Helpful Reminders

Safety

Walking to school: teach your child about safety regulations, intersection crossing and traffic signals.

Taking the bus: discuss appropriate behavior on the bus; for example -- sitting quietly, remaining in the seat and talking softly.

Please make sure there a contingency plan (backup) for unexpected situations or a change in dismissal routines.

Home address/telephone numbers/e-mail address: be sure your **Student Profile Sheet** is in the office and up to date with appropriate information at all times. Designated contacts should be local and willing to care for your child if you are unavailable.

Arrival at school: please send your child to school on time for optimal learning.

Absences/late arrivals: communicate with the office if your child will be absent or late. You may leave a message during off-school hours. Please review the district's policy on attendance.

Clothing

Dress your child in practical, washable clothing and sneakers so that he or she can participate in all activities.

Label clothing and belongings with your child's name.

Work with your child on zinning and buttoning clothing:

Work with your child on zipping and buttoning clothing and tying shoelaces.

School Health

All kindergarten students *must have* a current CT State HAR3 physical and CT State required immunizations on file prior to school entry. Health forms and information are contained in the kindergarten packet or they can be obtained from the school nurse.

Parents of new students should schedule a meeting with the school nurse to familiarize the nurse with your child's individual health history and needs.

Please inform the nurse of any medication or medical care that your child needs during the school day.

Please adhere to school guidelines regarding illnesses and/or keep them home if your child is not feeling well enough to participate in the learning activities provided in school.

Philosophy

Greenwich Public Schools Kindergarten program is an integral part of today's total educational program. It is the foundation upon which all future education is built. A kindergarten filled with a variety of learning activities in a nurturing, personalized environment will help your child grow socially, emotionally, physically, and intellectually. It is the most influential year in your child's formal education.





Getting your Child Ready for Kindergarten

Parents will always be the most important teachers their children can have. At home, you can support the kindergarten program in many ways including the following:

Help your child learn these academic, personal and social skills:

Reading, Writing, Language

- ✓ Help your child to recognize and write his or her first name First letter capitalized followed by lower case
- ✓ Raise your child's awareness of words and letters of the alphabet
- √ Read with your child every day and discuss the reading using open-ended questions

✓ Encourage your child to use pencils, crayons and markers to write and draw with their dominant hand and to use an appropriate pencil grip

- ✓ Have meaningful conversations with your child and introduce/explain new vocabulary words to them
- ✓ Encourage your child to explain his or her thinking and ask questions
- ✓ Give your child multiple step directions and have them repeat them
- √ Sing nursery rhymes and play rhyming games
- ✓ Label things in your home with simple signs to encourage letter and word recognition

STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Math)

- √ Help your child recognize numbers and count with them
- ✓ Count objects with them and encourage 1:1 correspondence
- ✓ Relate numbers and their impact to everyday life
- ✓ Work with your child to recognize shapes, patterns and primary colors
- ✓ Help your child sort items into different categories and identify patterns
- ✓ Expose your child to different types of music and rhythms

Personal/Independent Learning

- ✓ Encourage your child to dress independently
- √ Have your child practice packing and unpacking their backpack
- ✓ Be sure your child can use the bathroom facilities without help
- ✓ Provide opportunities for your child to develop independence by assigning them responsibilities at home
- \checkmark All clothing and educational materials your child brings to school should be clearly labeled.
- √ Kindergartners should keep an extra set of clothes in school

Social Emotional Learning

- ✓ Provide opportunities for your child to play with children his or her age
- ✓ Allow your child to work out differences with other children independently
- √ Teach your child to respect others and the belongings of others
- ✓ Encourage your child to stay involved in an activity until it is completed

Student progress is reported on a standards-based report card three times per year (December, March and June. Individual conferences will and can be scheduled with your child's teacher.

Development of Young Children

It is known that the young child's thought processes are different from older children and adults. Young children think globally in large "chunks" and as they grow, they tend to think in segments or compartments. Given that young children understand what can be seen and touched, activities in kindergarten utilize real, hands-on materials, manipulatives and digital tools for oneto-one correspondence.

In order to best meet the needs of the kindergarten students, teachers will administer short screenings and universal assessments to help provide information on your child's development.

12 Principles of Child Development and Learning

- 1 All areas of development and learning are important.
- 2 Learning and development follow sequences.
- 3 Development and learning proceed at varying rates.
- 4 Development and learning result from an interaction of maturation and experience.
- 5 Early experiences have profound effects on development and learning.
- 6 Development proceeds toward greater complexity, selfregulation, and symbolic or representational capacities.
- 7 Children develop best when they have secure relationships.
- 8 Development and learning occur in and are influenced by multiple social and cultural contexts.
- 9 Children learn in a variety of ways.
- 10 Play is an important vehicle for developing selfregulation and pro¬moting language, cognition, and social competence.
- 11 Development and learning advance when children are challenged.
- 12 Children's experiences shape their motivation and approaches to learning.

The elementary speech and language pathologists provide early intervention strategies and supports to students who exhibit difficulties in the areas of language and speech, through the Student Assistance Teams or direct therapy to students with disabilities as stipulated in the Individual Education Plans (IEPs).

English Language Learners

We provide a comprehensive English for Speakers of Other Languages instruction in reading, writing, listening, speaking and critical thinking with content area instruction that is academically challenging and integrated with the GPS content curriculum and tailored to each student's linguistic proficiency, educational background and academic needs; and professional learning for all staff members to help them facilitate the academic growth of linguistically and culturally diverse students.


