In addition, she presented an amended proposed calendar per Board direction and an outline of start dates, end of semester 1 dates, and end of school dates through the 2022-2023 school year.

The following people spoke in opposition of the proposed calendar change:

Lynn Rodriquez spoke as a LBUSD parent and an educator in another district. She believes that AP tests are not a reason to change. She stated the difference in the 80 day semester and the 100 day semester is a huge disparity. She also noted that homework and projects do not need to be assigned over the winter break, regardless of the calendar; real world lessons are just as effective.

Carol Reagan, parent, thanked the Board for having staff bring forward compromises in out year calendars. She reasoned that families cannot participate in the holiday season if students are preparing for finals before winter break. She said she's not sure that the students who support the change understand all the ramifications. Would consider option B as a fallback.

Tina Steinke, parent, stated 52% of parents oppose the proposed change and they are in charge of taking care of the kids. The Board should listen to the parents/taxpayers and not spend time focusing on children's opinions. She stated there are only 300 AP students and wanted to know what percentage of teachers have students in the district.

The following people spoke in support of the proposed calendar change:

Natalie Newburry supports the proposed calendar for 2019-2020. She stated she has seen and heard a lot of misinformation in the community. She stated colleges do look at AP scores and traffic is no worse at the end of August than the beginning of September. She stated the goal for the change is to lessen stress on students. Additional factors for support include community college sessions starting before LBUSD students have completed the school year and students support the change and they should be listened to.

Dawn Hunnicutt spoke as the department chair for the English department. She stated 92% of the staff support the proposed changes. She attended the Challenge Success conference at Stanford, where research presented showed students are overworked and underprepared. Factors include stress, drug addition, suicide rates at an all-time high. She recommended parents read the book Overworked and Underprepared.

Jan Schrieber, parent.

Addison Briggs, Senior Class President, LBHS. She believes the current calendar is putting students at a disadvantage related to summer programs and job opportunities. She stated most colleges start earlier and sports programs are impacted already. She stated the academic advantages of the proposed calendar outweigh the cons.

Chris Tebbut stated he is neutral on the change. He trusts the committee to do the right thing.

Kimberly O'Brien-Young, parent. Previously opposed the change, but now supports. She has found this issue to be very divisive in the community. She met with the principal and assistant principal at the high school to review test scores. She stated this is a great district and she supports the Board in its decision.

Member Normandin moved to continue discussion. Member Wolff seconded.

Student Board Representative Piper Warner, cast a provisional vote in favor. Motion carried 4-0-1. Members Vickers, Perry, Normandin, and Wolff voted yes. Member Brown was absent.

The following people spoke in opposition of the proposed calendar change:

Moya Mitchell took offense to statement that parents oppose change because they want to be at the beach; however, after second thought understands there is nothing wrong with wanting to preserve the culture. Asked what "list" Dr. Viloria was referring to that "we are always on the cusp of getting on." She listed potential stress for students in having to navigate holiday performances while preparing for finals. The holiday break can be used to redo work for increased credit and other options.

Susan Vaughn, parent. She appreciates the democratic process and others opinions. She believes teachers have the power and ability to hone in on stress and how students are reacting and can help evaluate and adjust. She is curious about how teachers will teach semester courses with the difference in 80 and 100 days.

Kevin Harrison stated there seems to be different definitions on what's good for kids. He noted the quality of life as being important. He questioned if change was being proposed for the sake of change.

Mark Kellum, parent. He is worried about what's going on. There is no agreement with the Board or what will be presented to parents and taxpayers of Laguna Beach. He commented on the petition on Change.org is being signed by residents of Laguna Beach. He commented on the district facing a loss of support by members of the community due to the calendar change. He suggested the district get rid of ski week. He doesn't understand why kids are worried about stress over the holidays, he does not know any that face stress. Can't imagine students attending school in August with the Festivals, beach and good weather.

Colleen Connelly does not see a clear path as to why this is being done. How does the district know it's going to work? If scores drop will the district change the calendar back? She stated the decision is based on opinions and not research or facts. She stated the survey that was done was not fair and the process has not been clear.

The following people spoke in support of the proposed calendar change:

Ann Bergen, LBHS Teacher, stated the change is not about AP classes or tests, it is about missed opportunities for students and sited College and Career Advantage program has after school classes that LBHS students cannot attend, community college schedules, and UC schedules.

Chad Carter sees many benefits to the change and believes it is for all students. He commended the Board for looking at what can be done to help students.

Leslie Briggs, parent. Her family was previously on an August – May calendar and she believes it is superior in many ways. One example is an extra 100 instructional hours, which does make a difference. She is sad to hear that people think student voices don't matter. The decision should be about the students and the teachers.

Beth Van Es spoke on behalf of her daughter who asked her to attend. When kids reach high school, you feel their needs more saliently. She believes that kids should be listened to as a part of their social emotional well-being. She noted traffic has eased up this week already. She realizes the change won't eliminate stress and anxiety, but it will help. Many students are already at sports camp and preparing for schools and not at the beach.

Katherine Tran mentioned the petition on Change.org in opposition. She referenced the district survey as the method for gathering information. She stated she thought the proposed change was brought forward for the benefit of students and people should stick to the facts and research.

Cal Nielson, Senior at LBHS. He appreciates the passion brought by both sides. He supports version A of the calendar and believes it's a fair compromise and great for the students.

Luke Goldsine, student LBHS. Attended high school in Arizona previously, August-May calendar. He believes that is a better system. Students will persevere because they want to do well, but appreciate any help they can get.

Sofia Ravenna, student LBHS. Respects everyone for their opinions. Disheartened that student opinion is "less than" others.

**Board Discussion** 

President Vickers reminded attendees this is an information item and no action would be taken.

Member Wolff thanked everyone for sharing their perspectives. She shared she has received threatening emails and harassing texts. She stated she understands the Board is elected by taxpayers; however, the mission of the Board is to serve all students academically and their social emotional well-being with best practices. She stated she supports the amended version of the 2019-2020 calendar and version A for 2020-2021.

She listed many benefits that will be brought about by the change in calendar, which included:

- Reorganizing semesters so that the first semester ends at winter break (with 80 days backward from winter break) will positively affect 1800 students at Thurston Middle School and Laguna Beach High School. Students will finish the semester, they will have two weeks off, and the Board will make sure there is a policy that no homework is given during that time. Students will have a mental health break.
- The District operates within and functions with many other systems, including:
  - o CIF
  - o Community College
  - o AP Testing College Board
  - o Summer Program Offerings at Universities
  - o College Orientations
  - o Career Technical Education (CTE) Courses
  - o Summer Camps
  - o Summer Job Opportunities
- Students will end the school year earlier, which will allow them to access many opportunities in June, including college orientations, which tend to be the month of June
- Students will have more instructional days prior to high stakes testing and fewer classes after testing and less filler instruction
- Professional Development Days, which are important for all professionals, are built into the calendar; there will be fewer substitute teachers and students will have more consistent time with their teachers
- Research from Stanford University shows that adjusting the instructional year can distress students and is a worthwhile investment.

Member Normandin stated that all students should have the opportunity to take at least one AP class. She commented on the need to protect playtime, downtime, and family time. She asked for review and discussion of the amended 2019-2020 and version A of 2020-2021 for clarification. She stated the pageant will adjust as the school calendar adjusts. Summer does not go away, it shifts by one week. She trusts staff to do what's best for kids.

Member Perry prefers version B of the 2020-2021 calendar. She stated another possibility would be to keep the calendar as is and not allow homework over the winter break. Discussion was held on how having no homework would work for students when a course is in session. She stated she worries about stress on students before the holidays. She views the imbalance of the semesters as a detriment. She is in favor of ending school earlier in the year.

Student Member Piper Warner stated she has been in the District since kindergarten. She supports the change and believes student voice is important and should be listened to.

President Vickers stated there are currently four semester courses at the high school, all others are a year-long. Some of the semester classes are offered during the summer. She also stated there is a lot of information on the district website under FAQs. Questions may be directed to Mrs. Winston's office. The Board has allowed this process to be long and involved to allow more discussion and to gather more input from the community. Changes have been made to the proposed calendars based on parent and community input. The decision is not all about scores, and were not discussed in the committee meetings. Student voice is important to the Board. The overarching concern for Mrs. Vickers is the end of the year concern, and what students do that have value and meaning after the completion of testing.

Discussion on how the dates were selected for the calendar based on counting back 80 days from the start of winter break, with the least amount of days as possible before Labor Day.

Dr. Viloria stated all AP teachers were surveyed regarding homework. All except for two would make adjustments. One of those two does not have summer assignments and therefore would not make any changes.

The Board reviewed version B of the calendar in depth for clarification. Two Board members prefer version A and two Board members prefer version B.

The Board will bring back the amended version of the 2019-2020 calendar and version A and B of 2020-2021 for further discussion and action in September.

Dr. Viloria and Mrs. Winston verified with members of the festival and pageant, our students will not lose access to scholarships. They have asked for as much notice as possible if the calendar change is adopted.

The Board took a five-minute break.

#### Presentation on Social Emotional Support (SES) Services Overview and Update

Dr. Keller's presentation included information on California's Social Emotional Learning (SEL) Guiding Principles, the SEL Framework, and the SEL Resource Model. He also presented information on the student risk screening scale K-3 and the co-vitality strength scores for all four sites.

Board Members stated they were impressed with the progress and appreciate the work on suicide prevention. Discussion was held on what other districts do. The Board believes staff is doing well in meeting the needs of students. The Challenge Success Program the district is participating in will be a great resource.

Student Board Representative Piper Warner, cast a provisional vote in favor. Motion carried 4-0-1. Members Vickers, Perry, Normandin, and Wolff voted yes. Member Brown was absent.

Mr. Dixon introduced the item for Board approval.

Public Comment: Kathleen Kane lives on Manzanita. She is concerned with overflow parking and student speeding. She would like an adult to oversee some of the off-campus student activity. She praised Mr. Dixon for his follow-through.

Member Normandin moved approval, member Wolff seconded.

Student Board Representative Piper Warner, cast a provisional vote in favor. Motion carried 4-0-1. Members Vickers, Perry, Normandin, and Wolff voted yes. Member Brown was absent.

#### **Proposal**

Staff proposes the Board of Education approve the release of the student(s) to attend the Orange County Department of Education Community Home Education Program (CHEP).

#### Background

Education Code 1981(b) provides that, at the request of a pupil's parent or guardian, the school district of attendance may approve the pupil's enrollment in a county community school.

The release of students to the Orange County Department of Education Community Home Education Program would result in an approximate cost of \$8,500 per student, which is our district's estimated 2018-19 per student ADA (average daily attendance) revenue limit for community school. These funds are used to provide curriculum books and materials for the students.

Due to the elimination of State aid (\$120.00 per ADA) for basic aid school districts, there is no apportionment from which the State may transfer funds directly to Orange County Community Schools. Although the funding has been eliminated, the District is responsible for the cost of educating these students and payment is made from our General Fund to Orange County Community Schools on an annual basis. The expenditure will be budgeted and will occur at year-end.

#### **Budget Impact**

Approval of this request will result in an approximate additional expense of \$25,500.00 for three students.

#### **Recommended Action**

Per counsel, it is legally permissible to disapprove the release of students to community home education programs because of a negative fiscal impact.

Staff recommends the Board of Education approve the release of the student to the Orange County Department of Education Community Home Education Program.

## **Background**

LBUSD Board Policy #5145.3, along with State and federal law, states:

The Board prohibits, at any district school or school activity, unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, and bullying, targeted at any student by anyone, based on the student's actual or perceived race, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, immigration status, ethnic group identification, ethnicity, age, religion, marital status, pregnancy, parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, or genetic information, or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics.

LBUSD is taking critical steps to foster an inclusive educational environment for all students. With this in mind, our district began discussions in 2016-17 and continued in 2017-18 to provide educational training and support to staff members on a voluntary basis to increase awareness in each of us about our cognitive biases and to offer intervention strategies. The district is providing professional development opportunities to various employee groups on this topic. This professional development opportunity is a one-day training which will be required of our administrative office staff in October 2018.

Whether an administrator, classified employee, principal, teacher in the classroom, or security personnel, any adult who works in a school district has the opportunity, and the responsibility for ensuring all students' physical and emotional wellbeing. As the individuals who set the tone of what will or will not be tolerated on the campus, staff members establish the expectations students will follow. Individuals not in attendance for the two ADL dates will be trained separately by the principal or principal's designee.

# **Budget Impact**

The cost of this professional development services is not-to-exceed \$1,500.00.

# **Recommended Action**

Staff recommends the Board of Education approve the contract with the Anti-Defamation League (ADL) to offer their "A World of Difference® Institute" for annual training.

# TRAINING PROGRAM CONTRACT

AGREEMENT ("Agreement") made this 23th day of August, 2018 between the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith ("ADL"), a not-for-profit corporation having its principal place of business at 605 Third Avenue, New York, NY, 10158 with an office at Los Angeles, 10495 Santa Monica Blvd., Los Angeles, CA 90025-5031, and Laguna Beach Unified School District ("CLIENT"), located at 550 Blumont St., Laguna Beach, CA 92651.

WHEREAS, CLIENT desires that the ADL shall conduct the A WORLD OF DIFFERENCE® Institute Training Program;

WHEREAS, ADL desires to provide the required services to CLIENT; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to establish the terms and conditions by which ADL will provide said services.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and obligations contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

- (1) ADL agrees to conduct a training program consisting of two (2) days of training sessions. There must be a minimum of ten (10) participants in each training session, and a maximum of fifty (50). Client agrees to notify ADL at least five (5) days in advance of the training session if Client expects participation will fall below the minimum. In such event, ADL shall have the right to cancel or postpone the session until another date can be mutually agreed upon. In the event of such cancellation or postponement, the provisions of Paragraph 6 (c) of this Agreement shall prevail.
- (2) The training sessions will be held on Thursday, October 04, 2018; Tuesday, November 13, 2018.
- (3) The cost for the complete training program will be \$1,500.00 for one (1) facilitator as outlined in Exhibit B. CLIENT will make these arrangements in consultation with ADL.
  - ADL will be paid for its services specified in Exhibit A in accordance with the payment schedule set forth in Exhibit B and shall submit to CLIENT complete bills for said services and expenses.
- (4) CLIENT will provide the necessary materials, including audio-visual equipment as outlined in Exhibit C.
- (5) CLIENT agrees to provide adequate crowd control and adequate security. CLIENT agrees to obey all fire precautions as required by law or local ordinances.
- (6) (a) Either party shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon thirty (30) days prior written notice to the other party.
  - (b) ADL shall have the right to terminate this Agreement immediately, by written notice to CLIENT, for any of the following reasons:

- (i) A breach by CLIENT of any material term or condition of this Agreement including, but not limited to, the inability of CLIENT to provide in a timely fashion any of its obligations outlined in this Agreement;
- (ii) If CLIENT submits an application or petition for the appointment of a receiver, trustee or liquidator of all substantial amount of their assets;
- (iii) CLIENT admits to or implies that it is unable to pay its debts as they become due:
- (iv) There is entered an order, judgment or decree by any court of competent jurisdiction on the application of a creditor adjudicating a petition seeking reorganization of a CLIENT's firm for all or substantial part of its assets; or
- (v) CLIENT has assigned this Agreement without first receiving ADL's prior written consent.
- (c) If one or more sessions are cancelled within thirty (30) days of the contracted training date, through no fault of ADL, CLIENT agrees to reimburse ADL for 50% of the contracted fee plus all expenses incurred to that date, including travel in connection with the cancelled sessions.
- (7) CLIENT hereby agrees to hold harmless, defend and indemnify ADL affiliates, their directors, officers, employees, agents and representatives from and against all damages, expenses, causes of action, suits, claims, penalties, judgments, reasonable legal fees and/or liabilities by reason of any acts or commission or omission directly or indirectly attributable to any of CLIENT's undertakings and obligations arising under this Agreement.
  - ADL hereby agrees to hold harmless, defend and indemnify CLIENT and its affiliates, their directors, officers, employees, agents and representatives from and against all damages, expenses, causes of action, suits, claims, reasonable legal fees, penalties, judgments and/or liabilities to the extent caused by ADL's undertakings or obligations arising under this Agreement.
- (8) CLIENT agrees that all material used in conjunction with the Training program is proprietary to ADL. As such, these materials may not be reproduced, translated, abbreviated, abridged, excerpted or in any way altered without the written consent of the ADL.
- (9) Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to place ADL and CLIENT in the relationship of a partnership or a joint venture, and neither ADL nor CLIENT shall have any power to oblige or bind the other party in any manner whatsoever.
- (10) On termination of this Agreement, regardless of how termination is effected, or whenever requested by ADL, CLIENT shall immediately return to ADL all copies of ADL's property, and cease using the ADL and/or A WORLD OF DIFFERENCE names.
- (11) Any publicity or promotional materials, including but not limited to press releases and advertisements, produced by CLIENT for or in conjunction with the Training program, must be reviewed and approved in writing by ADL prior to publication.

- (12) This Agreement contains the entire understanding between the parties and supersedes any prior written agreement between the parties. No amendment or modification of this Agreement shall be valid, unless made in writing and signed by both parties. In the event of any inconsistency between the provisions of this Agreement and the provisions of any exhibits or other agreements between the parties relating to the services provided for in this Agreement, the provisions of this Agreement shall prevail.
- (13) This Agreement shall be construed in accordance with, be governed by and subject to the jurisdiction of the laws and courts of the State of California.
- (14) Any notice or document required hereunder shall be delivered in writing. Any notice of termination of this Agreement shall be sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, or delivered personally to the parties at the address set forth above. A copy of any notice or document sent to ADL shall be sent to the attention of Director of Operations, Education Division, and a copy of any such notice or document shall be sent to Ann M. Ortega, Education Director.

