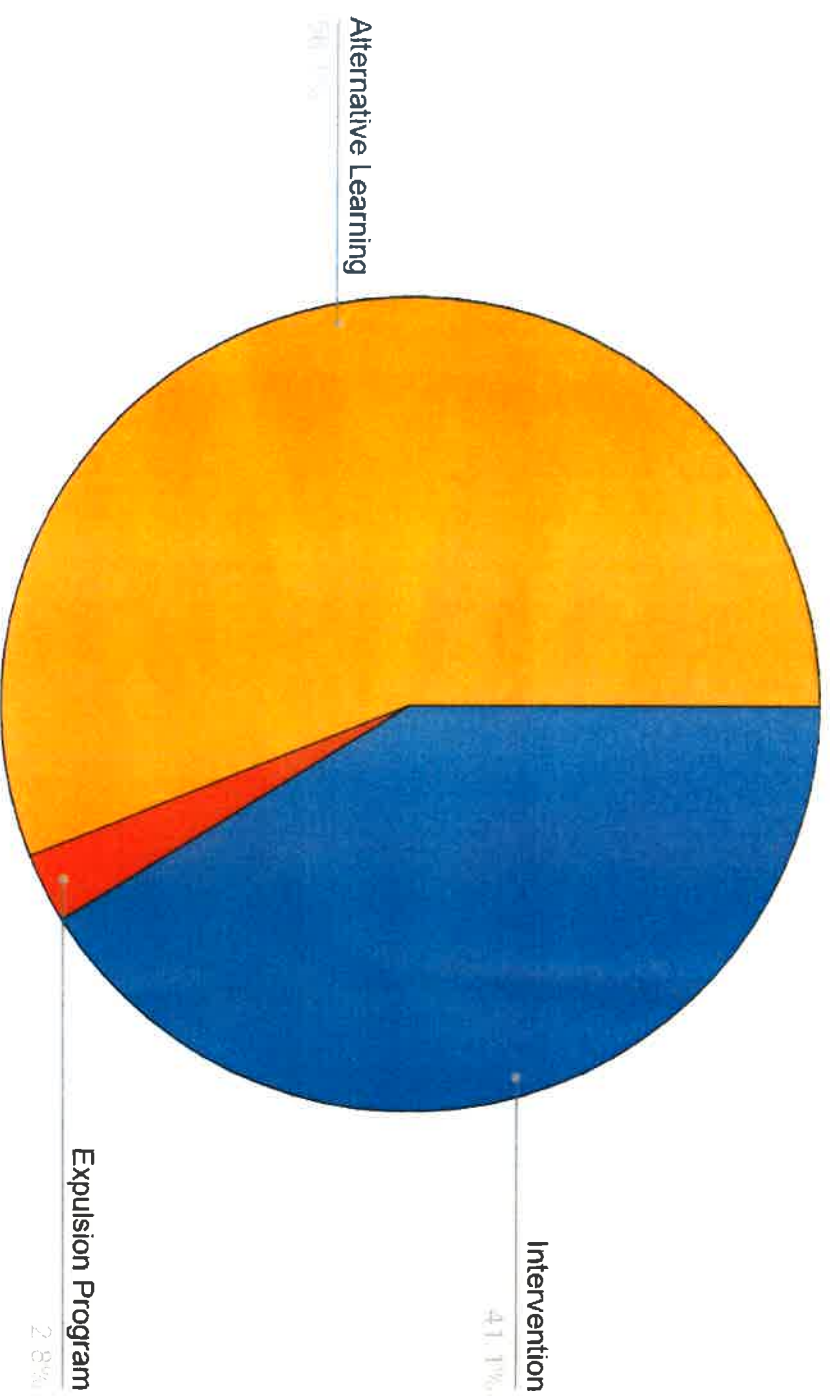
2018-2019 APEX Final Grade Distribution

1. Elementary School SBAC Data Presentation [ATTACHMENT #1]

Ms. Austin gave a brief overview of the data to be presented. Each elementary Principal gave an overview of the percentage at level 3 or above for grades 3, 4, and 5 for GPS, State and their respective school for ELA and Math as well as the average percentage of target achieved in ELA and Math. Each school noted that there is co-teaching in grades 3, 4, and 5. Each Principal expounded on the outstanding efforts of their Interventionists for ELA and Math.

2. Discussion re: Recommendation for Magnet School Program at Charles Barnum School

Dr. Graner noted that it was his recommendation that Groton become a fully Magnet Elementary School District.

It was the consensus of the Board to accept the Superintendent's recommendation that Groton become a fully Magnet School District and that Charles Barnum Elementary School becomes a magnet school beginning in the 2021-2022 school year.

3. Groton 2020 Planning Timeline [ATTACHMENTS #2, 3]

Ms. Austin gave an overview of the elementary and middle school Groton 2020 Planning Timeline.

4. 2020-2021 School Calendar [ATTACHMENT #4]

Dr. Graner and Ms. Austin reviewed the two proposed options for the 2020-21 School Calendar.

It was the consensus of the Board to start school for students on September 8, 2020, to have school on Columbus Day, and to have a half day on the Wednesday before Thanksgiving.

Dr. Graner was asked to survey the area Superintendents regarding whether they would be having school on Columbus Day next year.

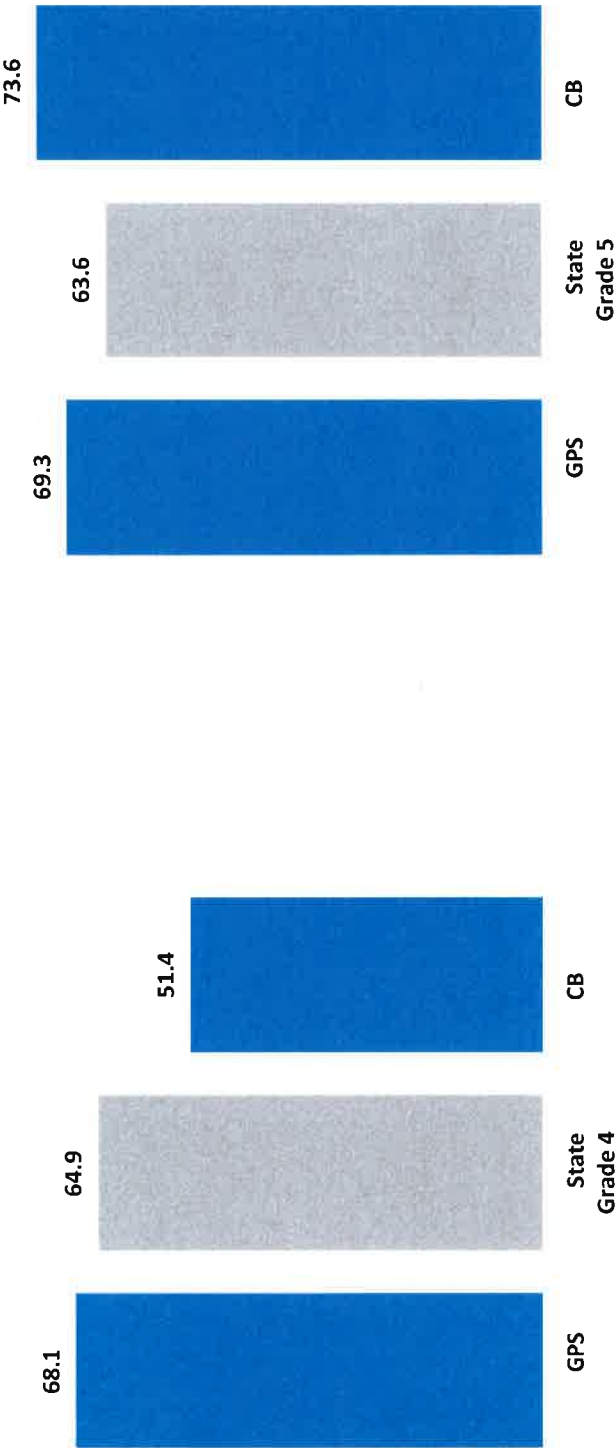
Percent at Level 3 or Above in ELA for Grades 3, 4 and 5

