Last spring, the library was pleased to announce the selection of the Center for Nursing History collection to be part of a grant funded project through Council of Independent Colleges (CIC) for digitization. The project uses Shared Shelf Commons, and

these materials will eventually be accessible through the Artstor database.

In September, Jessica Garner, Archivist, and Sameera Redkar, Head of Collection Resource Management, attended training at CIC in Washington, D.C. It was during this training that Jessica and Sameera learned what other options exist with Shared Shelf. The library can give faculty access to Shared Shelf to store and display their digital research. This research can range from images to sound files to film clips. Shared Shelf also gives faculty the flexibility to share their personal collection with an individual, class, or select audience, or by working with one of our librarians, faculty have the ability to share

their research collections through Artstor or other online publishing resources such as Wordpress.

You can browse the various collections that are available to the public at www.ssccommons.org. Here, you will find Bucknell University's World War II poster collection, the Brooklyn College Listening Project, and so much more! You will also notice that no collection is too small to use this valuable resource.

Jessica, Sameera, and Jenn Luksa, Director of Library Services, shared information about Shared Shelf at college meetings this past November and December. National Library Week, April 10-16

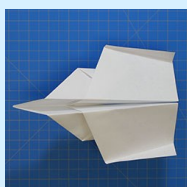
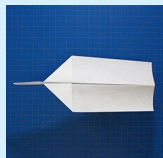

Roya Fahmy is a current instructor of Global Studies and an International Consultant to Kings College in Wilkes Barre, PA. Roya grew up in New York City, and Syracuse

NY before moving to Dallas, PA. She is the eldest daughter of Dr. Mahmoud Fahmy and Mrs. Iran Fahmy. The dinner table conversations with mom, dad, brother Raef and sister Randa were conducted in multiple languages and were often about social justice, world politics, culture, and travel.

While attending Dallas Middle School and High School and Wilkes University, Roya traveled to Asia, Africa, and Europe. She graduated from Wilkes University with a B.A. in Communications and ultimately from the University of Maryland with a self-designed Masters in Global Social Work.

Roya had lived in New York City and in Los Angeles during the riots of 1992, and in Washington D.C. during 9/11. These experiences led her to form her own international consulting company call "Visions of Tolerance." The

goal of Visions of Tolerance is to promote conflict resolution and multicultural understanding amongst youth from warring areas of the world. Visions has consulted with the White House, the U.S Department of State, the Ministries of Education of Israel and the Arab world, as well as churches, synagogues, mosques, and houses of worship around the United States.

In 2015, Roya received a grant to travel to Brazil to create a pipeline of International Education for the University of Fortaleza' UNIFOR in northeast Brazil. While in Brazil, Roya began to understand the integration of social justice and social responsibility in the fabric of Brazilian society. Roya is honored to speak about social justice and social responsibility in the U.S. and Brazil.

Featured Database: Nursing Reference Center Plus

Nursing Reference Center™ Plus

The library has acquired access to an exciting database, Nursing Reference Center Plus. NRC Plus is an evidence based, point-of-care resource designed to specifically support nurse clinicians, students and educators. With an emphasis on point-of-care, this database has a downloadable app that can be used with both Android and Apple phones, so that you take it with you, wherever you go. It is free of cost to the Misericordia community. The database also integrates with many hospital ERM systems, so students have the opportunity to become familiar with the same content that they may find in the workplace. As a desktop application through Misericordia, the NRC Plus database is designed to search both the CINAHL Complete and Medline databases simultaneously, making it the ultimate nursing resource.

Content is broken out and searchable in seven distinctive areas: Diseases, Skills, Drugs, Management, Patient Education, Continuing Education and an eBook library. Several

unique nursing oriented content formats can be retrieved such as Quick Lessons, Evidence Based Care Sheets, Care Plans, Patient Handouts, Skill Sheets, Images, Videos and more.

A Quick Lesson will bring you up to speed on an unfamiliar topic and provide references to the content. Evidence Based Care Sheets provide a summary of the best evidence and ranks that evidence so that you know the strength of each recommendation. When available, full-text links to references are provided from a variety of sources, such as articles found within the CINAHL database. Skill sheets provide step by step checklists to achieve competency, many of which are enhanced with slow-motion video guidance. The eBook library provides drug information from both Davis's Drug Guide for Nurses and AHFS Drug Information Essentials.