Any notice or document sent to CLIENT shall be sent to Dr. Jason Viloria. Any notice or document sent by mail shall be deemed received five (5) business days after mailing. Any notice or document personally delivered shall be deemed received when delivered.

To effectively deal with issues such as cultural diversity, participants must be made to feel at ease. This exercise is designed with this goal in mind.

4. Self Identity Exercise-Four Questions

This exercise invites participants to share and relate information with one another. It explores a mechanism for exploring the importance of identity and how we define ourselves. It can also establish a broad definition of diversity for a seemingly homogenous group.

5. Cultural Self-Knowledge Exercise-Name 5

The purpose of this activity is to allow participants to identify their own cultural knowledge gaps and explore the importance of positive roles models for everyone. It provides a forum for discussing the need for expanding traditional approaches to education and for examining the ways people from non-mainstream groups have been absent or misrepresented.

# **EDUCATIONAL FIELD PRACTICE AGREEMENT**

This Agreement is entered into by and between \_\_ LAGUNA BEACH SCHOOL DISTRICT\_\_ (hereinafter called "District"), and LA SIERRA UNIVERSITY (hereinafter called the "University").

#### RECITALS

- A. The purpose of this Agreement is to provide to the students of the University educational field practice experience/school psychology internships in the areas of: student teaching and/or administration and/or pupil services (special education, counseling and school psychology); and
- B. The University has established programs in student teaching, pupil services, and administration and leadership.
- C. The programs require locations where the students can obtain educational field practice experience required by the curriculum; and
- D. The District has the appropriate settings needed by the students of these programs as part of their practical learning experience.

#### **TERMS**

In consideration of the mutual promises and conditions in this Agreement and for good and valuable consideration, the University and the District agree as follows:

#### 1.0 Obligations of the District.

- 1.1 The District shall provide to the students of the University educational field practice experience in schools, classes or other appropriate sites of the District, under the direct or indirect supervision of certified employees of the District.
- 1.2 The District will designate appropriate personnel to coordinate the student's educational field practice experience. This will involve working with University faculty and staff to assign students to the appropriate sites as required by the particular program.
- 1.3 The District will recommend to the University the withdrawal of a student if: (1) the achievement, progress, adjustment, or health of the student does not warrant continuation at the District, or (2) the behavior of the student fails to conform to the applicable regulations of the District. The District will assist the University, if necessary, in implementing this recommendation.
- 1.4 The District reserves the right, exercisable in its discretion after consultation with the University, to exclude any student from its premises in the event that such person's conduct or state of health is deemed objectionable or detrimental, having in mind the proper administration of said District.
- 1.5 The District shall provide emergency care in case of illness or accident to any participating student. However, the District shall have no financial obligation pursuant to section 6.1 below.

## 2.0 Obligations of the University.

- 2.1 The University will provide and maintain the records and reports necessary for conducting the student's educational field practice experience.
- 2.2 The University will withdraw a student from the educational field practice program with the District if, after consultation with District personnel, the University determines such action to be warranted.
- 2.3 The University will be responsible for providing a University Supervisor or person designated and employed by the University to direct, supervise, and evaluate the performance of the students of the University engaged in the educational field practice experience. The person(s) will participate cooperatively with those individuals in the District responsible for placement and direct supervision.
- 2.4 The University will provide the District supervisors with student and/or supervisor guides to the required field experience. The guide will include a description of the field experience program, the curriculum and objectives to be achieved, and the responsibilities of the District supervisors at the district and/or school site.
- 2.5 The University will require that each fieldwork student apply for and be issued a Certificate of Clearance from the State of California.

#### 3.0 Reservation of Rights; Placement.

The University and the District each reserve the right to withhold the placement of students depending upon the availability of field locations and personnel to adequately provide a satisfactory educational field practice experience.

#### 4.0 Student Teaching fieldwork Provisions.

Where the District agrees to provide to the students of the University educational field practice experience in the area of student teaching, the following additional provisions will apply:

- 4.1 Student Teaching fieldwork students are defined as persons who are working towards the completion of a credential preparation program and who have met prescribed training prerequisites for field placement. Such students will have met all requirements of the Teacher Education Program prerequisites to student teaching, and will have been issued a Certificate of Clearance from the State of California.
- 4.2 The District agrees to place student teachers from the University in the District schools under guidelines specified by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing and incorporated into the Teacher Education Program of the University.
- 4.3 Participating Master Teachers of the District will receive a stipend in the amount of \$100.00 for each student teaching period.
- 4.4 Arrangements for student teaching placement will be made by the University's Director of Student Teaching with the person designated by the Assistant Superintendent of Schools in the District, according to District policy.

- 4.5 Regular supervision of student teachers by the faculty of the University will be provided during this educational field practice experience.
- 4.6 The District's Master Teachers will be issued a La Sierra University Directed Teaching Handbook, specifying the requirements and regulations of the student teaching program.
- 4.7 The District's Master Teachers will hold a California Clear Professional Credential and will have had a minimum of three years of successful teaching experience, and at least one year in the current teaching assignment.
- 4.8 The District's Master Teachers will be viewed as good professional role models for student teachers, be committed to the teaching profession, and provide the guidance, supervision and evaluation of student teachers as specified in the Directed Teaching Handbook.

#### 5.0 <u>Labor Disputes.</u>

- 5.1 The University is obligated to maintain neutrality in the District's labor disputes, to ensure that all field experiences will be educationally valid, and to avoid placing its students in situations in which there is a risk of physical injury.
- 5.2 In the event of a labor dispute in the District, University students involved in an educational field practice program shall report to the University until the University's Director of Field Practice has assessed the situation.
- 5.3 During a labor dispute at a District field practice experience site, the University faculty members who supervise students will visit the District's school site on a regular basis to observe, to meet with District personnel, and to determine whether the situation remains educationally valid and physically safe for field experience activity.
- 5.4 During a labor dispute, if the situation is educationally valid and physically safe and the District Field Supervisor is present in his/her regular position, the University's Director of Field Practice will allow the students the option of continuing the field practice at that site or of terminating the assignment.

# 6.0 Financial Provision.

- 6.1 Students of the University are individually responsible for medical insurance. However, the University shall provide such workers' compensation for the performance of its employees and students under this Agreement, as may be required by California law.
- 6.2 It is mutually agreed upon that no monetary provisions to the District or from the University will be made for services rendered by the students of the University.

#### 7.0 Term.

- 7.1 This Agreement shall be for a term of five (5) years, beginning on August 9, 2018 and ending without further notice on August 9, 2023.
- 7.2 This Agreement may be renewed by written agreement of both parties.

#### 8.0 Termination.

Either party may terminate this Agreement upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other party except if the University terminates this Agreement based on lack of funding, the thirty (30) days notice requirement shall not apply. The notice required under this clause shall be sent by registered mail.

# 9.0 Non-Assignment and Subcontracting.

The District shall not assign, transfer, or contract for the furnishing of services to be performed under this Agreement without the written approval of the University.

#### 10.0 Hold Harmless.

- 10.1 The University and its field work students hereby agree to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the District and its departments, agents, officers, and employees from any and all claims or sums which the District or any of its departments, agents, officers, or employees may be obligated to pay by reason of any liability of any kind imposed upon them, including damages to property or injury or death of persons, arising out of the performance of services rendered by field work students or caused by any error, omission, or act of the field work student or of any other for whose acts the field work student is legally liable. Said sums shall include, in the event of legal action, court costs, expenses of litigation, and reasonable attorney's fees.
- 10.2 The District agrees that it will indemnify and hold harmless the University, its servants, agents and employees, and any students acting as such, from any and all liability, damage, expense, cause of action, suits, claims, or judgments arising from injury to person(s) or personal property or otherwise which arises out of the act, failure to act, or negligence of the District, its servants, agents, or employees, in connection with or arising out of the activity which is the subject of this Agreement.

#### 11.0 Statement Regarding Fingerprint Clearance

That in accordance with PC 11105.3, pre-service teachers and fieldwork candidates will not be placed in fieldwork experiences in the District with unsupervised access to children until a background check by the Department of Justice, including fingerprint clearance, is complete and reviewed by the District. Subsequent arrest records received by the District will be cause for a District review of continued student suitability. The District will be the sole determiner if it is deemed that the student will be removed from the fieldwork assignment.

#### 12.0 Entire Agreement; Alteration Disclaimer.

- 11.1 This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof.
- 11.2 No alteration or variation of the terms of this Agreement shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by the parties hereto, and no oral understanding of the Agreement not incorporated herein shall be binding on any of the parties hereto.

#### 13.0 Governing Law.

This Agreement shall be governed by and construed under the laws of the State of California, which shall be the forum of any lawsuit arising from or incident to this Agreement.

# 14.0 Severability.

In the event that one or more clauses of this Agreement are declared illegal, void or unenforceable, that shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Agreement.

#### 15.0 Waiver.

The failure of either party to exercise any of its rights under this Agreement for a breach thereof shall not be deemed to be a waiver of such rights, and no waiver by either party, whether written or oral, express or implied, of any rights under or arising from the Agreement shall be binding on any subsequent occasion; and no concession by either party shall be treated as an implied modification of the Agreement unless specifically agreed in writing.

The District routinely enters into agreements with various local universities in order to provide a student teaching experience to students enrolled in various educational programs of the university. The agreement may be terminated by either the University or District at any time.

# **Budget Impact**

# UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, IRVINE STUDENT TEACHING AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT entered into this 27th day of July, 2012 by and between the Regents of the University of California on behalf of the School of Education at the University of California, Irvine (hereinafter called the "University"), and the Laguna Beach Unified School District of Orange County (hereinafter called the "District"). The term of this agreement shall commence on August 1, 2012, and shall continue thereafter until terminated by University or District on thirty (30) day's written notice to the other. Upon execution of this Agreement any previous Student Teaching Agreement between the parties will be automatically terminated. This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties and from the date specified above supersedes all prior written or oral agreements with respect to the subject matter herein.

#### WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of the Education Code, the governing board of any school district is authorized to enter into agreements with a state college, the University of California, or any other university or college accredited by the State Board of Education as a teacher education institution, to provide teaching experience through practice teaching to students enrolled in teacher training curricula of such institutions; and

WHEREAS, an agreement may provide for the payment in money or in services for the services rendered by the District of any amount not to exceed the actual cost to the District of the services rendered; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined between the parties haveto that the payments to be made to the District under this agreement do not exceed the actual cost to the District of the services rendered by the District;

I

NOW, THEREFORE, it is mutually agreed between the parties hereto as follows:

The District shall provide teaching experience through practice teaching in schools and classes of the District. Such practice teaching shall be provided in the District, and under the direct supervision and instruction of such employees of the District, as the District and the University through their duly authorized representatives may agree upon.

T

The District may, for good cause, refuse to accept for practice teaching any student of the University easigned to practice teaching in the District, and upon request of the District, made for good cause, the University shall terminate the sesignment of any student of the University to practice teaching in the District.

"Practice teaching" as used herein and elsewhere in this agreement means active participation in the duties and functions of classroom teaching under the direct supervision and instruction of employees of the District holding credentials issued by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing, other than emergency or provisional credentials, authorizing them to serve as classroom teachers in the Districts or classes in which the practice teaching is provided.

The University will pay the District for the performance by the District of all services required to be performed by the District under this agreement as follows:

An assignment of a student of the University to practice teaching in schools or classes of the District shall be, at the discretion of the University, either for approximately ten (10) weeks or for approximately twenty (20) weeks, but a student may be given more than one assignment by the University to practice teach in such District or classes.

The assignment of a student of the University to practice teach in the District shall be deemed to be effective for the purposes of this agreement as of the date posted on the assignment papers sent to the proper authorities of the District or other document generated by the University effecting such assignment, but not earlier than the date of such assignment as shown on such papers or other document.

Within a reasonable time following the close of the academic term of the University of California, the District shall submit an invoice, in triplicate, to University for payment for practice teaching provided by the District under and in accordance with this agreement during said quarter.

The District shall generate an invoice, in triplicate, executed by a duly authorized representative of the District certifying that the District expended or became obligated to expend in providing such practice teaching an amount not less than the amount of the invoice. University will pay the amount of such invoice from monies made available for such purposes by or pursuant to the laws of the State.

V

Notwithstanding anything herein contained to the contrary, this agreement may be terminated and the provisions of this agreement may be altered, changed, or smended in writing, by mutual consent of the parties herein.

VI

Notwithstanding any other provisions of this agreement, University shall not be obliged by this agreement to pay the District any amount in excess of four hundred dollars (\$400) per student teacher.

VII

The University shall defend, indemnify and hold the District, its officers, agents and employees, harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense (including reasonable attorney's fees) or claims for injury or damages arising out of the performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of the University, its officers, agents or employees.

The District shall defend, indemnify and hold the University, its officers, agents and employees, harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense (including reasonable attorney's fees) or claims for injury or damages arising out of the performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of the District, its officers, agents or employees.

Each party shall maintain in full force and effect, at its sole expense, comprehensive general liability insurance of not less than One Million Dollars.

VII

The District in the performance of this Agreement shall be and act as an independent contractor. The District understands and agrees that its employees, contractors, subcontractors, and agents shall not be considered officers, employees, or agents of University, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided to employees. Contractor assumes the full responsibility for the acts and/or omissions of its employees or agents as they relate to the services to be provided under this Agreement. The District shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state, and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance (as applicable), social security, and income tax withholding with respect to District employees.

# **Proposal**

Staff proposes the Board of Education approve the attached Investment Report as per Board Policy No. 3002 – Investments.

## **Background**

Senate Bill 564 added Government Code section 53646 requiring the chief fiscal officer of each local agency in California to annually render a statement of investment policy and to render quarterly reports to the governing board with respect to the agency's investments. A District Investment Policy was adopted at the October 22, 2002 regular Board meeting.

In addition to reviewing the wording in the bill, there has been an advisory issued from School Legal Services regarding implementation of the requirements in SB564.

Government Code Section 53646 (e) states: "If a local agency has placed all of its investments in...a county investment pool...the chief fiscal officer may supply to the governing body...the most recent statement or statements received by the local agency from these institutions...".

A memo from School Legal Services to districts says, "In most cases, districts in Orange County would be able to rely on the provisions of Section 53646 (e) and provide the most recent statements received by the local agency from the county treasurer. Only in cases where districts have invested surplus funds outside the county treasury, LAIF, or a bank or savings and loan will districts be required to prepare an individualized written report."

On July 3, 1995, the Office of the Treasury-Tax Collector established a separate bank and custody account entitled the Orange County Educational Investment Pool for public education funds. Available at the District Office for review is the June 2018 Treasurer's Management Report from the Orange County Treasurer's Office and the June 2018, bank statements for District funds held outside the County Treasury.

Government Section 53646 (b)(2) states: "the quarterly report shall state compliance of the portfolio to the statement of investment policy." Under section 3430(b), the investment policy specified that the District shall deposit in the Orange County Treasury, pursuant to Education Code section 41001, to be placed to the credit of the proper fund, all General funds, Adult Education funds, Cafeteria funds, Deferred Maintenance funds,

General Obligation Bond funds, Capital Facilities funds, Developer Fees, School Facilities funds, Special Reserve funds, and Foundation Trust funds.

The District and the Orange County Treasury shall make investments of all such funds within the requirements of the "Prudent Investor Rule" in California Probate Code section 16045 et seq.

# **Budget Impact**

District monies are deposited in compliance with Board Policy 3002 – Investments.

# **Recommended Action**

Staff recommends the Board of Education approve the report on District investments and certify that the method of investments is in compliance with the District investment policy.

Per Education Code Section 60119, districts must adopt a resolution attesting to the sufficiency of textbooks and instructional materials within the first eight (8) weeks of the school year. In addition, the Instructional Materials Funding Realignment Program requires a certification. This is a form designed to assist governing boards in assuring compliance with Education Code 60421 (a) and California Code of Regulations (CCR), Title 5, Section 9531 (a). This form certifies current instructional materials adopted for mathematics and reading/language arts are State content standards aligned and may be approved in conjunction with the annual public hearing and resolution required under Education Code Section 60119.

# **Budget Impact**

The District appropriates and spends the funds designated for K-12 State adopted Instructional Materials. There is no additional budget impact for approval of this Resolution and Certification.

