## What our families think about BGS traffic.

Traffic congestion during drop-off and pick-up is a perennial issue for many schools. It is particularly challenging for BGS as we share an inner-city street with two other significant schools.

To tackle this issue, BGS and BGGS recently introduced several changes to improve safety and traffic flow. This includes limiting wait times during pick-up and restricting pedestrian movement when traffic lights in and out of BGS are green.

To inform further improvements, BGS and BGGS surveyed their respective communities to understand travel behaviour and traffic volume. More than 500 BGS families responded to our survey, which indicates a considerable level of interest in this topic.

Valuable quantitative data from this survey is depicted in the infographics on the following pages. The qualitative feedback from our families revealed the following recurrent themes:

- Dysfunctional driver behaviour is a significant cause of traffic congestion;
- Common suggestions for simple infrastructure changes were identified;
- Heavy and bulky sports bags are a limiting factor to the use of public transport use;
- Parents have safety concerns around the early and late use of public transport; and
- Past pedestrian traffic management practices contributed to traffic congestion.


This survey's results, in addition to externally commissioned vehicle traffic surveys, will be considered by both schools and a traffic engineer. Infrastructure changes, particularly those involving traffic lights and pedestrian crossings, will be presented to Brisbane City Council.

We thank all those families who took the time to complete our survey. We are committed to student safety and improving the drop-off and pick-up experience for our community.





## Protecting Children Is Everybody's Business | Queensland Child Protection Week

This week was Queensland Child Protection Week. To raise student awareness, BGS displayed a video campaign on the screens in The Lilley Centre. The campaign encouraged boys to speak to a trusted adult if faced with a child protection issue, including bullying.

We provide a safe environment where boys can report issues that make them feel uncomfortable. This is a vital message that all BGS community members need to send.

At today's Senior School assembly, I outlined the Child Safe School Environment Framework that I have presented to many parents, volunteers, Old Boy coaches and tutors. This framework is based on research from the Royal Commission.

The BGS framework is based on the Child Safe Institutions document and includes:

- Policies and Practices – outlining procedures to follow if issues arise
- Promotion and Perennial – informing our community of our focus and progress on an ongoing basis
- People and Culture – developing proactive strategies aimed at supporting students (the most important category)

Today, we hosted the Australian Boarding Schools Association Regional Conference in The Lilley Centre. It was wonderful to collaborate with almost 40 boarding colleagues from the region. We spent the time learning about and discussing wellbeing issues for adolescent students in the residential setting.

Thank you to Michael Knight from Peer Power for leading the first session of the conference. Michael delivered an insightful presentation about adolescent wellbeing and highlighted the challenges they face while navigating this developmental stage. He also provided useful strategies to identify when students might be facing these challenges in the boarding context.

Michael then answered questions alongside Julie Hodges of EduMatters, The Director of Boarding at The Southport School Tony Watt, Assistant Principal and Dean of Boarding at Stuartholme Karen Davis and BGS Student Counsellor Nathan Simmons. The expert panel was a valuable addition, answering a breadth of questions from eager colleagues.

Panel member Julie Hodges is an old friend of Harlin House, having worked with Former Director of Boarding Ross Chapman for the pilot Student Wellbeing program. Her work has since been adopted as a standardised boarding wellbeing test by several schools in South East Queensland.

On Sunday, we will undertake our first boarding wellbeing test at Harlin House. We look forward to working with Julie to decode results and develop targeted strategies to improve our program.

# Director of Outdoor Education

The Year 10 classes have started their final outdoor education experience, with 10A at Moogerah last week. The Year 10 program focuses on leading others, and boys practise peer leadership in the field.

Students complete the high ropes course to start the week, then embark on an expedition across the Teviot Range for three days. The groups select and navigate their route and decide on summiting one of the peaks across the range. Extending their skills obtained in Year 9, the boys design bivvy shelters on the expedition and learn to light a campfire with a friction technique.

Sam Bizzell was a standout student in his expedition group. Sam put the needs of his group before his own, showed great attention to detail when navigating and facilitated group decisions throughout the journey. Tyrese Ahloo was highly supportive of others and an effective motivational leader. He was a valued group member both at the campsite and the centre.