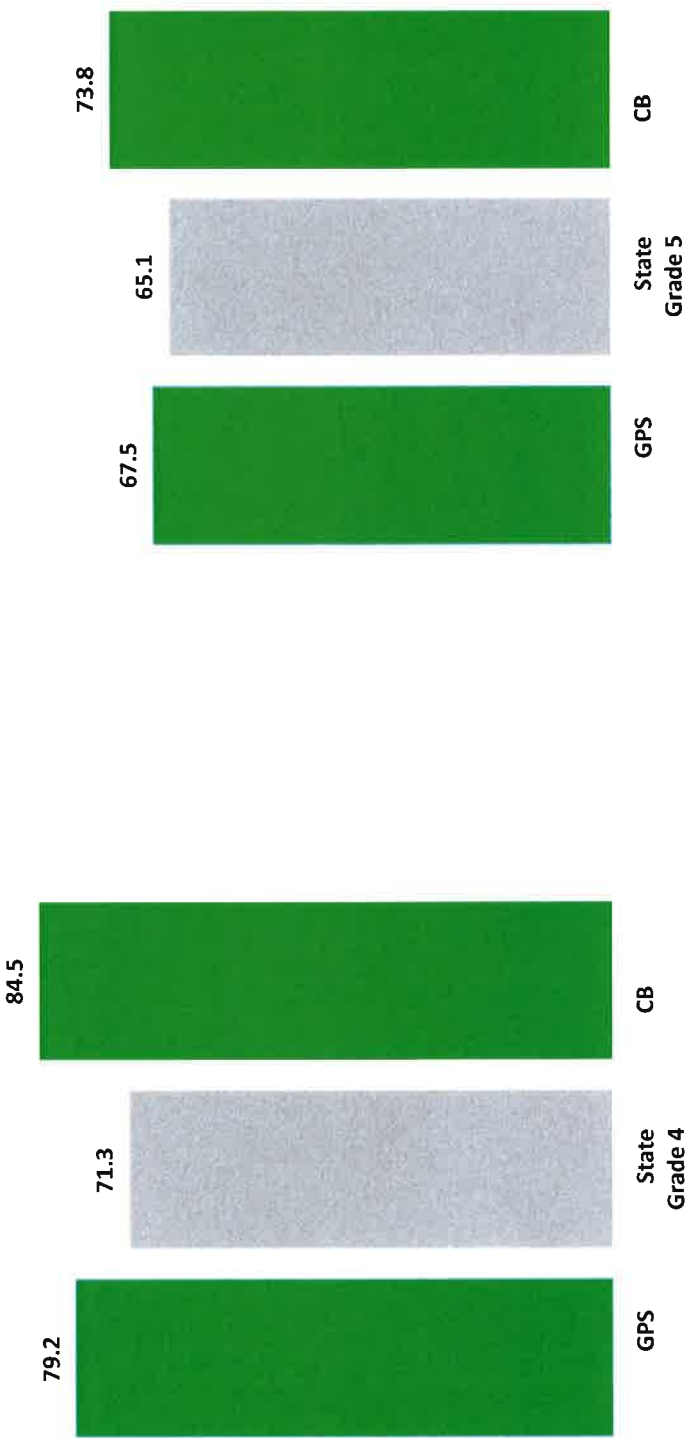
Percent at Level 3 or Above in Math for Grades 3, 4, and 5 GPS, State, and Charles Barnum