WHEREAS, the procedures require that school districts take appropriate action to ensure the availability of textbooks and instructional materials on a yearly basis, and;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Education Code Sections 60119, the Board is required to hold a public hearing to encourage participation by parents, teachers, members of the community interested in the affairs of the school district, and bargaining unit leaders, and;

WHEREAS, the Board is required to provide 10 days' notice of the public hearing or hearings, and;

WHEREAS, the notice shall contain the time, place, and purpose of the hearing and be posted in three public places within the school district, and;

WHEREAS, the hearing shall be held at a time that will encourage the attendance of teachers and parents and guardians of pupils who attend the schools in the district and shall not take place during or immediately following school hours, and;

WHEREAS, the governing Board of a school district, as part of the required hearing, shall also make a written determination as to whether each pupil enrolled in a foreign language or health course has sufficient textbooks or instructional materials that are consistent with the content and cycles of the curriculum frameworks adopted by the state board for those subjects, and;

WHEREAS, the governing Board shall also determine the availability of laboratory science equipment as applicable to science laboratory courses offered in grades 9 to 12, inclusive, and;

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held on September 11, 2018, at 6:00 o'clock p.m., which is on or before the eighth week of school and;

WHEREAS, the Board is required to make a determination, through a resolution, as to whether each pupil in each school in the district has, sufficient textbooks or instructional materials, or both, that are aligned to the content standards adopted pursuant to Education Code Section 60605 and Education Code 33126 in each of the following subjects, as appropriate, that are consistent with the content and cycles of the curriculum framework adopted by the State Board:

(i) Mathematics, Science, (iii) History-social science, English/language including English language development component arts, the adopted program, (v) Visual and performing arts. (Not listed in 60605 or 33126) NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the governing Board makes the determination that each pupil of the district, has available sufficient textbooks or instructional materials, or both, that are aligned to the content standards adopted pursuant to Education Code Section 60605 and Education Code Section 33126 in each subject listed above, consistent with the content and cycles of the curriculum framework adopted by the State Board and adopted by this Board in accordance with the procedures as established. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that for the 2018-19 school year, the Laguna Beach Unified School District, has provided each pupil with sufficient textbooks or instructional materials, or both, that are aligned to the content standards adopted pursuant to Education Code Section 60605 and Education Code Section 33126 in each subject listed above, consistent with the content and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum framework adopted by the State Board for those subjects. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that for the 2018-19 school year, the School District has provided sufficient textbooks or instructional materials, or both, that are consistent with the content and cycles of the curriculum frameworks adopted by the state board, to each pupil enrolled in a foreign language or health course, and that sufficient laboratory science equipment applicable to science laboratory courses offered in grades 9 to 12, inclusive, is available to pupils. ### Laguna Beach Unified School District 2017-18 Unaudited Actuals

The 2017-18 Unaudited Actuals report contains forms that describe the financial position of each fund as of June 30, 2018, and they reflect the District's financial activity that occurred during the July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2018 fiscal year. The Unaudited Actuals also contain supplemental reports concerning the District's capital assets, average daily attendance, restricted programs and other disclosures.

This report of financial position will be provided to the Orange County Department of Education. The independent auditors from Vavrinek, Trine, Day & Co. LLP (VTD) will finalize their review of the District's financial statements in September. The final audit report will be submitted to the State by December 15, 2018.

#### 2017-18 Financial Components

#### 1. Property Tax Revenue

- Property tax revenues were \$51,320,428.
- The District experienced a growth of 6.7%, a \$3,220,956 increase from prior year.
- Property tax revenues are included as "Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) Sources".

#### 2. Education Protection Account (EPA)

- Approved by voters on November 6, 2012, the Schools and Local Public Safety Protection Act of 2012 (Proposition 30) temporarily increased the State's sales tax rate and the personal income tax rates for taxpayers in high tax brackets.
- Proposition 30 funding was set to expire in 2018, however, voters approved Proposition 55 in April 2016, which extended the funding through 2030.
- Revenues generated from Proposition 30 are deposited into a dedicated account called the Education Protection Account (EPA).
- EPA apportionments are calculated as \$200 per Average Daily Attendance (ADA), and the District realized EPA funds of \$578,808 in 2017-18.
- EPA revenues are included as "Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) Sources".

#### 3. Federal and State Programs

- Federal revenue in the general fund totaled \$911,404 and contributed 1.5% of total revenue. Federal revenues were up \$4,799 from June estimates.
- Other state revenues in the general fund totaled \$3,704,188 and contributed 6.1% of total revenue. A recalculation of the STRS On-Behalf contribution resulted in a reduction of nearly \$58,011.
- Except as illustrated under Contributions to Restricted Programs, all federal and state restricted categorical programs are self-funded.

#### 4. Other Local Revenue


- Other Local Revenues are both restricted and unrestricted. Unrestricted local revenue is received for e-rate discounts, donations, interest earnings, facilities use, transportation fees and other miscellaneous sources. Restricted local revenues are received for special education as pass-through funding from the South Orange County SELPA.
- Local revenue receipts totaled \$3,382,074 in 2017-18. This was about \$276,093
  more than projected in June. Increases are attributed to e-rate reimbursements
  and higher interest earnings.

#### **General Fund Revenue Components**

The District receives funding for its general operations from various sources. The types of major funding sources are illustrated below:




#### **Operating Expenditure Components**

The General Fund is used for the majority of the functions within the District. As illustrated below, salaries and benefits comprise 74% of the District's budget, and approximately 26% of the total General Fund is expended on books, classroom supplies, services, utilities, other operating expenses, capital outlay and contributions to restricted resources.

- 1. Cost of Education Expended for Classroom Compensation
  - Laguna Beach Unified School District dedicated 55.88% of its General Fund Budget towards Education Expended for Classroom Compensation. For a unified school district, the minimum percentage requirement must be no less than 55%. The District has met the State requirement.

#### 2. Employee Benefits

• The total dollars budgeted for health benefits in the 2017-18 school year was \$4,559,000. Through employee contributions, the District was able to keep costs below the cap. The final total was \$4,395,309.

#### 3. Books and Supplies

- A textbook adoption is not just about buying new books; rather it focuses on excellent and sustained professional development so teachers have the necessary resources, knowledge, confidence, and strategies to educate students in the classroom to meet the needs of all learners.
- In May 2017, the District approved the textbook adoption for English Language Arts/English Language Development (ELA/ELD) framework. The cost was approximately \$1 million to purchase the selected textbooks.
- For the 2017-18 budget funds were allocated in anticipation of the next major textbook adoption, History/Social Science. However, plans to purchase these new instructional materials follow a rigorous process for evaluation and stakeholder participation. Therefore, approximately \$460,470 has been designated as carryover for 2018-19.

#### 5. Services and Other Operating Expenditures

- Services and operating expenses amounted to \$8,588,050. Costs in this category
  are comprised of utilities, insurance, software and web application licenses,
  consultants, sub-agreements for services, routine maintenance repairs and
  professional development.
- Continued attention to utility usage, water conservation measures and efficiencies in electricity consumption kept utility costs down during the 2017-18 year.
- Various facility projects for routine maintenance were deferred to the 2018-19 school year.

 A decrease in contract services was attributed to reduced services in special education. Nonetheless, local funds still cover an increasing share of special education costs.

#### 6. Capital Outlay

- Capital outlay expenditures in the general fund included Prop 39 Clean Energy Jobs Act projects, CTE equipment, large routine maintenance projects and various equipment purchases at the school sites.
- Capital outlay expenditures were \$1,836,161. Expenditures were \$130K less than projected due to carryover for 4CLE projects.

#### 7. Other Outgo

- Included in this category are payments for Laguna Beach students in country programs and indirect costs.
- \$328,400 was expended, which was lower than expected. The attendance for District funded County programs was slightly lower than projected.

#### 8. Transfers Out

- As planned, a General Fund transfer to the Cafeteria Fund in the amount of \$165,000 was carried out to maintain a positive ending fund balance.
- A transfer of \$900,000 from the General Fund to the Special Reserve Fund (Capital Projects) Fund was fulfilled for the facility, repair and replacement program (FRRP).
- Lastly, a transfer of \$1,200,000 from the General Fund to the Special Reserve Fund (Capital Projects) Fund was realized to fund projects in the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP).

The District ended fiscal year 2017-18 with an unrestricted ending fund balance for the General Fund of \$6,527,606, which is sufficient to meet the State required 3% reserve for economic uncertainty plus an additional 2% per our local requirement for financial reserves. Half a million is committed for the basic aid differential. Another \$857,979 in funds are carry-over for textbook purchases, 4CLE projects and specific site purposes. After Non-Spendable, an unrestricted balance of \$2,138,911 is assigned for potential one-time expenditures in the upcoming fiscal year.

The restricted general fund ending balance is reported at \$2,685,495. These funds will carry forward for Routine Restricted Maintenance, College Readiness, Lottery Instructional Materials and Medi-Cal Billing Option.

#### Other Funds

As illustrated below, all other funds have a positive ending balance at June 30, 2018 and budgets for FY 2018-19 have not been adversely affected by any changes in ending balances for FY 2017-18.

# **Proposal**

Staff proposes the Board of Education approve Resolution #18-08: Increase 2017-2018 Gann Limit by \$3,058,699.35 and Adoption of the 2017-2018 and 2018-2019 District Appropriations Subject to GANN Limits.

# **Background**

Each year the Board approves the GANN Limit calculation. The numbers that go into the calculation are based on specific formulas set by the State according to applicable constitutional and statutory law and supplied to the District by the California Department of Education.

For the 2017-2018 GANN Limit Calculation, there is an increase in the appropriations limit of \$3,058,699.35. The increase of the appropriations limit will permanently increase our appropriations limit and should have virtually no adverse effect due to our increase being absorbed in the State's own total GANN limit. Government code 7902.1(a) states:

If, beginning with the 1980-81 fiscal year or any fiscal year thereafter, the proceeds of taxes of a school district, community college district, or county superintendent of schools, exceed its appropriations limit determined pursuant to Section 7902 for that fiscal year, the governing body of the school district, community college district, or the county superintendent of schools, may increase its appropriations limit to an amount equal to its proceeds of taxes.

Approval by the Board of Education of Resolution #18-08: Increase of \$3,058,699.35 Appropriations Limit to the 2017-2018 GANN Limit will satisfy the requirement of Government Code Section 7902.1(a).

#### **Budget Impact**

No budget impact will result from approval of this Resolution.

#### Recommended Action

Staff recommends the Board of Education approve Resolution #18-08: Increase 2017-2018 Gann Limit by \$3,058,699.35 and Adoption of the 2017-2018 and 2018-2019 District Appropriations Subject to GANN Limits.

- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that this Board does provide public notice that the attached calculations and documentation of the Gann limits for the 2016-17 and 2017-18 fiscal years are made in accord with applicable constitutional and statutory law;
- AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this board does provide public notice that the attached calculations and documentation of the Gann Limits for the 2017-18 and 2018-19 fiscal years include an increase of \$3,058,699.35 to the 2017-18 Gann Limit pursuant to the provisions of Government Code Section 7902.1:
- AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Superintendent notifies the Director of the State Department of Finance of the increase to the 2017-18 Gann Limit;
- AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Board does hereby declare that the appropriations in the Budget for the 2017-18 and 2018-19 fiscal years do not exceed the limitations imposed by Proposition 4;
- AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Superintendent provides copies of this resolution along with the appropriate attachments to interested citizens of this district.

# **Proposal**

Staff proposes the Board of Education approve a temporary interfund transfer of \$6,000,000 from the Special Reserve for Non-Capital Outlay (17) to the General Fund (01).

# **Background**

Pursuant to Education Code Section 42603, the governing board of any school district may direct that moneys held in any fund or account be temporarily transferred to another fund or account of the district for payment of obligations.

The months of October through December are the low cash balance months in the General Fund. Major payrolls begin September 30 and the first major cash receipt from property taxes arrives mid-December. The cash shortage in the General Fund during this period is estimated at \$6,000,000. Therefore, it is requested that funds be transferred from the Special Reserve for Non-Capital Outlay to the General Fund on or about September 12, 2018 with the plan to repay the temporary borrowing on or about December 19, 2018.

An information agenda item will be prepared in January noting the return transfer to Fund 17.

#### **Recommended Action**

Staff recommends the Board of Education approve Resolution 18-09: Temporary interfund transfer of \$6,000,000 from the Special Reserve for Non-Capital Outlay (17) to the General Fund (01).

#### NONDISCRIMINATION IN DISTRICT PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES

#### **BP 0410**

Philosophy, Goals, Objectives and Comprehensive Plans

The Governing Board is committed to providing equal opportunity for all individuals in district programs and activities. District programs, activities, and practices shall be free from unlawful discrimination, including discrimination against an individual or group based on race, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, immigration status, ethnic group identification, ethnicity, age, religion, marital status, pregnancy, parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, or genetic information; a perception of one or more of such characteristics; or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics.

All individuals shall be treated equitably in the receipt of district and school services. Personally identifiable information collected in the implementation of any district program, including, but not limited to, student and family information for the free and reduced-price lunch program, transportation, or any other educational program, shall be used only for the purposes of the program, except when the Superintendent or designee authorizes its use for another purpose in accordance with law. Resources and data collected by the district shall not be used, directly or by others, to compile a list, registry, or database of individuals based on race, gender, sexual orientation, religion, ethnicity, national origin, or immigration status or any other category identified above.

District programs and activities shall be free of any racially derogatory or discriminatory school or athletic team names, mascots, or nicknames.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually review district programs and activities to ensure the removal of any derogatory or discriminatory name, image, practice, or other barrier that may unlawfully prevent an individual or group in any of the protected categories stated above from accessing district programs and activities. They shall take prompt, reasonable actions to remove any identified barrier. The Superintendent or designee shall report their findings and recommendations to the Board after each review.

All allegations of unlawful discrimination in district programs and activities shall be investigated and resolved in accordance with the procedures specified in AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

Pursuant to 34 CFR 104.8 and 34 CFR 106.9, the Superintendent or designee shall notify students, parents/guardians, employees, employee organizations, applicants for admission and employment, and sources of referral for applicants about the district's policy on nondiscrimination and related complaint procedures. Such notification shall be included in the annual parental notification distributed pursuant to Education Code 48980 and, as applicable, in announcements, bulletins, catalogs, handbooks, application forms, or other materials distributed

by the district. The notification shall also be posted on the district's website and social media and in district schools and offices, including staff lounges, student government meeting rooms, and other prominent locations as appropriate.

In addition, the annual parental notification shall inform parents/guardians of their children's right to a free public education regardless of immigration status or religious beliefs, including information on educational rights issued by the California Attorney General. Alternatively, such information may be provided through any other cost-effective means determined by the Superintendent or designee.

The district's nondiscrimination policy and related informational materials shall be published in a format that parents/guardians can understand. In addition, when 15 percent or more of a school's students speak a single primary language other than English, those materials shall be translated into that other language.

#### Access for Individuals with Disabilities

District programs and facilities, viewed in their entirety, shall be in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and any implementing standards and/or regulations. When structural changes to existing district facilities are needed to provide individuals with disabilities access to programs, services, activities, or facilities, the Superintendent or designee shall develop a transition plan that sets forth the steps for completing the changes.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district provides appropriate auxiliary aids and services when necessary to afford individuals with disabilities equal opportunity to participate in or enjoy the benefits of a service, program, or activity. These aids and services may include, but are not limited to, qualified interpreters or readers, assistive listening devices, assistive technologies or other modifications to increase accessibility to district and school websites, notetakers, written materials, taped text, and Braille or large-print materials. Individuals with disabilities shall notify the Superintendent or principal if they have a disability that requires special assistance or services. Reasonable notification should be given prior to a school-sponsored function, program, or meeting.

The individual identified in AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures as the employee responsible for coordinating the district's response to complaints and for complying with state federal civil rights laws is hereby designated as the district's ADA coordinator. They shall receive and address requests for accommodation submitted by individuals with disabilities, and shall investigate and resolve complaints regarding their access to district programs, services, activities, or facilities.

# LOCAL CONTROL AND ACCOUNTABILITY PLAN (LCAP)

#### **BP 0460**

Philosophy, Goals, Objectives and Comprehensive Plans

The Governing Board desires to ensure the most effective use of available funding to improve outcomes for all students. A community-based, comprehensive, data-driven planning process shall be used to identify annual goals and specific actions and to facilitate continuous improvement of district practices.

The Board shall adopt a districtwide local control and accountability plan (LCAP), following the template provided in 5 CCR 15497.5, based on the template adopted by the State Board of Education that addresses the state priorities in Education Code 52060 and any local priorities adopted by the Board. The LCAP shall be updated on or before July 1 of each year and, like the district budget, shall cover the next fiscal year and subsequent two fiscal years

The LCAP shall focus on improving outcomes for all students, particularly those who are "unduplicated students" and other underperforming students or are part of any numerically significant student subgroup that is at risk of or is underperforming.

Unduplicated students include students who are eligible for free or reduced-price meals, English learners, and foster youth and are counted only once for purposes of the local control funding formula.

Numerically significant student subgroups include ethnic subgroups, socioeconomically disadvantaged students, English learners, students with disabilities, foster youth, and homeless students, when there are at least 30 students in the subgroup or at least 15 foster youth or homeless students, or as otherwise defined by the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI).

The Superintendent or designee shall review the Single Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA) submitted by each district school pursuant to Education Code 64001 to ensure that the specific actions included in the LCAP are consistent with strategies included in the SPSA.

The LCAP shall also be aligned with other district and school plans to the extent possible in order to minimize duplication of effort and provide clear direction for program implementation.

Any complaint that the District has not complied with legal requirements pertaining to the LCAP may be filed pursuant to AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

Plan Development

The Superintendent or designee shall gather data and information needed for effective and meaningful plan development and present it to the Board and community. Such data and information shall include, but not be limited to, data regarding the numbers of students in various student subgroups, disaggregated data on student achievement levels, and information about current programs and expenditures.

The District shall consult with teachers, principals, administrators, other school personnel, employee bargaining units, parents/guardians, and students in developing the LCAP. Consultation with students shall enable unduplicated students and other numerically significant student subgroups to review and comment on LCAP development and may include surveys of students, student forums, student advisory committees, and/or meetings with student government bodies or other groups representing students.

# Public Review and Input

The District shall establish a parent advisory committee to review and comment on the LCAP. The committee shall be composed of a majority of parents/guardians and shall include at least one parent/guardian of an unduplicated student as defined above.

Whenever district enrollment includes at least 15 percent English learners, with at least 50 students who are English learners, the district shall establish an English learner parent advisory committee composed of a majority of parents/guardians of English learners.

The Superintendent or designee shall present the LCAP to the committee(s) before it is submitted to the Board for adoption, and shall respond in writing to comments received from the committee(s).

The Superintendent or designee shall notify members of the public of the opportunity to submit written comments regarding the specific actions and expenditures proposed to be included in the LCAP. The notification shall be provided using the most efficient method of notification possible, which may not necessarily include producing printed notices or sending notices by mail. All written notifications related to the LCAP shall be provided in the primary language of parents/guardians when required by Education Code 48985.

