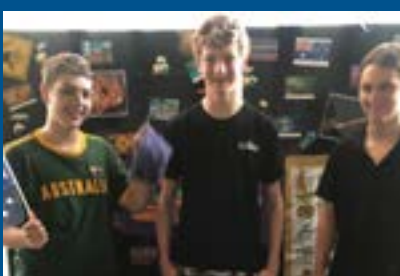

# Acting Head of Middle School

This year sees the beginning of significant changes to the Queensland Certificate of Education, with the current OP score replaced with an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) for students graduating in 2020 onwards. Despite these changes and the introduction of high-stakes external examinations, Brisbane Grammar School remains committed to providing a broad, liberal education nurturing each boy's academic, physical, social and emotional wellbeing. One way through which we aspire to achieve our ambition is providing an extensive range of activities and experiences, both within and beyond the classroom.

Over the holiday break, I had the privilege of accompanying a group of Year 11 students to the third annual Asia-Pacific Young Leaders Convention (APYLC), hosted by Binus School in Jakarta, Indonesia. The APYLC provides a platform for aspiring young leaders to come together to discuss global issues, raise political awareness and to share their own experiences. The main activity was a mixed team challenge with students working together over the four days to research and prepare a 20-minute presentation attended by the Headmaster or Principal of each school. Topics included technology, environment, urban planning, inequality and the wealth gap, human rights and education.

Students learned about issues and challenges facing Indonesia from organisations including the UN Refugee Agency (UNHCR), Waste4Change, Hope Indonesia, and Habitat for Humanity. Participants then engaged in field research, visiting locations related to their topic. Our students visited a landfill, worked in a refugee kitchen and assisted with building a house for a family in need. Following the immersion phase, delegates participated in rich group discussions to compare Indonesia's situation with their own home countries and to provide viable solutions to address the stark contrasts that exist in Indonesia.

This meaningful and purposeful inquiry was a valuable learning experience for our students that allowed them to think deeply about a topic and to explore real-life issues from multiple perspectives. Students were encouraged to critique and challenge their own thinking as well as the thinking of others. It was a true example of learning beyond the classroom that engaged both the heart and the mind.

I thank Ms Douglas for organising this experience for our students and I also thank our student representatives who were wonderful ambassadors for Brisbane Grammar School. Next year's APYLC will be hosted by Kaichi High School in Japan.





Back in Brisbane, our Middle School Music students recently attended the Junior Music Camp, culminating in a concert in Centenary Hall on Monday afternoon. The camp and concert provided our young musicians with the opportunity to work together to develop their musicality and their performance skills. I was incredibly proud to see so many of our senior boys assisting with the program and developing their leadership skills through mentoring our young musicians. A special thank you to Mr Ingram, our Music staff and guest conductors for facilitating this wonderful experience.

Preparations have also commenced for the highly anticipated Middle School Dramatic Production, *10 Ways to Survive the Zombie Apocalypse*, which will be performed in Term 3 (15, 16 and 18 August). Through this experience, our Years 7 and 8 thespians have a unique opportunity to hone their artistic talents under the guidance of our talented Drama staff.



Commencing Friday of Week 8, Middle School students will participate in their first Signature Program for 2019. We are excited to be planning three new Year 8 programs that delve into the world of theatre, robotics, coding and engineering. For those new to BGS, regular timetabled classes are suspended during Signature Programs, while students engage in an extended design thinking task, with collaboration and creative problem-solving at its core.

This term, Public Purpose sees our Middle School year level committees joining forces with the Year 10 committee to support the Sisters of the North, raising funds for those affected by the recent Queensland floods. Throughout the term, the boys will work together to raise money to help rural children from Mt Isa School of the Air to attend their Year 5 camp and Year 6 Canberra trip. While raising funds to support those in need is important, education and raising awareness of local and global issues is fundamental to our Public Purpose program.

Our Year 8 classes will round out their Outdoor Education experience this term with 8G, 8H and 8I attending in coming weeks. This then sees a break in the Outdoor Education program for Middle School students until Term 4. Our Outdoor Education program allows students to build on the skills and experiences developed in the previous year and provides a gradual increase in the degree of challenge. Thank you to our Outdoor Education staff, particularly Mr Derek Jervis and Mr Mat Fairley for providing such an engaging and rewarding experience for our Middle School boys.

