from the executive director...

Happy Holidays to each and every member of our FCIS family! The first semester of the 2019-20 school year is coming to an end, and we look forward to the new opportunities that await in 2020.

The recent 2019 Annual Business Meeting in Orlando provided a great time for colleagues to gather, connect, and reflect on the accomplishments of our schools and association over the past few years. FCIS President, Dr. Dana Markham, opened the annual meeting, noting that FCIS is not only a premier independent school accrediting association in the United States, but FCIS is one of the founders of the International Council Advancing Independent School Accreditation (ICAISA), formerly the NAIS Commission on Accreditation. As a matter of note, ICAISA became separately incorporated from NAIS on July 1, 2018, although ICAISA continues to enjoy a close relationship with NAIS. FCIS is playing a key role in advancing accreditation on a national and international level through ICAISA, made even more possible by my being tapped to be chair of the ICAISA Board of Directors. Within the state of Florida, FCIS looks forward to advancing our member schools as the association continues to address the goals outlined in the 2018-23 Strategic Plan - prioritizing the successful implementation of the new standards/accrediting process adopted on July 1, 2017, promoting capacity development for our member schools, developing partnerships that have strategic value, and expanding FCIS's future capacity and capabilities.

2019 FCIS CONVENTION. The 64th Annual FCIS Convention was held in Orlando on November 7 and 8. The theme, "Learn Today, Learn Tomorrow", resonated throughout the convention, including the two pre-conferences and the Annual Business Meeting. I want to personally thank the convention co-chairs, Cynthia Lane, Head of Sweetwater Episcopal Academy, and Byron Lawson, Jr., Head of Trinity Preparatory School, as well as the convention steering committee members, who spent untold hours in dedication to our member schools.

At the FCIS Annual Business Meeting, new Directors were elected. The newly elected Directors include: Lori Menger, Head of San Jose Episcopal Day School, and Dr. Mike Sligh, Head of Lakeland Christian School; both were elected to a first two-year term. In addition, Byron Lawson, Jr., Head of Trinity Preparatory School, was elected to a second two-year term

CAPE. The results of the 2019 National Assessment of Education Progress (NAEP) were released on October 30. Average reading scores for both fourth and eighth graders have dropped on a national level since 2017. In the area of math, fourth grade scores have increased by one point, and eighth grade scores have decreased by one point. Catholic private schools outperformed public schools in both subject areas; the aggregate of private schools were not in the report due to fact that they did not reach the 70% participation level.

Upcoming Events. Registration is now open for High Performing Educators Academy in Tampa, Early Childhood Institute in Orlando, and Winter Symposiums in Fort Lauderdale. The High Performing Educators Academy always receives rave reviews, with participants describing it as a life-changing professional development opportunity. The Early Childhood Institute will feature Daniel Hodgins, who will speak on "Creating Caring and Cooperative Environments for Young Children"; this event allows early childhood educators to come together, network, and explore best practices in their field. This year, the theme of the Winter Symposiums is Student Health and Wellness and will feature David Gleason. Clinical Psychologist, Founder, Developmental Empathy LLC, and Dr. Scott Poland, Professor, College of Psychology, and Co-Director of the Suicide and Violence Prevention Office, Nova Southeastern University. The Winter Symposiums will continue the theme of student wellness promoted at the 2019 Annual Convention. Please plan to join us!

The mental health needs of students, the screen age, the incidence of bullying, cyberbullying, school violence, and suicide have resulted in very challenging times to be an educator. Research has emphasized the need for all students to feel a connection to school and it is very important for each student to have a significant relationship with one or more adults. Numerous tragedies could have been prevented if students had come forward and alerted school personnel and other adults about the warning signs of suicide and/or violence. FCIS Presidents' Reception Honoring New FCIS School Heads





Learn Today! Learn Tomorrow! Hyatt Regency, Orlando—November 6-8

Thank you to all the schools, speakers and sponsors who participated in the FCIS Annual Convention at the Hyatt Regency Orlando International Airport in November. Convention Committee Chairs, Cynthia Lane, Head of Sweetwater Episcopal Academy, and Byron Lawson, Head of Trinity Preparatory School, designed a program that highlighted the evolving needs of today's learners in independent schools.

FCIS kicked off the Convention with an ISM pre-conference workshop, *Session I: Strategic Financial Planning and Session II: Financial Aid — Understanding Need.* In the morning, Terry Moore, ISM Consultant, explored basic sustainability variables, tuition setting policies, and the two types of strategic planning. In the afternoon, Terry defined what financial "need" means at different schools, by considering financial aid policies, awarding strategies, and need assessment protocols necessary for effective program management.

For the fourth year, a pre-conference workshop targeted to Business Officers was offered. This year, the workshop was led by Gigi Chinisci, retired Assistant Director of Admission at Albuquerque Academy; Gigi's presentation was titled, *Bringing Disney's Philosophy to Your School*. She introduced Walt Disney's business philosophy, explored the science of positive psychology, and shared simple practices for setting a school apart within a crowded field.

At the Convention, FCIS welcomed approximately 1,800 educators from 135 independent schools for two energizing days filled with innovative sessions on topics targeting educational leadership, sustainability, marketing, fundraising, diversity and inclusion, student health and wellbeing, and evolving technologies to enhance teaching and engage learners. Richard Weissbourd, Ed.D., Senior Lecturer, Director of Making Caring Common, and Co-Director of the Human Development and Psychology Program at the Harvard Graduate School of Education, and Denise Pope, Ph.D., Senior Lecturer at the Stanford Graduate School of Education and Co-Founder of Challenge Success, delivered outstanding keynote addresses. In his presentation, How Can Schools Develop Caring and Thriving Students?, Dr. Weissbourd explored current trends and provided concrete strategies that schools can utilize to develop empathetic, caring, justice-minded children, who are also happy and able to pursue meaningful achievement. On Friday, in her keynote, Teaching for Healthy, Engaged Students in a Fast-Paced World, Dr. Pope examined the latest research on academic pressure and the tension that parents, students, and teachers often experience over issues such as homework, grades, college admissions, and the culture of competition. She offered concrete strategies and tools for creating a healthier and more productive school environment without sacrificing achievement.

Dr. Barbara Hodges delivered a "state of the association" address on Thursday, bringing members up to date on current and future FCIS initiatives and trends in independent schools on both a state and national level.

Participants attended luncheons on both days in anticipation of our two luncheon keynotes: Michael J. McCulley, retired astronaut, who presented Space Talk (Astronaut Selection to Flying in Space), and Dr. Jeff Duke, Associate Professor at the University of Central Florida, who presented Capturing the Heart of the 21st Century Student. During the luncheon, door prizes were awarded, and the lucky winners went home with a variety of gift cards to restaurants and retail stores and overnight stays at a couple of beautiful resorts.

Again this year, FCIS offered a mobile app for the Convention to provide participants with helpful information and navigation of the schedule, sessions, special events, hotel and exhibitors. Participants were able to give feedback on each session that they attended, as well as on their overall Convention experience, with results used to shape the planning for next year's Convention.