As part of the parent and community engagement process, the district shall solicit input on effective and appropriate instructional methods, including, but not limited to, establishing language acquisition programs to enable all students, including English learners and native English speakers, to have access to the core academic content standards and to become proficient in English.

The Board shall hold at least one public hearing to solicit the recommendations and comments of members of the public regarding the specific actions and expenditures proposed to be included in the LCAP. The public hearing shall be held at the same meeting as the budget hearing required pursuant to Education Code 42127 and AR 3100 - Budget.

#### Adoption of the Plan

The Board shall adopt the LCAP prior to adopting the district budget, but at the same public meeting. This meeting shall be held after the public hearing described above, but not on the same day as the hearing.

The Board may adopt revisions to the LCAP at any time during the period in which the plan is in effect, provided the Board follows the process to adopt the LCAP pursuant to Education Code 52062 and the revisions are adopted in a public meeting.

#### Submission of Plan to County Superintendent of Schools

Not later than five days after adoption of the LCAP, the Board shall file the LCAP with the County Superintendent of Schools.

If the County Superintendent sends, by August 15, a written request for clarification of the contents of the LCAP, the Board shall respond in writing within 15 days of the request. If the County Superintendent then submits recommendations for amendments to the LCAP within 15 days of receiving the Board's response, the Board shall consider those recommendations in a public meeting within 15 days of receiving the recommendations.

# **Monitoring Progress**

The Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board, at least annually in accordance with the timeline and indicators established by them and the Board, regarding the district's progress toward attaining each goal identified in the LCAP. Evaluation shall include, but not be limited to, an assessment of district and school performance on the California School Dashboard. Evaluation data shall be used to recommend any necessary revisions to the LCAP.

#### Technical Assistance/Intervention

When it is in the best interest of the district, the Board may submit a request to the County Superintendent for technical assistance, including, but not limited to:

- 1. Assistance in the identification of district strengths and weaknesses in regard to state priorities and review of effective, evidence-based programs that apply to the district's goals
- 2. Assistance from an academic expert, team of academic experts, or another district in the county in identifying and implementing effective programs to improve the outcomes for student subgroups
- 3. Advice and assistance from the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence established pursuant to Education Code 52074

In the event that the County Superintendent requires the district to receive technical assistance pursuant to Education Code 52071, the Board shall review all recommendations received from the County Superintendent or other advisor and shall consider revisions to the LCAP as appropriate in accordance with the process specified in Education Code 52062.

If the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI) identifies the district as needing intervention pursuant to Education Code 52072, the district shall cooperate with any action taken by the SPI or any academic advisor appointed by the SPI, which may include one or more of the following:

- 1. Revision of the district's LCAP
- 2. Revision of the district's budget in accordance with changes in the LCAP

3. A determination to stay or rescind any district action that would prevent the district from improving outcomes for all student subgroups, provided that action is not required by a collective bargaining agreement

#### **ACCOUNTABILITY**

#### **BP 0500**

Philosophy, Goals, Objectives and Comprehensive Plans

The Governing Board recognizes its responsibility to ensure accountability to the public for the performance of the district and each district school. The Board shall regularly review the effectiveness of district programs, personnel, and fiscal operations, with a focus on the capacity to improve student achievement. The Board shall establish appropriate processes and measures to monitor results and to evaluate progress toward accomplishing the district's vision and goals set forth in the local control and accountability plan (LCAP).

District and school performance shall be annually evaluated based on multiple measures specified in the California Accountability and Continuous Improvement System as reported on the California School Dashboard.

The district's alternative schools serving high-risk student populations, including continuation high schools, opportunity schools, community day schools, and nonpublic, nonsectarian schools pursuant to Education Code 56366, shall be subject to an alternative accountability system established by the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

The district and each district school shall demonstrate comparable improvement in academic achievement for all numerically significant student subgroups. Numerically significant subgroups include ethnic subgroups, socioeconomically disadvantaged students, English learners, students with disabilities, foster youth, and homeless students, when the subgroup consists of at least 30 students with a valid test score or 15 foster youth or homeless students.

The Superintendent shall provide regular reports to the Board and the public regarding district and school performance. Opportunities for feedback from students, parents/guardians, staff, and community members shall be made available as part of any review and evaluation of district programs and operations and as part of the development or annual update of the LCAP.

Evaluation results may be used as a basis for revising district or school goals, updating the LCAP or other comprehensive plans, identifying and developing strategies to address disparities in achievement among student subgroups, implementing programmatic changes, determining the need for additional support and assistance, awarding incentives or rewards, and establishing other performance-based consequences.

# **Community Relations**

The Governing Board recognizes that the District has the primary responsibility to ensure compliance with applicable state and federal laws and regulations governing educational programs. The Board encourages the early, informal resolution of complaints whenever possible and appropriate. To resolve complaints which cannot be resolved through such informal process, the Board adopts the uniform system of complaint processes specified in 5 CCR 4600-4670 and the accompanying administrative regulation.

The District's uniform complaint procedures (UCP) shall be used to investigate and resolve the following complaints:

- 1. Any complaint alleging District violation of applicable state or federal law or regulations governing adult education programs, after school education and safety programs, migrant education, bilingual education, peer assistance and review programs for teachers, career technical and technical education and training programs, child care and development programs, child nutrition programs, compensatory education programs, consolidated categorical aid programs, Economic Impact Aid, English learner programs, federal education programs in Title I-VII, Regional Occupational Centers and Programs, school safety plans, special education programs, Tobacco-Use Prevention Education programs, and any other district-implemented program which is listed in Education Code 64000(a) (5 CCR 4610).
- 2. Any complaint alleging the occurrence of unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying) against any student, employee, or other person participating in District programs and activities, including, but not limited to, those programs or activities funded directly by or that receive or benefit from any state financial assistance, based on the person's actual or perceived characteristics of race or ethnicity, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, immigration status, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital status, pregnancy, parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, or genetic information, or any other characteristic identified in Education Code 200 or 220, Government Code 11135, or Penal Code 422.55, or based on their association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics
- 3. Any complaint alleging District noncompliance with the requirement to provide reasonable accommodation to a lactating student on school campus to express breast milk, breastfeed an infant child, or address other breastfeeding-related needs of the student
- 4. Any complaint alleging District noncompliance with the prohibition against requiring students to pay fees, deposits, or other charges for participation in educational activities

- 5. Any complaint alleging District noncompliance with legal requirements related to the implementation of the local control and accountability plan
- 6. Any complaint, by or on behalf of any student who is a foster youth, alleging District noncompliance with any legal requirement applicable to the student regarding placement decisions, the responsibilities of the District's educational liaison to the student, the award of credit for coursework satisfactorily completed in another school or district, school transfer, or the grant of an exemption from Board-imposed graduation requirements
- 7. Any complaint, by or on behalf of a homeless student as defined in 42 USC 11434a, alleging District noncompliance with any requirement applicable to the student regarding the award of credit for coursework satisfactorily completed in another school or district or the grant of an exemption from Board-imposed graduation requirements
- 8. Any complaint, by or on behalf of a former juvenile court school student, or a child of a military family as defined in Education Code 49701 who transfers into the district after his/her second year of high school, alleging district noncompliance with any requirement applicable to the student regarding the award of credit for coursework satisfactorily completed in another school or district or the grant of an exemption from Board-imposed graduation requirements
- 9. Any complaint alleging District noncompliance with the requirements of Education Code 51228.1 and 51228.2 that prohibit the assignment of a student in grades 9-12 to a course without educational content for more than one week in any semester or to a course the student has previously satisfactorily completed, without meeting specified conditions
- 10. Any complaint alleging District noncompliance with the physical education instructional minutes requirement for students in elementary school
- 11. Any complaint alleging retaliation against a complainant or other participant in the complaint process or anyone who has acted to uncover or report a violation subject to this policy
- 12. Any other complaint subject to this procedure as specified in a district policy.

The Board recognizes that alternative dispute resolution (ADR) can, depending on the nature of the allegations, offer a process to reach a resolution to the complaint that is acceptable to all parties. ADR such as mediation may be offered to resolve complaints that involve more than one student and no adult. However, mediation shall not be offered or used to resolve any complaint involving sexual assault or where there is a reasonable risk that a party to the mediation would feel compelled to participate. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the use of ADR is consistent with state and federal laws and regulations.

The District shall protect all complainants from retaliation. In investigating complaints, the confidentiality of the parties involved shall be protected as required by law. As appropriate for

any complaint alleging retaliation or unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying), the Superintendent or designee shall keep confidential the identity of the complainant and/or the subject of the complaint if they are different from the complainant, as long as the integrity of the complaint process is maintained.

When an allegation that is not subject to the UCP is included in a UCP complaint, the district shall refer the non-UCP allegation to the appropriate staff or agency and shall investigate and, if appropriate, resolve the UCP-related allegation(s) through the district's UCP.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training to district staff to ensure awareness and knowledge of current law and related requirements, including the steps and timelines specified in this policy and the accompanying administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain records of all UCP complaints and the investigations of those complaints. All such records shall be destroyed in accordance with applicable state law and District policy.

# Non-UCP Complaints

The following complaints shall not be subject to the District's UCP but shall be referred to the specified agency:

- 1. Any complaint alleging child abuse or neglect shall be referred to the County Department of Social Services, the County Protective Services Division, and the appropriate law enforcement agency.
- Any complaint alleging health and safety violations by a child development program shall, for licensed facilities, be referred to Department of Social Services and shall, for licensing-exempt facilities, be referred to the appropriate Child Development regional administrator.
- 3. Any complaint alleging fraud shall be referred to the Legal, Audits and Compliance Branch of the California Department of Education.

Any complaint alleging employment discrimination or harassment shall be investigated and resolved by the district in accordance with the procedures specified in AR 4030 - Nondiscrimination in Employment.

In addition, the District's Williams Uniform Complaint Procedures, AR 1312.4, shall be used to investigate and resolve any complaint related to sufficiency of textbooks or instructional materials, emergency or urgent facilities conditions that pose a threat to the health or safety of students or staff, or teacher vacancies and misassignments.

#### DRUG AND ALCOHOL FREE SCHOOLS

#### **BP 3513.4**

**Business and Noninstructional Operations** 

The Governing Board recognizes the need to keep district schools free of drugs and alcohol in order to create a safe and healthy environment conducive to learning and promote student health and well-being. The Board prohibits the possession, use, or sale of drugs and alcohol at any time in district-owned or leased buildings, on district property, and in district vehicles, unless otherwise permitted by law.

The following substances are prohibited on all district property:

- 1. Any substance which may not lawfully be possessed, used, or sold in California
- 2. Cannabis or cannabis products
- 3. Alcoholic beverages, unless approved by the Superintendent or designee for limited purposes specified in Business and Professions Code 25608

Prescription medication, except for prescribed cannabis, may be administered at school in accordance with law, district policy and regulations, and written statements by the parent/guardian and the student's authorized health care provider as applicable.

Information about the district's drug- and alcohol-free schools policy and the consequences for violations shall be communicated clearly to employees, parents/guardians, students, and the community.

# Enforcement/Discipline

The Superintendent or designee shall take appropriate action to eliminate the possession, use, or sale of alcohol and other drugs and related paraphernalia in district facilities, on district property, in district vehicles, or at school-sponsored activities. As appropriate, they may direct anyone violating this policy to leave school property and/or refer the matter to law enforcement.

Students and employees who violate the terms of this policy may be subject to discipline and/or referred to assistance programs in accordance with law and Board policy.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL SAFETY**

#### **BP 3514**

**Business and Noninstructional Operations** 

The Governing Board recognizes its obligation to provide a safe and healthy environment at school facilities for students, staff, and community members. The Superintendent or designee shall regularly assess school facilities to identify environmental health risks and shall develop strategies to prevent and/or mitigate environmental hazards. They shall consider the proven effectiveness of various options, anticipated short-term and long-term costs and/or savings to the district, and the potential impact on staff and students, including the impact on student achievement and attendance.

Such strategies shall focus on maximizing healthy indoor air quality; monitoring the quality of outdoor air and adjusting outdoor activities as necessary; reducing exposure to vehicle emissions; minimizing exposure to lead and mercury; reducing the risk of unsafe drinking water; inspecting and properly abating asbestos; appropriately storing, using, and disposing of potentially hazardous substances; using effective least toxic pest management practices; reducing the risk of foodborne illness; and addressing any other environmental hazards identified during facilities inspections.

In developing strategies to promote healthy school environments, the Superintendent or designee may consult and collaborate with local environmental protection agencies, health agencies, water boards, and other community organizations.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide the district's maintenance and facilities staff, food services staff, teachers, and other staff as appropriate with professional development regarding their responsibilities in implementing strategies to improve and maintain environmentally safe and healthy schools.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify the Board, staff, parents/guardians, students, and/or governmental agencies, as appropriate, if an environmental hazard is discovered at a school site. The notification shall provide information about the district's actions to remedy the hazard and may recommend health screening of staff and students.

#### **HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCES**

#### BP 3514.1

**Business and Noninstructional Operations** 

The Governing Board desires to provide a safe school environment that protects students and employees from exposure to any potentially hazardous substances used in the district's educational program and in the maintenance and operation of district facilities and equipment.

Insofar as reasonably possible, the Superintendent or designee shall minimize the quantities of hazardous substances stored and used on school property. When hazardous substances must be used, the Superintendent or designee shall give preference to materials that cause the least risk to people and the environment.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all potentially hazardous substances on district properties are inventoried, used, stored, and regularly disposed of in a safe and legal manner.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop, implement, and maintain a written hazard communication program in accordance with 8 CCR 5194 and shall ensure that employees, students, and others as necessary are fully informed about the properties and potential hazards of substances to which they may be exposed.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop specific measures to ensure the safety of students and staff in school laboratories where hazardous chemicals are used. Such measures shall include the development and implementation of a chemical hygiene plan in accordance with 8 CCR 5191 and instruction to students about proper handling of hazardous substances.

The Superintendent or designee shall not order or purchase for use in grades K-6 any arts and crafts materials containing a substance determined by the California Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment to be toxic. The Superintendent or designee shall not purchase any such toxic material for use in grades 7-12 unless it includes a warning label as specified in Education Code 32065 that identifies any toxic ingredients, warns of potential adverse health effects, and describes procedures for safe use and storage.

#### EMERGENCIES AND DISASTER PREPAREDNESS PLAN

#### **BP 3516**

Business and Noninstructional Operations

The Governing Board recognizes that all district staff and students must be prepared to respond quickly and responsibly to emergencies, disasters, and threats of disaster. The district shall take all reasonable steps to prevent and/or mitigate the impact of a disaster on district students, staff, and schools.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop and maintain a disaster preparedness plan which contains routine and emergency disaster procedures, including, but not limited to, earthquake emergency procedures, and adaptations for individuals with disabilities in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. Such procedures shall be incorporated into the comprehensive school safety plan.

In developing the disaster preparedness plan, the Superintendent or designee shall involve district staff at all levels, including administrators, school resource officers, facilities managers, transportation managers, food services personnel, school psychologists, counselors, school nurses, teachers, classified employees, and public information officers. As appropriate, they shall also collaborate with law enforcement, fire safety officials, emergency medical services, health and mental health professionals, parents/guardians, and students.

The plan shall comply with state-approved Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS) guidelines established for multiple-jurisdiction or multiple-agency operations and with the National Incident Management System.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training to employees regarding their responsibilities, including periodic drills and exercises to test and refine staff's responsiveness in the event of an emergency.

The Board shall grant the use of school buildings, grounds, and equipment to public agencies, including the American Red Cross, for mass care and welfare shelters during disasters or other emergencies affecting the public health and welfare. The Board shall cooperate with such agencies in furnishing and maintaining whatever services the district may deem necessary to meet the community's needs.

#### LACTATION ACCOMMODATION

#### **BP 4033**

#### Personnel

The Governing Board recognizes the immediate and long-term health advantages of breastfeeding for infants and mothers and desires to provide a supportive environment for any district employee to express milk for her infant child upon her return to work following the birth of the child. The Board prohibits discrimination, harassment, and/or retaliation against any district employee who chooses to express breast milk for her infant child while at work.

The district shall provide a reasonable amount of break time to accommodate an employee each time she has a need to express breast milk for her infant child.

To the extent possible, such break time shall run concurrently with the break time already provided to the employee. Any additional break time used by a non-exempt employee for this purpose shall be unpaid.

The employee shall be provided a private location, other than a restroom, which is in close proximity to her work area and meets the requirements of Labor Code 1031 and 29 USC 207, as applicable.

Employees are encouraged to notify their supervisor or other appropriate personnel in advance of their intent to make use of the accommodations offered for employees who are nursing mothers. As needed, the supervisor shall work with the employee to address arrangements and scheduling in order to ensure that the employees' essential job duties are covered during the break time.

Lactation accommodations may be denied only in limited circumstances in accordance with law.

Before an employee's supervisor makes a determination to deny lactation accommodations, they shall consult the Superintendent or designee. In any case in which lactation accommodations are denied, the Superintendent or designee shall document the options that were considered and the reasons for denying the accommodations.

#### RECRUITMENT AND SELECTION

#### BP 4111/4211/4311

Personnel

The Governing Board is committed to employing suitable, qualified individuals to effectively carry out the district's vision, mission and goals.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop equitable, fair, and transparent recruitment and selection processes and procedures that ensure individuals are selected based on demonstrated knowledge, skills, and competence and not on any bias, personal preference, or unlawful discrimination.

When a vacancy occurs, the Superintendent or designee shall review the job description for the position to ensure that it accurately describes the major functions and duties of the position. They also shall disseminate job announcements to ensure a wide range of candidates.

