

## LOGOS Student Behavior Code

The LOGOS Student Behavior Code was created so that we have a clear set of expectations of what is acceptable and unacceptable behavior at LOGOS School. Acceptable behavior is based on a respect for one's self and others. The goal is for this behavior to be reflected at home and school. Everyone is important and has equal value and worth, along with our differences. This is the "LOGOS Way". LOGOS is incorporating a restorative approach to discipline whenever appropriate. A restorative approach builds healthy relationships between educators and students. It reduces, prevents, and improves harmful behavior, while repairing harm and restoring positive relationships. This approach resolves conflict, holds individuals and groups accountable and addresses and discusses the needs of the school community to prevent the behavior again. A restorative approach can include affective questioning, conflict resolution, problem-solving circles or class meetings and formal restorative conferences. A restorative approach believes that it is important to problem solve, resolve conflicts and build stronger relationships.

This student behavior code is a guideline of behaviors acceptable in the building. When the guidelines are not met, the goal is to provide interventions for the education and therapeutic support of students. Expectations will be enforced fairly, firmly, and consistently in a manner that is therapeutic, equitable, just and legal. Professional judgment will be used by LOGOS teachers, therapists, staff, and administrators in handling incidents/infractions. It is impossible to cover every conceivable incident that may occur at the school, field trips, or other LOGOS sponsored activities. LOGOS is an individualized environment. We must take a student's IEP goals and clinical goals into consideration in making decisions. However, based on the severity of the incident, we must abide by the contracted district Code of Conduct, Municipal, State, or Federal Law.

#### **BUS INFRACTIONS**

If a student is on district-provided transportation, **LOGOS Administrators cannot** make any decisions regarding interventions, or consequences. The district's guidelines will be followed in those cases.

#### **TECHNOLOGY AND STUDENT BEHAVIOR**

The Student Acceptable Use Policy and Regulations govern the use of all technology at LOGOS, including cyber bullying (Mo Rev Stat 160.775)). Violations may result in loss of user privileges, suspension, expulsion and civil or criminal penalties. Students shall not have an expectation of privacy in anything they create, send, receive, or store on School technology. Use of cell phones, electronic cameras and electronic communication devices must be authorized by school staff. Unauthorized use of cell phones, cameras and electronic devices may result in confiscation or search and seizure of the item.

Personal Technology (phone, computer, tablet, etc) use shall only occur before school, during passing periods and lunch. Personal technology (cell phone, tablet, computer) use during class time is prohibited.

• Items confiscated will only be returned to parent(s)/guardians after meeting with school officials within a reasonable time frame.

• LOGOS is not liable for the devices brought in violation of district policy and confiscated in accordance with the same. Students are prohibited from taking pictures or video of other students and staff. Doing so violates the privacy rights of other students and staff and is subject to discipline pursuant to LOGOS policies on acceptable use and the Family Education Right and Privacy Act (FERPA).

• The school monitors electronic communications and information stores on its technology in the regular course of business to protect student users and school equipment. Under certain circumstances, students' off campus use of technology that disrupts the operation of the school is also subject to discipline (i.e. use of Facebook and other media sources to harass or cyber bully).

• LOGOS reserves the right to limit Internet access to times when resources and supervision are available.

• LOGOS network is considered to be a closed forum to the extent allowed by law.

• Student users shall agree not to meet with persons they have met online (internet or intranet) unless done with the knowledge and encouragement of a school employee for an educational purpose.

• Student users shall immediately disclose to their teacher or other school employee any inappropriate material they access through the computer or any message the student receives that is inappropriate or makes the user feel uncomfortable.

#### **MISSOURI SAFE SCHOOLS ACT**

Student conduct and discipline issues, including reporting requirements, will be handled in a manner consistent with the Safe Schools Act, including but not limited to, Sections 160.261, 167.161 and 167.171 of the Missouri Revised Statutes.

School administrators are required to report, as soon as reasonably practical, to the appropriate law enforcement agency any of the following crimes or any act which if committed by an adult would be one of the following crimes committed on school property, including but not limited to actions on any school bus in service on behalf of, or while involved in school activities:

- (1) First-degree murder under section 565.020;
- (2) Second-degree murder under section 565.021;
- (3) Kidnapping under section 565.110 as it existed prior to January 1, 2017, or kidnapping in the first degree under section 565.110;
- (4) First-degree assault under section 565.050;
- (5) Rape in the first degree under section 566.030;
- (6) Sodomy in the first degree under section 566.060;
- (7) Burglary in the first degree under section 569.160;
- (8) Burglary in the second degree under section 569.170;
- (9) Robbery in the first degree under section 569.020 as it existed prior to January 1, 2017, or robbery in the first degree under section 570.023;
- (10) Distribution of drugs under section 195.211 as it existed prior to January 1, 2017, or manufacture of a controlled substance under section 579.055;
- (11) Distribution of drugs to a minor under section 195.212 as it existed prior to January 1,2017, or delivery of a controlled substance under section 579.020;

- (12) Arson in the first degree under section 569.040;
- (13) Voluntary manslaughter under section 565.023;
- (14) Involuntary manslaughter under section 565.024 as it existed prior to January 1,
   2017, involuntary manslaughter in the first degree under section 565.024, or
   involuntary manslaughter in the second degree under section 565.027;
- (15) Second-degree assault under section 565.060 as it existed prior to January 1, 2017, or second-degree assault under section 565.052;
- (16) Rape in the second degree under section 566.031;
- (17) Felonious restraint under section 565.120 as it existed prior to January 1, 2017, or kidnapping in the second degree under section 565.120;
- (18) Property damage in the first degree under section 569.100;
- (19) The possession of a weapon under chapter 571;
- (20) Child molestation in the first degree pursuant to section 566.067 as it existed prior to January 1, 2017, or child molestation in the first, second, or third degree pursuant to section 566.067, 566.068, or 566.069;
- (21) Sodomy in the second degree pursuant to section 566.061;
- (22) Sexual misconduct involving a child pursuant to section 566.083;
- (23) Sexual abuse in the first degree pursuant to section 566.100;
- (24) Harassment under section 565.090 as it existed prior to January 1, 2017, or harassment in the first degree under section 565.090; or
- (25) Stalking under section 565.225 as it existed prior to January 1, 2017, or stalking in the first degree under section 565.225; 41.

