The meeting was called to order at 6:32 p.m. at the Operations Center by President Grimm.

Mrs. Grimm reconvened the meeting at 7:34 p.m. and asked everyone to stand for the Pledge of Allegiance.

Presentation

Elementary School Highlight

Mrs. Ware, Elementary School Principal, began by inviting the Board to the bus bay to hear the 5th grade jazz band led by Mr. Greg Kane perform several songs. Mrs. Ware then provided the Board an overview of the different extras available to students; from the Fiddle Club, Robotics "Experts" Club, Page Turners Book Club, and E-School Times.

Superintendent's Report

Superintendent Erdle reported on a partnership with the Ontario County Safety Council. New signs will be posted around the district buildings to encourage drivers to stop texting while driving. The signs say: "One Text or Call Could Wreck it All". All the Finger Lakes area superintendents are involved in the partnership.



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Superintendent Erdle also gave a huge thank you to our buildings and grounds staff, as well as our transportation staff. Our buildings and grounds staff began work at 1:00 a.m. on March 13 to begin clearing away the snow from the snowstorm the previous day. Many districts around were not able to open because they were unable to access their buildings. Our bus drivers provided a safe commute for our students.

Academy senior Meredith Hutchings was recently profiled on News 8 Scholastic Arts Spotlight.

Superintendent Erdle noted that there were three recent Community Forums to gain input on any potential capital project work within the District. Unfortunately, these three meetings had a total of six people attend. There was discussion on safety and security and athletic fields work. She asked the Board for approval to work with SEI Architect to develop a schematic and cost to bring back to the Board with potential ideas and discussion. There will be future forums with anticipation of a fall vote. The Board approved going forward and having additional information provided to them for a potential capital project vote.

School of Character Award

Dr. Julie Winston, Assistant Superintendent for Instruction, read a statement: *In 1996 a group of teachers, parents, students, and administrators gathered to clearly define what showing good character means to the children of Canandaigua. With this began our dedication to teaching our children not only the 3R's, but how to appropriately apply that knowledge to their lives once they walk across the stage on graduation day. Today we are here to officially announce that the Middle School has earned prestigious recognition in this area. Earlier this year, the Middle School welcomed evaluators representing the Character Education Partnership (CEP), a national organization based in Washington, DC at the forefront of this effort across the country. We have been invited for two years in a row to share our thoughts and ideas at their national convention. The evaluators talked to administrators, faculty, students, and staff to find out more about the Middle School. As they left the informed Brian of their decision...Canandaigua Middle School was selected as a New York State School of Character. With this comes the honor of being one of three middle schools so recognized in our state.*

The next step in the process was a waiting game: we waited for word from the partnership if we were to be considered as a National School of Character. On Monday, March 10 we received more good news: the Middle School is one of the 13 finalists in the United States for potential recognition as a National School of Character. The 12 other Middle schools hail from all over our country. The Middle School staff is working to upload more information for consideration and awaits the time and date when they will welcome the national evaluators to our school to share the wonderful character shown by our students and staff.

The Board was treated to a short video of Middle School students and then a brief celebration.

Those not participating in the rest of the meeting left at 8:20 p.m.

Real Property Tax Cap

Mrs. Carleen Pierce, Assistant Superintendent for Business, provided the Board with an overview of the real property tax cap calculation. Based on our current numbers, the District would be able to go out at a 4.52% increase. After her presentation, Superintendent Erdle asked the Board what levels they would like to see. The majority said between the 2 percent and 3 percent. They were provided several figures, such as for a 2.03% that would increase the tax rate by .40 cents per thousand, and a 3.67% that would increase the tax rate by .71 cents per thousand.

Adopting Bond Resolution

Upon a recommendation by the Superintendent, a motion was made by Mr. Reho, seconded by Mrs. Raeman, with all the Board members voting yes, the Board of Education approved adopting a bond resolution by a roll call vote:

The following resolution and duly moved that it be adopted:

BOND RESOLUTION DATED MARCH 13, 2014 OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE CANANDAIGUA CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT AUTHORIZING GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS TO FINANCE THE ACQUISITION OF SCHOOL BUSES, AUTHORIZING BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES IN CONTEMPLATION THEREOF, THE LEVY OF TAXES IN ANNUAL INSTALLMENTS IN PAYMENT THEREOF, THE EXPENDITURE OF SUCH SUMS FOR SUCH PURPOSE, AND DETERMINING OTHER MATTERS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THIS BOARD OF EDUCATION AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The City School District of the City of Canandaigua, New York (“Canandaigua City School District”) shall undertake certain capital expenditures, as more particularly described in Section 3 hereof.

