Study Skills for the Week in 4th & 5th Grades - Skimming

Skimming is when you read over a text to obtain an overall message. You might skim when you first look at a source for a research project to decide if this is a text you want to look at more carefully or not. When you skim, look for titles, subtitles, headings, and illustrations. Read the first and last sentence of each paragraph. Don't read every word or every sentence...let your eyes skim over the text, taking in key words to come up with an overall meaning of the text. You can practice skimming with newspapers or magazines at home...can you figure out what the article is mostly about without reading the whole thing? Junk mail is another great way to practice skimming. When you get an advertisement in the mail, have your student skim it...look for words in bold, or first and last sentences. See if they can figure out what message the seller is trying to convey, without actually reading the whole thing.

A Note from Dr. McCormick

Dear Parents,

I was filled with pride when watching students with whom I had conducted socratic seminars as sixth graders engaging in similar types of discussions in Mrs. Jones' seventh grade history course. These groups of approximately eight students were regularly referring to the selected text to support their thinking, building on one another's insights, and asking questions of their fellow discussants that extended the conversation in meaningful ways. Additionally, students who as sixth graders were more reticent about introducing an idea in these forums were full participants as seventh graders. Woo Woo! It was wonderful to see the growth in virtually all of these students in this critical thinking/problem-solving/communication exercise.

Last week, I traveled with Mrs. Lewis, Mrs. Parker, Ms. Butler, and Mr. Thurman to the Association for Middle Level Education national conference in Nashville, TN. It was a wonderful opportunity to connect with middle grades professionals from around the world, and I will share several experiences from that workshop in ensuing *Roars*. One of our keynote speakers, author and educator Jessica Lahey who wrote the 2015 book, *The Gift of Failure*, talked about the debilitating effects of extrinsic motivators such as money or rewards for grades. In her book, she explains, "First, rewards don't work, because humans perceive them as attempts to control behavior, which undermines intrinsic motivation. Second, human beings are more likely to stick with tasks that arise out of their own free will and personal choice" (Lahey, p. 26). Of course, we want to know how to foster students' intrinsic motivation, and Lahey, who has read the motivation research, addresses some of these strategies in her book.

Middle School Health Screenings

Hello Middle School Parents,

In compliance with Arkansas State Law governing scoliosis screenings, and hearing and vision requirements for school accreditation, we will be conducting **Health Screenings on the morning of Tuesday, November 19**, in the Axillary Gym. Screenings will include: Vision, Hearing, BP, Height, Weight, and Scoliosis for **6th and 8th graders, and all new students to the school.**

Please remind your student(s) to bring or wear their glasses or contacts for vision screening. Scoliosis screenings will be performed using privacy screens set up in two separate areas. Girls need to wear a sports bra or tank top for the scoliosis screening as shirts are removed to observe the back. To perform the test, the back is visible to the observers. The student will stand straight with hands to the side, then they will bend forward and down. The student's back will be observed from all sides.

- If your child is under the care of a physician for scoliosis please let the school nurse know before November 18, 2019.
- If your child is under the care of a physician and it has been greater than 1 year since their last appointment, please follow-up with the physician and send the school nurse the upcoming appointment date and time.
- If you do not want your child screened for scoliosis at school, and they are not currently under the care of a physician for scoliosis you will need to get a current scoliosis evaluation from their physician.

If you need to make an appointment, you will need to send the school nurse the appointment date and time on doctor's letterhead by Monday, November 18, 2019, so they will not be screened on Tuesday.

*Parents will receive a referral letter for further testing if there is an issue detected as a result of the screening. <u>Please contact Nurse Hopkins</u> if you have any questions or concerns.
