TAKE THE LEAP

t is with honor that I have the opportunity to continue the important work inspired by our Founders, Yvonne and Dave Streit. With humble beginnings, Briarwood began out of need. In the late '60's, our Founders were unable to find a school or facility capable of teaching their severely handicapped daughter. With a small group of eight children that included the Streit's daughter, Special (Tuttle) School came to fruition. Soon children who were not handicapped and had average to above average IQ's were being brought to Briarwood by frustrated and concerned parents. Their children were failing in school. Thus, the unique concept of serving the LD and ID populations in one building began and has developed steadily for over 50 years.

In mid-June, I had the privilege of joining approximately 70 of my colleagues at The



Marburn Academy in Columbus, Ohio, for the Fifth Annual Leadership Summit for LD schools across the nation. Always inspirational, the Leadership Summit implemented a mentorship program this year, the purpose of which is to mentor those who

are new in leadership positions. The mentorship program is a wonderful opportunity to serve

others. Over the years we have welcomed to Briarwood many of our colleagues who lead LD schools.

Having bid farewell in May to another outstanding group of students, the Class of 2019, we celebrated the class for their triumphs and their aspirations. Each of these graduates came to Briarwood out of need, for most struggled with reading, writing, or spelling. The learning challenges had already begun to impede their potential successes in school and their self-esteem. Prior to joining Briarwood, many had already been told that they would never graduate from high school, let alone college. Upon graduation, the Class of 2019 spread their wings to Arizona State University, the University of Missouri, Schreiner University, Austin College, Houston Community College and Lone Star College. In that group we bid goodbye to an aspiring actress, a landscape architect, a veterinarian, entrepreneurs, a writer, and several who will follow careers in technology. Again, we had another class of students who clearly defied the odds. Once more, parents took a leap of faith; trusted the vision set forth by Briarwood's founders and watched their children prosper.

In a recent phone conference with Brent
 Richardson, Class of 2008, he reflected on his years at Briarwood. Upon his graduation from high school, he followed his dreams and gave his all. With a work ethic that cannot be surpassed, Brent attended Stephen F. Austin State University in Nacogdoches, where he earned degrees in Hotel and Restaurant Management.

Throughout his college years, Brent worked to help defray the costs of his education. Before Brent entered Briarwood, he was reminded often of things he would not be able to accomplish because of his learning disabilities. "You're not going to make it unless you know someone, so just settle for this job" were words Brent will always remember.

Today Brent lives in Delray Beach, Florida, with his wife and two dogs. He is Regional Director of TPG Hospitality Hotel & Resorts and aids in the oversight of 22 hotels/resorts along the East Coast, including Westin, Marriott, Wyndham Resorts, and boutique hotels from Rhode Island to Florida. Brent works on all aspects of hotel management, acquisition and construction: Ownership, operational oversight acknowledges their strengths, they are able to imagine a bright future and are prepared to 'take the leap.'

We are here to serve, not only our students but also our families. Known around the world, Briarwood is recognized for the intense remediation that we provide, the ray of light that sparks and ignites a spirit of hope for the future. Throughout their years at Briarwood, our students are 'stretched to their strengths', gifts that they never knew they had! Through direct and explicit instruction, our students are taught organizational skills, another area of challenge. Briarwood students are critical and creative thinkers who think outside the box. Innate in each is a desire we nurture through an extensive volunteer program. Whether

When they arrive at a school that understands and honors their experiences, embraces their challenges and they enter into college or the workforce, our graduates are drawn to organizations that are philanthropic. Always eager to make a difference through volunteering, our students' abilities to look beyond themselves WILL make the world a better place.

A Briarwood education is always Mission-based. As we enter a new year, our Mission will remain. We circle back to Briarwood's humble beginnings and give thanks to our Founder for making a decision, through faith, to carry the torch of learning for those who struggle to learn. We give thanks to our families, friends and donors who have walked with us and beside us through this wonderful journey. Every day, not just occasionally, we have the opportunity to make a difference, to give back to others, celebrate the journey and especially the triumphs, and to change a life for a lifetime.

