
Welcome Back! Welcome Back! Welcome Back!



Library Converts from Dewey to Library of Congress

Over the past year, the library staff, with the help of library work-study students, has been converting the call numbers on the books and DVDs from Dewey Decimal to Library of Congress. Most students probably will not notice the change, but some faculty may notice that their subject areas are not in the same location as before. For example, most of the library's history book collection was on the third floor, but now, most of that collection has been relocated to the first floor because of the changes in the call numbers. The reasoning for the change in call number classification is that Library of Congress is considered to be "more academic"; whereas, Dewey Decimal is seen as more "public" or "school" library.

By the time classes begin in August, the majority of the conversion will be complete. However, there are some titles that did not convert during the initial process. The books with Dewey call numbers are currently housed on the second floor. These titles will be converted manually by the Technical Services staff. This portion of the project will probably take another year to complete.

Library signage will be updated to reflect the changes. As always, if you cannot find a book on the shelf, library staff members at either the Circulation Desk on the first floor or the Reference Desk on the second floor are more than willing to assist you.



LibChat Arrives at Mary Kintz Bevevino Library By David Marks

In July of this year, the chat program that the library uses to communicate with the Misericordia community was discontinued. Meebo was purchased by Google, and as of the middle of July, the service was no longer available to all Meebo users. After evaluating several chat program options, the library decided to migrate to LibChat.

LibChat is a program created by Springshare. Currently, the library uses LibGuides as well as LibAnswers to assist in delivering reference tools to the Misericordia community. Both LibGuides and LibAnswers are accessible through the library's webpage. Since all of these products are created by Springshare, there is a seamless integration in the delivery of services. For example, the new LibChat software is available from the library's home page but also from every LibGuide that is accessible from a computer or other Internet device.

This integration ensures that resources can be pushed to the end user, such as a web address or another part of a LibGuide that has the answer needed to respond to a virtual reference question. The chat software also enables multiple users to be able to access the software. For example, two users can contact the Reference Desk with simultaneous chat sessions, and questions can be directed to specific LibGuide authors all at the same time. Lib-Chat also enables a librarian to store and provide information that can be used to respond to library customers in a timely fashion, such as the hours of the library or the paths to various

LibChat is user-friendly. Students will find it easy to connect to the system once they click on the LibChat link located on the library's homepage. LibChat is also unique in that it works with Flash- and non-Flash-supported devices. LibChat can be accessed using a PC, Mac, or any handheld device. Another nice feature of LibChat is that the transcript of each chat session is available to each chat user. Library users can also email the transcript to themselves with one click after the chat session has ended. Library users do not have to rely on the library staff to email it to them. For statistics, the library is able to obtain quick stats detailing when the system is being used the most. Patrons can also rate the software and the system, thereby ensuring that the system is most effectively optimized to assist our users, due to the feedback library users are able to provide.

All students and other Misericordia community members are encouraged to try out and use this software. LibChat will be available and monitored every hour that the library is open. When the library is not open, users who access the program will receive a message stating when the library will be open again. Users will also receive a message stating the time frame when their question will be answered. Please take a moment this semester to try out this new service. Our mission trip to Peru in May, 2012 was an amazing immersion experience into the culture, landscape, and economic background of the country. We departed with all of the technology that we NEEDED to survive: iPhones, iPads, and iPods. Prior to departure, I borrowed an iPad from the library and was excited to have the device for a week. My intention was to keep up with my e-mails, read a book review on the plane ride, and familiarize myself with some of the other features on the device.

On one of our daily outings, we found ourselves in a poor section of Nuevo Chimbote. The "projects," as they were called, were tiny homes with poor sanitation and no running water. We helped with some painting at this site, and as we were painting, some of the children from the area gathered to watch us. We started playing games with the children, and I took the iPad out to take some pictures. They laughed at the pictures of themselves and were amazed by the animations and games on the device. The children had obviously never seen an iPad, and their expressions of wonder and awe were priceless! For a short time, the fact that we did not speak the same language did not matter.

