# Stonyhurst Pupils Question Cabinet Minister over Afternoon Tea!

On Wednesday 2nd October Stonyhurst welcomed Cabinet Minister, the Right Honourable Stephen Barclay MP, Secretary of State for Exiting the European Union. Stephen was born and lived for many years not too far away from Stonyhurst, in Lytham St Annes. He is now Conservative MP for North East Cambridgeshire and was appointed to the Cabinet in November 2018.

On his way back from the Conservative party conference, Stephen gave generously of his time to speak with over 100 young people in the Top Refectory on his "Life in Politics". He spoke about how he initially worked in the Law before entering Politics and about his journey over several years from Prospective Parliamentary Candidate to Cabinet Minister. Stephen shared his own experience of having to fight more than one election before successfully winning a parliamentary seat and he told pupils to be patient and tenacious in following their own aspirations.

Pupils with a wide range of views on Brexit were keen to put questions to Stephen in an interesting Q & A session. Stephen encouraged pupils with an interest in politics to consider getting involved.

Before heading back to London for a number of face-to-face and telephone appointments with the Prime Minister and Senior EU officials, Stephen had afternoon tea with a group of Sixth Form pupils in the Stuart Parlour answering their questions on key aspects of the Brexit debate.

Stephen's visit came on the day new proposals were presented to Brussels in respect of finding a mutually acceptable way for the UK to leave the EU. The Stonyhurst Community are tremendously grateful to him for visiting Stonyhurst at such a busy time in UK politics.



## Willkommen, Kolleg Sankt Blasien!

Earlier this month, Stonyhurst welcomed pupils and staff from Kolleg Sankt Blasien, a Jesuit School in Germany. Chris O'Reilly OS '86 who is an English and Philosophy teacher at the College of St. Blaise wrote about their week at Stonyhurst:

Sankt Blasien students are well used to snow, but when they were told that they should bring wellingtons in order to reach the accommodation with dry feet, a certain number began to look quizzically at each other. They had only to arrive on Stonyhurst soil however, in order to begin enthusing about the place. Kolleg, a former Benedictine monastery and now Jesuit school is not unimpressive, but the sheer size of Stonyhurst, among other differences, certainly quickly gave the Kolleg students the feeling of being somewhere very unique.

Highlights of our visit included an excellent atmospheric tour of the college by Mr D Ridout, who was able to bring walls and pictures to life with his accounts of past and present pupils; the Tolkien (or not-so-Tolkien) Trail, accompanied by many demythologising anecdotes provided by Mr T Laemmer and a visit to the Museum and Arundell Library, with a highly illuminating introduction by Dr J Sharples. With various other excursions to Clitheroe and York, the German students were able to take a full set of impressions and memories of this brief stay away with them, but the greatest impact was made by the warm welcome given by Stonyhurst staff and pupils alike. It was a real pleasure to see young people enjoying getting to know each other, despite the short amount of time they had together.

We very much look forward to receiving Stonyhurst pupils on the return visit to the Black Forest in the summer, when hopefully some rain will help them to feel at home. If staff, pupils or OS happen to be in the area, they are always very welcome.



## Marymount Visit

We were delighted to host Marymount Secondary School, Hong Kong earlier this month. Marymount are part of our family of Jesuit schools worldwide and all the girls on the tour were literature and drama students. ## The Senior Essay Society: Lady Milena Grenfell-Baines

"The Last Train to Tomorrow" was an extremely well attended talk by Lady Milena Grenfell-Baines MBE. She told a rapt audience about her experience of being one of the Czech Jewish children rescued by Sir Nicolas Winton in 1938, on the eve of the German invasion, and of her subsequent life in England as a refugee until her eventual reunion with her family.

This was an excellent and very personal presentation by a remarkable, and indeed, extraordinary lady and we are most grateful to Lady Milena for giving her time to visit the College and tell her moving story.

### MODEL UNITED NATIONS - A PUPIL'S PERSPECTIVE

6 Model United Nations is an educational simulation of United Nations conferences, and is an international schools based programme. I chose to take part in MUN to learn about diplomacy, international relations and the United Nations itself, as well as the challenge of thinking more critically and to try to look at problems from an unfamiliar perspective of the represented country.

Our MUN group is made up of students from all over the world and so it is a great opportunity to learn more about each other's cultural backgrounds and how to step away from that.

So far in our MUN sessions, we have learned about the structure of the UN, its goals and origins and reasons why UN was created. We have also discussed the conflict happening in Darfur, Sudan and stepped into the role of Security Council to try to find an effective way to resolve the problem. On the example of Greta Thunberg's latest speech to the UN, we looked at the factors that make a good speech. Our current goal is to prepare for an MUN debate on Olympic Truce, based on which the team for MUN conference in London will be chosen.