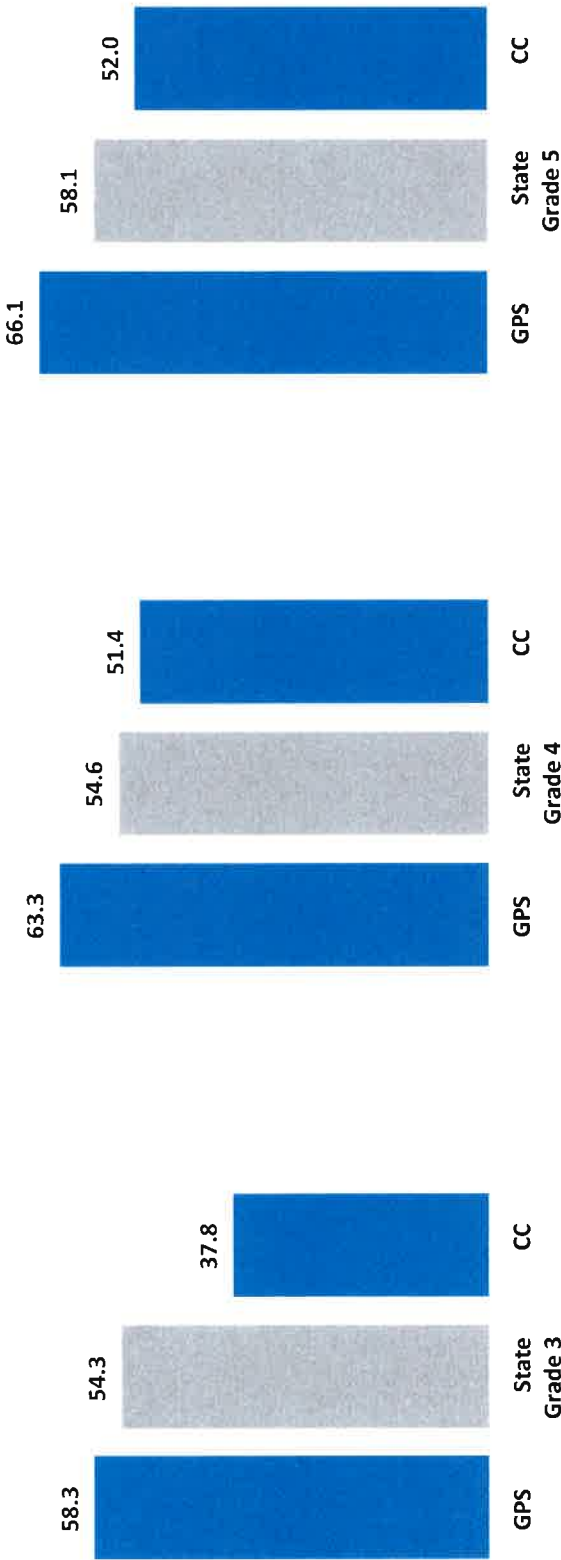

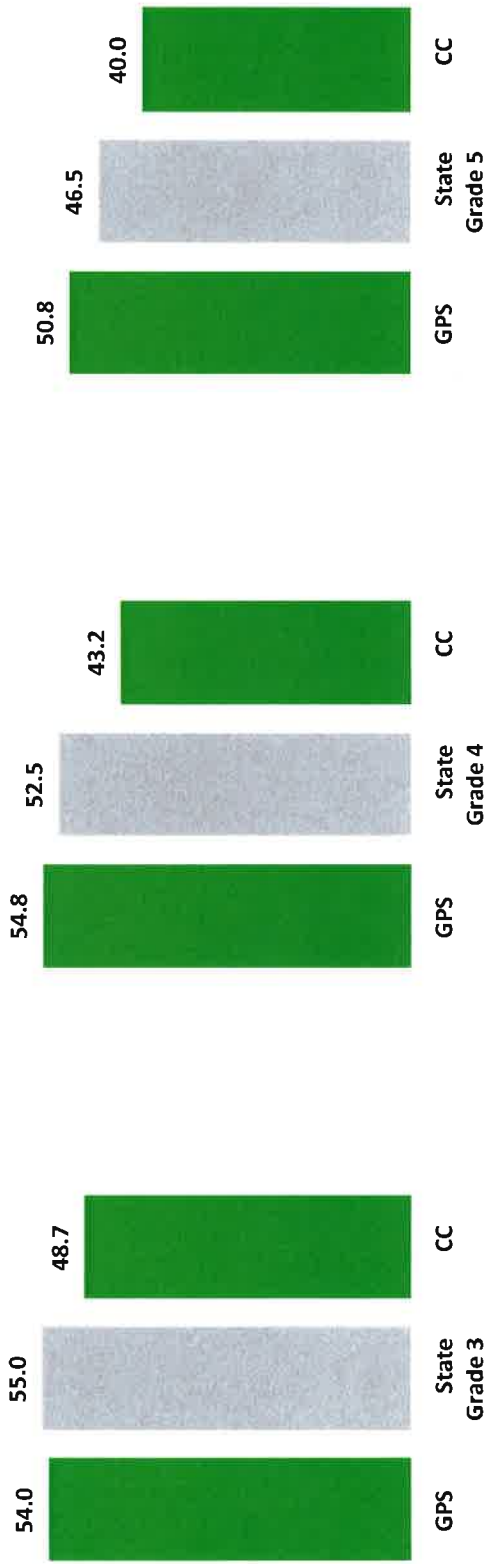

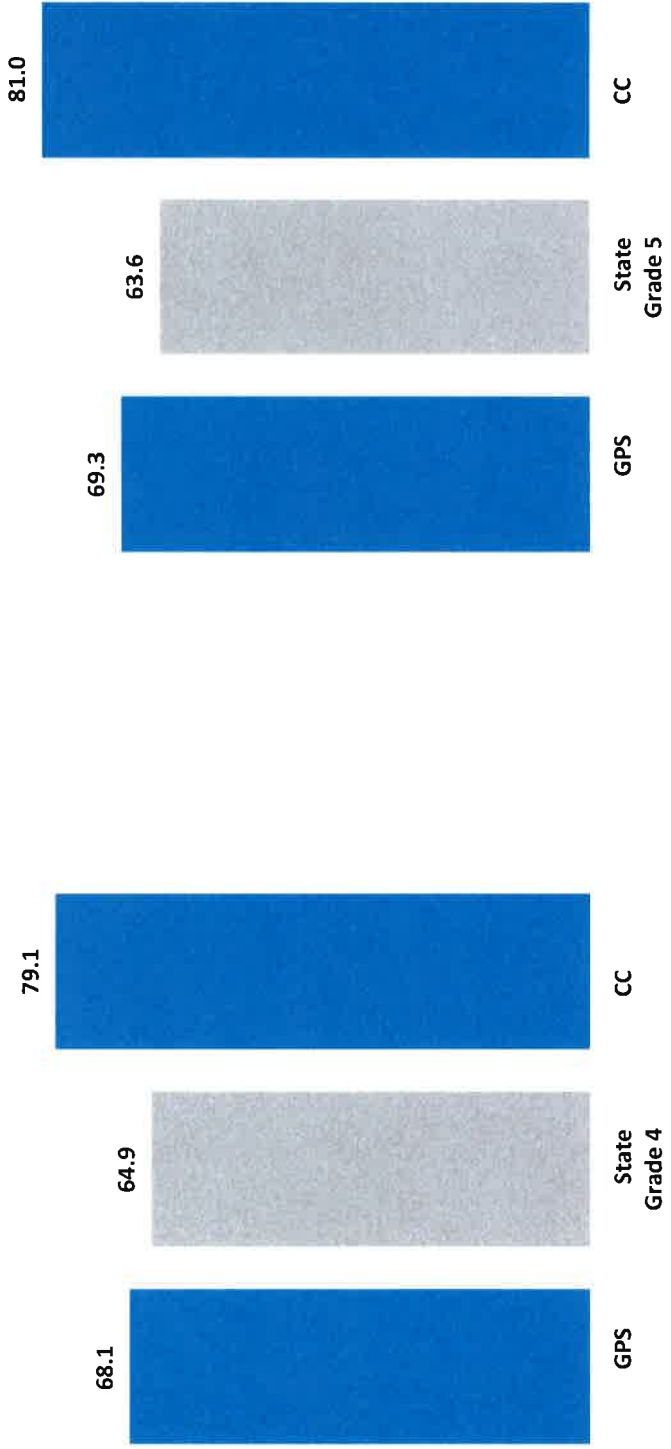
Percent at Level 3 or Above in ELA for Grades 3, 4 and 5

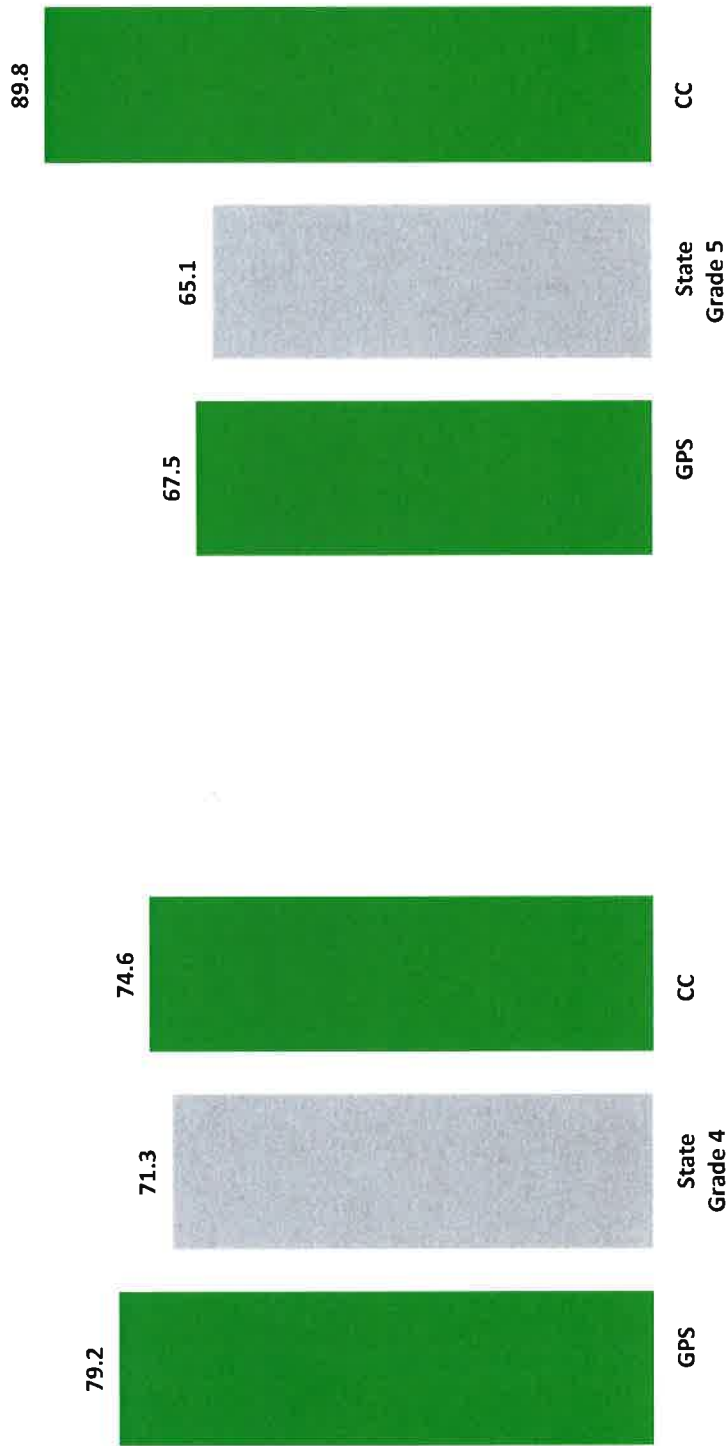
Percent at Level 3 or Above in Math for Grades 3, 4, and 5

