Why am I here doing this presentation?

1. I received a generic email at the end of the school year from FCIS about applying for a grant. Knowing it was the end of the school year and no one was probably reading this email, I decided my chances were probably good. So I wrote an essay, got a signature from my Headmaster, and applied that day for the Dewitt E. & Vera M. Hooker Fellowship Grant.
2. I tied for first place!
3. I received \$2,500 from FCIS for my theatre costume project!

What is this presentation about?

Description:

“Since many schools have very limited options for their school-wide musical, I propose that theatre departments start openly sharing their theatrical resources in order to become a close-knit community that partners together to provide excellent tools for other schools in need.”

So, I've realized a few things by being a Christian Theatre teacher...

1. It's hard. Get used to leaving school when it's dark.
2. It's challenging to present a *quality* theatre work that is readily accepted by the theatre community as "real".
3. It's expensive to do it right, and that it's worth doing.
4. We just can't do certain shows. Nope. We just can't.
5. Most Christian schools are bound to end up doing the same shows because of content, talent and budget.

So, what constitutes an acceptable Christian show?

1. Appropriate Content: no profanity, sexual situations, drug use, alcohol tolerance, physical violence, 20 more things...
2. Good roles for Leads, Supporting AND the Ensemble.
3. Applicable, teachable scenarios for both cast and crew.
4. Marketability to a live faith-based audience.
5. Student and Director enjoyment!



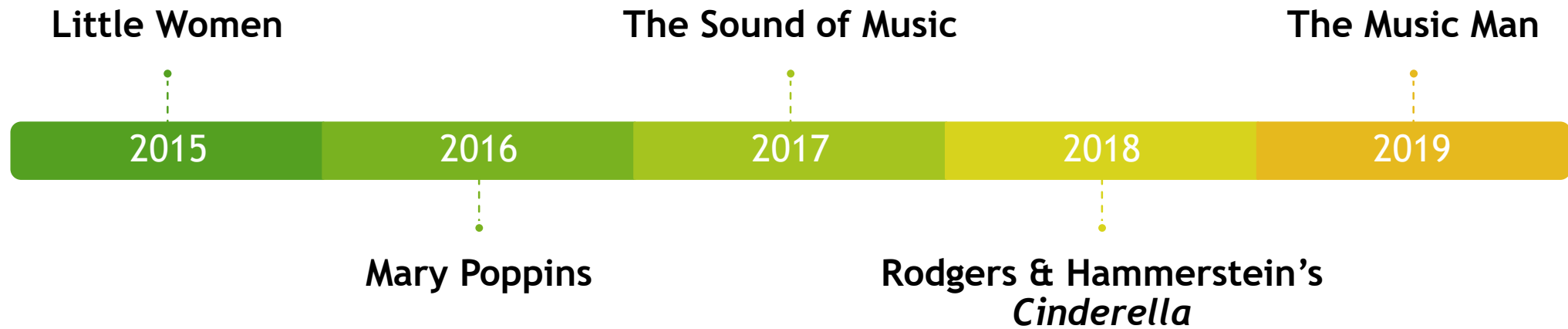
So, how many shows in the musical world does that leave us able to use?

The reality is that writers today are not rapidly producing quality shows that can be performed by Christian actors for a faith-based community.