How about 95 databases, containing 45,070 unique journal titles and more than 8,500,000 articles for you to access online to do research; 103 computers for student use, including 40 laptops for in-house use; and 10 iPads that circulate for a week at a time? Of course, we are constantly adding to the collection of over 80.000 books and 2.200 DVDs available for you to check out. Our dedicated staff can help you find whatever you are looking for, even if you are not completely sure yourself! Searching the stacks may be overwhelming, especially as we transition from Dewey to the Library of Congress Classification System, but we are happy to be of assistance. Did you ever see the scene at the end of Indiana Jones and the *Raiders of the Lost Ark*, when they file the ark in that huge warehouse? We know where to find the ark if that's what you're looking for!

In Access Services, we've upgraded the E-ZBorrow interlibrary loan system for improved functionality and increased the loan period to seven weeks, with the opportunity for a seven-week renewal. This will allow plenty of time to complete that research paper. ILLiad's new enhancements will include mobile web pages that allow users to access their ILLiad accounts via iPhone or Android. We added new wireless mice and headphones, and all photocopy machines are now located on the second floor for your convenience. So, stop in and see all that awaits you this year at the library!

News from the Archives

The Center for Nursing History of Northeastern Pennsylvania was established at Misericordia University to give voice to area nurses past, present and future, and to recognize the impact of regional nurses and nursing on the history of Northeastern Pennsylvania. To accomplish these goals, the Center began collecting nursing history, historical artifacts and memorabilia in 2005. Those first collected items were the foundation of the Center for Nursing History Collection, which is housed in the Library's Sister Mary Carmel McGarigle Archives. To highlight the growth of the Center, and the Center's special collection, an exhibit was held in the Pauly Friedman Art Gallery in Misericordia's Insalaco Hall. The exhibit was entitled "The History and Impact

of Nursing Education in Luzerne County 1887 -2012" and focused on the 125-year evolution and legacy of nursing and nursing education in the context of the historical development of Luzerne County. The exhibit included uniforms, photographs, narratives, and artifacts that provided a visual evolution of nursing education. The opening reception was held on Sunday, May 6, National Nurses Day, and nearly 500 students, staff, faculty, and community members came out to learn about the history of nursing education. The exhibit ran from May 6, 2012 to June 29, 2012. Computers on Campus



As some of you may have already noticed, the computers on campus have changed. The modems have been replaced by a Virtual Terminal. This is connected to a Virtual Desktop. You will need to sign in using your email user name and password. Next, you will click on "connect." This will bring you to a screen that gives you different locations, where you will click on Library. This tells the computer which printer it is going to use.

To save your work, you can save to the desktop and email it to yourself, or use a flashdrive in the USB port on the side of the terminal.

Nothing will be saved on the desktop or in the document folder.

When you have finished working, you will log out, and the computer will refresh itself to the original settings. If the computer is not actively used, it will log out automatically.

When printing, your print job will go directly to the Pcounter, where you will enter just your password. All computers are defaulted to single-sided. Double-sided printing can be chosen in the preferences. Double-sided will count as two pages. The paper allotment has also decreased to 300 sheets per semester. If you need any assistance, you may ask anyone at the Reference Desk.

Book Review: Flashpoint By Jacob Garner

Waking up one morning, Barry Allen (the identity of the Flash, the fastest human alive), realizes that his powers are gone, along with the rest of the world that he knew. Superman and the Justice League don't exist; Batman kills as often the villains do; and the world is being torn apart by various factions. Using what knowledge he still has about the world he came from, Barry Allen must gather the few heroes who remain and try to find a way to change the universe back to the way it was.

For those of you who are not frequent comic book readers, you may have read in the news in August 2011 that DC Comics was "relaunching" its universe. All titles got rolled back to #1, with the DC Comics, Vertigo, and Wildstorm universes all combined into a single universe. Flashpoint is the crossover event that led to this relaunch of "The New 52" (referring to the number of titles that DC will publish on a regular basis). I'd recommend checking this title out; the artwork is incredible, and the story is action-packed, with new twists on your favorite heroes. As the tagline states, everything you know will change in a FLASH!




throughout the building. Please *bee* considerate and help keep our building clean.