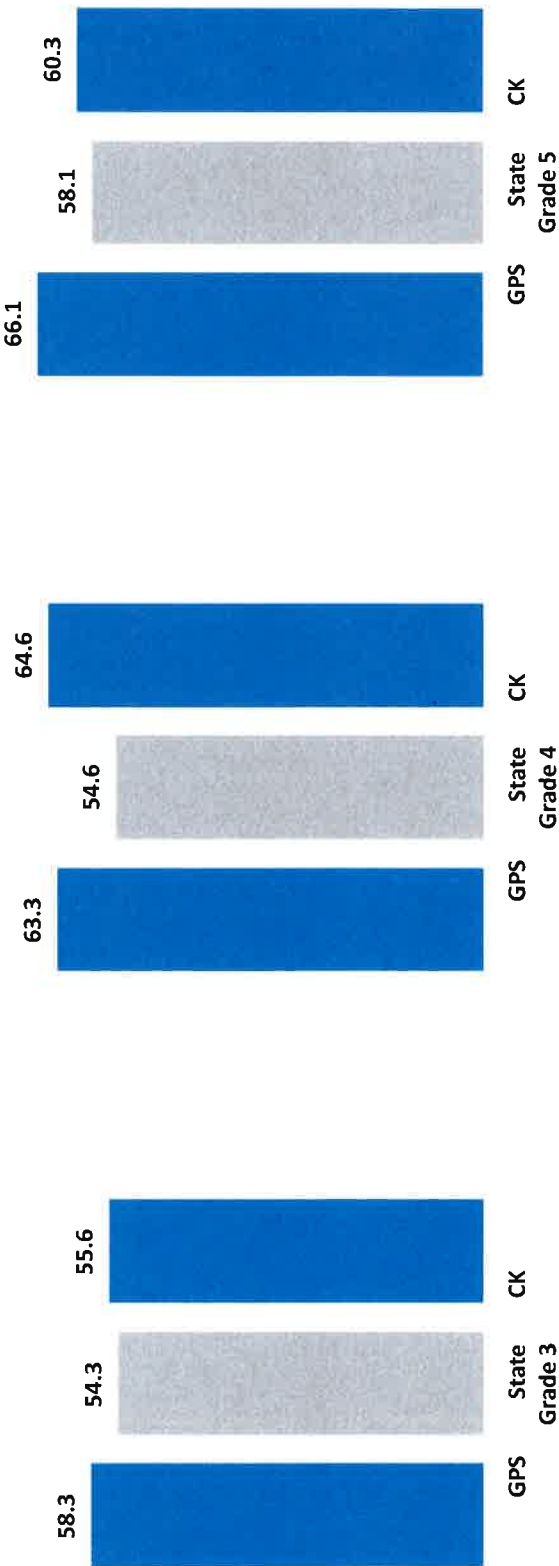

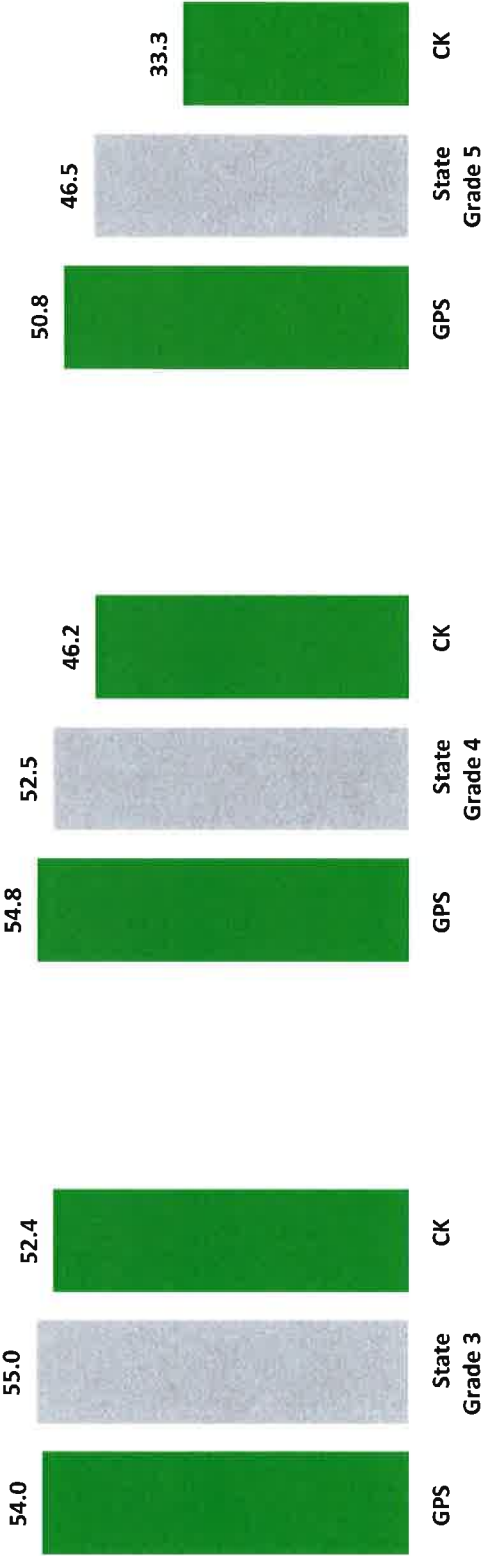

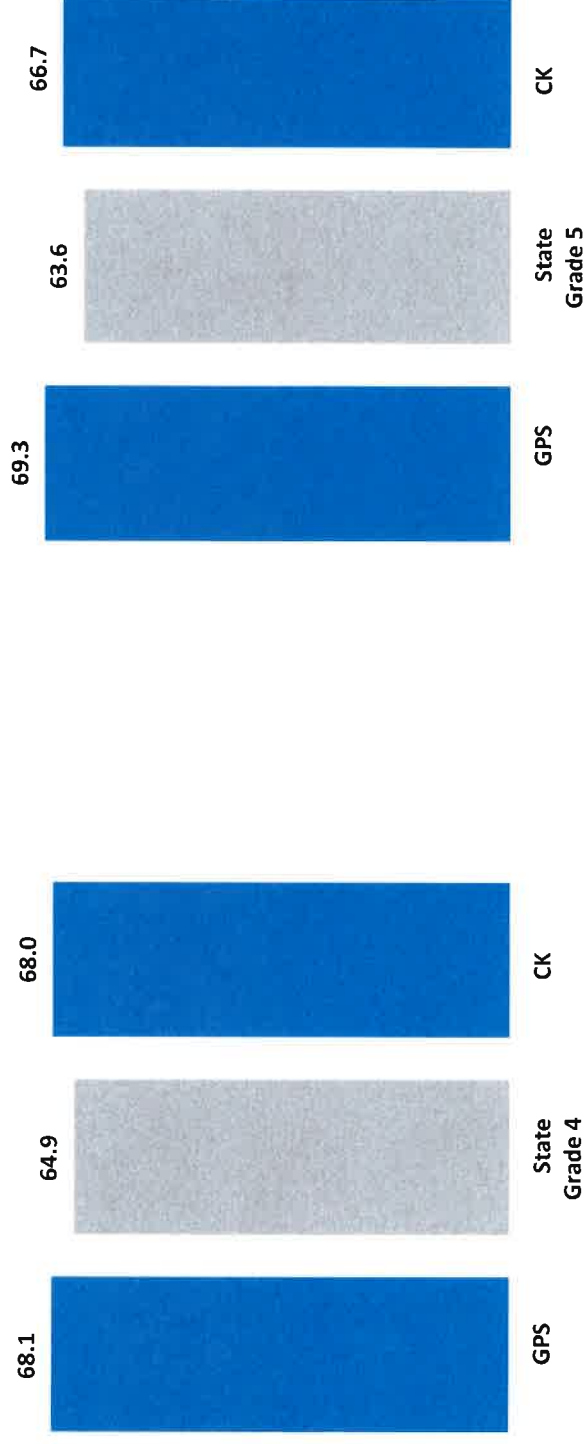


Percent at Level 3 or Above in