Acting Head of Middle School

As parents and teachers, one of the greatest gifts we can instil in our children is the love of reading. Reading is not only an important life skill, but it fosters creativity and curiosity along with the ability to think critically and to consider other perspectives. Basic literacy skills such as writing and spelling are also developed through reading, and subjects such as Mathematics rely heavily on a student's ability to read and extract key information. This week in the Middle School we celebrated Book Week, where boys had the opportunity to meet authors and participate in a variety of activities inspired by books. The Middle School Libraries were abuzz with activity and it was wonderful to see students so enthusiastically engaged.

With the rise of technology — gaming, YouTube and social media — reading is at risk of becoming a lost art. I was interested to attend Cam Adair's gaming addiction presentation a few weeks ago, where Mr Adair posed the question, 'Why do we game?'

Our boys' responses included, 'it takes you to another world', 'to relax', 'you can talk to your mates about it' and 'you feel like you are part of the game'. As I sat and listened to these comments, it took every ounce of restraint for me not to stand up and shout, 'What about books?'

Books were once the primary vehicle through which children could delve into new worlds, use their imagination, engage in discussion with their friends and enjoy some downtime. I am saddened to think that the joy of reading is being overtaken by technology, especially gaming.

The literacy levels of boys attract a lot of negative press, especially around standardised testing such as NAPLAN. We are constantly reminded that boys' literacy levels are behind those of girls. Even more alarming are stereotypes that only girls like to read, and boys only enjoy non-fiction books. At BGS, we are committed to challenging these stereotypes and actively seek ways to engage boys in reading. Weekly library lessons take place where boys are introduced to new authors and series, share what they are reading and engage in rich discussions about texts. Our English teachers intentionally select quality literary works that are age-appropriate and appeal to boys' interests.

Our Middle School Reading and Literacy Advisor, Ms Michelle Ragen recently conducted a survey to identify students' reading habits and preferences. Findings from the survey included:

- Middle School boys tend to prefer print books over all other mediums, including eBooks
- While most boys enjoy reading, their level of enjoyment decreases slightly from Year 5 to Year 8
- Most Middle School boys prefer fiction over non-fiction even in Year 8, 78% of our boys prefer fiction
- Adventure and fantasy genres remain very popular in each year level
- In Years 5 and 6, mothers are overwhelmingly the ones who most commonly recommend books to their sons; however, by the time boys are in Year 8, the Teacher Librarians most commonly recommend books to them
- Harry Potter and Percy Jackson are popular choices for our Middle School students across all year levels

Head of English, Mr Greg Howes shared reasons why some boys become reluctant readers, particularly as they



get older. Sometimes it's because there's little time left in a busy day; sometimes it's because they just lose interest. Another factor is that it can be difficult to find the right book that will help older students move beyond young adult fiction. To overcome these obstacles, Mr Howes offers the following tips for parents and teachers:

- Talk enthusiastically about books and the ideas they contain. Curiosity is motivating. Even as adults, we are more likely to read a book that someone else has mentioned favourably.
- Find books that will serve as a bridge into more challenging literary works. Look for books that are marketed to adult readers but are still accessible to young adults. Stories that involve detective work or deal with the concept of justice are usually appealing.
- Create routines around reading. All that is needed is 15 minutes a day. Audiobooks and story-related podcasts shouldn't be forgotten; there are some wonderful apps and online resources. Time spent travelling to and from school is underutilised for 'reading' purposes.
- Display a positive attitude towards reading and find the time to read.

Role modelling has a powerful impact on children. In my own professional reading, I recently came across the term, 'dispositional apprenticeship'. Advocates of this type of learning highlight that children learn from us the messages that we explicitly and implicitly deliver. They go on to say that mirror neurons fire most strongly for people with whom we identify; we are programmed to learn from others. In other words, if children see those they are closest to enjoying reading, they are more likely to pick up a book themselves. The messages we send around reading and the value placed on it at home and school greatly influence our boys' attitudes and dispositions.

I thank Ms Vicki Palmer and Ms Dani Smith for making Book Week such an enjoyable event and for the incredible role they play in nurturing our reading culture.

Boys and Sleep Health

I agree with her belief that we need to address the topic personally, so as to model good practice for our children. If we are to have any impact, we must first address the issue ourselves. The benefit, of course, is that it will be incredibly valuable to our health and wellbeing.

This concept is no different from other areas, as modelling good practice is the key to so many aspects of effective parenting. I encourage you to visit **The Sleep Connection website** and access the useful resources on offer, particularly focusing on pre-sleep and post-waking routines. These are crucial to the establishment of your body clock, which is in turn crucial to effective sleep patterns.