The district's selection procedures shall include screening processes, interviews, recommendations from previous employers, and observations when appropriate, as necessary to identify the best possible candidate for a position. The Superintendent or designee may establish an interview committee to rank candidates and recommend finalists.

During job interviews, applicants may be asked to describe or demonstrate how they will be able to perform the duties of the job. All discussions and recommendations shall be confidential in accordance with law. No inquiry shall be made with regard to any category of discrimination prohibited by state or federal law.

For each position, the Superintendent or designee shall present to the Board one candidate who meets all qualifications established by law and the Board for the position. No person shall be employed by the Board without the recommendation or endorsement of the Superintendent or designee.

#### **Incentives**

With Board approval and in accordance with district needs, the district may provide incentives to recruit teachers, administrators or other employees, such as signing bonuses, assistance with beginning teacher induction and/or credential costs, mentoring, additional compensation, and/or subsidized housing.

#### SEXUAL HARASSMENT

#### BP 4119.11/4219.11/4319.11

Personnel

The Governing Board is committed to providing a safe work environment that is free of harassment and intimidation. The Board prohibits sexual harassment against district employees and retaliatory behavior or action against any person who complains, testifies, or otherwise participates in the complaint process established for the purpose of this policy.

Sexual harassment includes, but is not limited to, harassment that is based on the gender, gender identity, gender expression, or sexual orientation of the victim.

This policy shall apply to all district employees and to other persons on district property or with some employment relationship with the district, such as interns, volunteers, contractors, and job applicants.

Any district employee who engages or participates in sexual harassment or who aids, abets, incites, compels, or coerces another to commit sexual harassment in violation of this policy is subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

The Superintendent or designee shall take all actions necessary to ensure the prevention, investigation, and correction of sexual harassment, including but not limited to:

- 1. Providing training to employees in accordance with law and administrative regulation
- 2. Publicizing and disseminating the district's sexual harassment policy to employees and others to whom the policy may apply
- 3. Ensuring prompt, thorough, and fair investigation of complaints
- 4. Taking timely and appropriate corrective/remedial action(s), which may require interim separation of the complainant and the alleged harasser and subsequent monitoring of developments

Any district employee who feels that they have been sexually harassed in the performance of their district responsibilities or who has knowledge of any incident of sexual harassment by or against another employee shall immediately report the incident to their direct supervisor, another supervisor, the district's coordinator for nondiscrimination, the Superintendent, or if available, a complaint hotline or an ombudsman. A supervisor or administrator who receives a harassment complaint shall promptly notify the coordinator.

All complaints and allegations of sexual harassment shall be kept confidential to the extent necessary to carry out the investigation or to take other subsequent necessary actions.

A supervisor, principal or other district administrator who receives a harassment complaint shall promptly notify the Superintendent or designee.

Complaints of sexual harassment shall be filed in accordance with AR 4030 - Nondiscrimination in Employment. An employee may bypass their supervisor in filing a complaint where the supervisor is the subject of the complaint.

#### EMPLOYEE SECURITY

BP 4158/4258/4358

Personnel

The Governing Board desires to provide a safe and orderly work environment for all employees. As part of the district's comprehensive safety plan, the Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies for protecting employees from potentially dangerous persons and situations and for providing necessary assistance and support when emergency situations occur.

Any employee against whom violence or any threat of violence has been directed in the workplace shall notify the Superintendent or designee immediately. As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee shall initiate legal and security measures to protect the employee and others in the workplace.

The Superintendent or designee may pursue legal action on behalf of an employee against a student or their parent/guardian to recover damages to the employee or their property caused by the student's willful misconduct that occurred on district property, at a school or district activity, or in retaliation for lawful acts of the employee in the performance of their duties.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that employees receive training in crisis prevention and intervention techniques in order to protect themselves and students. Staff development may include training in classroom management, effective communication techniques, procedures for responding to an active shooter situation, and crisis resolution.

The Superintendent or designee also shall inform teachers, in accordance with law, of crimes and offenses committed by students who may pose a danger in the classroom.

The Superintendent or designee may make available at appropriate locations, including, but not limited to, district and school offices, gyms, and classrooms, communication devices that would enable two-way communication with law enforcement and others when emergencies occur.

Use of Pepper Spray

Employees shall not carry or possess pepper spray on school property or at school activities, except when authorized by the Superintendent or designee for self-defense purposes. When allowed, an employee may only possess pepper spray in accordance with administrative regulations and Penal Code 22810. Any employee who is negligent or careless in the possession or handling of pepper spray shall be subject to appropriate disciplinary measures.

# Reporting of Injurious Objects

The Board requires employees to take immediate action upon being made aware that any person is in possession of a weapon or unauthorized injurious object on school grounds or at a school-related or school-sponsored activity. The employee shall use their own judgment as to the potential danger involved and shall do one of the following:

- 1. Confiscate the object and deliver it to the principal immediately
- 2. Immediately notify the principal, who shall take appropriate action
- 3. Immediately call 911 and the principal

When informing the principal about the possession or seizure of a weapon or dangerous device, the employee shall report the name(s) of persons involved, witnesses, location, and the circumstances of any seizure.

#### **ADMISSION**

# BP 5111

Students

The Governing Board encourages the enrollment and appropriate placement of all school-aged children in school. The Superintendent or designee shall inform parents/guardians of children seeking admission to a district school at any grade level about admission requirements and shall assist them with enrollment procedures.

The Superintendent or designee shall announce and publicize the timeline and process for registration of students at district schools. Applications for intradistrict or interdistrict enrollment shall be subject to the timelines specified in applicable Board policies and administrative regulations.

All appropriate staff shall receive training on district admission policies and procedures, including information regarding the types of documentation that can and cannot be requested.

The district's enrollment application shall include information about the health care options and enrollment assistance available to families within the district. The district shall not discriminate against any child for not having health care coverage and shall not use any information relating to a child's health care coverage or their interest in learning about health care coverage in any manner that would harm the child or their family.

# Verification of Admission Eligibility

Before enrolling any child in a district school, the Superintendent or designee shall verify the child's age, residency, immunization, and other applicable eligibility criteria specified in law, the accompanying administrative regulation, or other applicable Board policy or administrative regulation.

The district shall not inquire into or request documentation of a student's social security number or the last four digits of the social security number or the citizenship or immigration status of the student or their family members.

However, such information may be collected when required by state or federal law or to comply with requirements for special state or federal programs. In any such situation, the information shall be collected separately from the school enrollment process and the Superintendent or designee shall explain the limited purpose for which the information is collected. Enrollment in a district school shall not be denied on the basis of any such information of the student or their parents/guardians obtained by the district, or the student's or parent/guardian's refusal to provide such information to the district.

School registration information shall list all possible means of documenting a child's age for grades K-1 as authorized by Education Code 48002 or otherwise prescribed by the Board. Any alternative document allowed by the district shall be one that all persons can obtain regardless of immigration status, citizenship status, or national origin and shall not reveal information related to citizenship or immigrant status.

The Superintendent or designee shall immediately enroll a homeless student, foster youth, student who has had contact with the juvenile justice system, or a child of a military family regardless of outstanding fees or fines owed to the student's last school, lack of clothing normally required by the school, such as school uniforms, or their inability to produce previous academic, medical, or other records normally required for enrollment.

#### **DISTRICT RESIDENCY**

BP 5111.1 Students

The Governing Board desires to admit all students who reside within district boundaries or who fulfill the district residency requirements through other means as allowed by law. The Superintendent or designee shall develop procedures to facilitate the receipt and verification of students' proof of residency.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually notify parents/guardians of all existing attendance options available in the district, including, but not limited to, all options for meeting residency requirements for school attendance.

The Superintendent or designee shall require parents/guardians to provide documentation of the student's residency upon admission to a district school. A copy of the document or written statement offered as verification of residency shall be maintained in the student's mandatory permanent record.

When establishing students' residency for enrollment purposes, the Superintendent or designee shall not inquire into the citizenship or immigration status of students or their family members.

A student's enrollment may be denied when the submitted documentation is insufficient to establish district residency. In any such case, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parent/guardian in writing, including specific reasons for the denial.

## Investigation of Residency

When the Superintendent or designee reasonably believes that a student's parent/guardian has provided false or unreliable evidence of residency, they may make reasonable efforts to determine that the student meets district residency requirements. An investigation may be initiated when the Superintendent or designee is able to identify specific, articulable facts supporting the belief that the parent/guardian has provided false or unreliable evidence of residency.

The Superintendent or designee may assign a trained district employee to conduct the investigation. The investigation may include the examination of records, including public records, and/or interviews of persons who may have knowledge of the student's residency.

If necessary, the Superintendent or designee may employ the services of a private investigator to conduct the investigation. Before hiring a private investigator, the Superintendent or designee shall make other reasonable efforts to determine whether the student resides in the district.

The investigation shall not include the surreptitious collection of photographic or videographic images of persons or places subject to the investigation. However, the use of technology is not prohibited if done in open and public view.

Any employee or contractor engaged in the investigation shall truthfully identify themselves as an investigator to individuals contacted or interviewed during the course of the investigation.

# Appeal of Enrollment Denial

If the Superintendent or designee, upon investigation, determines that a student does not meet district residency requirements and denies the student's enrollment in the district, they shall provide the student's parent/guardian an opportunity to appeal that determination.

The Superintendent or designee shall send the student's parent/guardian written notice specifying the basis for the district's determination. This notice shall also inform the parent/guardian that they may, within 10 school days, appeal the decision and provide new evidence of residency.

The burden shall be on the parent/guardian to show why the district's determination to deny enrollment should be overruled.

A student who is currently enrolled in the district shall be allowed to remain in attendance at their school pending the results of the appeal. A student who is not currently enrolled in the district shall not be permitted to attend any district school unless their appeal is successful.

In an appeal to the Superintendent of a determination that district residency requirements were not met, the Superintendent shall review any evidence provided by the parent/guardian or obtained during the district's investigation and shall make a decision within 10 school days of receipt of the parent/guardian's request for the appeal. The Superintendent's decision shall be final.

## Enrollment Not Requiring District Residency

When approved by the Board and the appropriate agency, the district may enroll students from other countries who are participating in an international exchange program under the sponsorship of a government-approved agency. #### CHRONIC ABSENCE AND TRUANCY

BP 5113.1

Students

The Governing Board believes that absenteeism, whatever the cause, may be an early warning sign of poor academic achievement and may put students at risk of dropping out of school. The Board desires to ensure that all students attend school in accordance with the state's compulsory education law and take full advantage of educational opportunities provided by the district.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a system to accurately track student attendance in order to identify individual students who are chronic absentees and truants, as defined in law and administrative regulation, and to identify patterns of absence throughout the district. They shall provide the Board with data on school attendance, chronic absence, and truancy rates districtwide, for all district students, for each school, and disaggregated for each numerically significant student subgroup as defined in Education Code 52052. Such data shall be used in the development of annual goals and specific actions for student attendance and engagement to be included in the district's local control and accountability plan and other applicable school and district plans.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies that focus on prevention of attendance problems, which may include, but are not limited to, efforts to provide a safe and positive school environment, relevant and engaging learning experiences, school activities that help develop students' feelings of connectedness with the school, school-based health services, and incentives and rewards to recognize students who achieve excellent attendance or demonstrate significant improvement in attendance. The Superintendent or designee also shall develop strategies that enable early outreach to students as soon as they show signs of poor attendance.

The Superintendent or designee shall consult with students, parents/guardians, school staff, and community agencies, as appropriate, to identify factors contributing to chronic absence and truancy.

Interventions for students with serious attendance problems shall be designed to meet the specific needs of the student and may include, but are not limited to, health care referrals, transportation assistance, counseling for mental or emotional difficulties, academic supports, efforts to address school or community safety concerns, discussions with the student and parent/guardian about their attitudes regarding schooling, or other strategies to remove identified barriers to school attendance. The Superintendent or designee may collaborate with child welfare services, law enforcement, courts, public health care agencies, other government agencies, and/or medical, mental health, and oral health care providers to make alternative educational programs and support services available for students and families.

Students who are identified as truant shall be subject to the interventions specified in law and administrative regulation.

A student's truancy, tardiness, or other absence from school shall not be the basis for their suspension or expulsion. Alternative strategies and positive reinforcement for attendance shall be used whenever possible.

The Superintendent or designee shall periodically report to the Board regarding the district's progress in improving student attendance rates for all students and for each numerically significant student population. Such information shall be used to evaluate the effectiveness of strategies implemented to reduce chronic absence and truancy and to make changes as needed. As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee shall engage school staff in program evaluation and improvement and in the determination of how to best allocate available community resources.

#### DISTRICT SCHOOL ATTENDANCE REVIEW BOARD

#### **BP 5113.12**

Students

The Governing Board recognizes that poor school attendance and behavior problems negatively impact student achievement and put students at greater risk of dropping out of school. The Superintendent or designee shall establish a comprehensive and integrated system for the early identification of attendance problems and shall implement strategies to encourage students' attendance. After other interventions have been exhausted, students with a pattern of unexcused absences may be referred to a school attendance review board (SARB), in accordance with applicable law, in order to receive intensive guidance and assistance.

The SARB shall maintain a continuing inventory of community resources, including alternative educational programs.

The Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with the SARB and appropriate community agencies, including, but not limited to, law enforcement agencies, child welfare agencies, and health services, to provide school-based and/or community-based interventions tailored to the specific needs of the student.

The Board shall appoint members to the district's SARB, who may include a parent/guardian as well as representatives of various agencies including, but not limited to, school districts; the county probation department; the county welfare department; the County Superintendent of Schools; law enforcement agencies; community-based youth service centers; school guidance personnel; child welfare and attendance personnel; school or county health care personnel; school, county, or community mental health personnel; the county district attorney's office; and the county public defender's office.

The district's SARB shall provide support to improve student attendance and behavior through proactive efforts focused on building positive school environments and improved school connectedness, early identification and immediate intervention to re-engage students with poor attendance or behavior, and intensive intervention with students and families to address severe or persistent attendance or behavior issues.

The district's SARB shall operate in accordance with Education Code 48320-48325, the Brown Act (Government Code 54950-54963), and the bylaws of the SARB.

The SARB shall collect data and annually report outcomes on SARB referrals to the Governing Board, Superintendent or designee, and County Superintendent of Schools.

## INTERDISTRICT ATTENDANCE

#### **BP 5117**

Students

The Governing Board recognizes that parents/guardians of students who reside within the geographic boundaries of one district may, for a variety of reasons, desire to enroll their children in a school in another district.

#### **Interdistrict Attendance Permits**

The Board may enter into an agreement with any other school district, for a term not to exceed one school year, for the interdistrict attendance of students who are residents of the districts. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the interdistrict attendance agreements specify the terms and conditions agreed by both districts for granting, denial, or revocation of the agreement as well as the standards for reapplication.

The agreement shall specify the terms and conditions under which interdistrict attendance shall be permitted or denied. It also may contain standards agreed to by both districts for reapplication and/or revocation of the student's permit.

Upon receiving a permit for transfer into the district that has been approved by the student's district of residence, or upon receiving a written request from the parent/guardian of a district student who wishes to enroll in another district, the Superintendent or designee shall review the request and may approve or deny the permit subject to the terms and conditions of the interdistrict attendance agreement.

# Transportation

The district shall not provide transportation beyond any school attendance area. Upon request of a student's parent/guardian, the Superintendent or designee may authorize transportation for an interdistrict transfer student to and from designated bus stops within the attendance area of the school that the student attends if space is available.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the interdistrict attendance agreements specify the terms and conditions agreed by both districts for granting, denial, or revocation of the agreement as well as the standards for reapplication.

The agreement shall specify the terms and conditions under which interdistrict attendance shall be permitted or denied. It also may contain standards agreed to by both districts for reapplication and/or revocation of the student's permit.

Upon receiving a permit for transfer into the district that has been approved by the student's district of residence, or upon receiving a written request from the parent/guardian of a district student who wishes to enroll in another district, the Superintendent or designee shall review the request and may approve or deny the permit subject to the terms and conditions of the interdistrict attendance agreement.

## **Transportation**

The district shall not provide transportation beyond any school attendance area. Upon request of a student's parent/guardian, the Superintendent or designee may authorize transportation for an interdistrict transfer student to and from designated bus stops within the attendance area of the school that the student attends if space is available.

## STUDENT RECORDS

#### **BP 5125**

Students

The Governing Board recognizes the importance of keeping accurate, comprehensive student records as required by law. The Superintendent or designee shall establish administrative regulations governing the identification, collection, retention, and security of student records. These regulations shall ensure the rights of authorized persons to have timely access to student records while maintaining the confidentiality of student records consistent with state and federal law.

The Superintendent or designee shall designate a certificated employee to serve as custodian of records with responsibility for student records at the district level. At each school, the principal or a certificated employee shall be designated as custodian of records for students enrolled at that school. The custodian of records shall be responsible for implementing Board policy and administrative regulation regarding student records.

All appropriate personnel shall receive training regarding district policies and procedures for gathering and handling sensitive student information.

The district shall not collect or solicit social security numbers or the last four digits of social security numbers of students or their parents/guardians, unless otherwise required to do so by state or federal law.

No information or documents regarding the citizenship or immigration status of students or their family members shall be collected, except as required by state or federal law or as required to administer a state or federally supported educational program. The Superintendent or designee shall not disclose student records to a person, agency, or organization for immigration enforcement purposes without parental consent, a court order, or a judicial subpoena. If a district employee receives such a request, they shall immediately report the request to the Superintendent. The Superintendent shall report the request to the Board in a timely manner that ensures the confidentiality and privacy of any potentially identifying information.