Math for Grades 3, 4, and 5

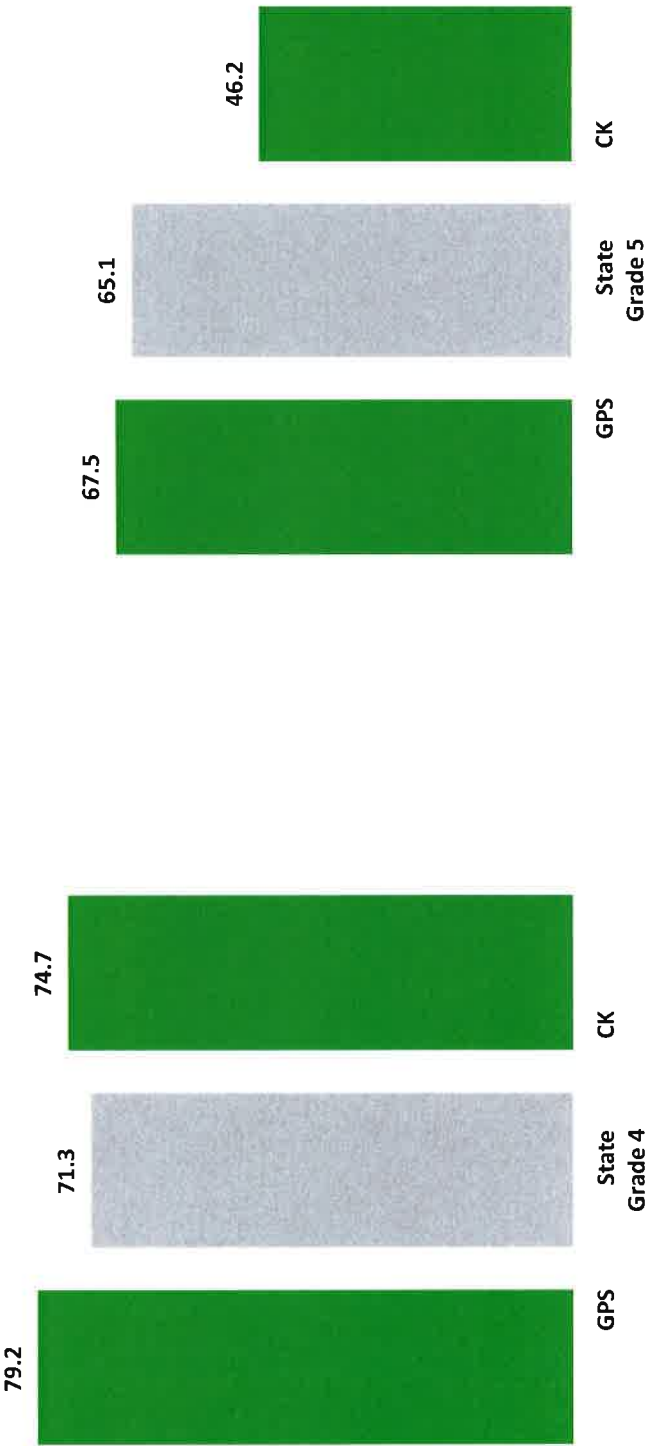


Average Percentage of Target Achieved in ELA for Grades 4 and 5

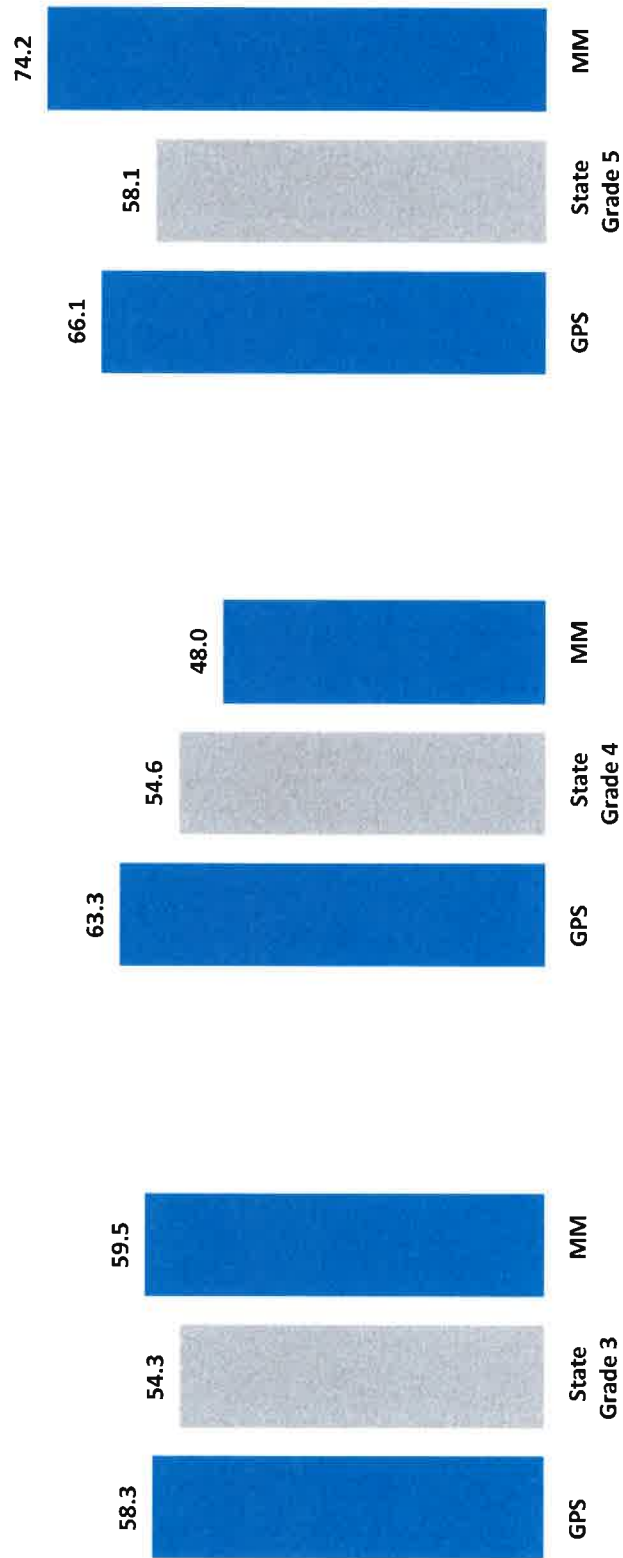