#### LEVEL SYSTEM

When a student fails to comply with the expectations of the Student Behavior Guide, it may be necessary to assign appropriate interventions/supports. All interventions/supports are organized under a level system based on their severity.

Below are consequences that may be assigned to students and are placed in levels based on their severity. A student may receive a higher level of consequence depending on the frequency and/or severity of the offense. The consequences and interventions are not meant to be used in sequential order. They are to be used as a guide. Consequences and interventions should be assigned to individual students based on many factors, including age, grade level, student's prior experiences and situation.

The infractions will be documented in the LOGOS Student Information System (Blackbaud) by staff members who witness/have information on an incident.

#### LEVEL 1

Minor infractions that will be handled mostly at the teacher/therapeutic staff/student level.

#### LEVEL 2

Moderate to Serious Infractions that would involve administration, parents, school districts, law enforcement.

#### LEVEL 3

Out-of-School Suspension (OSS) and/or a discipline hearing up to 180 days Out of-School Suspension, or possible expulsion and/or police notification as required by law.

#### **LEVEL 1 INFRACTIONS**

Dress Code Violations Student dress code is defined as attire that will not disrupt nor distract from the instructional procedures of the school. The school administrator(s) or designee will make the determination if clothing is disruptive, inappropriate, or poses a safety hazard. The following is a list that is intended to inform not limit. Students are to wear clothing that is clean and safe. Shoes must be worn at all times. Items of clothing that are inappropriate for school dress and are not permissible are shoes with wheels, flip-flops, tight-fitting clothing, revealing or suggestive clothing, tube tops, revealing tank tops, halter-tops, midriff, sleepwear and see- through clothing. Headgear (e.g., hats, caps, scarves, bandanas, hair rollers, hairnets, picks, combs, and plastic hair coverings). Sunglasses and dark glasses, medical masks unless by prescription, are not allowed. Chains used with wallets, keys, etc. or as a belt or decoration are not allowed. Clothing that promotes disruptive behavior, and/or displays images, including but not limited to drugs, alcohol, tobacco and/or its products, violence, sex or hate groups is prohibited from campus and must be covered or removed. No clothing, coloring, insignia or other symbol or combinations of symbols indicating membership in, affiliation with, or support for any gang or similar organization associated with violence, drugs, intimidation or other criminal activity will be allowed on school grounds or at school sponsored activities. It is also required that clothing be worn in the correct manner. <b>Bullying/Cyberbullying/Harassment</b> Bullying is unwanted, aggressive behavior among school-aged children that involves a real or perceived power imbalance. The behavior is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time. An Imbalance of Power: Kids who bully use their power—such as physical strength, access to embarrassing information, or popularity—to control or harm others. Harassment is defined as abusive behavior towards another student based on race, color, national origin, sex, or disability that creates a hostile environment. This includes gestures, verbal comments, pictorial or written statements, or threats. Any comments that could be construed as a threat or harassment will be taken seriously and result in disciplinary consequences. This includes bullying or cyber-bullying. All statements regarding or relating to threats/harassment will be taken seriously and will be dealt with accordingly. Gender Discrimination	
Discrimination may occur when an individual or individuals are treated differently specifically because of his/her/their gender, sexual orientation or pregnancy. Additionally, unintended behavior or action that ultimately results in treating a group differently because of their gender, sexual orientation. Also making comments, name-calling, conduct of a physical nature, or other expressive behavior directed at an individual or group on the basis of gender, sexual orientation or pregnancy are prohibited behaviors. Discriminatory and harassing behavior creates a demeaning, intimidating, and hostile educational environment. Discrimination/Harassment is considered to have occurred when such conduct: has the purpose or effect of creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive academic environment, has the purpose or effect of substantially or unreasonably interfering with a student's academic performance, or otherwise adversely affects an individual's academic opportunities. Fighting	
Fighting is defined as conflict to which both parties have contributed physically. Students are expected to seek non-violent solutions to solve disputes. If physical confrontation is anticipated, students are to seek assistance from the school staff. Any student joining in or who inhibits adults from interceding will be considered a participant. Individuals instigating, encouraging, or taping the fight, other than the original participants, will be considered part of the fight and will be subject to disciplinary consequences. Students who do not disperse upon request when watching a fight will also be subject to disciplinary consequences. A dangerous weapon as defined in 571.010, RSMo. (g) (2). 4. An instrument or device used to threaten or assault, whether for attack or defense. 5. Any object designed to look like or imitate a device as described in 1-4. The possession, displaying, handling, brandishing, use or attempted use of a weapon by a student is prohibited on or in all school facilities and at all school activities whether they are on district property or not. Students in possession of a weapon are subject to disciplinary consequences, police notification, as required by law, and charges if warranted. Students are not to bring any type of weapon to school, real, imitation or toys. It is essential that every student and every parent understand that anyone who violates the weapon policy should expect the most severe consequence. When an item (such as a tennis racket or scissors) is used or displayed as a potential weapon against another person, the weapon policy will be enforced. In accordance with federal law, and the Safe Schools Act, any student who possesses a firearm (as defined in 18 U.S.C. 921) in a school building, on school property, on a school bus or at a school function will be suspended from school for a minimum of one calendar year.
