The History of The McGowan Room

The Catherine Evans McGowan Center (The McGowan Room) is located on the third floor of the Bevevino Library. The center commemorates Catherine Evan McGowan, who was known for her devotion to the profession of education, for her commitment to her family, and for her work in the community of Ashley.

Catherine Evans McGowan, the daughter of Irish immigrants, grew up in the Newton section of Hanover Township. A graduate of Bloomsburg University, she taught school for ten years in the Mocanaqua and Hanover Township school systems, where she was renowned as an excellent teacher of reading and spelling. Catherine was also known as a teacher, who instilled a love of learning in her students.

In 1923 she married Andrew J.

McGowan, a resident of the Preston section of Hanover Township. Andrew McGowan was a first lieutenant in the United States Army and later, a railroad engineer in the Central Railroad of New Jersey. The couple settled in Ashley and there, raised five children: Lenore McGowan Rosica, who graduated from College Misericordia in 1944; Andrew J. McGowan, Jr., now Monsignor Andrew McGowan of the Diocese of Scranton and a former chair of the Board of Trustees at Misericordia, and presently trustee emeritus; William G. McGowan, deceased, founder of MCI, Inc. and a business leader; Thomas J. McGowan, a sales representative in Kansas City, Kansas; and Leo McGowan, deceased, co-proprietor of Schmitt Electric Company of Ashley. Catherine and Andrew had fifteen grandchildren; the family now has more than 20 great grandchildren.

In addition to caring for her family, Catherine was active in her community, serving as an officer in the Railroad Engineer's Auxiliary, and also serving as a volunteer for the American Red Cross, and St. Leo's Parish.

The 1,600 square foot McGowan Center, containing the latest in communication and multi-media equipment, is used for teleconferences, satellite conferences, seminars, and other activities. A built-in projection screen and white board, televisions, telephones, podium, and audio-visual systems, complete the conference space in the center, which has the capacity to seat up to 100 people.

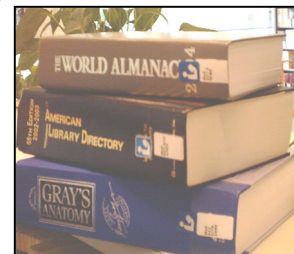

Getting to know the Library's Electronic Databases

Beginning in this issue of the library's newsletter, and continuing in subsequent issues, we will be introducing readers to the library's electronic databases. We will explore two databases at a time, providing readers with an understanding of what each database may be used for.

In this issue, we will be looking at two Humanities databases – MLA International Bibliography (a Literary database) and Poesis (a Philosophy database).

MLA International Bibliography Database

The MLA (Modern Language Association) International Bibliography database is one of several databases that the library subscribes to through EBSCOhost Publishing. EBSCO is a vendor that provides specialized products and services for libraries, corporations and other organizations.

The MLA database, is produced by the Modern Language Association. This association promotes the study and teaching of language and literature. The database provides indexing of journal articles, books and

dissertations, along with some full-text content, covering subjects including *literature, language and linguistics, folklore, literary theory & criticism and the dramatic arts*. The database provides indexing for articles dating back to 1896 and is international in scope.

Examples of titles offered in MLA International Bibliography include: *Journal of International Folklore, Journal of English and German Philology, Journal of Linguistics, Journal of Popular Film and Television, Language and Communication, Language Teaching Research, Modern Language Journal, etc.*

POESIS Database

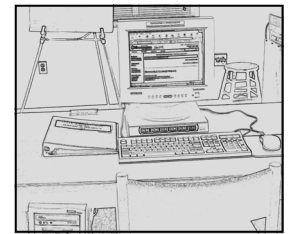
POESIS is one of a few electronic databases that the library does not subscribe to through EBSCO Publishing. This Philosophy database, a product of InteLEX and the Philosophy Documentation Center, provides searchable access to many philosophy articles, book reviews and dissertation listings. Indexed titles offered in POESIS include *Journal of Philosophy*, *Philosophical Topics*, *The Philosophical Review*, *Philosophy & Theology*, *Philosophy in the Contemporary World* and *Teaching Philosophy*.

Aside from this feature, the library's subscription of POESIS does allow users to access *full-text* documents from five philosophy journals which the library owns in print form, namely: *American Catholic Philosophical Quarterly*, *Business and Professional Ethics*, *International Philosophical Quarterly*, *Proceedings of the ACPA (American Catholic Philosophical Association)*, and *Professional Ethics*.

Users wishing to access the above mentioned databases off campus may do so by way of any internet connected computer. Off campus access does require the use of a Username and Password which may be obtained from the Reference Department staff.

The Beagle Virus

The Beagle (or Bagle) worm has been unleashed yet again, and it's spreading across the campus email system quickly. Though it won't necessarily damage your PC, it will pilfer your hard drive for email addresses, potentially harvesting them for spammers bent on selling the data to other email marketers.

This virus started rearing its ugly head in the beginning of the year and was called 32.Beagle.A@mm and caused widespread mayhem. As the case here at College Misericordia, the worm arrives from a friend or coworkers e-mail

cleverly called Joke or Price.

When the email is executed, it scans the system for files with the extensions .wab, .txt, .htm, and .html. It looks for email addresses within these files and then emails itself to the addresses. The worm won't send itself to addresses with the following domain names: @.r1, @hotmail.com, @msn.com, @microsoft.com, @avp.com.

Other than replicating itself and infecting others, Beagle does not run an immediately damaging script. Beagle has now spread around the world, according to

antivirus specialists. Symantec rated the virus as a three on its five-point scale, and rival McAfee called Bagle.AI a medium threat.

Combined Health Information Database (CHID)

CHID is a cooperative effort among several Federal agencies. Recognizing the need for a single source of health information, the participating agencies combined their information files into one database which is now CHID. Topics covered include AIDS, Alzheimer's, Diabetes, Maternal and Child Health, and many others.

Developed by the U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services, this site links to carefully selected information and Web sites from over 1,700 health-related organizations. Included are a health library, health topics geared toward a particular population group, a directory of health organizations, government agencies, websites, universities, non-profits and clearing houses.

A medical and health information resource containing a database of health articles and reference materials, Allrefer.com – Health has extensive information on over 4,000 topics including diseases, tests, symptoms, injuries, surgeries, nutrition, poisons, and special topics.
