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#### Library Adds New Databases and Journal Finder **By Joan Pastorelli**

The Reference Staff is looking forward to the start of the Fall semester and assisting you with your research needs. We are pleased to announce the addition of several new databases:

**CINAHL Plus with Full Text** provides full-text for many nursing journals

Article First is a multidisciplinary database with full-text from many journals

ECO (Electronic Collections Online) provides links to online journals with some full-text article availability

Philosopher's Index provides indexing for scholarly journals in philosophy

LexisNexis Academic is a fulltext multidisciplinary database for over 5000 news, legal, business, and interdisciplinary publications

Wilson Select Plus provides full-text to over 2000 journals in the humanities, sciences, and social sciences

WorldCat is a catalog of holdings from libraries around the world

• Wiley Interscience provides full-text to journals primarily in the sciences and social sciences

Historical Newspapers includes full-text and full-images to the historical New York Times, the Wall Street Journal, the Washington Post, and the Hartford Courant.

World Dissertations and Thesis includes abstracts of dissertations and theses cataloged in World Cat. To access databases from the library homepage

(www.misericordia.edu/library), go to Research, then Research Databases.

To see if the library owns a journal or has full-text access through one of the databases, use Journal Finder. Simply enter the title of the journal in the search box. The results will indicate whether the library has a print subscription of the journal or will provide links to the appropriate database. You can also browse through the A-Z list or search for journals by discipline. Journal Finder should be your first step in locating journal title information.

The Reference staff is pleased to welcome all new and returning students for the Fall semester of 2006. We have a variety of services and resources to help you with your research papers and other course assignments.

#### FAQs (Frequently Asked Questions) about Reference Services:

#### Where do I go to for help with my class assignment?

The Reference Desk, which is located on the second floor of the library, is where you would go for help with any class assignment. Reference staff members are more than willing to provide you with the assistance you need. We do offer one-on-one instruction, as well, to help familiarize you with all our resources. Your professor might also bring your class over to us for a library instruction session.

#### What reference materials are available to help me complete my assignments, and where can I find them?

The second floor of the library also houses the Reference books collection, where you may find encyclopedias, dictionaries and other books that would help you with gathering background information on your topic or for obtaining quick, easily accessible information on a particular topic. There are also online reference resources that you may access from our library webpage at <u>www.misericordia.edu/library</u>. Please ask a Reference staff member for assistance.

#### Where will I be able to search for articles for my research paper?

You may search for articles by using our databases and other online resources such as electronic journals. These may be accessed from our library webpage at <u>www.misericordia.edu/library</u>. Click on "Research." Then go to "Journal Finder" or "Databases." Since there are several to choose from, please ask a Reference staff member for assistance.

#### Is there a computer lab in the library where I can do my research and write my papers?

Yes, the computer lab or Data Search Lab is on the second floor of the library. You may use the computers to look up articles and other research materials as well as to work on your assignments.

#### Where would we go if we have a group study session?

There is a group study room on the second floor of the library. You may reserve this room ahead of time by contacting the Reference Desk, or just sign your name on the sign up sheet on the door when you are using the room.

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### Saving the Past for the Future

What is an Archives? Often Archives are mistakenly thought of as a secret vault where old documents are locked away. Archives continually change, grow, and represent the history, mission and evolution of an institution and its community. The Sister Mary Carmel McGarigle Archives is open to the public Monday through Friday, and is located on the third floor of College Misericordia's Mary Kintz Bevevino Library.

The purpose of the Archives is to collect, organize, preserve, protect, and make available for research, information and materials which record and describe the history of College Misericordia, and the college's founders and continuing sponsors, the Sisters of Mercy. The Archives was established in 1990 and has grown as a result of donations made by students, alumni, employees and friends of College Misericordia. The Archives collects photographs, files, correspondence, promotional materials, audio/visual recordings, newspapers, and information relative to all College Misericordia functions from 1924 to the present. The Archives has over 50,000 photographs and collections, including information about the 1972 Agnes Flood. All collections are catalogued using the library online catalog, www.misericordia.edu/ library. You can view archival displays throughout the library and in other buildings on campus. Archival collections are valuable resources that can be used for projects and to conduct research. The Archives offers many services, including photographic duplication, scanning and digitization, photocopying, and preparing presentations, displays, and exhibits.

The Sister Mary Carmel McGarigle Archives works in collaboration with the Luzerne County Historical Society and the Back Mountain Historical Association to collect photographs and history of the Back Mountain (www.backmountain.org). The Archives houses the Center for Nursing History at College Misericordia, which collects photographs, information and memorabilia about nursing education in Northeastern Pennsylvania.