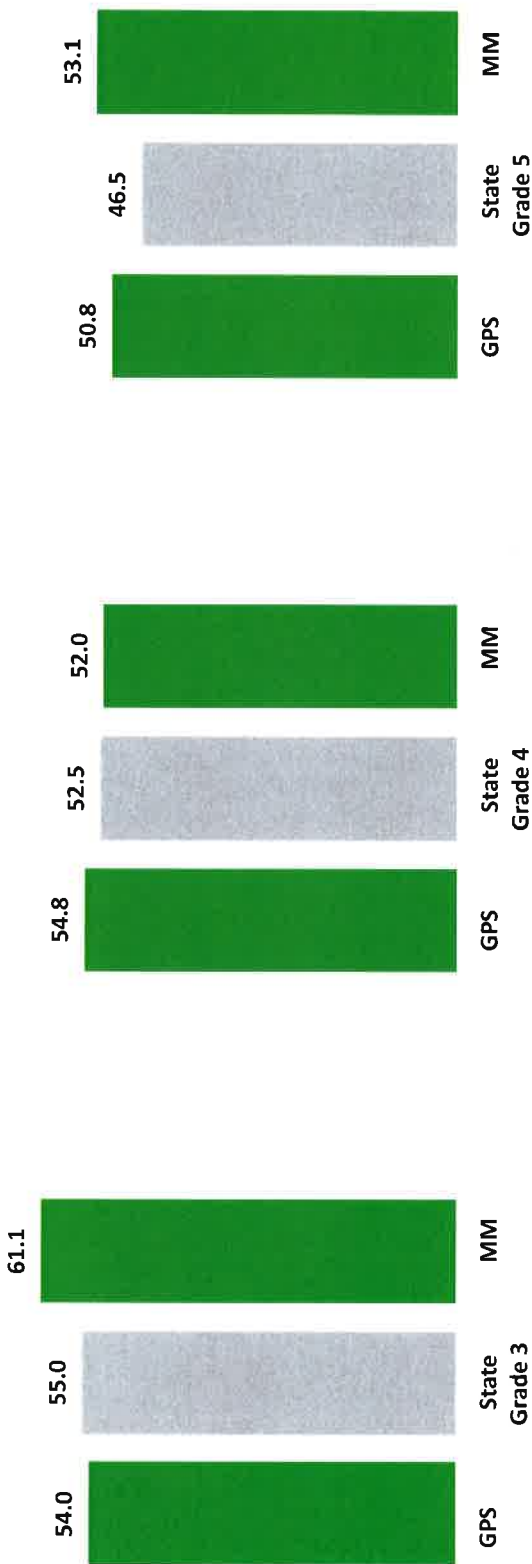

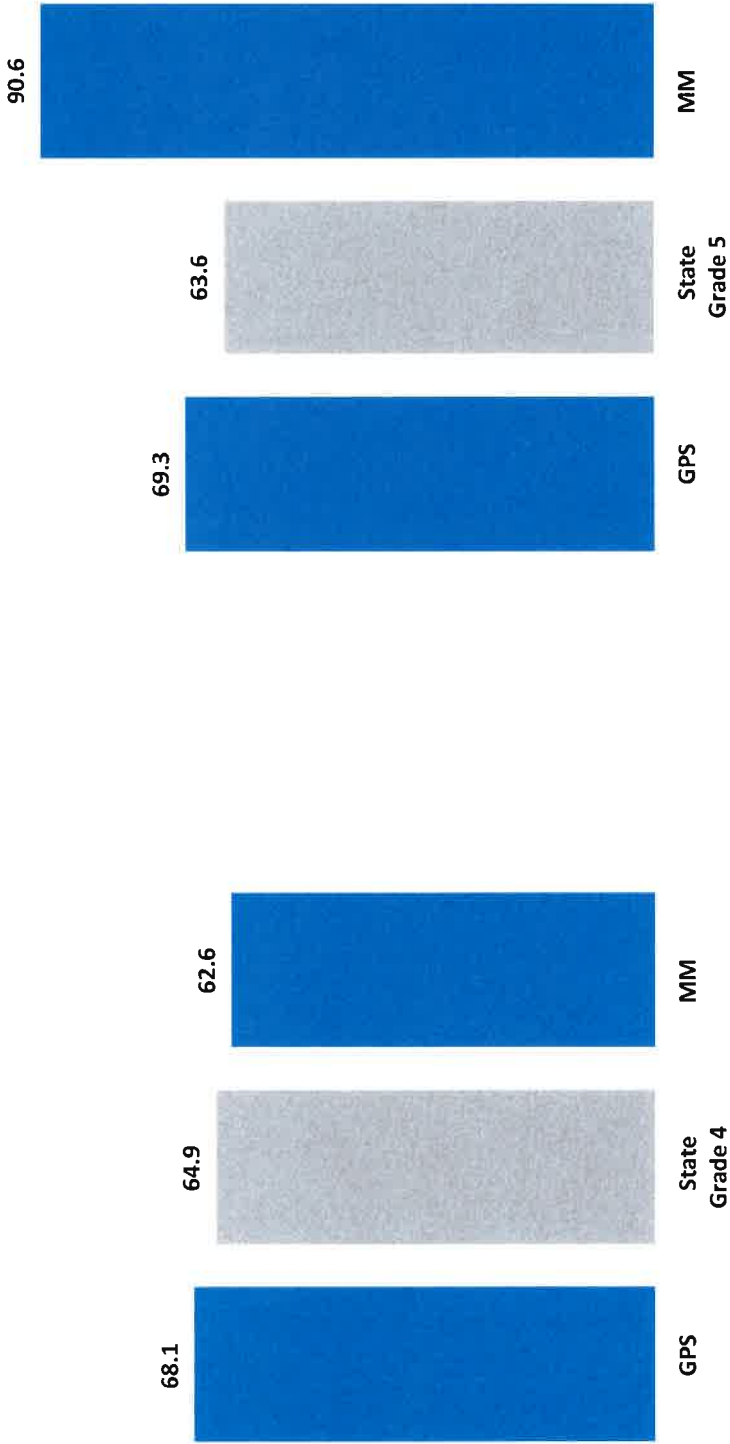
Percent at Level 3 or Above in ELA for Grades 3, 4 and 5