The shows we usually perform are older, “classic” shows,

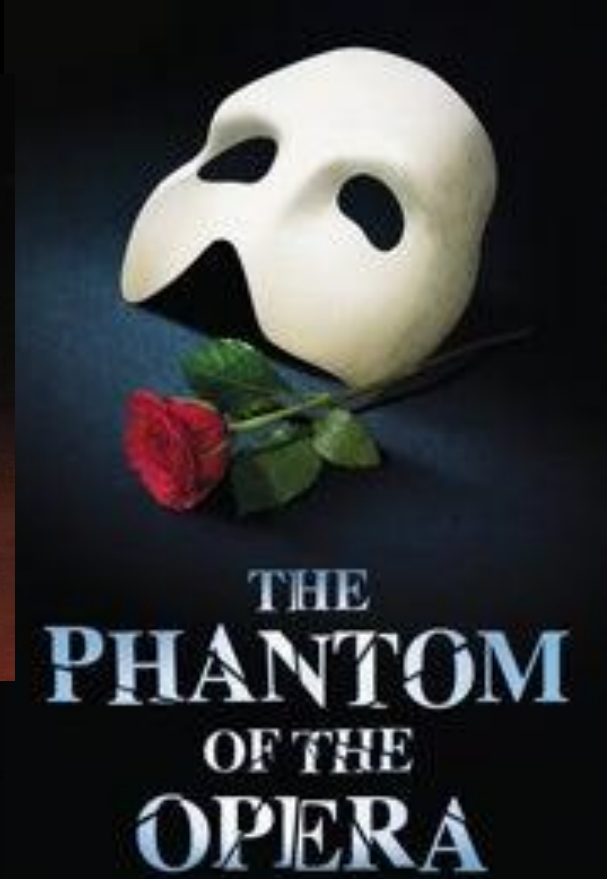

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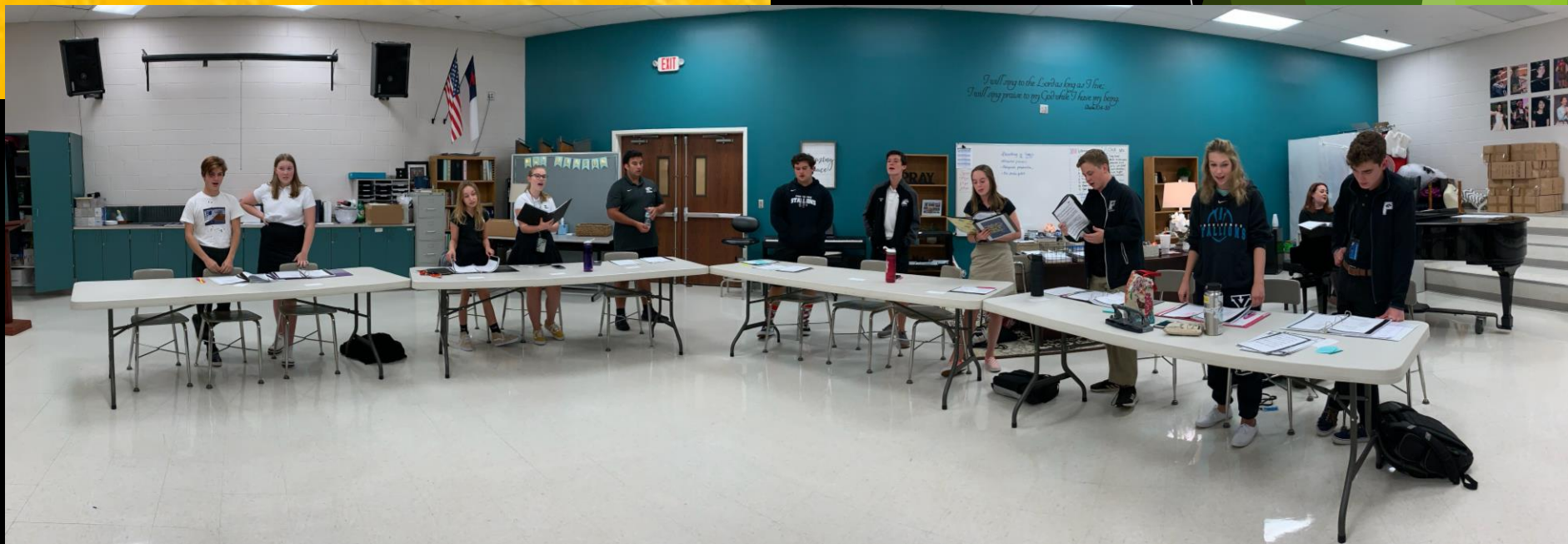






THE MUSIC MAN





This entire project is a direct result of a theatre teacher named Peter Nason of Gulf Middle School.





Gulf Middle School was doing *The Sound of Music* soon. He had seen my pics on Facebook and he reached out to me as a total stranger...

Peter asked me if I would consider renting him my costumes for his school production...



His theatre program had recently exploded with kids, and he was very short on costumes. He needed a lot of pieces, and soon. So, I asked him what his costume budget was for the almost 200 pieces I was asked to rent out to him...



He responded:
“ \$400.00 ”

My INITIAL thought process:

- Maria's wedding dress alone cost \$400.00.
...I guess I can loan him that one piece?
- I could easily rent this show out for \$4,000.00.
- I don't want middle schoolers messing up MY stuff.



My ENDING thought process:

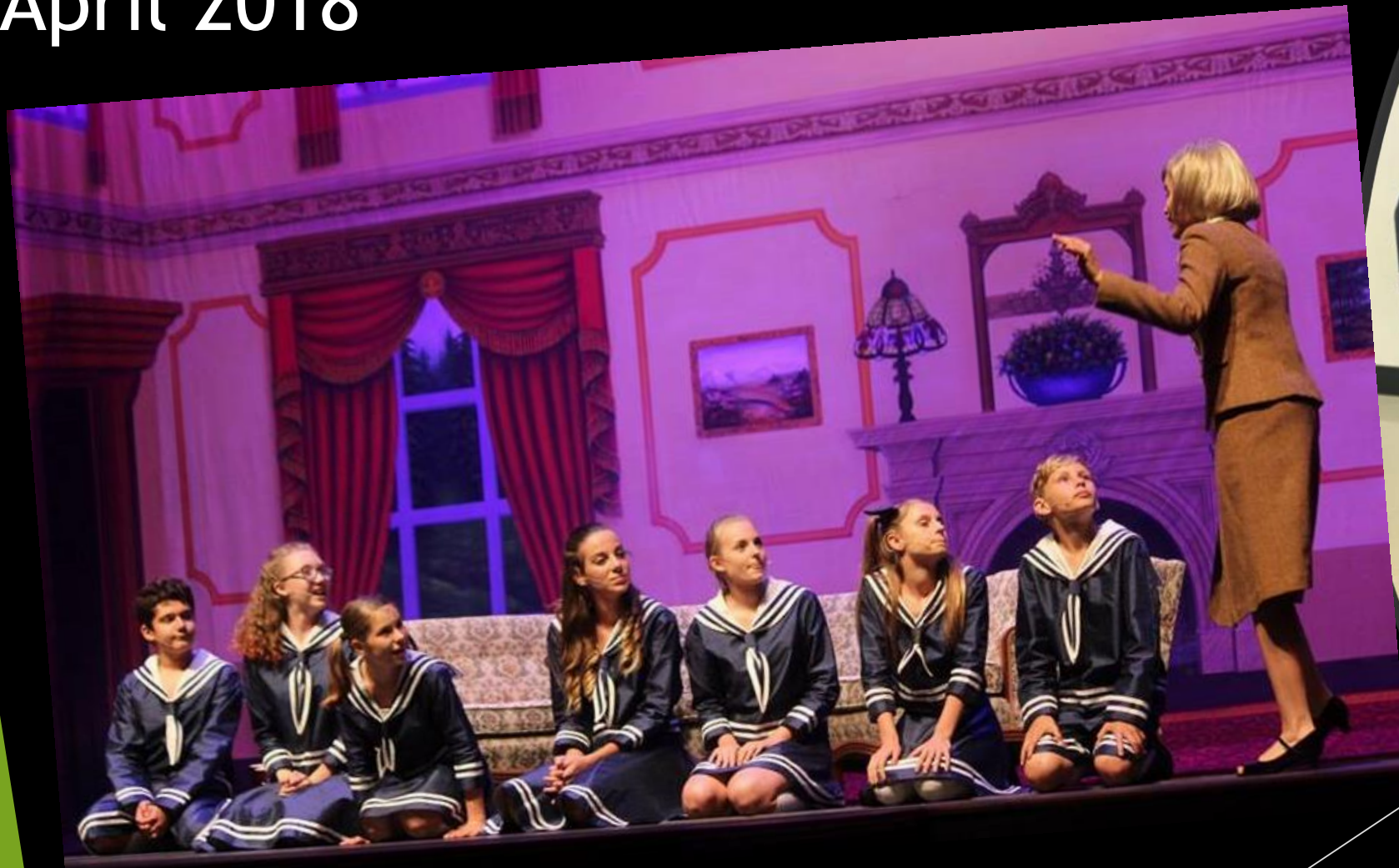
- He told me everyone in his cast is on a free lunch program. These kids literally have nothing.
- His students have never worn handmade costumes.
- He is trying to do the same thing I am.
- He needs help if he's going to do it.
- He asked *me* for help.

