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From the Superintendent: Giving Thanks

In this season of appreciation, there is much for which to be thankful.

At the top of the list is an appreciation to the community for approving the district's bond referendum request with 57.4% yes votes in early November. With this vote of confidence and support in our schools, our staff and our students, we can now begin planning to Build Our Future!

The bond funds will be used to address projected enrollment growth throughout the district; provide safe, secure and healthy learning environments for all students through investments in our aging facilities and infrastructure; increase opportunities for students by creating a single unified grades 9-12 high school; and create flexibly-designed learning spaces to support student-centered instruction. We have a lot of planning ahead of us for the construction projects that will be taking place throughout the district, and we will soon be sharing out information about what the engaged process will look like moving forward.

Also on the docket for appreciation is the level of individual support shown to our schools, programs, staff members and students by individual community members. Sometimes the support is calendar-specific, with community members recently being welcomed into the schools to speak to students about Veteran's Day, for instance.

STUDENT GROWTH & PROFICIENCY

Minnesota Comprehensive Assessments (MCA)

Student proficiency is measured by the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessment (MCA) tests, Minnesota's state requirement for testing under the Federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA).

White Bear students have a higher rate of proficiency in reading and mathematics than students across the state of Minnesota. Additionally, as they progress from one grade to the next, White Bear students show a greater rate of proficiency increase than students across the state.

- » Reading 65.2% of White Bear students met or exceeded grade-level proficiency in Reading in 2019 based on the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessment. This is compared to 59.6% of students across the state. 70.8% of White Bear students maintained or improved their level of Reading achievement from 2018 to 2019 as compared to 67.0% of students across the state
- » Mathematics 63.0% of White Bear students met or exceeded grade-level proficiency in Mathematics in 2019 based on the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessment. This is compared to 55.4% of students across the state. 68.5% of White Bear students maintained or improved their level of Mathematics achievement from 2018 to 2019 as compared to 62.7% of students across the state.

Early Childhood

More than 850 students are nurtured and develop a love of learning through our WBLAS Early Childhood programs. All of the District's preschools have a Parent Aware rating of four stars, the highest possible rating. Teachers assess the growth of children and take appropriate measures to ensure they are kindergarten-ready.

Elementary

Students at our nine elementary schools are assessed by teachers using a range of grade-appropriate assessments in reading, math and science to measure progress toward local and state standards. Student proficiency is measured using MCA assessments. Instructional support is personalized so students who test below grade level receive extra intervention and support, and students who already exceed standards are challenged through our comprehensive Gifted and Talented program.

Middle School

Students at Central and Sunrise Park Middle Schools take the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessment (MCA). Teachers and counselors use these assessments along with other data to help students select courses. Intervention support is provided for students who test below grade level. Accelerated and enriched class options ensure each student is challenged.

High School

High school teachers assess students through common assessments in each subject. Nationally-normed assessments include the PreACT offered to tenth graders in the fall and the PSAT and ACT offered to eleventh graders. Counselors and teachers use these data, along with an understanding of student motivation and goals, to help students select from more than 250 course offerings, including more than 51 college-level courses and five career pathways areas.

National Blue Ribbon School recognition

In September, Lincoln Elementary was named as one of 362 schools throughout the country to be named as National Blue Ribbon Schools for 2019. Lincoln was recognized as an Exemplary High Performing School, being among Minnesota's highest performing schools as measured by state assessments or nationally normed tests. Only ten schools in Minnesota are being recognized in the program this year.

HIGH EXPECTATIONS & ENRICHMENT



An increasing range of college-level courses, plus an initiative encouraging students to understand the importance of college-level work at the high school, has raised the percentage of high school seniors taking a college-level course during their high school career. For the class of 2019, 81% of seniors have taken one or more college-level courses, up from 54% for the class of 2016.

443 out of 633 students in the class of 2018 took at least one college-level course during high school. This includes Advanced Placement, College in the Schools, Project Lead the Way, and Post-Secondary Enrollment Options.



Colleges and Universities on campus

During the 2018-19 school year, 51 college level courses were offered at White Bear Lake Area High School: 21 Advanced Placement (AP) classes, 26 College in the School (CIS/CitHS) courses, and 4 Project Lead the Way (PLTW) courses. Students also took advantage of Post-Secondary Enrollment Options (PSEO).

The following numbers of White Bear Lake Area Schools students took collegelevel courses during the 2018-19 school year:

697 students took Advanced Placement (AP) classes

525 students took College in the Schools CIS/CitHS classes

103 students took Project Lead the Way (PLTW) classes

WBLAS continues to be a recognized leader for developing Career Pathways aligned to workforce needs.

WBLAHS began implementation of the Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) program in the fall of 2010. In AVID classes, students collaborate, engage in inquiry, and learn college-level reading, writing and study strategies.

- » In November of 2019, area residents voted on the District's \$326 million bond referendum, with 57.4% in support of the question.





Lincoln Elementary Recognized as Blue Ribbon School

In September, Lincoln Elementary was named as one of 362 schools throughout the country to be named as National Blue Ribbon Schools for 2019. The recognition is based on a school's overall academic performance or progress in closing achievement gaps among student subgroups. Only ten schools in Minnesota are being recognized in the program this year.

The award affirms the hard work put in to creating safe and welcoming schools where students master challenging and engaging content. Lincoln was recognized as an Exemplary High Performing School as being among Minnesota's highest performing schools as measured by state assessments or nationally normed tests.

Lincoln Elementary was celebrated along with other honorees at an awards ceremony in Washington, D.C. earlier this fall. This spring, the school community will host a more formal Blue Ribbon celebration at the school to thank those, past and present, who positively impacted students within the learning community.