Capturing merely a snapshot of the various activities offered beyond the classroom at BGS, this article demonstrates the breadth of experiences available to our boys. At last week's Middle School assembly, I reminded students that a new term presents fresh opportunities. All were encouraged to step out of their comfort zone and to approach new experiences with a growth mindset, a willingness to take responsible risks and an openness to new learning. Balancing his academic program with a rich array of experiences to nurture his creative, intellectual, social and emotional growth should be a priority for each BGS student. I look forward to seeing all Middle School boys embrace new opportunities throughout Term 2.

**Internet Safe Education** provides a community for parents, carers and those interested in the health, safety and wellbeing of children in an online environment to access credible and up-to-date resources.

Five key messages and actions for technology:

- Communicate with your sons
- Set clear rules and boundaries
- Stay up to date with apps and programs
- Consider and use parental controls
- Be the one who makes the final decisions

**Family Zone** is an online cybersafety solution design to protect children. It is simple to set up, easy to use and supported by a team of experts. This app removes adult content, manages the use of social apps including in-app purchases, sets routines for what can be accessed and when, and works across every device.

**eSafety Parents and Carers** provides practical, issue-focused information and advice for parents of children of all ages, as well as investigating complaints about offensive and illegal material.

## Global Leadership Tours

During the Term 1 holidays, a group of BGS students travelled to Virginia, USA, to participate in and represent BGS at the Loudoun International Youth Leadership Summit (LIYLS).

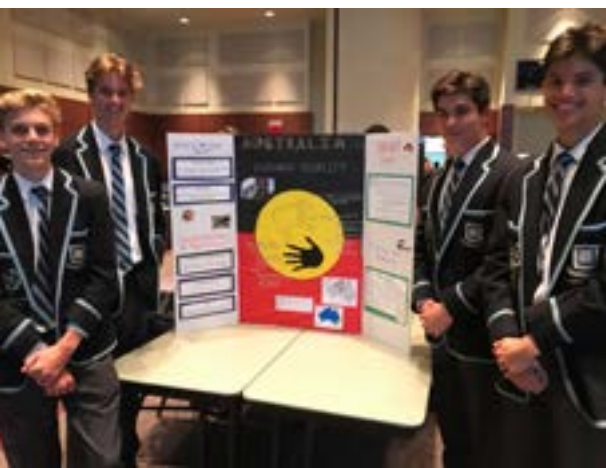
Over 10 days, we had the privilege of meeting students from 26 different nations from around the world, including Japan, Lebanon, South Africa, Greece, Costa Rica, France, Sweden, Panama, Scotland, and Singapore. We regularly conversed in open dialogue discussions, focusing on issues from our own countries relating to collective identity, historic preservation, human rights and the environment.

We also got to experience American high school culture, such as attending classes, eating 'American' food, travelling to and visiting monuments and museums in Washington D.C., and spending free time with our host families. Highlights included the National Museum of African American History and Culture, and taking part in a school 'pep rally'.

The main task we were given at the summit was to devise an action plan to tackle an inequality of our choosing. We addressed the issue of the poor health conditions from diet that Indigenous populations in rural Australia are experiencing.

Despite a transit time of over 27 hours to get back home, we thoroughly enjoyed our trip to the States. It has provided us with a great learning experience, exposure to life in other countries, and strong friendships.

## Senior Dramatic Production

Excitement is building as the cast and crew bring Daniel Evans' reworking of Shakespeare's *Richard III* to life. To do justice to this ambitious production, we have engaged the services of multi-award-winning lighting designer, Jason Glenwright, who has created lighting states that are both subtle and dramatic.

While the cast took a well-earned break from rehearsal over the recent holidays it was the Tech Team's turn to hit the stage. Over several days Oliver Butler (Year 10), Louis Cardell-Ree (Year 12) and Theo Dickey (Year 9) worked hard to install the most sophisticated lighting rig we have ever undertaken in the BGS Theatre. Jason's design calls for a multitude of computer-controlled LED fixtures rigged in previously untried locations and the result is stunning.

