After an incredible year of engagement, we are coming to an end of our BGS150 celebrations. The theme for the 150-year anniversary was *Celebrating Our Community* and it has been embraced by the BGS community all over the world.

Our BGS150 celebrations launched this time last year with the Story Bridge and Victoria Bridge lit up in the School's renowned *light dark blue* colours as a symbol of our 150-year history and connection with the community of Brisbane.


Our major events ranged from the Gala Dinner, royal visit and Sports Lunch, to reunions around Australia and overseas. The year saw an incredible 500% increase in the total number of community members attending BGS events.

Today we celebrated our Foundation Day, reflecting on the School's history. This month marks 150 years since Headmaster Thomas Harlin welcomed 94 students and five staff to Brisbane Grammar School, the city's first secondary school for boys.

As Brisbane's first secondary school for boys, BGS educated the colony's homegrown leaders in politics, public service, education, medicine, law, business, the military and the arts. A great many of them became engineers, surveyors and geologists, and played an enormous role in the development of the colony and then the state. To this day our graduates continue to make a difference in the world.

The Foundation Day awards also saw several major scholarships and bursaries presented to recent graduates and to boys beginning their BGS journeys. The awards honour the service to the School of three men – first Headmaster Reginald Heber Roe, Queensland's first Rhodes Scholar Arthur Stanley Roe, and long-serving former teacher AJ Mason.

These BGS icons did much to endorse and sponsor the qualities of character and learning that BGS has always regarded most highly. Between them, they contributed a total of 120 years of service to the School. Congratulations to Anton Vellnagel, Marcus Ray and Eagle Ngo for being awarded these scholarships.



Well done to Lewis Williams for receiving the JG Nowlan award and a Trustees' Scholarship. Trustees' Scholarships were also awarded to James Brough, Jarrah Chien, Edward Cooper, Daniel Luo, Euan Mortimer, Nicholas Silverston and Lewis Williams.

Today's Foundation Day assembly also provided an opportunity for current students to hear from an inspiring graduate, BGS Old Boy Michael Milford '98, as guest speaker. Prof Milford is a multi-award-winning educational entrepreneur with a Mechanical and Space Engineering degree and a PhD in Robotics from The University of Queensland, and currently leads a team at QUT researching the nature of intelligence.



The highly anticipated BGS history book, *Light Dark Blue: 150 Years of Learning and Leadership at Brisbane Grammar School*, will be launched at the final BGS150 event on Saturday 2 March. Drawing on personal stories and extensive scholarly research, author Helen Penrose explores and celebrates the School's distinctive place in Queensland's educational landscape. BGS Student Wellbeing

I mentioned in an earlier newsletter the importance of creating a routine and rhythm for the boys at home and at school at the start of the school year. This has also been a strong focus for staff over the past four weeks and I am pleased with the outcome. I am regularly asked if it has been a good start to the year and I tend to respond that it is too early to say. Given that it is now the end of Week 4, I can confirm that I am pleased with how the boys in the Senior School have settled in and feel that the school year has started well.

The Student Wellbeing Curriculum is an important component of the School's Student Wellbeing strategy. A new program is evolving, and the boys are exposed to important content each Monday. Ms Philippa Douglas has updated the Wellbeing Curriculum section on MyGrammar. The updates identify important year level information from the Wellbeing Curriculum as well as seminars and workshops from outside presenters that complement and enhance the boys' learning. In the same section you will see links to SchoolTV, which is a resource purchased by the School that provides access to up-to-date information on adolescent issues. It is an excellent resource and I encourage you to visit it this weekend.

You will also see invites over the next couple of weeks to a variety of presentations as part of our Wellbeing Series. These presentations give parents the opportunity to hear from experts on aspects of your son's adolescent journey:

2019 ACER Scholarship Exam

Saturday 23 February 2019

The ACER Scholarship Examination will take place at Brisbane Grammar School on **Saturday 23 February 2019. Please note that registrations are now closed.** The following information is for students registered for the exam.

Arrival

Students should arrive at the Great Hall at Brisbane Grammar School at **8.15am** as there are administrative tasks we need to complete prior to the boys commencing the exam at **9.00am**. Signs will indicate the location of the Great Hall and School Prefects will be available to direct you when you enter the School grounds.

Examination

Once boys have entered the Great Hall for instructions they will be under the direction of supervising staff and parents will not be permitted access to the Hall or the examination centre. **Parents are asked not to remain on campus while the examination is on and should return to collect their sons at 12.00pm.**

It is not necessary for boys to bring anything other than **two blue or black ball point pens, two HB or B pencils and a pencil eraser**. Candidates should **not** bring books, papers, rulers or mathematical instruments of any kind. Your son is not required to bring any form of identification.

There will be a break between papers and light refreshments will be provided for students. Boys should bring their own morning tea if they would like to eat something substantial or if they have a specific dietary requirement. Boys may bring a water bottle to take into the exam if they wish.

Boys are **not required** to wear school uniform for the exam and should attend in neat, casual clothing. This also applies to students who currently attend Brisbane Grammar School.

Parking

Please note there will be no provision for parking at the School and the parking situation at Gregory Terrace is usually extremely hectic on this day. I would urge you to be aware of this and make arrangements so your son arrives on time.

Departure

The examination should conclude at approximately **12.00pm** when students may be collected from the Great Hall or surrounds.

Results

The School does not provide candidates' actual scores or order of merit. However, ACER will provide your son's results online from **Thursday 4 April 2019**. You will need your username and login details to access his results.

If your son is being considered for a scholarship you will be contacted by the Headmaster's Office as he will be required to attend an interview. Please note that only successful candidates will be contacted.




Cricket team photos will be taken at Northgate over the next two Saturdays, 23 February (tomorrow) and 2 March.