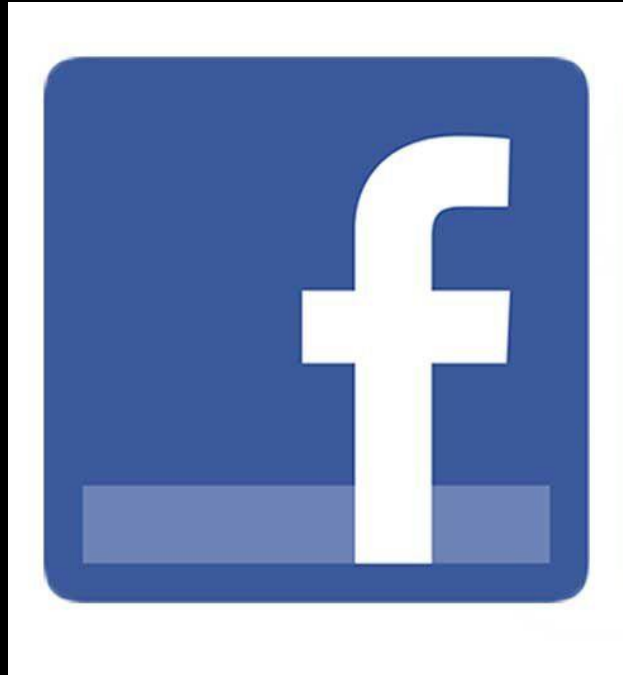

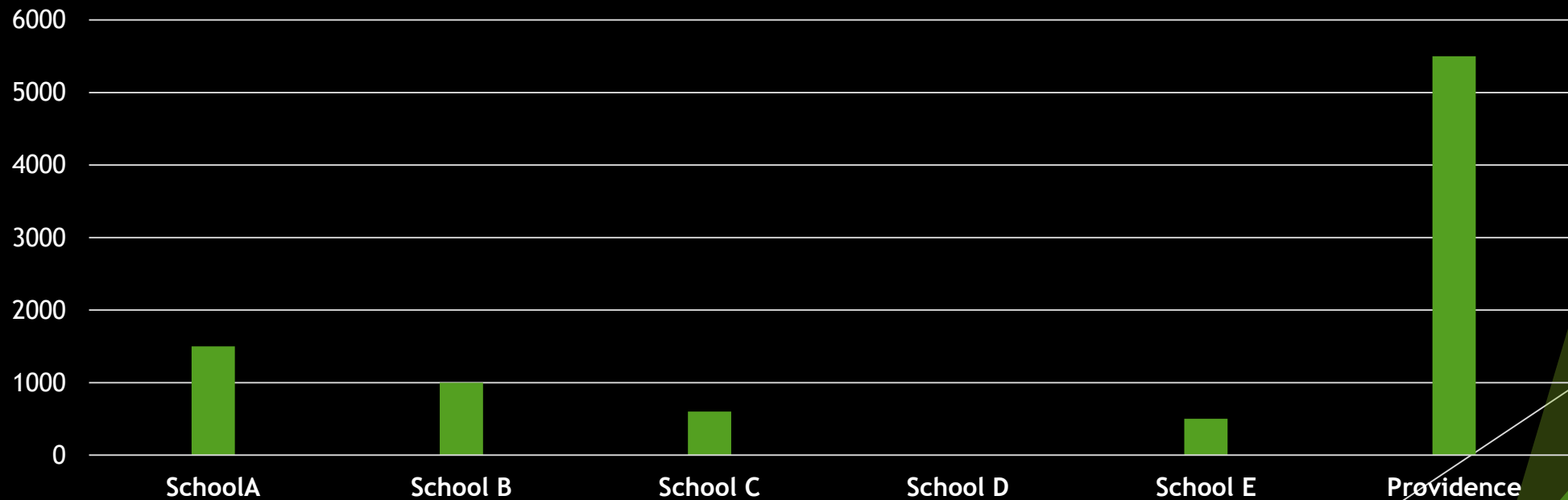
This experience sparked me to find out how many other teachers are teaching with a limited budget.

“I pay out of my pocket until I raise enough donations to turn in receipts.”

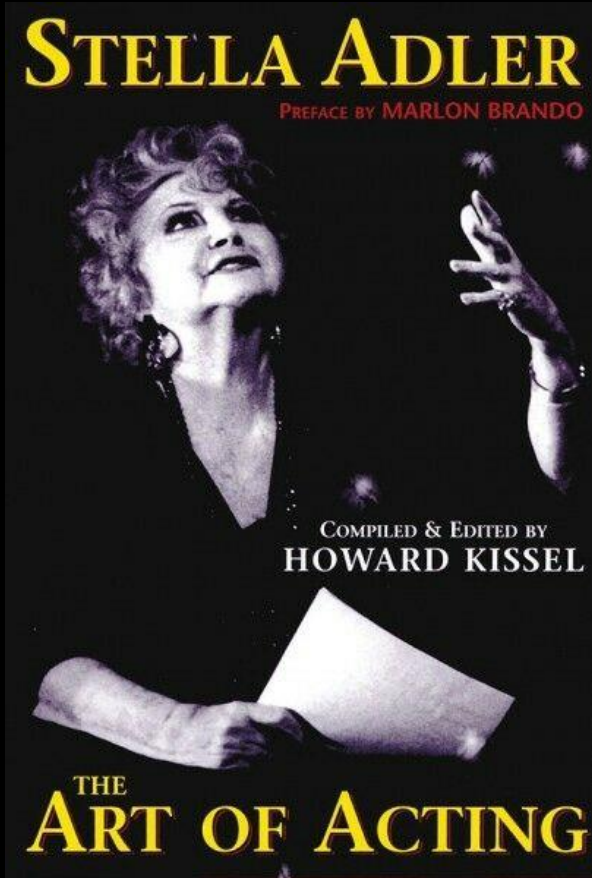
“No budget for costumes. We have to borrow from other local theatres.”
