LEARNING

Children are organised in two classes in each age group. Pupils learn as classes and in groups so that all children's needs are met. Our learning is designed to engage all children and give them practical experiences. We use topic themes for some of our work and children all learn outside and in the community during the year.

The core learning for all children involves daily lessons in the building blocks of all education: reading, phonics and spelling, English writing, handwriting, and mathematics. This is supported with home learning tasks and personalised learning. Children are all expected to complete short daily home learning tasks.

Children have opportunities to learn about their world and become active members of the school. Our broader curriculum includes PE, arts, music and humanities. We use computing across all areas of learning; children use IT equipment including iPads. We celebrate achievement with parents, carers and the community through performances, celebration assemblies, open afternoons and rewards. Specialist sports coaches provide physical activity and PE, which supports our teachers.

We have opportunities for children to have care and support before and after school and offer a range of after school clubs. For working parents who need help with childcare we offer an on-site breakfast club and after school club run on the premises by Clive Vale Nursery. We are open from 8am to 6pm.

We are able to support children with additional teaching or interventions in reading, phonics, maths and through the Thrive programme. Our wider school life includes a wide variety of trips and activities such as visits to Bodiam Castle, Field to Fork and pantomimes, many of which are supported by our friends group. Children may also have the opportunity to learn the violin in an after school club.

SUPPORTING SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS AND DISABILITIES

Our aim is for all pupils including those with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) to achieve their very best and become successful, well-rounded individuals.

We believe that all children should have high quality teaching and access to the curriculum adjusted to meet their individual needs. We have an inclusion coordinator who has day-to-day responsibility for the SEND policy in the Academy: providing advice and support for staff, and working in partnership with parents and carers.

Pupils are regularly assessed so that SEND can be identified as early as possible. We follow an 'assess, plan, do and review' cycle to ensure individual needs are met.

LEARNING ENVIRONMENT

We have recently redecorated and refurnished our classrooms to support learning, including white boards and a range of ICT resources.

We have developed our outside areas to enhance learning in all curriculum areas and we also have gardens and green spaces that enable children to learn about wildlife and nature.

We enhance our sports and games through the use of our Multi Use Games Area, playground and hall. Sports Premium funding for PE enables specialist provision during the day and after school.