National Closing the Gap Day

Today was the Closing the Gap assembly. This is an important assembly each year at BGS as we continue to develop the awareness of our community on the roles we play to assist in closing the gap for Indigenous people. I congratulate the Closing the Gap Committee senior leader, Jude Forrest, who spoke brilliantly at today's assembly and who has done an excellent job leading the group this year. This week, Lisa Maltman of The Sleep Connection once again visited Brisbane Grammar School to help with the School's processes and practices regarding sleep. In the past, Lisa has worked directly with Harlin House to monitor sleep patterns and to provide best practice examples as we develop and refine our approach. We aim to ensure your son gets the rest he needs to fulfil his potential.

Schools use data to check the effectiveness of processes and initiatives. Boarders have been providing data relating to their time asleep and the quality of that experience. We will review this information to appraise our current systems and refine our practices.

This works alongside a more traditional means of evaluation, in walking the corridors and making sure lights are out and boys are in bed. On Tuesday night of this week, I was particularly impressed by the Years 10 and 11 boys on the ground floor who had managed their bed routines to the extent that the only significant noise I could hear was the gentle snoring of one of our senior boys.

Our approach is simple: we establish a set routine that we adhere to, and in doing so look to manage access to technology and develop the habit of reading. From novels to set texts for English and even the occasional boy reading essays on pluralism; I am heartened by what I see.

The challenge is that such patterns and routines take time to establish. I encourage you to maintain the boarding bedtime and sleep routine over the coming break to assist your son in readiness for his continuing academic journey for the rest of the year. Changes to qualifications allowed for Year 12 school leaver entry to university

In the new System of Assessment and Tertiary Entry (SATE) there are changes to the qualifications allowed for school leavers when applying to university. Decisions about the use of qualifications other than the ATAR are made by individual institutions. For example, in the case of UQ and QUT AMEB qualifications are no longer accepted for school leaver entry in 2021. The information below provides information on decisions made by the three Brisbane universities.

The University of Queensland

In the year that a student completes high school, the only ranking that will be awarded to a UQ preference will be that of the new ATAR when it comes into effect for the first time in 2020.

From 2020 onwards, UQ will no longer allow school-leaver applicants to receive a standalone selection rank based on a VET award alone. This is in response to the introduction of the new SATE system. Currently, students can use VET awards to gain a separate tertiary entrance rank in Queensland in addition to their OP or school studies. Under the new system, a completed VET award may be used in the calculation of a student's ATAR where it is one of the student's best eligible study results.

Advice from the Admissions Office at the University indicates that this decision also applies to 'alternative qualifications' and includes ranks gained from Music, Dance, and Speech and Drama qualifications from providers such as AMEB.

This change will only impact students applying to UQ for tertiary entry in the year immediately following Year 12. Non-school-leaver applicants will still be able to use their VET and other qualifications to apply for entry to UQ in subsequent years, and this change will not impact students completing their OP in 2019.

Queensland University of Technology

QUT will not accept non-AQF performing arts qualifications, such as AMEB or Trinity College. You can read more on QUT standards for entry to the new system **here**.

Griffith University

Griffith University has a statement on their website which indicates that from 2021 the ATAR will be the admission pathway for Year 12 students applying to study a Griffith undergraduate program. They have a commitment to the continuation of VET pathways and the details of this can be found **here**.

On Tuesday, boys in Year 7 participated in a workshop focusing on the importance of sleep on their emotional and physical wellbeing. Lisa Maltman from The Sleep Connection explained to boys that improving their sleeping habits is the simplest way to improve their overall health, resilience and performance. Throughout the workshop, boys developed an awareness of the current level of sleep deprivation among students and the effect this is having on all aspects of their lives. Boys were also empowered with knowledge, practical strategies and tools to make informed decisions regarding their sleep health.

Interestingly, most boys' motivations to improve their sleep were similar to what we expected — improvements in mood, energy, concentration, academic and sport performance. It was very positive to see how aware boys were of the impact poor quality sleep had on their relationships at school and home and how they really didn't care as much about people when they were tired. This was something they wanted to improve on. The issues explored during the workshop will be further discussed during student wellbeing lessons.

Our Year 9 boys started the day well with many good performances across the age group. While some crews had mishaps, five out of nine crews placed in the top four, with three crews securing third place.

The Brisbane Grammar School Art Support Group is delighted to present the 50th Annual Art Show, Aurum.