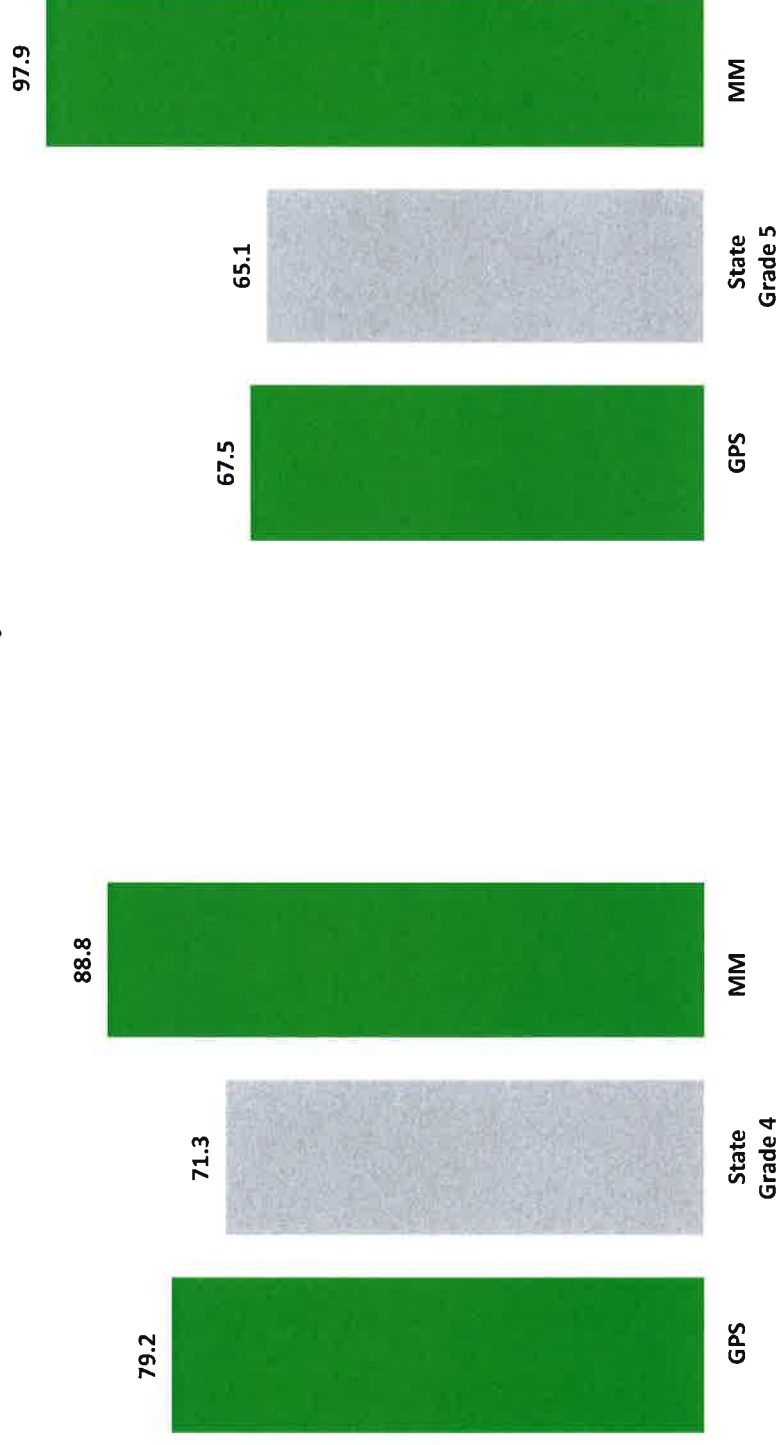
Percent at Level 3 or Above in Math for Grades 3, 4, and 5