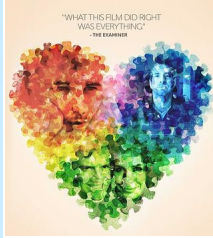

What's Not to Love about *Autism in Love*?

Autism in Love, one of the highlights of the 2015 Tribeca Film Festival, is also a new part of the DVD collection at the Mary Kintz Bevevino Library. Directed by Matt

Fuller, this documentary chronicles the lives and loves of four adults on the autism spectrum: Lenny, anxious about yet yearning for a romantic relationship in his life; Lindsey and Dave, dating for eight years and living together near Washington, D.C.; and Stephen, a postal worker married for 20 years. Through all their anxiety, confusion, and fear, the individuals featured in *Autism in Love* demonstrate the innate desire of all people to love and be loved in turn.

This eye-opening documentary moves fluidly between interviews with each individual and their circumstances in love. For instance, we learn from Lenny that his romantic relationship experience is very limited to one past girlfriend and was not necessarily a healthy experience. He begins to spiral in a series of depressive, self-defeating conversations about his fear of reckless behavior in romance and sexual relationships. As he continues to feel down, he has difficulty in pursuing a dating relationship with “no job, no car, and living with his parents.”

Lindsey and Dave, on the other hand, have dated for eight years when the film begins. As

a conference presenter (Lindsey) and a meteorologist (Dave), the “antenna” that seems to guide romantic partners is something of a challenge for both individuals. Although Lindsey in particular shares her experiences of “pressure to fit into a social norm” as a person with autism, she becomes a “good actress” in presenting herself. Dave, on the other hand, creates a scientific equation where Love = Looks (L) + Personality (P) + 2xTreatment (T) in his pursuit of a partner, and where Marriage = 60% practical + 40% Emotional quotients. In each other, they find love without total understanding.

As Stephen’s story unfolds, his love for his wife Geeta, is immediately obvious. Although they are forced to live separately due to Geeta’s cancer diagnosis and treatment, Stephen’s routine remains steady as he is shown visiting his parents for meals, watching Jeopardy!, and working behind the scenes as a postal worker. He visits Geeta routinely and as they ask each other about their day and favorite colors, as clips from their wedding video are played behind their dialogue.

As the booming population of young adults with autism diagnoses reach adulthood, *Autism in Love* is a comforting reminder that while it is cliché to say “all you need is love,” the struggle to find – and keep – love is often taken for granted. This documentary shares the superhuman challenges and its victories for four individuals on the autism spectrum.

Truly a must-see!

ILL and E-ZBorrow

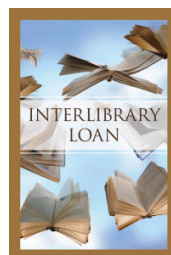

Welcome to the library interlibrary loan system.

We have two loan programs at our library. The links are on the website under the Services Tab: click on Interlibrary Loan and that will take you to the page with information about both systems. E-ZBorrow is a program associated with Pennsylvania Academic Library consortium, Inc. and gives our students, faculty, and staff, access to books at over 60 libraries throughout Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey, and West Virginia. To access this service, click on the E-ZBorrow icon on the interlibrary loan page, and patrons use their student ID to enter the system E-ZBorrow to search for books from within E-ZBorrow. Libraries lend books to our patrons, but not videos, e-books, or journal articles. To request articles or videos, our patrons can use the ILLiad system via the same webpage. To gain access to ILLiad, click on the ILLiad icon on the interlibrary loan page. Patrons will use their MyMU user name and password at the prompt on the opening page of the ILLiad system. If a patron has not used the

ILLiad system before, the first time user page will come up and the patron will be prompted to enter information on that page first. We just need some contact information since some libraries do not lend to MU and may charge for filling requests for articles or books, in which case we need to contact a patron to see if they are willing to pay for an item. There is a question on the ILL request form about willingness to pay, but sometimes this question is ignored and we must wait to get in touch with a patron to confirm. This is only an issue with the ILLiad system, as all participating libraries in the PALCI E-ZBorrow system are reciprocal with MU. Using both of these systems provides access for our patrons to resources for research and leisure reading that enhances and supports the educational pursuits of our campus community.