Alexander Dagleish also showed great leadership potential while navigating the expedition and with his positive attitude towards the program and his peers. Alex showed a genuine interest in the outdoors, and his enthusiasm kept the group motivated. Pavan Subburaj stepped up to take the leadership role with confidence and motivate his group.

Thomas Freeman was willing to lead, yet capable of stepping back and providing fantastic support to his peers. Thomas was often looking out for others and showed great initiative at the campsite. William Riddell had a great week; he was willing to challenge himself and support his mates.

Aiden Catakovic reflected on his experiences at the end of the program:

*"After my Year 10 experience I now understand and see the importance of Outdoor Education. Each year, the camp has allowed me to create closer bonds and new friendships which have followed me through school. It also helps students to disconnect from the world, understand the land and to learn more about Aboriginal culture."*

# Director of Student Wellbeing Programs

## Year 6 Global Citizenry | Solar Buddy Program

In Term 3, the Year 6 curriculum encourages students to consider their place in the global community. Over three lessons, boys learn about energy poverty and create a solar light for children who do not have electricity. Old Boy Phil Gough '62 is a passionate supporter of the Solar Buddy Program and shares his knowledge with the boys during the lessons.

This September holidays, the Year 10 boys on the Cambodia service immersion will distribute the lights to children in remote villages so they can study in the evenings and improve their educational outcomes.

The Solar Buddy Project complements the Year 6 Independent Investigation: a major project for Geography, Science and English lessons. Boys focus on a geographical issue, such as water shortage or power supply in an Asian country. They can also explore a social issue such as poverty or human rights as part of next term's Signature Programs. Such programs are an essential ingredient for a broad liberal education. They help students appreciate diversity, bring awareness to global issues and encourage boys to make a difference in their global communities.



## Year 10 Programs

A couple of weeks ago, Year 10 boys attended the Prevent Alcohol and Risk-Related Trauma in Youth (PARTY) Program at the Royal Brisbane Women's Hospital. PARTY helps teens identify risks and make better and safer choices.

In a full day at the hospital, boys were exposed to a trauma patient's painful journey through presentations, interviews with patients and families, and simulated clinical scenarios. They also learned about trauma injuries and the equipment used in trauma care and rehabilitation. Although confronting and challenging, the feedback from the boys was extremely positive.

*"My experience at the PARTY program helped me realise how senseless drink driving is and how having an accident under the influence can create extreme trauma to the victim and their families. I found the program to be extremely informative and I really appreciated the opportunity to attend." – Year 10 student Reagan Holliday*

Year 10 boys also attended the RACQ Learner Presentation held at school. Students were given practical information and strategies to help them pass their practical driving test and discussed what it meant to be a good mate in the passenger seat. The interactive program engaged boys to consider real-world scenarios, which should help these novice drivers in their driving learning journey.

## Debating

The format of the evening was familiar, but I was surprised by the environment of safe risk-taking enabled by the outstanding leadership of this program. You may be wondering what I mean when I talk about risk-taking in this context. Allow me to explain.

The dinner function turned into a compelling, hilarious, well-prepared debate; our senior students took on an all-star team, which included two of our exceptional coaches and an experienced BGS Debating parent.

The intellectual wrestling match which ensued allowed our seniors to have fun and use their wit and expertise while setting a positive example to the junior students. The pre-debate censor attempts were mostly effective, and we witnessed an exceptionally high standard of thinking and structured advocacy.

All those involved took risks, and those risks paid off. Each boy involved in Debating this year has taken risks, from the moment they signed-up to their final contest.

For many people, speaking in front of others is confronting. To do so in a time-poor environment, with rigid rules, knowing you are being formally judged, on a topic which you may find utterly contemptible, in front of a room full of people, with your opponent allowed to interrupt you repeatedly; *that* is the definition of taking a risk.

With risk comes reward. It was a privilege to honour our debating students and especially those who shone in their performances this year. It was also an honour to hear the expressions of gratitude from our departing BGS Debating students. That is our greatest reward.


## Safety Inductions
