INTERPROFESSIONAL EDUCATION

AUTISM CENTER

The Autism Center expands with grant funding and State Reimbursement to include a Respite Program, Transition Services and Extended School year. The center is hiring a director to support the expanding services to the already successful **Autism for Lifelong Learning (ALL)** program. In addition, a revised Autism Certificate will begin fall 2019 that prepares both undergraduate and post-professionals for this special population.

SOCIAL WORK

As part of his Methods & Process II group methods course, professor **David Hage**’s class of 8 junior level social work students completed a service learning project in support of the Dinners for Kids event on Wednesday, April 3rd, 2019. **Dr. McDonald, Professor Ellman, and Joanie Salla**, a longtime child welfare advocate and instructor also participated in supporting the event. **Mary O’Leary**, from the AmeriCorps Vista volunteer coordinator served as the as the department representative for the planning committee and took a lead role in planning the silent auction fundraiser. **Betty Ann Duffy**, the department’s Administrative Assistant is also a regular volunteer for Dinners for Kids. The program currently serves 40 children in the Back Mountain with meals being prepared by **Metz Food Service** on campus. The social work department

previously raised enough funds to purchase a commercial food refrigerator housed in the Metz kitchen for the project and helped fund many dinners for the local children.

This year the event raised over \$46,000 for the program. This allowed the Dinners for Kids program to expand to serve the Wilkes-Barre School District with a goal to serve a minimum of 40 children there. Principle **Mellissa Meyers** spoke and detailed the great need in their school district as well. It became clear to all who attended, food insecurity remains a significant problem within the Wyoming Valley and Dinners for Kids, founded by **David and Edna Tevet** is committed to helping children access these needed meals. **Dr. Botzman** was also a speaker and affirmed the university’s continued commitment to the program and local children in need. The honorees



at the dinner were **The Metz family**, who were acknowledged for their support of the Dinners for Kids program by preparing the meals on campus weekly, hosting an annual fundraiser golf tournament, and providing the fundraiser dinner at-cost in support of Dinners for Kids. The social work department is proud to partner with all involved to support the Dinners for Kids organization to enhance justice through reducing local food insecurity and demonstrate mercy, service, and hospitality by participating in the annual fundraiser, regularly scheduling volunteer drivers to deliver, and increasing community awareness.

HEALTHCARE ANALYTICS

Leading the region, Misericordia’s College of Health Science & Education launches new program:

The **Healthcare Analytics** program is a 36-credit Master of Science degree program available fully online beginning in August. The new academic program prepares creative and diligent professionals who use data to communicate and enact meaningful improvements in health care delivery and in health.

The graduate program places a unique emphasis on interprofessional practice and patient-family perspectives. In doing so, it stresses the importance of health care

professionals working together as equal team members with one common goal, while ensuring patient’s and family’s voices are heard throughout the continuum of care.

Curriculum is composed of required courses as well as electives to support student goals and interests of improving care throughout health care systems. The curriculum’s framework is based on quality improvement competencies in health care quality: data sets, measurement, analysis, improvement science, change management, leadership and more. Course content will also stress themes of population health, ethics, social justice, leadership, patient experience,

interprofessionalism and creativity.

Beginning Fall 2019, Misericordia will deliver the courses primarily in a seven-week block schedule via an asynchronous on-line format to support the flexibility required by adult learners. Students can work toward the advanced degree in full- or part-time formats, and can earn their master’s degree in as little as two years.

In addition, an 18-credit post baccalaureate certificate is available in the Healthcare Analytics program. Students also can apply the credits earned through completion of the certificate program to the requirements for the master’s degree.

TEACHER EDUCATION

AMERICAN EDUCATION WEEK

In November, the Teacher Education Department celebrated American Education Week! This year's theme was "Celebrate STEM!". Throughout the week of November 12th, **Dr. Duffy** and several TED students facilitated STEM activities for school-aged children in the community.

Events included the "Fall into STEM Expo" at the Back Mountain Library in Dallas and "Family STEM Night" at Dan Flood Elementary school in Wilkes-Barre. At the library, approximately 20 school-aged children participated in interactive STEM learning centers that were planned and facilitated by TED students, under the direction of Dr. Colleen Duffy.

At Dan Flood, 150 elementary students traveled from learning center to learning

center. As they successfully completed the STEM activity at each center, students earned a stamp in their STEM passport. Students who earned enough stamps were treated to a free pizza dinner. TED students and Dr. Duffy were part of a team of educators and students from local high schools and colleges that collaborated in the planning and facilitation of the event. Special thanks to the Wyoming Valley Library Association for providing the STEM learning kits that were used by MU students at both events.

