11 Mercy Hall
You are in Mercy Hall, the first building constructed on the campus which opened in 1924. Known as the Administration Building, it was re-dedicated as Mercy Hall after extensive renovations in 2002. The building is home to the President's Office, the Admissions offices, the Center for Adult and Continuing Education, and the majestic University Chapel on the first floor. The lower level houses the Medical Imaging Department, Safety Services and Computer Services. The Academic Affairs and University Advancement departments are located on upper levels along with classrooms and faculty offices in the College of Arts and Sciences. (To proceed with the walking tour, take the Mercy Hall elevator to the lower level, go to your left and through the doors, pass Campus Safety, and exit the building toward the Science Building.)

12 Hafey-McCormick Science Building
is home to the faculty offices and laboratories of the sciences. The building offers the region's only human cadaver lab for undergraduates, used to teach gross anatomy in a number of majors including pre-med, physician assistant and physical therapy.

13 Sandy and Marlene Insalaco Hall
is a technologically-smart learning center that opened in 2009 providing classrooms, faculty offices and conference space. The \$7 million structure houses the Assistive Technology Research Institute, the renowned Pauly Friedman Art Gallery, the InterMetzo Café, a popular stop for quick meals and snacks, and a scenic lounge with window seating that overlooks the campus quadrangle.

14 Banks Student Life Center
is the social center of the campus offering the Mary and John Metz Dining Hall, the Cougars Den Café, the University Bookstore, Post Office, and Campus Ministry offices. It is here that you find the Student Activities and Student Affairs offices, the Cougar Radio Station, meeting space for the Student Government Association, clubs and organizations, and plenty of lounge space.

15 Glüden Hall
is a modern, air-conditioned residence hall with single, double and quadruple bedroom suites, each offering a common living area and full bath. This residence hall is popular with upperclassmen who want to live with a group of friends.

16 McGeehan Field
is a newly resurfaced turf field that in 2012 became the venue for men's and women's soccer, men's and women's lacrosse and field hockey. The Cougars softball diamond is nearby.

17 Townhouses
complex offers a community setting for upper classmen in residential units that each offer three bedrooms, two bathrooms, a common living room and full kitchen, complete with patio.

18 Entrance Arch
was built circa 1933 and is adorned by two unique cupolas. The arch was chosen as the school's logo when Misericordia achieved university status in 2007.

Lower campus

19 Facilities Building
houses the University's maintenance staff, Print Shop, and the Marketing Department's creative services team.

20 Rasmussen House/Rosary Hall
was a former broom factory at 181 Lake St., and since 2000, it offers bedrooms, a kitchen and community living space for single mothers and their children participating in the Women with Children Program.

21 President's House
at 130 Lake St. has been home to Misericordia leaders since the early 1990s and features spacious rooms, hardwood flooring, and is surrounded by lovely gardens.

22 Off campus houses
are managed by Residence Life staff at 120 and 179 Lake Street, providing a comfortable alternative to dorm style living. Usually home to upper class students, they offer spacious living quarters and the full amenities of a typical household.

23 John J. Passan Hall
at 100 Lake St. is the former headquarters of Commonwealth Telephone Company. Opened in 2010, it is a modern, air-conditioned residence hall with single, double and quadruple bedroom suites, each offering a common living area and full bath. This residence hall is popular with upperclassmen who want to live with a group of friends.

24 Anderson Sports and Health Center
includes Mangelsdorf Field, a turf football field surrounded by a six-lane synthetic track, that was recently renovated with new bleachers and lights to support the additional of football as a varsity sport in the fall of 2012. Also new in 2012, the \$4.4 million Metz Field House features state-of-the-art training rooms, locker rooms, and team meeting rooms. Tambur Field, the new home of Cougar baseball, is nearby.

25 McHale Hall
is a traditional dormitory-style residence hall, housing mostly first-year students in air-conditioned rooms that include a large closet, ample drawer space and a sink. The Fireside Lounge is a popular hangout offering a big screen TV and a full kitchen.

