Monday, Nov. 25, the Board of Education voted to increase its contribution to health insurance premiums for all staff by \$45 per month. The National Education Association – Shawnee Mission (NEA-SM), along with representatives for school psychologists and Parents as Teachers, have accepted that offer.

This agreement matches the Board's plan to provide that same increase for classified staff and administrators, in order to help offset increased health insurance premiums, which go into effect on January 1, 2020.