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Section 2. The Canandaigua City School District is hereby authorized to issue its General Obligation Serial Bonds in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$425,503, pursuant to the Local Finance Law of New York, in order to finance the class of objects or purposes described herein.

Section 3. The class of objects or purposes to be financed pursuant to this resolution (hereinafter referred to as "purpose") is the acquisition of school buses.

Section 4. It is hereby determined and declared that (a) the maximum cost of said purpose, as estimated by the Board of Education, is \$760,000, and such amount is hereby appropriated therefor, (b) the Canandaigua City School District plan to finance the cost of said purpose is (i) to expend \$334,497 from the existing bus reserve fund for such costs; and (ii) to provide up to \$425,503 from funds raised by the issuance of said Bonds and Bond Anticipation Notes hereinafter referred to; and (c) no money has heretofore been authorized to be applied to the payment of the cost of said purpose.

Section 5. It is hereby determined that the purpose is one of the class of objects or purposes described in Subdivision 29 of Paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law, and that the period of probable usefulness of said purpose is five (5) years.

Section 6. The Canandaigua City School District is hereby authorized to issue its Bond Anticipation Notes in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$425,503, and is hereby authorized to issue renewals thereof, pursuant to the Local Finance Law of New York in order to finance the purpose in anticipation of the issuance of the above described Bonds.

Section 7. It is hereby determined and declared that (a) there are presently no outstanding Bond Anticipation Notes issued in anticipating of the sale of said Bonds, (b) the Bond Anticipation Notes authorized hereby are not issued in anticipation for Bonds for an assessable improvement.

Section 8. It is hereby determined and declared that the Canandaigua City School District reasonably expects to reimburse the general fund, or such other fund utilized, not to exceed the maximum amount authorized herein, from the proceeds of the obligations authorized hereby for expenditures, if any, from such fund that may be made for the purpose prior to the date of issuance of such obligations. This is a declaration of official intent under Treasury Regulation §1.150-2.

Section 9. The faith and credit of the Canandaigua City School District, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such Bonds and Bond Anticipation Notes as the same respectively become due and payable. And annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all taxable real property of said School District, a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 10. The power to further authorize the issuance of said Bonds and Bond Anticipation Notes and to prescribe the terms, form and contents of said Bonds and Bond Anticipation Notes, subject to the provisions of this resolution and the Local Finance Law of New York, including without limitation, the consolidation with other issues, the determination to issue Bonds with substantially level or declining annual debt service, whether to authorize the receipt of bids in an electronic format, and to sell and deliver said Bonds and Bond Anticipating Notes, is hereby delegated to the President of the Board of Education or to the Vice President of the Board in the event of the absence or unavailability of the President. The President of the Board of Education and the District Clerk are hereby authorized to sign by manual or facsimile signature any Bonds and Bond Anticipation Notes issued pursuant to this resolution, and are hereby authorized to affix to such Bonds and Bond Anticipation Notes the corporate seal of the School District and to attest the same.

Section 11. After compliance with Section 12 hereof, this resolution, or a summary hereof, shall be published in full by the District Clerk or the Clerk's designee together with a notice in substantially the form prescribed by Section 81.00 of said Local Finance Law, and such publication shall be in each official newspaper of the School District. The validity of said Bonds and Bond Anticipation Notes may be contested only if such



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obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said School District is not authorized to expend money, or the provisions of law which should be complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication; or if said obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 12. This resolution shall be submitted to a referendum of the qualified electors of the School District on May 20, 2014 pursuant to Section 37.00 of the Local Finance Law of the State of New York and shall take effect immediately upon approval at such referendum.

PROPOSITION #2

Shall the bond resolution adopted by the Board of Education of the City School District of the City of Canandaigua, New York, dated March 13, 2014, authorizing the acquisition of school buses, at an estimated maximum aggregate cost of \$760,000, less trade-in value, if any, and the appropriation and expenditure from the existing bus reserve fund of \$334,497 for such cost; the levy of a tax to be collected in annual installments therefor; the issuance of debt obligations of the School District as may be necessary, or the use of undesignated unappropriated fund balance, not to exceed \$425,503, all be approved?

- At such meeting taxes to be levied by installments will be proposed providing for payment of the acquisition of school buses. Such taxes shall be levied upon all the taxable property of the District, shall be levied in annual installments and shall be of such amounts and levied in such years as may be determined by the Board of Education.

- The District Clerk or the Clerk's designee is hereby directed to add the above to the notice of the annual meeting of the School District.

- This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.
