School uniform—upper school

Minimum uniform expectation

- Navy badged blazer (compulsory from the start of November 2019)
- Navy badged jumper or cardigan
- White shirt
- School tie
- Grey formal bottoms or dress trousers, skirt, or tartan skirt (Summer uniform can include tailored grey shorts)
- Dark tights
- Black outdoor shoes

Dark colour coat

Please note that blazers for Upper School pupils are compulsory for the academic Year 2019 /20. Only one item of clothing needs to be badged so if a blazer is worn, a cardigan or jumper underneath needn't be badged.

PE

- Black or Navy shorts, jogging bottoms or leggings
- Royal blue or white t-shirt
- Optional royal blue quarter zip sweatshirt
- Trainers

We will continue to be vigilant in ensuring our pupils wear their uniform correctly to engender a feeling of community and sense of belonging. **Can I stress that only grey formal bottoms and not black are acceptable.**


Please note that 'red card' detentions will be issued to all upper school pupils not wearing a school blazer from the week beginning the 11th November 2019.

Reading at Ysgol Nantgwyn

At Ysgol Nantgwyn we are entirely committed to ensuring that, as a minimum expectation, all pupils are able to read at their chronological age. This is a core focus for all staff at the school as we know that when pupils are able to read in line with their chronological age, they are able to access all areas of the school curriculum and thrive in their learning. Over the course of the first year in Ysgol Nantgwyn a wide range of reading methods and interventions were implemented. These have been incredibly successful with many more pupils reading at their chronological age this September compared to September 2018. We have invested in Group Guided Reading for the Lower School so that pupils learn to take ownership for their reading and share the experience with their friends on a daily basis. In Gwyn Middle School we have invested over £1000 in new reading materials and appointed library monitors to create a positive reading culture that will stay with pupils throughout their education. In Nant, we have heavily invested in young adult fiction for the Library Resource Centre which is now opened and manned every lunchtime for pupils. Upper School also now has a supply of reading materials that can be used during registration time, should a pupil not have their own reading book with them. Reading takes place for Upper School pupils every Friday in registration.

This is a fantastic start to developing a reading culture and you are able to support this development at home. This infographic shows what an impact just 20 minutes of reading a day has on academic achievements.



Homework - Upper School

Ysgol Nantgywn staff have been working to develop a revised homework policy across the school. The new policy is based on literacy, numeracy and the development of essential skills. At Ysgol Nantgwyn, homework activities are an important part of our home/school partnership and all pupils are expected to take part in a variety of homework tasks to enhance and support both their work in class and their progress in school. The homework will develop interest and engage pupils, as well as providing them with practise that they need to become secure in their learning and development of everyday skills. We would very much appreciate your support in encouraging your child to complete all homework set.

Year 9 – In many classes, pupils are developing the skills required for qualifications and the homework set will reflect this; details are provided below. Pupils are also experiencing a range of optional subjects over the year to inform their future choices. In these subjects, they will receive one piece of homework per fortnight or a mini project over the course of the lessons completed at the end of the cycle.

Year 10 and Year 11 - In qualification classes, the nature and spread of homework changes throughout the year depending on when controlled assessments and extended pieces of work are being completed.

Subjects will set roughly one piece of homework for each subject for every two lessons during each two week timetable cycle. This means that pupils should expect rather more homework from English, mathematics and science as they have far more lessons in these subjects. Pupils will have at least one piece of homework per subject over a fortnight. The format of the homework will vary depending on the teaching and learning within the curriculum. For example in English, pupils could be set an extended writing task or a reading task and then during revision periods instructed to watch the GCSE Pod video and create a mind map.

Skills based homework - Pupils are preparing for their qualification assessments and, as a recommendation, they should be undertaking revision/self-study work at home outside of the set homework. They should be reviewing work studied in lessons and making study notes using the provided material from the school to develop their knowledge and application of the subjects. For example, use of GCSE pod to watch a video on fractions in mathematics or to use the Google drive for science to access the past paper to enhance their application of the work or to read the set literacy text and make notes on the chapters to support their English exam. Please note this is in addition to homework, not instead of it.