The Superintendent or designee shall not compile a list, registry, or database based on students' national origin, ethnicity, or religious belief, practice, or affiliation, nor shall they disclose student information to federal government authorities for the purpose of compiling such a list, registry, or database for purposes of immigration enforcement. Such information may only be compiled or exchanged with other local, state, or federal agencies if the information is aggregated and is not personally identifiable.

# Student Records from Social Media

The Superintendent or designee may gather and maintain information from the social media of any district student, provided that the district first notifies students and parents/guardians about the proposed program, offers an opportunity for public comment at a regularly scheduled Board meeting, and gathers only information that directly pertains to school safety or student safety.

Contract for Digital Storage, Management, and Retrieval of Student Records

The Superintendent or designee may enter into a contract with a third party for the digital storage, management, and retrieval of student records and/or to authorize a third party provider of digital software to access, store, and use student records, provided that the contract meets the requirements of Education Code 49073.1 and other applicable state and federal laws.

#### BULLYING

# BP 5131.2

Students

The Governing Board recognizes the harmful effects of bullying on student learning and school attendance and desires to provide a safe school environment that protects students from physical and emotional harm. District employees shall establish student safety as a high priority and shall not tolerate bullying of any student.

No individual or group shall, through physical, written, verbal, or other means, harass, sexually harass, threaten, intimidate, retaliate, cyberbully, cause bodily injury to, or commit hate violence against any student or school personnel.

Cyberbullying includes the electronic creation or transmission of harassing communications, direct threats, or other harmful texts, sounds, or images as defined in Education Code 48900. Cyberbullying also includes breaking into another person's electronic account and assuming that person's identity in order to damage that person's reputation.

Strategies for addressing bullying in district schools shall be developed with involvement of key stakeholders, including students, parents/guardians, and staff, and may be incorporated into the comprehensive safety plan, the local control and accountability plan, and other applicable district and school plans.

As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee may collaborate with law enforcement, courts, social services, mental health services, other agencies, and community organizations in the development and implementation of joint strategies to promote safety in schools and the community and to provide services for alleged victims and perpetrators of bullying.

#### **Bullying Prevention**

To the extent possible, district schools shall focus on the prevention of bullying by establishing clear rules for student conduct and implementing strategies to promote a positive, collaborative school climate. Students shall be informed, through student handbooks and other appropriate means, of district and school rules related to bullying, mechanisms available for reporting incidents or threats, and the consequences for engaging in bullying.

As appropriate, the district shall provide students with instruction, in the classroom or other educational settings, that promotes social-emotional learning, effective communication and conflict resolution skills, character/values education, respect for cultural and individual differences, self-esteem development, assertiveness skills, and appropriate online behavior.

Such instruction shall also educate students about the negative impact of bullying,

discrimination, intimidation, and harassment based on actual or perceived immigration status, religious beliefs and customs, or any other individual bias or prejudice.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training to teachers and other school staff to raise their awareness about the legal obligation of the district and its employees to prevent discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying of district students. Such training shall be designed to provide staff with the skills to:

- 1. Discuss the diversity of the student body and school community, including their varying immigration experiences
- 2. Discuss bullying prevention strategies with students, and teach students to recognize the behavior and characteristics of bullying perpetrators and victims
- 3. Identify the signs of bullying or harassing behavior
- 4. Take immediate corrective action when bullying is observed
- 5. Report incidents to the appropriate authorities, including law enforcement in instances of criminal behavior

Based on an assessment of bullying incidents at school, the Superintendent or designee may increase supervision and security in areas where bullying most often occurs, such as classrooms, playgrounds, hallways, restrooms, and cafeterias.

#### Intervention

Students are encouraged to notify school staff when they are being bullied or suspect that another student is being victimized. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall develop means for students to report threats or incidents confidentially and anonymously.

School staff who witness an act of bullying shall immediately intervene to stop the incident when it is safe to do so.

When appropriate based on the severity or pervasiveness of the bullying, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians of victims and perpetrators and may contact law enforcement.

The Superintendent, principal, or principal's designee may refer a victim, witness, perpetrator, or other student affected by an act of bullying to a school counselor, school psychologist, social worker, child welfare attendance personnel, school nurse, or other school support service personnel for case management, counseling, and/or participation in a restorative justice program as appropriate.

# Reporting and Filing of Complaints

Any student, parent/guardian, or other individual who believes that a student has been subjected to bullying or who has witnessed bullying may report the incident to a teacher, the principal, a compliance officer, or any other available school employee. Within one business day of receiving such a report, a staff member shall notify the principal of the report, whether or not a uniform complaint is filed. In addition, any school employee who observes an incident of bullying involving a student shall, within one business day, report their observation to the principal or a district compliance officer, whether or not the alleged victim files a complaint.

Within two business days of receiving a report of bullying, the principal shall notify the district compliance officer identified in AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

When the circumstances involve cyberbullying, individuals with information about the activity shall be encouraged to save and print any electronic or digital messages that they feel constitute cyberbullying and to notify a teacher, the principal, or other employee so that the matter may be investigated. When a student uses a social networking site or service to bully or harass another student, the Superintendent or designee may file a request with the networking site or service to suspend the privileges of the student and to have the material removed.

When a report of bullying is submitted, the principal or a district compliance officer shall inform the student or parent/guardian of the right to file a formal written complaint in accordance with AR 1312.3. The student who is the alleged victim of the bullying shall be given an opportunity to describe the incident, identify witnesses who may have relevant information, and provide other evidence of bullying.

# Investigation and Resolution of Complaints

Any complaint of bullying shall be investigated and, if determined to be discriminatory, resolved in accordance with law and the district's uniform complaint procedures specified in AR 1312.3.

If, during the investigation, it is determined that a complaint is about nondiscriminatory bullying, the principal or designee shall inform the complainant and shall take all necessary actions to resolve the complaint.

#### Discipline

Corrective actions for a student who commits an act of bullying of any type may include counseling, behavioral intervention and education, and, if the behavior is severe or pervasive as defined in Education Code 48900, may include suspension or expulsion in accordance with district policies and regulations.

Any employee who permits or engages in bullying or retaliation related to bullying shall be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

# LAGUNA BEACH UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUGS

**BP 5131.6** Students

The Governing Board believes that the use of alcohol or other drugs adversely affects a student's ability to achieve academic success, is physically and emotionally harmful, and has serious social and legal consequences. The Board desires to keep district schools free of alcohol and other drugs in order to help prevent violence, promote school safety and create a well-disciplined environment conducive to learning.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop, implement and evaluate a comprehensive prevention and intervention program that is coordinated with other school and community-based services and programs. The district's program shall be scientifically based and designed to prevent or reduce alcohol or other drug use and the possession and distribution of illegal drugs. It shall include primary prevention activities such as decision-making skills and conflict management, instruction, referral to a rehabilitation program, enforcement/discipline, activities that promote the involvement of parents/guardians and coordination with appropriate community agencies and organizations.

The Board and Superintendent shall agree upon performance measures that will be used to monitor and determine the effectiveness of the district's program in reducing drug and alcohol use. The Superintendent or designee shall develop and implement an evaluation process that includes ongoing assessment and analysis of objective data regarding the incidence of drug and alcohol use among district students, including discipline problems, and the prevalence of risk factors.

The Superintendent or designee shall consult with principals, teachers, other school personnel, students and parents/guardians when developing the district's program.

The Superintendent or designee shall clearly communicate to all students, staff and parents/guardians the district's policies, regulations and school rules related to the use of alcohol and other drugs on school campuses or at school activities. Information about program needs and goals shall be widely distributed in the community.

Staff should encourage students to participate as responsible partners in efforts to maintain a safe, constructive school climate.

The Board encourages the establishment of district-level advisory groups to assist in promoting alcohol- and drug-free schools.

The district's drug education program shall augment county drug education services, if any. District staff shall take every opportunity to cooperate with county and county office of education staff in planning and implementing collaborative alcohol and drug prevention programs.

#### Instruction

The district shall provide science-based preventative instruction which has been proven effective in helping students avoid the use of alcohol and other drugs.

All instruction and related materials shall consistently state that unlawful use of alcohol or other drugs is wrong and harmful. Instruction shall not include the concept of responsible use of drugs or alcohol when such use is illegal.

The district shall offer staff development activities for staff who implement the comprehensive drug and alcohol prevention and intervention program.

Intervention, Referral and Student Assistance Programs

School staff, students and parents/guardians shall be informed about early warning signs which may indicate alcohol and other drug use and about appropriate agencies offering intervention programs, counseling, referral and other student assistance programs.

The Board strongly encourages any student who is using alcohol or drugs to discuss the matter with their parent/guardian or with any staff member. Students who disclose their use of alcohol or other drugs when seeking help from an intervention or recovery program shall not be disciplined for such use.

# Enforcement/Discipline

The Superintendent or designee shall take appropriate action to eliminate possession, use or sale of alcohol and other drugs and related paraphernalia on school grounds or at school-sponsored activities.

Students possessing, using or selling alcohol or other drugs or related paraphernalia shall be subject to disciplinary procedures including suspension or expulsion and/or referral to law enforcement in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulation. In addition, such students may be referred to an appropriate counseling program, transferred to an alternative placement, and/or be restricted from extracurricular activities, including athletics.

#### HEALTH CARE AND EMERGENCIES

#### BP 5141

Students

The Governing Board recognizes the importance of taking appropriate action whenever an emergency threatens the safety, health, or welfare of a student at school or during school-sponsored activities.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop procedures to ensure that first aid and/or medical attention is provided as quickly as possible when accidents and injuries to students occur and that parents/guardians are notified as appropriate.

The Superintendent or designee shall ask parents/guardians to provide emergency contact information in order to facilitate communication in the event of an accident or illness.

District staff shall appropriately report and document student accidents.

"Do Not Resuscitate" Orders

The Board believes that staff members should not be placed in the position of determining whether or not to follow any parental or medical "do not resuscitate" orders. Staff shall not accept or follow any such orders except under the specific written direction of the Superintendent or designee. The Superintendent or designee may only direct a staff member to follow a "do not resuscitate" order if they have received a written parent/guardian authorization, with an authorized health care provider statement, and an order of an appropriate court.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that parents/guardians who have submitted a "do not resuscitate" order are informed of this policy.

#### Automated External Defibrillators

The Board authorizes the Superintendent or designee to place automated external defibrillators (AEDs) at designated school sites for use by school employees in an emergency.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop guidelines for employees regarding these devices and shall ensure that employees receive information that describes sudden cardiac arrest, the school's emergency response plan, and the proper use of an AED. The guidelines shall also specify the placement, security, and maintenance of the AED.

The authorization of AEDs in district schools shall not be deemed to create a guarantee that an AED will be present or will be used in the case of an emergency, or that a trained employee will be present and/or able to use an AED in an emergency, or that the AED will operate properly.

#### SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION/DUE PROCESS

#### BP 5144.1

Students

The Governing Board desires to provide district students access to educational opportunities in an orderly school environment that protects their safety and security, ensures their welfare and well-being, and promotes their learning and development. The Superintendent or designee shall develop rules and regulations setting the standards of behavior expected of district students and the disciplinary processes and procedures for addressing violations of those standards, including suspension and/or expulsion.

The grounds for suspension and expulsion and the procedures for considering, recommending, and/or implementing suspension and expulsion shall be only those specified in law, in this policy, and in the accompanying administrative regulation.

Except when otherwise permitted by law, a student may be suspended or expelled only when their behavior is related to a school activity or school attendance occurring within any district school or another school district, regardless of when it occurs, including, but not limited to, the following:

- 1. While on school grounds
- 2. While going to or coming from school
- 3. During the lunch period, whether on or off the school campus
- 4. During, going to, or coming from a school-sponsored activity

District staff shall enforce the rules concerning suspension and expulsion of students fairly, consistently, equally, and in accordance with the district's nondiscrimination policies.

Appropriate Use of Suspension Authority

Except when a student's act violates Education Code 48900(a)-(e), as listed in items #1-5 under "Grounds for Suspension and Expulsion: Grades K-12" of the accompanying administrative regulation, or when their presence causes a danger to others, suspension shall be used only when other means of correction have failed to bring about proper conduct.

A student's parents/guardians shall be notified as soon as possible when there is an escalating pattern of misbehavior that could lead to on-campus or off-campus suspension.

No student may be suspended for disruption or willful defiance, except by a teacher pursuant to Education Code 48910.

#### **On-Campus Suspension**

To ensure the proper supervision and ongoing learning of students who are suspended for any of the reasons enumerated in Education Code 48900 and 48900.2, but who pose no imminent danger or threat to anyone at school and for whom expulsion proceedings have not been initiated, the Superintendent or designee may establish a supervised suspension classroom program which meets the requirements of law.

Except where a supervised suspension is permitted by law for a student's first offense, supervised suspension shall be imposed only when other means of correction have failed to bring about proper conduct.

#### Authority to Expel

A student may be expelled only by the Board.

As required by law, the Superintendent or principal shall recommend expulsion and the Board shall expel any student found to have committed any of the following "mandatory recommendation and mandatory expulsion" acts at school or at a school activity off school grounds:

- 1. Possessing a firearm which is not an imitation firearm, as verified by a certificated employee, unless the student had obtained prior written permission to possess the item from a certificated school employee, with the principal or designee's concurrence
- 2. Selling or otherwise furnishing a firearm
- 3. Brandishing a knife at another person
- 4. Unlawfully selling a controlled substance listed in Health and Safety Code 11053-11058
- 5. Committing or attempting to commit a sexual assault as defined in Penal Code 261, 266c, 286, 288, 288a, or 289, or committing a sexual battery as defined in Penal Code 243.4
- 6. Possessing an explosive as defined in 18 USC 921

For all other violations listed in the accompanying administrative regulation under "Grounds for Suspension and Expulsion: Grades K-12" and "Additional Grounds for Suspension and Expulsion: Grades 4-12," the Superintendent or principal shall have the discretion to recommend expulsion of a student. If expulsion is recommended, the Board shall order the student expelled only if it makes a finding of either or both of the following:

- 1. That other means of correction are not feasible or have repeatedly failed to bring about proper conduct
- 2. That due to the nature of the violation, the presence of the student causes a continuing danger to the physical safety of the student or others

A vote to expel a student shall be taken in an open session of a Board meeting.

The Board may vote to suspend the enforcement of the expulsion order pursuant to the requirements of law and the accompanying administrative regulation.

No student shall be expelled for disruption or willful defiance.

#### **Due Process**

The Board shall provide for the fair and equitable treatment of students facing suspension and/or expulsion by affording them their due process rights under the law. The Superintendent or designee shall comply with procedures for notices, hearings, and appeals as specified in law and administrative regulation.

# Maintenance and Monitoring of Outcome Data

The Superintendent or designee shall annually present to the Board a report of the outcome data which the district is required to collect pursuant to Education Code 48900.8 and 48916.1, including the number of students recommended for expulsion, the grounds for each recommended expulsion, the actions taken by the Board, the types of referral made after each expulsion, and the disposition of the students after the expulsion period.

In presenting the report to the Board, the Superintendent or designee shall disaggregate data on suspensions and expulsions by school and by numerically significant student subgroups, including, but not limited to, ethnic subgroups, socioeconomically disadvantaged students, English learners, students with disabilities, foster youth, and homeless students. Based on the data, the Board shall address any identified disparities in the imposition of student discipline and shall determine whether and how the district is meeting its goals for improving school climate as specified in its local control and accountability plan.

#### RESPONSE TO IMMIGRATION ENFORCEMENT

#### BP 5145.13

Students

The Governing Board is committed to the success of all students and believes that every school site should be a safe and welcoming place for all students and their families irrespective of their citizenship or immigration status.

District staff shall not solicit or collect information or documents regarding the citizenship or immigration status of students or their family members or provide assistance with immigration enforcement at district schools, except as may be required by state and federal law.

No student shall be denied equal rights and opportunities nor be subjected to unlawful discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying in the district's programs and activities on the basis of their immigration status.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians regarding their children's right to a free public education regardless of immigration status or religious beliefs and their rights related to immigration enforcement.

Consistent with requirements of the California Office of the Attorney General, the Superintendent or designee shall develop procedures for addressing any requests by a law enforcement officer for access to district records, school sites, or students for the purpose of immigration enforcement.

Teachers, school administrators, and other school staff shall receive training regarding immigration issues, including information on responding to a request from an immigration officer to visit a school site or to have access to a student.

The Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board in a timely manner any requests for information or access to a school site by an officer or employee of a law enforcement agency for the purpose of enforcing the immigration laws. Such notification shall be provided in a manner that ensures the confidentiality and privacy of any potentially identifying information.

#### NONDISCRIMINATION/HARASSMENT

#### BP 5145.3

Students

The Governing Board desires to provide a safe school environment that allows all students equal access and opportunities in the district's academic, extracurricular, and other educational support programs, services, and activities. The Board prohibits, at any district school or school activity, unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, and bullying, targeted at any student by anyone, based on the student's actual or perceived race, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, immigration status, ethnic group identification, ethnicity, age, religion, marital status, pregnancy, parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, or genetic information, or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics.

This policy shall apply to all acts related to school activity or to school attendance occurring within a district school, and to acts which occur off campus or outside of school-related or school-sponsored activities but which may have an impact or create a hostile environment at school.

Unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, may result from physical, verbal, nonverbal, or written conduct based on any of the categories listed above. Unlawful discrimination also includes the creation of a hostile environment through prohibited conduct that is so severe, persistent, or pervasive that it affects a student's ability to participate in or benefit from an educational program or activity; creates an intimidating, threatening, hostile, or offensive educational environment; has the effect of substantially or unreasonably interfering with a student's academic performance; or otherwise adversely affects a student's educational opportunities.

