WAVE Raises \$50,000 for Westside Schools at Western Gala

More than 200 supporters of the West Antelope Valley Education Foundation, also known as WAVE, raised more than \$50,000 last week to support Westside Union School District schools. Supporters gathered at the Rancho Vista Golf Club on Thursday to celebrate "Westside Heroes, community leaders who have supported the District throughout the years.

The Foundation raised more the money via a live and silent auction in addition to the dinner sponsorships.

IDEA Academy 5th Graders Graduate from STARBASE

On October 23rd, 5th graders from the IDEA Academy @Cottonwood graduated from the Department of Defense's STARBASE program, a STEM based program that took place at Edwards Air Force Base at the beginning of this year. All graduating students had to complete 25 hours of STEM coursework.

DoD STARBASE focuses on elementary students, primarily fifth graders. The goal is to motivate them to explore Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) as they continue their education. The academies serve students that are historically under-represented in STEM. Students who live in inner cities or rural locations, those who are socio-economically disadvantaged, low in academic performance or have a disability are in the target group. The program encourages students to set goals and achieve them.

Along with the STARBASE instructors and staff, Dr. Smith, Mr. Otis, and Mr. Gaddis were the base leadership in attendance. Dr. Smith will give a speech address to students and parents. Dr. Smith is the civilian equivalent rank to the General, Mr. Otis is the director of XP Plans and Programs, and Mr. Gaddis is the Deputy director for XP Plans and programs.



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Interview with Joe Walker Middle School Principal Steve Wood

Steve Wood has been a principal at Joe Walker for six years, and nine years at the school in total. He sat down with Westside Wire for an interview.

Q: How did you get started in education?

I started education in San Diego. I was living in San Diego and taught in San Diego Unified School District. I taught there for five years. I was born and raised in the Antelope Valley though.

I taught middle school and elementary school there, and my wife and I thought it would be good to come home...to the Antelope Valley.

I spent the rest of my time here. This is my 18th year teaching.

Q: Did you always know you wanted to be an educator?

Yeah. I grew up in a family of educators. My mom was an educator, my grandfather was a teacher at AV High School...it was kind of a family business. When I was in college, I thought, do I want to be in teaching? I do like kids a lot, and the schedule is kind of cool.

That was just growing up, my mom had us help put up bulletin boards and stuff like that...and so it just came natural.

Q: What is your approach to education?

The thing I value the most is trying to expose students to all the options they have at their fingertips, all the things that are out there for them. One of the quotes that I always live by is "if you aim at nothing, you will hit it". The reason I like that theme is that I value giving the students the opportunity to be exposed to lots of different things, so that they can figure out what they want to do before they leave Joe Walker. If they are exposed to robotics, or the arts, or humanities...because students who feel that they belong in school do far better academically, go on to be successful human beings and contributing members of society. So we pride ourselves at Joe Walker at giving students as many opportunities as possible.

Q: What is your favorite part about being principal?

The relationships. I really value being able to build relationships with families, and students, and the teachers...all the staff members on campus. I really feel that the strength in the power of our program literally has nothing to do with me; it's with the individuals, it's with the students who are involved, the parents who are supporting them. So I just do the best I can to support them, give them everything they need to be successful, and stay out of their way.

Q: Is there a fun fact about you that most people wouldn't know?

I love Star Wars.

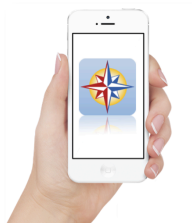