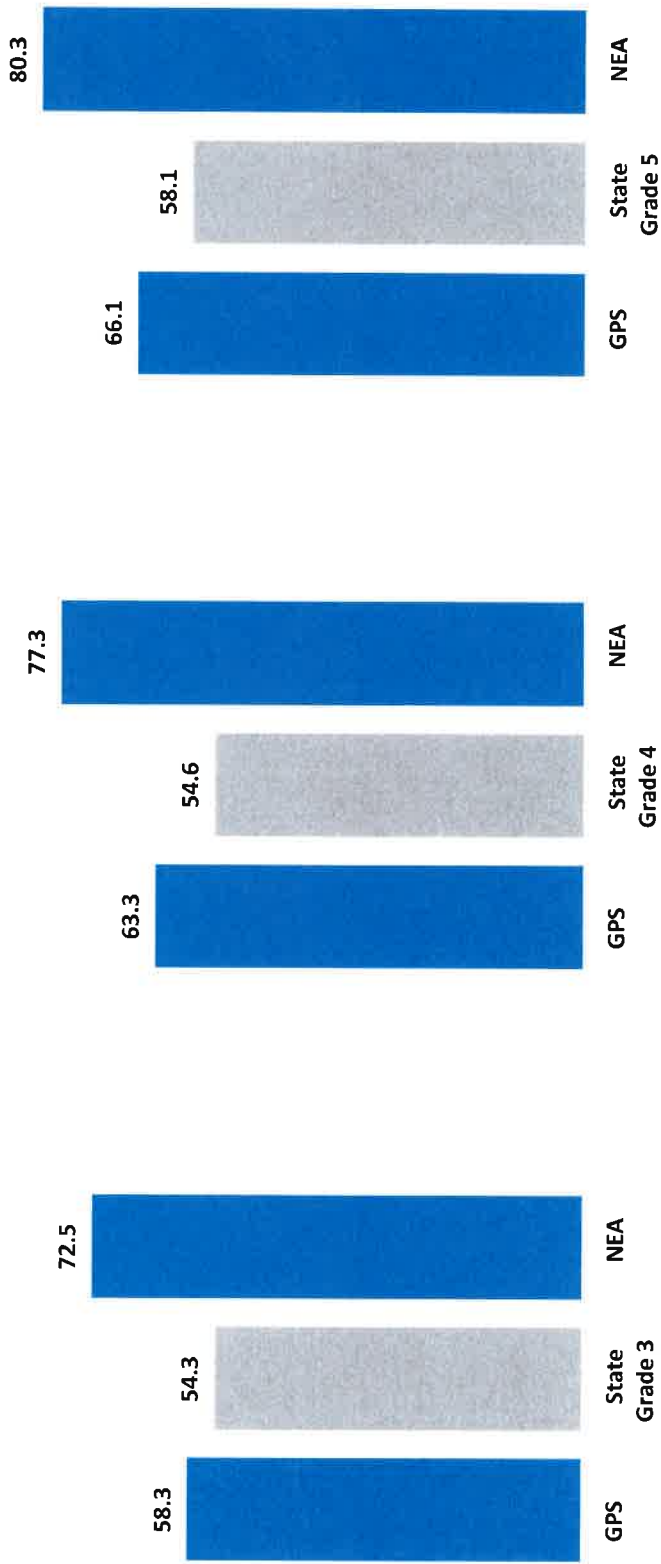

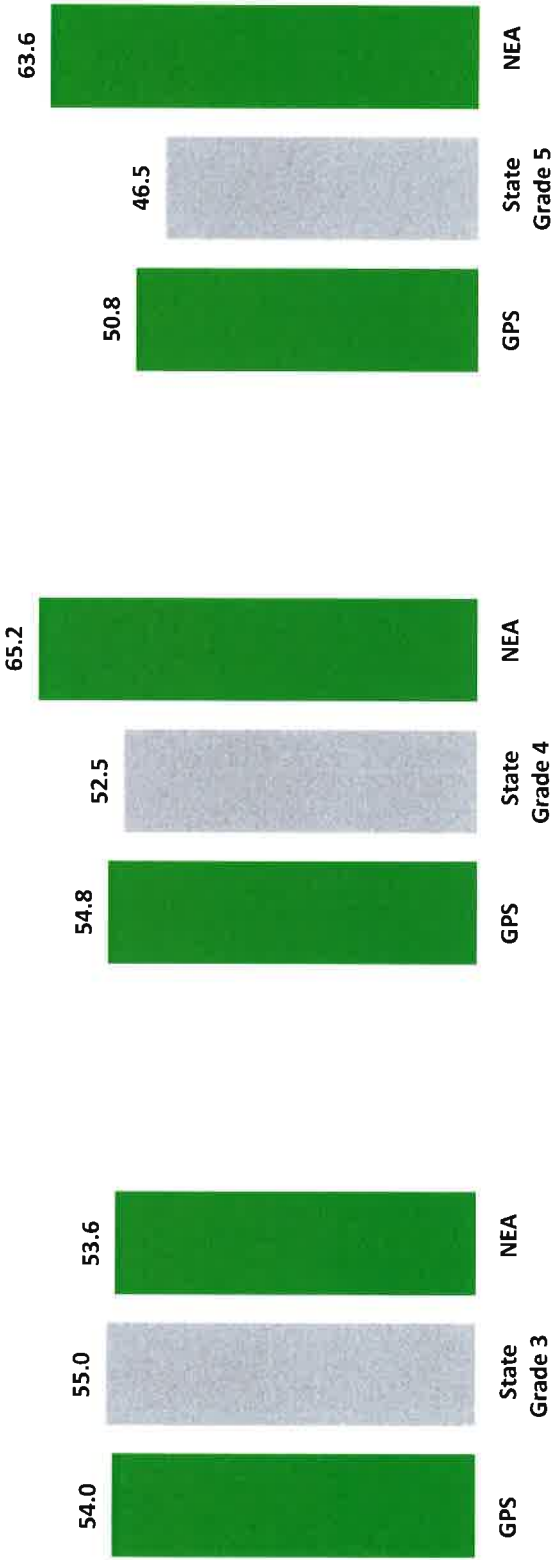

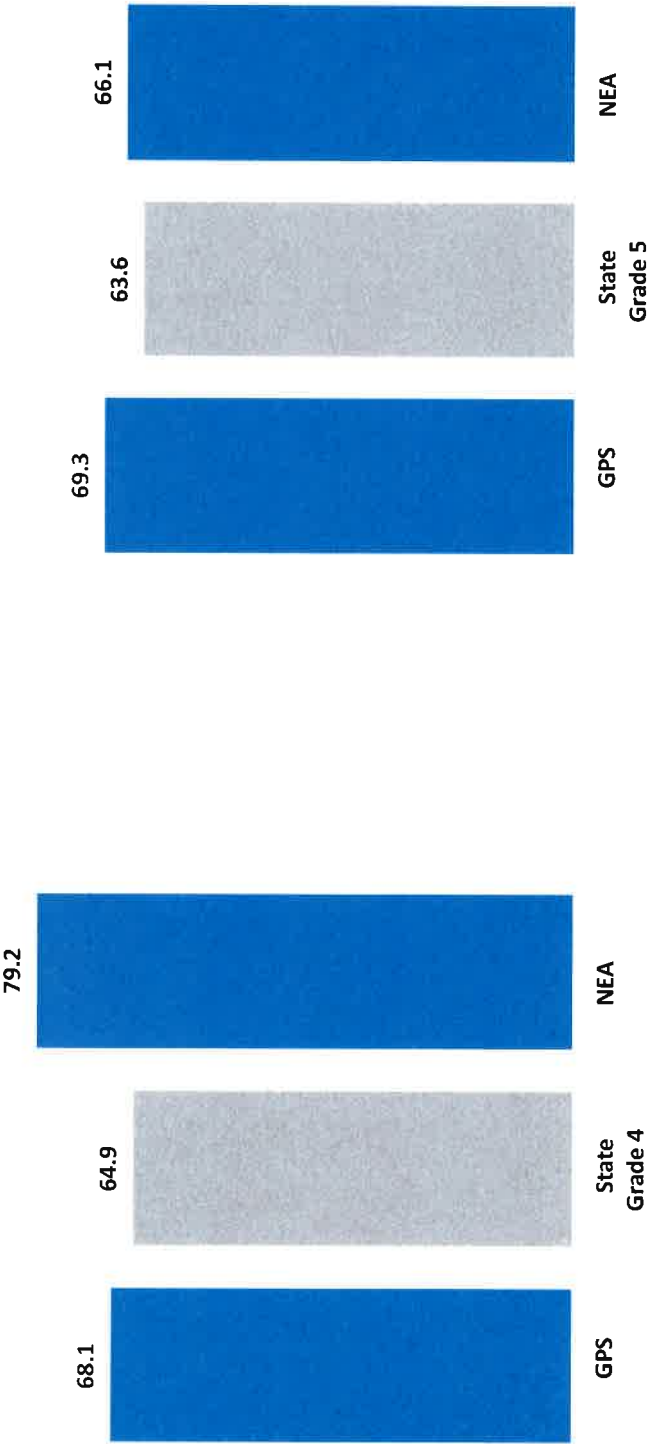
Percent at Level 3 or Above in ELA for Grades 3, 4 and 5

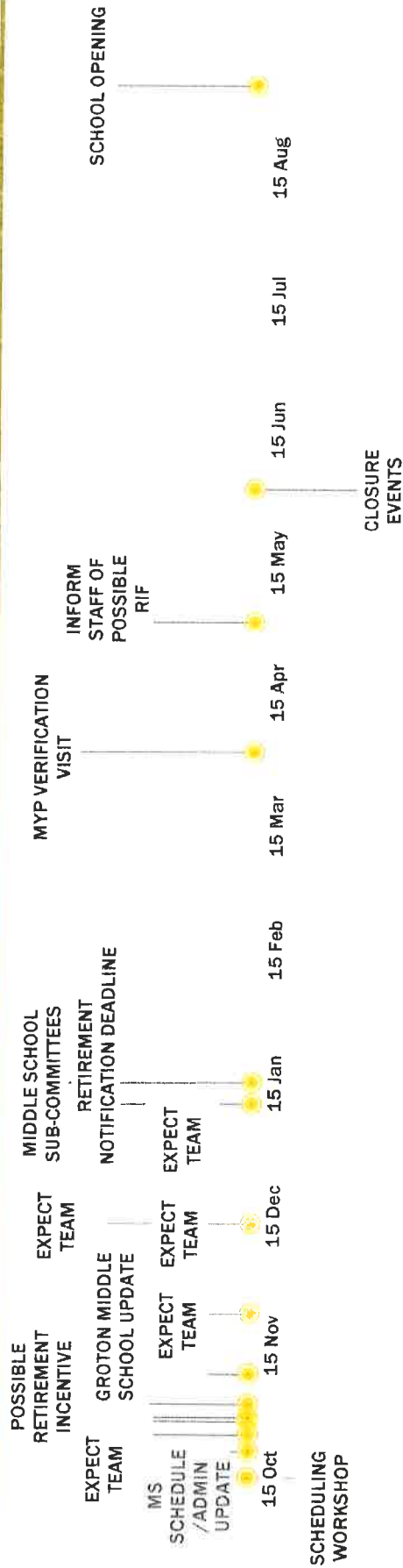
Groton 2020 Elementary Planning Timeline
