Mr. Dennis Colclough gave an update regarding technology in the district:

- Network Over the summer a lot of work on intra structure has been done:







## 1. Elementary School SBAC Data Presentation [ATTACHMENT #1]

Ms. Austin gave a brief overview of the data to be presented. Each elementary Principal gave an overview of the percentage at level 3 or above for grades 3, 4, and 5 for GPS, State and their respective school for ELA and Math as well as the average percentage of target achieved in ELA and Math. Each school noted that there is co-teaching in grades 3, 4, and 5. Each Principal expounded on the outstanding efforts of their Interventionists for ELA and Math.

## 2. Discussion re: Recommendation for Magnet School Program at Charles Barnum School

Dr. Graner noted that it was his recommendation that Groton become a fully Magnet Elementary School District.

It was the consensus of the Board to accept the Superintendent's recommendation that Groton become a fully Magnet School District and that Charles Barnum Elementary School becomes a magnet school beginning in the 2021-2022 school year.

## 3. Groton 2020 Planning Timeline [ATTACHMENTS #2, 3]

Ms. Austin gave an overview of the elementary and middle school Groton 2020 Planning Timeline.






Percent at Level 3 or Above in ELA for Grades 3, 4 and 5 GPS, State, and Charles Barnum




Percent at Level 3 or Above in Math for Grades 3, 4, and 5 GPS, State, and Charles Barnum

Average Percentage of Target Achieved in ELA by Levels Charles Barnum



Average Percentage of Target Achieved in Math by Levels Charles Barnum





Percent at Level 3 or Above in ELA for Grades 3, 4 and 5 GPS, State, and Claude Chester




Percent at Level 3 or Above in Math for Grades 3, 4, and 5 GPS, State, and Claude Chester

Average Percentage of Target Achieved in ELA by Levels Claude Chester






Percent at Level 3 or Above in ELA for Grades 3, 4 and 5 GPS, State, and Catherine Kolnaski




Percent at Level 3 or Above in Math for Grades 3, 4, and 5 GPS, State, and Catherine Kolnaski

Average Percentage of Target Achieved in ELA by Levels Catherine Kolnaski






Percent at Level 3 or Above in ELA for Grades 3, 4 and 5 GPS, State, and Mary Morrisson

Average Percentage of Target Achieved in ELA by Levels Mary Morrisson






Percent at Level 3 or Above in ELA for Grades 3, 4 and 5 GPS, State, and Northeast Academy




Percent at Level 3 or Above in Math for Grades 3, 4, and 5 GPS, State, and Northeast Academy

Average Percentage of Target Achieved in ELA by Levels Northeast Academy






Percent at Level 3 or Above in ELA for Grades 3, 4 and 5 GPS, State, and S.B. Butler




Percent at Level 3 or Above in Math for Grades 3, 4, and 5 GPS, State, and S.B. Butler

Average Percentage of Target Achieved in Math for Grades 4 and 5