FACULTY AND STUDENT PRESENTATIONS

Dr. Steve Broskoske co-presented a two-hour workshop at the Pennsylvania Association of Colleges and Teacher Educators (PAC-TE) Teacher Education Assembly on October 31, 2018. The workshop was entitled, "Strategies that Employ Different Levels of Technology and Hands-on Materials to Differentiate Instruction." The session was co-presented by **Dr. William Yerger** from Eastern University. The researchers presented specific high tech, low tech, and no tech teaching strategies that can be employed in the K-12 classroom environment. The strategies, based on brain-based learning principles derived from neuroscience, can be used to differentiate learning to the unique needs of individual learners.



Dr. Loughlin and **Dr. Brague**, TED faculty, recently presented their research at the Pennsylvania Council for Exceptional Children conference held in Harrisburg, PA on October 4, 2018. The title of their presentation was "Collaboration and Effective Differentiated Instruction". This presentation focused on collaboration and effective differentiated instruction between two methods courses, Math Methods and Reading Methods, in designing a course project: Learning Centers. Their session focused on **Carolyn Tomlinson's** concept of responsive teaching using flexible grouping and the three integral elements of differentiation: content, process and products. Three senior level preservice teachers, **Katelynn Taylor**, **Ashley Johnson**, and **Alle Stefanides**, presented their learning centers and reflected on the value of collaboration and the differentiation of activities within the learning centers to meet their students' needs.

CLUB 8 - AFTERSCHOOL STEM CAMP AT GOOD SHEPHERD ACADEMY

This year, 55 third through fifth graders participated in the pilot year of Club 8, an afterschool STEM program run at Good Shepherd Academy in Kingston, PA. The program is a collaborative effort between the four Catholic institutions: Misericordia University, King's College, University of Scranton and Marywood University, and the Diocese of Scranton. **Lisa Orf** the diocesan educational technologist partnered with TED's **Dr. Colleen Duffy** and **Dr. Sunny Weiland** from King's to create and implement the 10-week program in both the fall and spring semesters. The goal is to eventually offer the program in all Catholic k-12 schools in Luzerne and Lackawanna counties in partnership with the Catholic institutions. Student volunteers **Ashley Johnson**, **Marena Horan**, **Patrick Joyce** and **Karley May** facilitated the STEM explorations along with their collaborative peers from King's College.



TEACHER EDUCATION

SERVICE LEARNING

TED early childhood/special education majors who were enrolled in Cultural Awareness during the 2018-19 academic year tutored at Dan Flood Elementary School on Wednesdays after school. Approximately one third of the 4th and 5th grade students being tutored in literacy and math skills are bilingual students. Teachers and guidance counselors at the school identify those students who are most in need, and MU students typically tutor two or three students in a small group setting to meet the high need for this service. This program is led by TED faculty, **Dr. Susan Tomascik** and **Mr. John Faust** and is

in its 17th year.

TED's middle-level or secondary students were paired with eighth grade students at Wyoming Valley West Middle school to serve as mentors and role models. At the request of the principal, **Ms. Deborah Troy**, the TED partners with WVW to provide an on-site mentoring program that moves beyond "homework help" to focus on building a relationship with their students, many of which are considered at-risk and referred for the service by teachers, counselors, and other school staff. This program is led by TED faculty, Dr. Susan Tomascik and is in its 4th year.

CHARITABLE ACTIVITIES


items which they packaged into shoe boxes. The boxes were then shipped to children living in extreme poverty around the world.

SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY

Glen Tellis, Ph.D, CCC-SLP, BCS-F and **Kathleen Scaler Scott, Ph.D, CCC-SLP, BCS-F** are the honored speakers for this year's Gabriel Bernabeo Distinguished Speaker Series to be held on May 10, 2019. Dr. Tellis is Professor and Chair of the Speech-Language Pathology Department and Dr. Scaler Scott is Associate Professor in the Department. Dr. Tellis and Dr. Scaler Scott are two of 150 Board Certified Fluency Specialists in the world. In their presentation, "Real Life Solutions to Working with Clients with Fluency Disorders," they will provide the busy speech-language pathologist with strategies and approaches determine the most practical and time efficient way to evaluate clients with fluency



disorders. Throughout the day, specific cases in stuttering, cluttering, atypical disfluency, and fluency plus concomitant disorder will be followed.

