Educational Presentation

IB Five Year Self-Evaluation

The International Baccalaureate (IB) requires and evaluation of our program every 5 years. Coordinator Mr. Keith Pedzich shared the results of the evaluation, as well as the action plan that resulted from the findings. The goals of the Self-Evaluation are: to determine the assessment of the implementation of the programme, according to the Programme standards and practices and programme requirements to identify major achievements during the period under review and to identify practices that need further development. The IB program began in 2004 and provided its first diplomas in 2005. To date, there have been 128 total diplomas issued. There are 19 teachers who teach IB along with their other classes. There are 192 students enrolled in the Diploma Programme.

ESOL In Canandaigua

The number of students arriving to Canandaigua from other areas of the world has increased in recent years. English as Second Language Teachers, Ms. Leslie Tomanovich and Ms. Katelyn Lowry, described their program, their students, and the work they do in the different schools across our District. They began by providing a breakdown of the many acronyms that are used in their department. For the 2013-2014 school year they have 14 English as a Second Language (ESL) students speaking either Spanish, Chinese Mandarin, Albanian, Urdu, Vietnamese or Thai. A typical ESL lesson includes listening, speaking, reading and writing. They also follow the Common Core Standards and build upon what the ESOL student knows and likes.

Superintendent Erdle began by reviewing the District's new mission and vision statement that was approved by the Board of Education on February 6.

Canandaigua City School District Board of Education Meeting

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Vision Statement

The Canandaigua City School District will lead and inspire a community of learners to fulfill their academic and creative potential.

These new statements are part of the work of the Strategic Planning Committee and the process that has taken place this year. She also reviewed the Budget Guidelines the Board approved on January 9, 2014:

- Maintain a commitment to the educational success and character development of all students as is reasonable and appropriate in today's financial climate.
- Balance the need for staffing based on enrollment data with the need to prepare students as successful 21st century learners.
- Search for viable options for reducing costs across all budget areas that include budget efficiencies.
- Utilize fund balance and reserve funds conservatively with a financial plan to transition back to a budget that
 does not rely on reserves.
- Maintain a transparent system of continual communication with the public.

This year's budget is zero based budgeting. It represents the hard work of everyone. The District is in a "need" mindset not a want mindset. A reminder though, this type of budgeting will impact fund balance and reserves moving forward as the budget gets tighter and tighter.

Several staffing changes for the 2014-2105 school year. The asterisk ones were generated out of the Strategic Plan.

- o 11 retirees
- Reduction of 1.0 FTE science due to enrollment
- o Reduction of .5 FTE business due to enrollment
- Increase in:
 - 1.0 FTE school counselor K 5*
 - .15 FTE art / .25 FTE art
 - .5 FTE PE / health
 - .5 FTE music
 - 1.0 FTE elementary*
 - .5 FTE SRO*
 - 1.0 FTE custodian*

The budget as proposed represented a 2.56% increase year over year

Administration \$ 5,873,576 (8.55% of budget)
Program \$51,874,513 (75.5% of budget)
Capital \$10,958,603 (15.9% of budget)

Total Expense \$68,706,692

For the 2014-2015 school year the Allowable Tax Levy Cap is 3.05%. After the March 27, 2014 Board of Education meeting and with new information that was received from Albany Superintendent Erdle proposed a Tax Levy at 2.88%, lower than the allowable tax cap. This would be an *estimated* tax rate increase of .56 center per thousand of assessment or \$19.75 per thousand.

On the ballot May 20, 2014 the following propositions will be included with the budget:

- Proposition 2 ~ Transportation Purchase
- Proposition 3 ~ New Transportation Reserve
- Two Board of Education seats for five year terms each
- Proposition 4 ~ Wood Library Association

The Board thanked Superintendent Erdle, Assistant Superintendents, Principals and Directors for their dedication and hard work on providing a budget that is cognizant to the tax payer but also maintains programs for students.