Unlawful discrimination also includes disparate treatment of students based on one of the categories above with respect to the provision of opportunities to participate in school programs or activities or the provision or receipt of educational benefits or services.

The Board also prohibits any form of retaliation against any individual who reports or participates in the reporting of unlawful discrimination, files or participates in the filing of a complaint, or investigates or participates in the investigation of a complaint or report alleging unlawful discrimination. Retaliation complaints shall be investigated and resolved in the same manner as a discrimination complaint.

The Superintendent or designee shall facilitate students' access to the educational program by publicizing the district's nondiscrimination policy and related complaint procedures to students, parents/guardians, and employees. They shall provide training and information on the scope and use of the policy and complaint procedures and take other measures designed to increase the

school community's understanding of the requirements of law related to discrimination. The Superintendent or designee shall regularly review the implementation of the district's nondiscrimination policies and practices and, as necessary, shall take action to remove any identified barrier to student access to or participation in the district's educational program. They shall report their findings and recommendations to the Board after each review.

Regardless of whether a complainant complies with the writing, timeline, and/or other formal filing requirements, all complaints alleging unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, shall be investigated and prompt action taken to stop the discrimination, prevent recurrence, and address any continuing effect on students.

Students who engage in unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, retaliation, or bullying, in violation of law, Board policy, or administrative regulation shall be subject to appropriate consequence or discipline, which may include suspension or expulsion when the behavior is severe or pervasive as defined in Education Code 48900.4. Any employee who permits or engages in prohibited discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, retaliation, or bullying, shall be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

# Record-Keeping

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain a record of all reported cases of unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, to enable the district to monitor, address, and prevent repetitive prohibited behavior in district schools.

#### COMPREHENSIVE HEALTH INSTRUCTION

#### BP 6142.1

Instruction

The Governing Board desires to provide a well-planned, integrated sequence of medically accurate and inclusive instruction on comprehensive sexual health and human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) prevention. The district's educational program shall provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary to protect them from sexually transmitted infections and unintended pregnancy and to have healthy, positive, and safe relationships and behaviors. The district's educational program shall also promote understanding of sexuality as a normal part of human development and the development of healthy attitudes and behaviors concerning adolescent growth and development, body image, gender, sexual orientation, relationships, marriage, and family.

Comprehensive sexual health education and HIV prevention education shall be offered to all students in grades 7-12, including at least once in junior high or middle school and at least once in high school.

The Health Education Content Standards for California Public Schools have eight overarching standards in the following areas:

- 1. Essential Health Concepts: All students will comprehend essential concepts related to enhancing health.
- 2. Analyzing Health Influences: All students will demonstrate the ability to analyze internal and external influences that affect health.
- 3. Accessing Valid Health Information: All students will demonstrate the ability to access and analyze health information, products, and services.
- 4. Interpersonal Communication: All students will demonstrate the ability to use interpersonal communication skills to enhance health.
- 5. Decision Making: All students will demonstrate the ability to use decision-making skills to enhance health.
- 6. Goal Setting: All students will demonstrate the ability to use goal-setting skills to enhance health.
- 7. Practicing Health-Enhancing Behaviors: All students will demonstrate the ability to practice behaviors that reduce risk and promote health.
- 8. Health Promotion: All students will demonstrate the ability to promote and support personal, family, and community health.

The district's curriculum shall support the purposes of the California Healthy Youth Act as specified in Education Code 51930-51939, be unbiased and inclusive of all students in the classroom, and be aligned with the state's content standards. The district shall respect the rights of parents/guardians to supervise their children's education on these subjects and to impart values regarding human sexuality to their children.

### Parent/Guardian Consent

Annually, parents/guardians shall be notified that they may request in writing that their child be excused from participating in comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education. Students so excused by their parents/guardians shall be given an alternative educational activity.

A student shall not be subject to disciplinary action, academic penalty, or other sanction if the student's parent/guardian declines to permit the student to receive the instruction.

#### SCHOOL-SPONSORED TRIPS

BP 6153

Instruction

The Governing Board recognizes that field trips supplement and enrich the classroom learning experience, lead to increased student achievement, and foster student engagement. The Board encourages field trips to reinforce and increase learning opportunities and to enhance district programs.

Field trips shall be conducted in connection with the district's course of study or school-related social, educational, cultural, athletic, school band, or other extracurricular or co-curricular activities.

Requests for field trips involving out-of-state, or overnight travel shall be submitted to the Superintendent or designee. The Superintendent or designee shall review the request and make a recommendation to the Board as to whether the request should be approved by the Board. All other field trips shall be approved in advance by the principal.

The principal shall establish a process for approving a staff member's request to conduct a field trip. When planning trips, staff shall consider student safety, objectives of instruction, the most effective use of instructional time, the distance from school, district and student expense, and transportation and supervision requirements. Principals may exclude from the trip any student whose presence on the trip would pose a safety or disciplinary risk.

No field trip shall be authorized if any student would be excluded from participation because of a lack of sufficient funds. The Superintendent or designee may coordinate with community groups to supply funds for students in need.

No expenses of pupils participating in a field trip or excursion to any other state, the District of Columbia or a foreign country authorized by this policy shall be paid with District funds except incidental expenses for the use of District equipment or transportation.

# LAGUNA BEACH UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

Board Policy No. 6019: FIELD TRIPS AND EXCURSIONS

- A. Any District approved educational activity involving the transport of pupils to a non-school sponsored activity is a District field trip or excursion (hereinafter together referred to as a field trip). To the extent that requests for field trips are consistent with applicable laws and regulations and District field trip policies, they will be considered for District approval. This Policy shall be interpreted consistent with Education Code section 44808.
- B. Any other excursion, trip, tour, cruise, or other venture involving school age pupils that is not District approved and is not supervised by District personnel is not a District field trip, and the School District assumes no responsibility or liability for any such activities. Additionally, no excursion, trip, tour, cruise, or other venture not specifically approved in advance in writing by the Superintendent or Principal (hereinafter referred to as "non-District excursions") shall be promulgated, advertised, promoted, or represented as a District activity or District field trip. The District does not approve or endorse such excursions. If a District employee coordinates or participates in a non-District excursion, such excursion shall be on non-work time. In addition, the employee shall inform the excursions' participants and their parents or guardians that the District has not approved or endorsed such excursion and that the District retains no responsibility, liability, or insurance for such excursion. No District forms, including the District's attached parent consent and waiver form, shall be used for non-District excursions. Violation of this policy may result in discipline up to and including termination of employment.
- C. A field trip may be fully funded by the District; partially funded by the District; or totally financed by a fund raising event(s), gift(s), or donation(s).
- D. No expenses of pupils participating in a field trip or excursion to any other state, the District of Columbia or a foreign country authorized by this policy shall be paid with District funds except incidental expenses for the use of District equipment or transportation.
- E. No pupil shall be prevented from making the field trip because of lack of sufficient funds. No group shall be authorized to take a field trip authorized by this policy if any pupil who is a member of such identifiable group will be excluded from participation in the field trip because of lack of sufficient funds.
- F. All field trips must meet the following criteria and procedural safeguards:
  - 1. The trip is consistent with District educational goals;
  - 2. The trip will appeal to the age group of the pupils involved;
  - 3. The trip is safe for the age group of the pupils;

- 4. The trip will provide the pupils with unique experiences that are not available in a classroom setting;
- 5. The learning opportunities for pupils justify the time and expense in planning and conducting the trip;
- 6. The trip does not unduly distract from the pupils' regular classroom responsibilities;
- 7. The trip is planned and coordinated by District staff, and must be approved by the Superintendent or Principal in writing;
- 8. The Superintendent or designee will be provided assurance that no pupil who otherwise meets the prerequisites established for the field trip will be excluded for lack of personal finances;
- 9. The trip will not expose the District to an unreasonably high degree of liability and proper and adequate supervision of pupils shall be undertaken. The number of staff or volunteers necessary to assure the proper supervision of students will depend upon the number of students attending the field trip, and the location and nature of the activities in which students will engage.
- 10. If the field trip is to be partially or totally financed by non-District funding sources, the supervisors/organizers will adhere to all District fund raising policy and administrative procedure provisions. All District personnel are required to fully enforce Board Policy 5011- PARTICIPATION IN EXTRACURRICULAR AND CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES.
- 11. The teacher or employee in charge of the field trip shall have a first aid kit in his or her possession or immediately available, while conducting the field trip.
- No field trip into any area which is commonly known to be infested by poisonous snakes may be taken unless pupils are accompanied by a teacher, employee, or agent of the school who has completed a course in first aid, certified by the American Red Cross, which emphasizes the treatment of snake bites. In addition, the first aid kit shall contain snake bite response instructions.
- 13. All persons making the field trip shall be deemed to have waived all claims against the District or the State of California for injury, accident, illness or death occurring during or by reason of the field trip. All adults or parents or guardians of pupils taking field trips shall sign the attached parent consent and waiver form waiving such claims.

14. District staff accompanying or transporting students on District approved field trips or excursions shall not consume any alcoholic beverage at any time from the commencement of the field trip or excursion until its conclusion. Violation of this policy by District employees may lead to disciplinary action up to and including termination of employment. Parents, guardians and other individuals accompanying students on District approved field trips or excursions are strongly advised to comply with this provision in order to be eligible to attend future field trips and excursions.

#### STUDENT ASSESSMENT

# **BP 6162.5** Instruction

The Governing Board recognizes that student assessments are an important instructional and accountability tool. To obtain the most accurate evaluation of student performance, the district shall use a variety of measures, including district, state, and/or national assessments.

Assessment data shall be used to help determine individual students' progress, mastery of academic standards, appropriate placement in district programs, and/or eligibility for graduation. In addition, summary data on student assessment results shall be used by the district to identify and review student achievement goals in the district's local control and accountability plan, and evaluate district educational programs in order to identify needed improvements.

In selecting or developing any district assessment, the Superintendent or designee shall examine evidence of its reliability, its validity for the intended purpose and for various student populations, and the extent to which it aligns with the material that is being taught.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that assessments are administered in accordance with law and test publisher's directions, and that test administration procedures are fair and equitable for all students.

As appropriate, assessment results shall be disaggregated by student subgroup, classroom, grade level, and/or school site to allow for critical analysis of student needs.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide professional development as needed to assist administrators and teachers in interpreting and using assessment data to improve student performance and the instructional program.

When districtwide and school-level results of student assessments are published by the state, the Superintendent or designee may provide supplementary information to assist parents/guardians and the community in understanding test results.

#### Interim and Formative Assessments

State interim and formative assessments may be used in combination with other sources of information to gain timely feedback about student progress in an effort to continually adjust instruction to improve learning. Results from interim and formative assessments shall not be used for any high-stakes purpose, including, but not limited to, teacher or other school staff evaluation, accountability, student grade promotion or retention, graduation, course or class placement, identification for gifted or talented education, reclassification of English learners, or identification as an individual with exceptional needs.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that teachers who administer interim and formative assessments have access to all functions and information designed for teacher use related to such assessments and student performance on the assessments.

#### TRANSITIONAL KINDERGARTEN

#### BP 6170.1

Instruction

The Governing Board desires to offer a high-quality transitional kindergarten (TK) program for eligible children who do not yet meet the minimum age criterion for kindergarten. The TK program shall assist students in developing the academic, social, and emotional skills they need to succeed in kindergarten and beyond.

The district's TK program shall be the first year of a two-year kindergarten program.

The Board encourages ongoing collaboration among district preschool staff and providers, elementary teachers, administrators, and parents/guardians in the development, implementation, and evaluation of the district's TK program.

# Eligibility

The district's TK program shall admit children whose fifth birthday is from September 2 through December 2.

Parents/guardians of eligible children shall be notified of the availability of the TK program and the age, residency, immunization, and any other enrollment requirements. Enrollment in the TK program shall be voluntary.

Upon request of a child's parents/guardians, the district may, on a case-by-case basis after the Superintendent or designee determines that it is in the child's best interest, admit into the district's TK program a child whose fifth birthday is on or before September 1 and who is therefore eligible for kindergarten.

At any time during the school year, the district may admit into the TK program a child whose fifth birthday is after December 2 of that same school year, provided that the Superintendent or designee recommends that enrollment in a TK program is in the child's best interest. Prior to such enrollment, the child's parents/guardians shall be provided information regarding the advantages and disadvantages and any other explanatory information about the effect of early admittance.

#### Curriculum and Instruction

The district's TK program shall be based on a modified kindergarten curriculum that is age and developmentally appropriate.

The program shall be aligned with the preschool learning foundations and preschool curriculum frameworks developed by the California Department of Education. It shall be designed to facilitate students' development in essential skills related to language and literacy, mathematics, physical development, health, visual and performing arts, science, history-social science, English language development, and social-emotional development.

The Board shall establish the length(s) of the school day in the district's TK program. TK programs may be maintained for different lengths of time either at the same or different school sites, as long as the school day is at least three hours but no more than four hours. The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the California Department of Education as to whether the district's TK programs are offered full day, part day, or both.

TK students may be placed in the same classrooms as kindergarten students when necessary, provided that the instructional program is differentiated to meet student needs.

# Staffing

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that teachers assigned to teach in TK classes possess a teaching credential or permit from the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) that authorizes such instruction.

A credentialed teacher who is first assigned to a TK class after July 1, 2015, shall, by August 1, 2020, have at least 24 units in early childhood education and/or child development, comparable experience in a preschool setting, and/or a child development teacher permit issued by the CTC.

The Superintendent or designee may provide professional development as needed to ensure that TK teachers are knowledgeable about the standards and effective instructional methods for teaching young children.

#### Continuation to Kindergarten

Students who complete the TK program shall be eligible to continue in kindergarten the following school year. Parents/guardians of such students shall not be required to submit a signed Kindergarten Continuance Form for kindergarten attendance.

However, whenever children who would otherwise be age-eligible for kindergarten are enrolled in TK, the Superintendent or designee shall obtain a Kindergarten Continuance Form signed by the parent/guardian near the end of the TK year consenting to the child's enrollment in kindergarten the following year.

A student shall not attend more than two years in a combination of TK and kindergarten.

#### Assessment

The Superintendent or designee may develop or identify appropriate formal and/or informal assessments of TK students' development and progress. They shall monitor and regularly report to the Board regarding program implementation and the progress of students in meeting related academic standards.

#### TITLE I PROGRAMS

#### BP 6171

Instruction

The Governing Board desires to provide a high-quality education that enables all students to meet challenging state academic standards. In schools with a large number or percentage of economically disadvantaged families, the district shall use Title I funds to provide services that strengthen the academic program and provide support to students at risk of failing to achieve academic standards.

Title I funds shall be used to supplement, not supplant, funds available from state and local sources for the education of students participating in Title I programs. In order to improve the academic achievement of students from economically disadvantaged families, the district shall use federal Title 1 funds to provide supplementary services that reinforce the core curriculum and assist students in attaining proficiency on state academic standards and assessments.

Descriptions of how the district will address the required components of the Title I local educational agency plan, as specified in 20 USC 6312, shall be included within the district's control and accountability plan (LCAP), the LCAP Federal Addendum, or another document. School-level strategies shall be aligned with the district's plan and be tailored to the specific needs of the students at the school.

In addition, the district and each school receiving Title I funds shall develop a written parent/guardian and family engagement policy in accordance with 20 USC 6318.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide technical assistance and support to any school participating in the Title 1 program, including consultation in the development and implementation of school plans and activities.

# Comparability of Services

In schools receiving Title I funds, state and local funds shall be used to provide services that, taken as a whole, are at least comparable to services in schools that are not receiving Title I funds or, if all district schools are receiving Title I funds, that are substantially comparable in each school. Comparability may be determined on a school-by-school basis or by grade span.

To demonstrate comparability of services among district schools, the district shall:

- 1. Adopt and implement a districtwide salary schedule
- 2. Ensure equivalence in teachers, administrators, and other staff, as measured by either or both of the following:

- a. The ratio of students to instructional staff at each Title I school within a grade span, which shall not exceed 110 percent of the average ratio for all non-Title I district schools within that grade span
- b. Salary expenditures for instructional staff at each Title I school, which shall be no less than 90 percent of the average salary expenditure across non-Title I district schools.
- 3. Ensure equivalence in the provision of curriculum materials and instructional supplies, by determining whether the per-student expenditure of state and local funds for curriculum materials and instructional supplies in Title I schools is between 90 and 110 percent of the districtwide average
- 4. Determine whether the amount of state and local funds allocated per student for each grade span is between 90 and 110 percent of the per student average for each grade span in non-Title I schools

In determining comparability, the district shall not include staff salary differentials for years of employment. The district also may exclude unpredictable changes in student enrollment or personnel assignments that occur after the beginning of the school year, state and local funds expended for language instruction educational programs, state and local funds expended for the excess costs of providing services to students with disabilities, and supplemental state or local funds expended in any school attendance area or school for programs that specifically meet the intent and purposes of Title I.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually assess comparability in accordance with the above criteria and maintain records documenting the district's compliance. If any instances of noncomparability are identified, the Superintendent or designee shall promptly implement adjustments as needed to ensure comparability.

#### **Program Evaluation**

The Board shall regularly monitor the progress of economically disadvantaged and low-achieving students in Title I schools. During the annual evaluation of the district's progress toward achieving each goal identified in the LCAP or other planning document addressing 20 USC 6312, the Board shall review disaggregated data on academic achievement, school attendance, and other outcomes for such students and shall ensure that strategies are revised as necessary to support continuous improvement.

#### **EDUCATION FOR HOMELESS CHILDREN**

**BP 6173** 

Instruction

The Governing Board desires to ensure that homeless students have access to the same free and appropriate public education provided to other students within the district. The district shall provide homeless students with access to education and other services necessary for them to meet the same challenging academic standards as other students.