26 Anderson Sports and Health Center
is the university's home for varsity and recreational sports, and the campus Health and Wellness Center. Built in 1993, the 78,000-square-foot facility includes a six-lane NCAA competitive pool, a gym floor and synthetic track, an aerobics and dance studio, and a newly renovated fitness center. The lower level offers locker rooms, a sports injury center and three racquetball courts.

27 Mike and Tina MacDowell Hall
The newest residence facility on campus, this building was completed in summer 2012 and houses over 100 students in suite-style living. It also features two classrooms on the first floor.

28 Mary Kintz Bevevino Library
offers stacks for 90,000 volumes, study carrels, group study rooms and a video viewing room. It offers the Alden Trust Computer Teaching Laboratory, a high-tech classroom with a SMART Symptomium; and the Data Search Lab, plus micro-film viewer/printers and copy machines. The Catherine Evans McGowan Room, on the third floor, offers conference and meeting space, and one of the best views of the campus.

29 Geraldine Ruth Daley Anderson Bell Tower
If you're at the main entrance to the Bevevino Library, you're just about done with our tour. You should see The Geraldine Ruth Daley Anderson Bell Tower, with its carillon (bell system). You may even hear the bells playing. You can return to Mercy Hall's main lobby by using the Tower entrance and going up the steps.

the 37,000-square-foot facility houses the growing College of Health Sciences and includes "real-world" clinical laboratories for the departments of Physical Therapy (PT), Occupational Therapy, Speech-Language Pathology (SLP), and Nursing. Services are also provided to the public in outpatient clinics operated by the SPL and PT departments.

30 Pauly House
The Pauly House is the newest home for single mothers who are enrolled in the university's Women with Children Program and their children. Funded by the generosity of Pauly and her husband, Sidney Friedman, the renovation of the house at 62 Lake St. allowed the university to expand the program that provides free room and board to as many as 10 students and up to 20 children.

31 Art Studios
opened in 2011, it comprises two studios leased by the university in what was the former Richardson Dodge building at 50 Lake St. The studios provide opportunities for students and members of the community to take classes in painting, sculpture, drawing, and pottery taught by local artists.

32 Macell Avenue Residence Hall
is a 27-bed residence hall that opened in 2011 at 10 Macell Ave. in Dallas Borough. The facility was renovated to accommodate upper-division and graduate students, most of whom are health science students taking classes in nearby Passan Hall. It includes single, double, and triple rooms, plus a quad with a walk-out balcony. A shuttle service provides transportation to and from the upper campus.

Other Buildings and Landmarks on Upper Campus

33 Walsh Hall
is home to the renovated Lemmond Theater, a 650-seat venue that comes alive with numerous performances throughout the year. Walsh Hall also hosts the TV Studio, along with numerous faculty offices.

34 McAuley Hall
is home to the Insalaco Center for Career Development and numerous faculty offices for the College of Professional Studies and Social Sciences. McAuley Hall is connected to Mercy Hall by the Arcade, a picturesque glass-enclosed walkway.

35 Rosern Plaza
is located between Insalaco and Alumnae Halls and is one of the central gathering points of campus. The centerpiece of the plaza is Emerging, a four-piece abstract stone statue by sculptor Jay J. Dugan that symbolizes the growth of students during their college years.

36 Alumnae Hall
is a traditional style, residence hall popular with upperclassmen because of its close proximity to the Banks Student Life Center. The Student Success Center is located in the basement level providing academic and personal support, including a writing center and tutoring services.

37 Monsignor Andrew J. McGowan Hall
is a \$5.2 million residence hall that opened in 2008 and is home to 116 students in suite-style accommodations that consist of two double rooms connected by a semi-private bathroom. The University's Counseling and Psychological Service Center (CAPS) is located on the lower level.

38 Wells Fargo Amphitheater
was constructed in 1999 as an outdoor concert and theatrical venue for events such as the University's "Under The Stars" summer arts series.

39 Sr. Regina Kelly RSM Shakespeare Garden
was dedicated in 2010 in honor of the Shakespearean scholar and long-time member and chair of the Misericordia English Department. This Elizabethan Cottage Garden includes as many of the 278 plants