Working with an industry-leading designer has given myself and our lighting technician Cameron Quagliotto (Year 10) the opportunity to significantly enhance our knowledge of the process of stage lighting. The planning and design techniques we have learned will stand us in good stead on future productions.

There is still a lot of work to be done on refining the technical side of the production. So, as the villain of our production might say:

"Now is the winter of our discontent. Made glorious summer by this awesome lighting rig."

# Greening Grammar

Greening Grammar will support the **Tennis Avenue Bushcare Group in Ashgrove** on **Sunday 5 May**. The group is restoring a stretch of Enoggera Creek. The particular site has historic and remnant trees and the group's focus is to maintain and improve this important corridor link with infill planting and weed management. 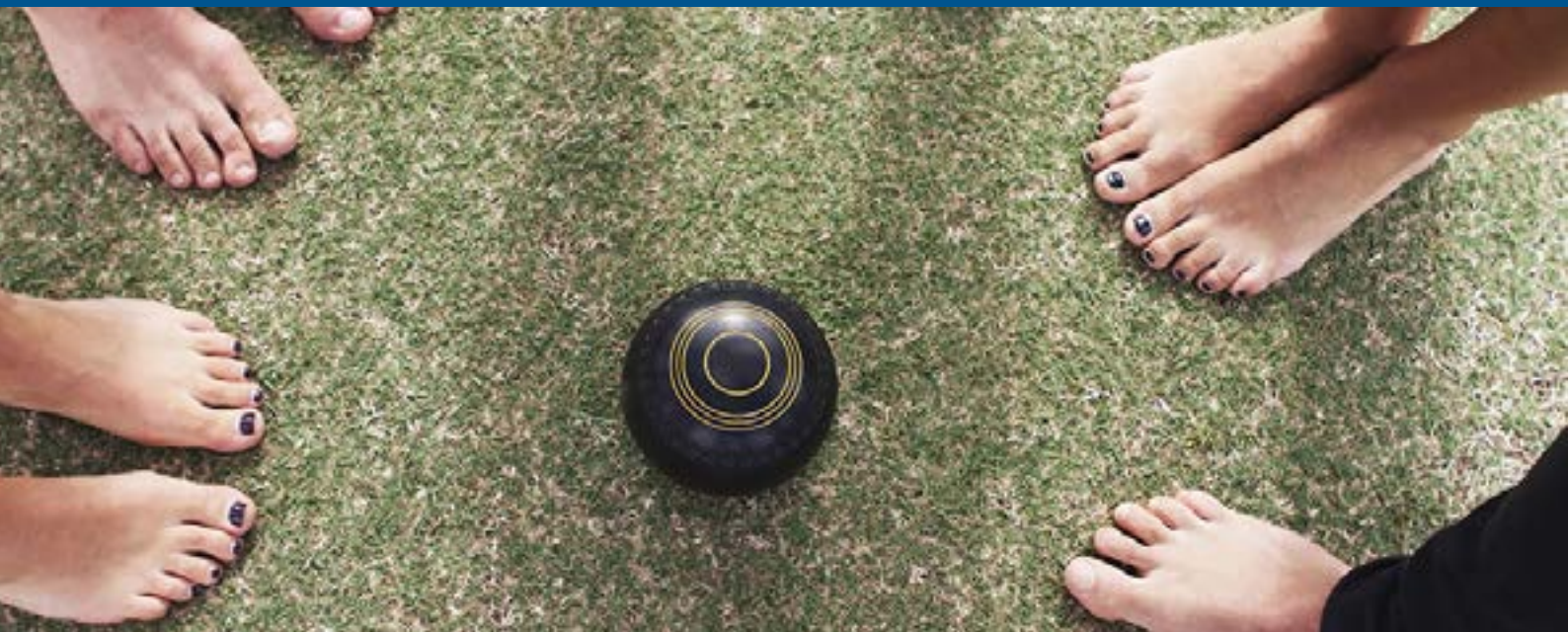