The Superintendent or designee shall identify and remove any barriers to the identification and enrollment of homeless students and to the retention of homeless students due to absences or outstanding fees or fines.

When there are at least 15 homeless students in the district or a district school, the district's local control and accountability plan (LCAP) shall include goals and specific actions to improve student achievement and other outcomes of homeless students.

The Superintendent or designee shall designate an appropriate staff person to serve as a liaison for homeless children and youths. The district liaison shall fulfill the duties specified in 42 USC 11432 to assist in identifying and supporting homeless students to succeed in school.

In order to identify district students who are homeless, the Superintendent or designee may give a housing questionnaire to all parents/guardians during school registration, make referral forms readily available, include the district liaison's contact information on the district and school websites, provide materials in a language easily understood by families and students, provide school staff with professional development on the definition and signs of homelessness, and contact appropriate local agencies to coordinate referrals for homeless children and youth and unaccompanied youth.

Information about a homeless students living situation shall be considered part of a student's educational record, subject to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act and shall not be deemed to be directory information as defined in 20 USC 1232g.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that placement decisions for homeless students are based on the student's best interest as defined in law and administrative regulation.

Each homeless student shall be provided services that are comparable to services offered to other students in the school, including, but not limited to, transportation, educational programs for which the student meets the eligibility criteria (such as federal Title I services or similar state or local programs, programs for students with disabilities, and educational programs for English learners), career and technical education programs, programs for gifted and talented students, and school nutrition programs.

Homeless students shall not be segregated into a separate school or program based on their status as homeless and shall not be stigmatized in any way. However, the Superintendent or designee may separate homeless students on school grounds as necessary for short periods of time for health and safety emergencies or to provide temporary, special, and supplementary services to meet the unique needs of homeless students.

The Superintendent or designee shall coordinate with other agencies and entities to ensure that homeless children and youth are promptly identified, ensure that homeless students have access to and are in reasonable proximity to available education and related support services, and raise the awareness of school personnel and service providers of the effects of short-term stays in a shelter and other challenges associated with homelessness. Toward these ends, the Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with local social services agencies, other agencies or entities providing services to homeless children and youth, and, if applicable, transitional housing facilities. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall coordinate transportation, transfer of school records, and other interdistrict activities with other local educational agencies. As necessary, the Superintendent or designee shall coordinate, within the district and with other involved local educational agencies, services for homeless students and services for students with disabilities.

District liaisons and other appropriate staff shall participate in professional development and other technical assistance activities to assist them in identifying and meeting the needs of homeless students and to provide training on the definitions of terms related to homelessness.

At least annually, the Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board on outcomes for homeless students, which may include, but are not limited to, school attendance, student achievement test results, promotion and retention rates by grade level, graduation rates, suspension/expulsion rates, and other outcomes related to any goals and specific actions identified in the LCAP. Based on the evaluation data, the district shall revise its strategies as needed to better support the education of homeless students.

#### **EDUCATION FOR FOSTER YOUTH**

#### BP 6173.1

Instruction

The Governing Board recognizes that foster youth may face significant barriers to achieving academic success due to their family circumstances, disruption to their educational program, and their emotional, social, and other health needs. To enable such students to achieve state and district academic standards, the Superintendent or designee shall provide them with full access to the district's educational program and implement strategies identified as necessary for the improvement of the academic achievement of foster youth in the district's local control and accountability plan (LCAP).

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that placement decisions for foster youth are based on the students' best interests as defined in law and administrative regulation. To that end, they shall designate a staff person as the district liaison for foster youth to help facilitate the enrollment, placement, and transfer of foster youth.

The Superintendent or designee and district liaison shall ensure that all appropriate staff, including, but not limited to, each principal, school registrar, and attendance clerk, receive training on the enrollment, placement, and transfer of foster youth and other related rights.

The Board desires to provide foster youth with a safe, positive learning environment that is free from discrimination and harassment and that promotes students' self-esteem and academic achievement. The Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies to build a foster youth's feeling of connectedness with their school, including, but not limited to, strategies that promote positive discipline and conflict resolution, the development of resiliency and interpersonal skills, and the involvement of foster parents, group home administrators, and/or other caretakers in school programs and activities.

To address the needs of foster youth and help ensure the maximum utilization of available funds, the Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with local agencies and officials including, but not limited to, the county placing agency, social services, probation officers, and juvenile court officers. The Superintendent or designee shall explore the feasibility of entering into agreements with these groups to coordinate services and protect the rights of foster youth.

At least annually and in accordance with the established timelines, the Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board on the outcomes for foster youth regarding the goals and specific actions identified in the LCAP, including, but not limited to, school attendance, student achievement test results, promotion and retention rates by grade level, graduation rates, and suspension/expulsion rates. As necessary, evaluation data shall be used to determine and recommend revisions to the LCAP for improving or increasing services for foster youth.

# LAGUNA BEACH UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT CAREER TECHNICAL EDUCATION

#### **BP 6178**

Instruction

The Governing Board desires to provide a comprehensive career technical education (CTE) program in the secondary grades which integrates core academic instruction with technical and occupational instruction in order to increase student achievement, graduation rates, and readiness for postsecondary education and employment. The district's CTE program shall be designed to help students develop the academic, career, and technical skills needed to succeed in a knowledge- and skills-based economy. The program shall include a rigorous academic component and provide students with a strong experience and understanding of all aspects of an industry.

The district's CTE program shall focus on preparing students to enter current or emerging high-skill, high-wage, and/or high-demand occupations. CTE opportunities may be offered through linked learning programs, partnership academies, apprenticeship programs or orientation to apprenticeships, regional occupational centers or programs, tech prep programs, small learning communities, or other programs that expose students to career options while preparing them for future careers in a given industry or interest area.

The Board shall review and approve all district plans and applications for the use of state and/or federal funds supporting CTE.

The district shall adopt standards for CTE which meet or exceed the state's model content standards and describe the essential knowledge and skills that students enrolled in these courses are expected to master. The course curriculum shall be aligned with district-adopted standards and the state's curriculum framework.

At least every three years, the Superintendent or designee shall compare the district's curriculum, course content, and course sequence of CTE with the model state curriculum standards.

The Superintendent or designee shall systematically review the district's CTE classes to determine the degree to which each class may offer an alternative means for completing and receiving credit for specific portions of the course of study prescribed by the district for high school graduation. The Board shall ensure that these classes are equivalent in content and rigor to the courses prescribed for graduation.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop partnerships with local businesses and industries to ensure that course sequences, career technical and integrated curriculum, classroom instruction and projects, and assessments have real-world relevance and reflect

labor market needs and priorities. They also shall work to develop connections with businesses, postsecondary institutions, community organizations, and/or other employers to provide students with actual or simulated work-based learning opportunities.

The Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with postsecondary institutions to ensure that the district's program is articulated with postsecondary programs in order to provide a sequential course of study. Articulation opportunities may include dual or concurrent enrollment in community college courses.

The Superintendent or designee shall inform all secondary students and their parents/guardians about the CTE experiences available in the district, CTE courses that satisfy college admission criteria, CTE courses that satisfy high school graduation requirements. In addition, secondary students may receive individualized career guidance and academic counseling which provides information about academic and CTE opportunities related to the student's career goals.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that teachers of CTE courses possess the qualifications and credentials necessary to teach their assigned courses. They also shall provide teachers and administrators with professional development designed to enhance their knowledge of standards-aligned CTE and shall provide opportunities for CTE teachers to collaborate with teachers of academic courses in the development and implementation of integrated curriculum models.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide counselors and other guidance personnel with professional development that includes, but is not limited to, information about current workforce needs and trends, requirements of the district's CTE program, work-based learning opportunities, and postsecondary education and employment options following high school.

Upon written request from a nonprofit private school within the geographical area served by the district, the Superintendent or designee shall consult with private school representatives in a timely and meaningful manner and may provide for the participation of private school secondary students in the district's programs and activities funded under the federal Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act. To the extent practicable, the Superintendent or designee also shall, upon request, permit participation of CTE teachers, administrators, and other personnel from private schools in the district's inservice and preservice professional development programs funded through the Perkins Act.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly assess district needs for facilities, technologies, and equipment to increase students' access to the district's CTE program.

#### Nondiscrimination

The district's program shall provide equal access to and shall not unlawfully discriminate against students who are members of special populations. Special populations include, but are not limited to, students with disabilities; students from economically disadvantaged families, including foster youth; single parents and single pregnant females; displaced homemakers; students with limited English proficiency; and students preparing for nontraditional fields. Nontraditional fields include occupations or fields of work, including careers in computer science, technology, and other emerging high-skill occupations, for which individuals from one gender constitute less than 25 percent of the individuals employed in each such occupation or field of work.

Prior to the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall advise students, parents/guardians, employees, and the general public that all CTE opportunities are offered without regard to any actual or perceived characteristic protected from discrimination by law.

The above notification shall be disseminated in languages other than English as needed and shall state that the district will take steps to ensure that the lack of English language skills will not be a barrier to admission and participation in the district's CTE program.

### School and Community Involvement

The Superintendent or designee shall appoint a CTE advisory committee to develop recommendations on the district's CTE program and to serve as a liaison between the district and potential employers. The committee shall consist of at least one student, teacher, business representative, industry representative, school administrator, member of the general public knowledgeable about the disadvantaged, and representative of the field office of the California Employment Development Department.

The district also shall involve parents/guardians; students; academic and CTE teachers; administrators; career guidance and academic counselors; representatives of tech prep consortia if applicable, business and industry, labor organizations, and special populations; and other interested individuals in the development, implementation, and evaluation of CTE programs.

#### **Program Evaluation**

The Board shall monitor the achievement of students participating in the district's CTE program in order to determine the need for program improvements. The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board and the California Department of Education on program enrollment and completion rates, including enrollment and completion of programs in nontraditional fields as defined in 20 USC 2302; student academic assessment results; attainment of career and technical skill proficiencies;

attainment of a high school diploma or equivalent; graduation rates; and subsequent placement in postsecondary education or advanced training, military service, or employment. Data shall be disaggregated, in accordance with 20 USC 2323, by race, ethnicity, gender, disability status, migrant status, English proficiency, and economic disadvantage status and for each special population as defined in 20 USC 2302 and listed in the section "Nondiscrimination" above.

**Board Bylaws**

To maximize Board effectiveness and public confidence in district governance, Board members are expected to govern responsibly and hold themselves to the highest standards of ethical conduct.

The Board expects its members to work with each other and the Superintendent to ensure that a high-quality education is provided to each student. Each individual Board member shall:

- 1. Keep learning and achievement for all students as the primary focus
- 2. Value, support and advocate for public education
- 3. Recognize and respect differences of perspective and style on the Board and among staff, students, parents and the community
- 4. Act with dignity, and understand the implications of demeanor and behavior
- 5. Keep confidential matters confidential
- 6. Participate in professional development and commit the time and energy necessary to be an informed and effective leader
- 7. Understand the distinctions between Board and staff roles, and refrain from performing management functions that are the responsibility of the Superintendent and staff
- 8. Understand that authority rests with the Board as a whole and not with individuals

Board members also shall assume collective responsibility for building unity and creating a positive organizational culture. To operate effectively, the Board shall have a unity of purpose and:

- 1. Keep the district focused on learning and achievement for all students
- 2. Communicate a common vision
- 3. Operate openly, with trust and integrity
- 4. Govern in a dignified and professional manner, treating everyone with civility and respect
- 5. Govern within Board-adopted policies and procedures
- 6. Take collective responsibility for the Board's performance
- 7. Periodically evaluate its own effectiveness
- 8. Ensure opportunities for the diverse range of views in the community to inform Board deliberations

The Governing Board recognizes the rights responsibility of Board members in their role as community leaders to participate in public discourse on matters of civic or community interest, including those involving the district, and their right to freely express their personal views. and encourages open discussion of issues during the Board meeting. The Board believes that effective Board members have a responsibility to express themselves, whether in agreement or disagreement with the Board majority, in ways that promote the Board's ability to govern the district. However, to ensure communication of a consistent, unified message regarding district issues, Board members are expected to respect the authority of the Board to choose its representatives to communicate its positions and to abide by established protocols. All public statements authorized to be made on behalf of the Board shall be made by the Board president or, if appropriate, by the Superintendent or other designated representative.

When speaking for the district, the Board encourages its spokespersons to exercise restraint and tact and to communicate the message in a manner that promotes public confidence in the Board's leadership.

Board spokespersons shall not disclose confidential information or information received in closed session except when authorized by a majority of the Board.

When speaking to community groups, members of the public, or the media, individual Board members should recognize that their statements may be perceived as reflecting the views and positions of the Board. Board members have a responsibility to identify personal viewpoints as such and not as the viewpoint of the Board.

In addition, the Board encourages members who participate on social networking sites, blogs, or other discussion or informational sites to conduct themselves in a respectful, courteous, and professional manner and to model good behavior for district students and the community. Such electronic communications are subject to the same standards and protocols established for other forms of communication, and the disclosure requirements of the California Public Records Act may likewise apply to them.

#### **BB 9011**

**Board Bylaws** 

The Governing Board recognizes the importance of maintaining the confidentiality of information acquired as part of a Board member's official duties. Confidential/privileged information shall be released only to the extent authorized by law.

Disclosure of Closed Session Information

A Board member shall not disclose confidential information acquired during a closed session to a person not entitled to receive such information, unless a majority of the Board has authorized its disclosure.

Confidential information means a communication made in a closed session that is specifically related to the basis for the Board to meet lawfully in closed session.

The Board shall not take any action against any person for disclosing confidential information, nor shall the disclosure be considered a violation of the law or Board policy, when the person is:

- 1. Making a confidential inquiry or complaint to a district attorney or grand jury concerning a perceived violation of law, including disclosing facts necessary to establish the illegality or potential illegality of a Board action that has been the subject of deliberation during a closed session
- 2. Expressing an opinion concerning the propriety or legality of Board action in closed session, including disclosure of the nature and extent of the illegal or potentially illegal action
- 3. Disclosing information that is not confidential

#### Other Disclosures

A Board member shall not disclose, for pecuniary gain, confidential information acquired in the course of their official duties. Confidential information includes information that is not a public record subject to disclosure under the Public Records Act, information that by law may not be disclosed, or information that may have a material financial effect on the Board member.

Disclosures excepted from this prohibition are those made to law enforcement officials or to the joint legislative audit committee when reporting on improper governmental activities.

#### BOARD MEMBER ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATIONS

**BB 9012** Board Bylaws

The Governing Board recognizes that electronic communication is an efficient and convenient way for Board members to communicate and expedite the exchange of information within the district and with members of the public. Board members shall exercise caution so as to ensure that electronic communications are not used as a means for the Board to deliberate outside of an agendized Board meeting nor to circumvent the public's right to access records regarding district business.

A majority of the Board shall not, outside of an authorized meeting, use a series of electronic communications of any kind, directly or through intermediaries, to discuss, deliberate, or take action on any item that is within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board.

Examples of permissible electronic communications concerning district business include, but are not limited to, dissemination of Board meeting agendas and agenda packets, reports of activities from the Superintendent, and reminders regarding meeting times, dates, and places.

In addition, Board members may use electronic communications to discuss matters that do not pertain to district business, regardless of the number of Board members participating in the discussion.

Board members shall make every effort to ensure that their electronic communications conform to the same standards and protocols established for other forms of communication. A Board member may respond, as appropriate, to an electronic communication received from a member of the community and should make clear that their response does not necessarily reflect the views of the Board as a whole. Any complaint or request for information should be forwarded to the Superintendent in accordance with Board bylaws and protocols so that the issue may receive proper consideration and be handled through the appropriate district process. As appropriate, communication received from the media shall be forwarded to the designated district spokesperson.

To the extent possible, electronic communications regarding any district-related business shall be transmitted through a district-provided device or account. When any such communication is transmitted through a Board member's personal device or account, they shall copy the communication to a district electronic storage device for easy retrieval.

#### STUDENT BOARD MEMBERS

**BB 9150** Board Bylaws

In order to enhance communication and collaboration between the Governing Board and the student body and to teach students the importance of civic involvement, the Board supports the participation of high school students in district governance.

The Governing Board believes that engaging the student body and seeking its input and feedback regarding the district's educational programs and activities are vital to achieving the district's mission of educating district students.

To enhance communication between the Board and the student body and to encourage student involvement in district affairs, the Board shall include at least one student Board member selected in accordance with procedures approved by the Board.

The term of a student Board member shall be one year, commencing on July 1 of each year. A student Board member shall have the right to attend all Board meetings except closed (executive) sessions.

Role and Responsibilities of Student Board Members

Student Board member(s) shall have the right to attend all Board meetings except closed (executive) sessions.

A student Board member shall be seated with other members of the Board. In addition, a student Board member shall be recognized at Board meetings as a full member, shall receive all materials presented to other Board members except those related to closed sessions, and may participate in questioning witnesses and discussing issues.

A student Board member may cast preferential votes on all matters except those subject to closed session discussion. Preferential votes shall be cast prior to the official Board vote and shall not affect the final numerical outcome of a vote. Preferential votes shall be recorded in the Board minutes.

A student Board member shall not be liable for any acts of the Board.

Student Board Member Development

As necessary, the Superintendent or designee shall, at district expense, provide learning opportunities to student Board members, through trainings, workshops, and conferences, to enhance their knowledge, understanding, and performance of their Board responsibilities.

The Superintendent or designee may periodically provide an orientation for student Board member candidates to give them an understanding of the responsibilities and expectations of Board service. Elimination of Position

Once established, the student Board member position shall continue to exist until the Board, by majority vote of all voting Board members, approves a motion to eliminate the position. Such a motion shall be listed as a public agenda item for a Board meeting prior to the motion being voted upon.