LOWER **SCHOOL**

THE CREATIVE EDUCATION INSTITUTE at Briarwood is an extensive remediation program for our Lower School students. The CEI learning process uses a combination of software and one-on-one coaching addressing students' reading needs. Studies show that one of the best ways to address learning difficulties is through multi-sensory instruction which is accomplished through the CEI Reading Lab. In the CEI Reading Lab, students work at their own pace. Students process information using a combination of software and one-on-one coaching that requires visual, auditory, and kinesthetic responses.

In the Spring, the Lower School's KCC Club enjoyed a visit from Swatson, the Sugar Land Skeeter's mascot. Swatson encouraged our students to 'keep on reading' and he shared a book about the importance of teamwork. It was great fun having famous mascots at Briarwood!



Work Force Program

Students in the Work Force program come daily to learn vital employment skills which help them successfully transition into life after Tuttle School.

The students learn how to check and follow a schedule, extend their time on task, use appropriate social skills, and so much more.

They learn these skills through meaningful jobs such as our Tuttlebucks coffee business, where the students make coffee, fill the coffee orders (cream/sugar), deliver them to the teachers who order, make change, and work on their verbal skills. The students also use a Cameo Vinyl Machine to make different personalized products such as monogrammed cups and Halloween baskets. They also recycle, shred, data entry and organize and sort the carpool numbers. They also have teamed up with Curtis Wagner Plastics, a local plastic company, to put code stickers on products, stack them in groups of





50, and send them back to the company. The transition class goes off campus for work training at Kroger and Chick-fil-A. Here, they learn how to interact and take direction from new people. They develop the stamina to work for extended periods of time without taking a break and interact with customers. The students love working at both locations and they take pride in doing a fantastic job. Students also go to work at Brookwood where they work in different areas of the Horticulture Center.

























ANGUA

The speech and language department has eight full and part time therapists who specialize in remediating the underlying language concerns associated with learning differences. Each therapist holds a master's degree and state certification/licensure in the field, and a certificate of clinical competency from the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA). Once a child has been identified and placed within our program, we use an evidence-based approach to design a program that supports and improves the overall academic outcome for the student.

In Lower School, focus is on diagnostic-prescriptive intervention and foundational skills. Speech-language pathologists utilize both individual and small group sessions to target goals. Intense remediation is given to underlying phonological awareness skills, working memory strategies, receptive/

erving our students at The Briarwood School necessitates looking closely at each child's individual needs. The profile of every student is unique and deserves to be treated as such. Studies have shown that up to half of children diagnosed with a learning difference have also been identified with a speech and language disorder. These children may have language deficits across multiple dimensions of language, including phonology, morphology, syntax, vocabulary, and pragmatics. The Briarwood School offers a robust speech and language therapy program that addresses this important underlying need.

expressive language abilities, social language competency, written language development and reading comprehension. Executive function skills are stressed at every level, creating independent and secure learners.

Working with our Middle and Upper School students involves a unique approach that looks beyond remediation. Keeping in mind that the challenges of college and "adulting" are right around the corner, sessions focus on the skills and strategies that will serve them past graduation. Our speech-language pathologists work closely with each student to develop independent study skills, improve executive function abilities to meet real life challenges, develop strategies when academic challenges arise, teach advanced reading comprehension/written language skills and importantly, develop the social language expertise to become well-adjusted adults. Tuttle school students come through our doors with a wide range of needs and abilities. The

speech department develops a program that is best suited for each student and works collaboratively with classroom teachers and families to ensure the carry over of goals. Whether our students are learning to communicate with the help of an augmentative communication device, developing conversational skills, or practicing the rules of pragmatic language, our objective is to help each child learn to their potential.

The speech and language department incorporates The Briarwood School's mission statement in all that we do; striving to reach each and every child and teach them in the way they learn best guides our therapeutic design and practice. Through direct intervention and collaborative efforts, our department supports Briarwood to best meet the challenges of our students and their unique communication needs.