During the 2018 American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA) Convention in Boston, Massachusetts, a

research poster presented by **Emily Gurtizen, Katrina Giacumbo, Bailey Hartung, Taylor Header, Jenna Reed, Lisa Giuffre, and Kayla Thorpe**, supervised by Kathleen Scaler Scott, Ph.D., CCC-SLP was one of 51 submissions to receive the "Meritorious Poster" recognition. Impressively, their poster was chosen out 2,122 posters at the convention. Their study, "Discourse Analysis in Adults with Cluttering: Implications for Language vs. Executive Functioning," examined the efficiency of communication in people who clutter.

On April 16th, the Speech-Language Pathology Department partnered with Misericordia University's Chapter of the National Student Speech-Language Hearing Association and the Northeastern Pennsylvania Chapter of the National Stuttering Association to screen the

documentary, "When I Stutter." Professors **Glen Tellis, Ph.D, CCC-SLP, BCS-F** and **Kathleen Scaler Scott, Ph.D, CCC-SLP, BCS-F**, Kyle Pelkey a 2018 graduate of the SLP program and person who stutters, **Ashley Johnson** a fourth-year Teacher Education student and person who stutters,

and **Cara Imbalzano** a first-year graduate student in the SLP program lead a discussion panel. Students from the SLP and teacher education department, professors, and community members attended the event.

SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY

Samantha Buldo, 2018 graduate of Misericordia University's speech-language pathology program, was awarded the Von Drach Memorial Scholarship at the 2018 Pennsylvania Speech-Language Hearing Association Convention last April. The Von Drach Memorial Scholarship is awarded annually to one student studying speech-language pathology or audiology from Pennsylvania who has demonstrated participation in professional activities, a desire to grow professionally, and leadership qualities.



This fall, **Tara O'Neill**, Ph.D., CCC-SLP was welcomed as a faculty member to the Speech-Language Pathology Department. Dr. O'Neill obtained all three of her degrees at Penn State University, including her undergraduate, graduate, and doctoral degrees. Dr. O'Neill worked at the Delaware County Intermediate Unit as a school-based speech-language pathologist after graduating with her Master's degree in speech-language pathology in 2012. She returned to Penn State to pursue her

research doctorate and graduated in the spring of 2018. During her first semester as a professor at Misericordia University, Dr. O'Neill taught all levels of students, ranging from first-year students in the Introduction to Communication Disorders course to graduate students in their online Comprehensive Seminar.



During the summer and fall of 2018, 10 students and two faculty presented research at international conferences. In June, **Cara Imbalzano**, **Jordan Seprosky**, and **Elizabeth Heinmiller** presented three papers in Rome, Italy at the 3rd International Conference on Stuttering under the mentorship of **Glen Tellis**, Ph.D, CCC-SLP, BCS-F. In July, **Emily Gurtizen**, **Katrina Giacumbo**, **Shea Williamsn**, **D'manda Price**, and **Cara Imbalzano** presented research studies at the Inaugural Joint World Congress of the International Cluttering Association (ICA), International Fluency Association (IFA), and International Stuttering Association (ISA) in Hiroshima, Japan with faculty members **Glen Tellis**, Ph.D, CCC-SLP, BCS-F and **Kathleen Scaler Scott**, Ph.D, CCC-SLP, BCS-F. **Brianna Spilsbury** and **Cara Imbalzano**, who conduct research under Glen Tellis, Ph.D, CCC-SLP, BCS-F and **Cari Tellis**, Ph.D, CCC-SLP, traveled to Tokyo, Japan to present their findings at the Biennial Meeting of the Society for Functional Near-Infrared Spectroscopy.

UNDERGRADUATE NURSING

WHITE COAT CEREMONY

The Department of Undergraduate Nursing at Misericordia University cloaked 63 nursing students who began the professional portion of the nursing program at the fourth annual **Arnold P. Gold Foundation** and American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN) White Coat Ceremony for Nursing in Lemmond Theater in Walsh Hall on October 21, 2018.

Students in the traditional and part-time evening academic programs began the professional portion of the program in the fall semester. An international nonprofit, the Gold Foundation established the ceremony in 1993 as a way to welcome new students into the profession of medicine and to underscore the importance of humanistic and patient-centered health care.

At the Misericordia University White Coat Ceremony, family and friends, as well as faculty and administration watched as 50 traditional students and 13 part-time evening nursing students took an oath that acknowledges their essential role as caregivers, with an emphasis on the Religious Sisters of Mercy's charisms of Mercy, Service, Justice and Hospitality. Students also received white coats and lapel pins that feature the Gold Foundation's logo, a stethoscope in the shape of a heart surrounded by the words, "humanism in medicine," to remind them that compassion and empathy must be the hallmark of their clinical practice.

