CARE Bill Update

Everyone is aware of the CARE bill (Consistency, Accuracy, Responsibility and Excellence in Medical Imaging and Radiation Therapy) that has been in existence for several years. The passing of the bill has been turbulent to say the least and often due to governmental prioritizations. There appears to be great support from many of our representatives recognizing that minimum standards must be set for imaging personnel who hold great responsibility for the safety of patients and accuracy of outcomes. This is not about a certified person be better than non-certified, but rather a unity of entry level knowledge and clinical practice standards. Through experience, knowledge is enhanced greatly, but it must start at an entry level.

On Friday (June 8), the House Energy & Commerce committee held a hearing on the CARE bill. After being notified the hearing was scheduled, SDMS submitted a request to be included on the witness list (those selected to present testimony). Unfortunately, we were not selected but we were able to submit our testimony through a committee member to be included as part of the hearing. There were only four organizations selected to be a part of the witness list from numerous requests. ASRT (American Society for Radiologic Technology and ASRTO (American Society for Radiation Oncology) were the only professional associations.

The hearing was very short, as far as hearings go...approximately 45 minutes. ASRT's Sal Martino spoke passionately and delivered key points regarding the CARE bill. Essentially from the meeting, no harm was done and hopefully, the bill will gain the momentum needed to continue. This hearing has been a long time coming...12 years, actually. The next step will be a request for a Bill mark-up along with movement to begin on the Senate side.

Accreditation Update

As we prepare in anticipation for our site visit in fall of 2012 or spring 2013, the program's advisory board and department faculty are reviewing both program and University goals to ensure that they are attainable and appropriate. One topic addressed is level of supervision. The two levels are direct and indirect.

Direct supervision refers to the sonographer working directly with the student to review the requested exam as well as patient condition to determine student knowledge and ability. The sonographer is in the room with the student and must review and approve images upon completion of the study for submission. This is best practice for students who have not completed a

1. Observing the student perform the examination or part of the examination and offering technical tips and protocol

2. Reviewing the images with the student after the examination and discussing pathology, pathophysiology, anatomy, differential diagnosis, expected clinical manifestations. technique or laboratory values of certain conditions.

Note: Time spent "in the room" with the student and not providing instruction is not considered educational and is not eligible for CME credit.

Indirect supervision refers to once the student meets the appropriate criteria to be deemed competent in a certain examination/ study, the sonographer is not required to be in the room with the student, however, must check images prior to dismissal of the patient from the department.
