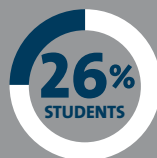

## Distinctive Programs

**Peter Clark Center for Mind, Brain, and Education** fuels teaching and learning excellence by bridging research and practice for faculty, students and parents at the crossroads of psychology, neuroscience and education. The PCC leads faculty development, mission-aligned curriculum, and encompasses the Faculty Fellows, Health and Wellness, Counseling, and Learning Coaches.

**Melrose Family Center for Servant Leadership** embodies Breck's dedication to cultivating future leaders. It works in conjunction with Breck's commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion, community engagement and religious and spiritual development.

**Community Engagement Program** is an opportunity for students to experience on-going and collaborative community-based learning through a year-long partnership with one of more than 40 organizations throughout the Twin Cities. These weekly off-campus visits encourage students to foster and sustain relationships beyond our school community, grounded in the belief that every individual can make valuable contributions to building a more just future for all.

## Key Points for Admissions Readers

- **Breck operates on a semester system with an 11-day May Program.** All semester courses receive 1.0 credit unit. All students are required to take a minimum of 44 semester credits and complete May Program each year.
- **May Program** allows for in-depth academic experiences for 9th and 10th graders and community partnerships, internships and capstone projects for 11th and 12th graders. Each May Program totals 1.0 credit unit.
- Rigorous expectations set the **standard load at 5 core academic courses** each semester, with fine arts, physical education and independent studies constituting a 6th or 7th course. Students in Top Rigor courses may elect fewer courses.
- **Top Rigor course placement** requires approval of the department, often including an application, recommendation, and interview.
- The **Advanced Science Research** Program provides the opportunity for authentic, graduate-level scientific research in a university setting during the summer. Once school begins in the fall, students enroll in a seminar class in which they write research papers, develop a seminar presentation and design a poster that they present at the regional, state science, and international science and engineering fairs.
- **Advanced History Research, *Race in Place: The Coloring of the Twin Cities*,** investigates the economic, political, cultural, and social factors that shaped the Twin Cities' population trends, geography, demographics, and population shifts since the start of the 20th Century within racial, ethnic and religious populations. Students pursue their own research areas within and work with local leaders and community partners.
- **Community-Based Research in Mathematics** has its heart in social justice and serving the community. Student researchers embed themselves with local nonprofits for yearlong research initiatives that provide clients with analytical insight that directly affects programming, funding and services.
- **Robust co-curricular offerings** include: Mock Trial (placed 2nd in State); Math League (3rd in Class A State Tournament); Robotics (won regional tournament and placed 16th at World); TEAM Astro is annually the only high school group to present research at the American Astronomical Society conference; 4 students competed at ISEF.
- **Designated a Unified School** by Special Olympics MN. Breck embraces neuro diversity through 3 unified club teams: flag football, bowling and basketball. We also co-sponsor with PACER Center a monthly community-wide social club for young people with and without disabilities.
- Students may begin taking **elective senior-level English courses** in 11th grade, all of which are semester in length except for AP Literature, which is only open to seniors.
- **All attempted and repeated Breck courses** are listed on the Breck transcript and calculated into the cumulative GPA. All waivers are also indicated on the transcript.
- The highest possible GPA is 4.0.
- Breck complies with colleges' requests for disciplinary disclosures.