John W. Mullen, R.N., A.D.N., P.H.R.N., C.F.R.N., a registered nurse in a cardiac intensive care unit, delivered the keynote address. Mullen began his career in health care as an orderly, while he continued his

education in nursing. Through the years, he has worked in various roles in the nursing profession, including 15 years as a flight nurse with the Geisinger Medical Center's Life Flight program. He is currently a registered nurse in a cardiac intensive care unit.

Undergraduate Nursing Program expands to Pittsburgh

MISERICORDIA STARTS A SATELLITE ACCELERATED BACHELOR IN NURSING IN PITTSBURGH

The nationwide nursing shortage is expected to hit critical levels over the next decade, Pittsburgh included. To help meet this demand, Misericordia University is expanding its nursing program to offer a new accelerated path to a Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) degree beginning in August. With a new nursing learning center near Pittsburgh, Misericordia University's Department of Nursing will offer a 16-month Accelerated Bachelor of Science in Nursing (ABSN) program, building upon the University's nearly century-long tradition of graduating nurses.

The ABSN program allows qualified students to leverage their prior non-nursing education

to earn a BSN in as little as 16 months. Through a mix of online coursework, onsite lab and simulation lab experiences at a new nursing learning center in Robinson Township, and clinical rotations at Allegheny Health Network health care facilities in the Pittsburgh area, students will gain real-world experience working as part of a multidisciplinary health care team. Three start times a year will allow additional flexibility for beginning the program.

Pittsburgh's health care sector is a prime destination for registered nurses because of the rapidly aging baby-boomer population and retirement wave of registered nurses. In fact, the city anticipates a projected growth

rate of 13 percent a year in the nursing profession between 2015 and 2025, according to a 2016 Pittsburgh Business Times report. "As an integrated medical system and provider in Pittsburgh, we at the Allegheny Health Network understand the benefit a baccalaureate educated nurse can have in our hospitals to impact outcomes for patient care and look forward to welcoming Misericordia University nursing students into our facilities to complete their clinical education," said **Dr. Paula Coe**, vice president, nursing education and professional practice for Allegheny Health Network.



SIGMA THETA TAU NURSING HONOR SOCIETY INDUCTION

Twenty students in the Misericordia University Nursing Program were inducted into the Theta Phi Chapter of the Sigma Theta Tau International Honor Society of Nursing during an induction ceremony in Sandy and Marlene Insalaco Hall on November 4, 2018.

In order to be nominated for membership in the International Honor Society of Nursing, undergraduate nursing candidates must have completed at least one half of the nursing curriculum, maintained at least a 3.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale, and be ranked in the top 35 percent of the graduating class. 

NCLEX-RN PASS RATE EXCEEDS STATE AND NATIONAL AVERAGES

Misericordia University students who recently graduated from the Bachelor of Science degree program in nursing (BSN) achieved a pass rate higher than the state and national averages on the National Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN) for baccalaureate degree students. The NCLEX-RN was developed by the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN) to ensure the public's protection. In order to receive a license to practice, a nursing candidate must pass an examination that measures the competencies newly licensed, entry-level nurses have to perform safely and effectively, according to NCSBN.

Misericordia University BSN graduates achieved a 95-percent pass rate for first-time test takers between October 2017 and September 2018. Misericordia graduates exceeded the average national pass rate of 88.56 percent and the average pass rate in Pennsylvania of 92.84 for baccalaureate degree programs. Misericordia University NCLEX-RN test-takers also had the second highest pass rates of baccalaureate-degree programs in Luzerne and Lackawanna counties, according to NCSBN data.



DIAGNOSTIC MEDICAL SONOGRAPHY

CLASS OF 2019 - SUCCESS!

Seventeen Diagnostic Medical Sonography (DMS) students were recognized for their accomplishments at the Sonography Recognition Ceremony held March 10, 2019. Twelve students earned their Certificate of Completion and five will graduate with their Bachelor of Science in Diagnostic Medical Sonography on May 11, 2019. All seventeen students have successfully passed on the first attempt the American Registry of Diagnostic Medical Sonography national credentialing exams in Sonography Physics and Instrumentation (SPI) and Abdomen Sonography to earn the recognition of Registered Diagnostic Medical Sonographer (RDMS). Fifteen of the students have also successfully sat


and passed the Obstetrics and Gynecology specialty exam. At the time of this writing, over 100% of the graduates secured employment or graduate school transitioning to life-long learners and providers of healthcare services. Congratulations to all of the graduates!

SONOGRAPHY STUDENTS ATTEND NEPASU SPRING SYMPOSIUM

Fourteen DMS students attended the 2019 Spring Symposium sponsored by the Northeast Pennsylvania Society of Ultrasound (NEPASU). The students along with 50 sonographers were blessed by presentations on a variety of topics given by local and national speakers. 


