




Long-term facilities planning context



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LWSD enrollment and available classroom space

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Long-term facilities planning – Not a new problem

- Rapid growth created significant demand for new school facilities
- District asked voters to approve bonds to build new schools and replace aging schools in 2010, and twice in 2014
- Neither measure received the 60% super-majority needed to pass school bonds

Bond Election	Approval %	Pass Y/N
Feb. 2010	55.67%	Ν
Feb. 2014	57.79%	Ν
April 2014	52.59%	Ν



Solving the challenge

- The district convened a 63-person Task Force to collaborate on longterm facilities planning
- They worked for nearly a year and sought significant community input and feedback
- They presented their final 254-page report to our Board on November 9, 2015





Task Force recommendation: Build more schools

Long-term strategy through 2029-30:

- Intentional planning
- Creative options
- Efficient use of space
- Well-built, cost effective designs
- Continued community involvement
- Recommended back-up plans


